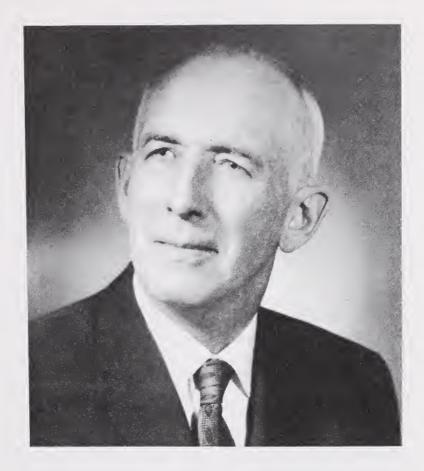

### TOWN WARRANT March 13, 1979

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE Poll will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000."

If the provisions of this subdivision are adopted by a town or city that had not previously adopted this subdivision, the provisions of RSA 72:39 and 72:40 are no longer effective in that city or town.

If after adoption of this subdivision as amended, a town or city votes to rescind such adoption, RSA 72:39 and 72:40 shall take effect at the same time such rescission becomes effective. (By Petition)

3. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system; which exemption shall be in an amount of 100%?" (By Petition)

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 4 through will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 15, 1979 at 7 p.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of \$795,000 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, the sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$170,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 6. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1979 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for summer and winter maintenance of highways, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,083.83 to be used with the sum of \$13,892.21 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$892.23 as a set-off against that reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire known as the Duncan Fund, for use on Class V highways.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,284.98 which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,117.30 as a set-off against the State reimbursement known as Highway Subsidy Funds.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 for a Highway Grader.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,200 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the repaying of two fire station driveways or to take any other action in relation thereto.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new fire truck or to take any action in relation thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,500.00 for updating the tax map, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,500 for operation and maintenance of the landfill area, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements with commercial rubbish haulers for the use of the town's landfill site upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interests of the Town.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,510 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 for the care of cemeteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the Civil Defense program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.

28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for renovation of the old High School Building for town office or to take any other action in relation thereto.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for a new heating system for the Stone Memorial building or to take any action in relation thereto.

30. To see what part of the surplus, if any, the Town will vote to return to the general fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for office equipment for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office and the office of the Selectmen, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the sealing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.

33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of that portion of Memorial Drive known as Slack's Hill or to take any other action in relation thereto.

34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire independent public accountants to perform the financial audit of the town records for the year ended December 31, 1979 and also a compliance audit required of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

35. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$100.00.

36. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town and further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the "Notice of Building and Permit Ordinance," adopted at the March 5, 1974 Town Meeting, by inserting the following after the third full paragraph, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

A notice of intent to build and building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family and designed or intended for residential purposes.

A notice of intent to build may only be filed by, and a building permit only issued to, the owner of record of the land on which the building is to be erected, or his authorized agent.

A building permit shall be valid for twelve (12) months unless active and substantial construction has begun during that period. A building permit may not be transferred or otherwise assigned.

These amendments shall take effect upon passage.

38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to seek other means of covering Town employees for Workers Compensation.

39. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Conservation Commission to survey and map the remaining tracts of Town land (not originally surveyed and mapped), and to authorize said Conservation Commission to withdraw from the Forestry Account an amount not to exceed S for the purpose of surveying and mapping, or take any other action in relation thereto.

40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to take such action as may be necessary to acquire on behalf of the Town such tracts of land as are determined by the official map of the Town not to have any ownership and to authorize the withdrawal from the Forestry Account an amount not to exceed \$ for said purpose or to take any other action in relation thereto.

41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Town Shed for the Highway Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

42. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Petition)

43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for winter maintenance of East Shore Road, so-called. (By Petition)

44. To see if the Town will vote to accept Lawrence Road, so-called, as a town road. (By Petition)

45. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road shown on a plan known as "Land of Leslie & Pearl Durant, 'Windsong Heights', Weare, N.H.", and known as Windsong Heights Road, so-called. (By Petition)

46. To see if the Town will vote to accept the remaining portion of Ridgeview Road as a town road. (By Petition)

47. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to its Sub-Division Regulations of 1973, effective on passage, or take any other action in relation thereto:

1. Delete paragraph 2.A. and substitute:

A sub-division is defined as any parcel of land that is divided into two (2) or more pieces and offered for the purposes, whether immediate or future, of sale, lease or of building development.

2. Delete paragraph 2.B. and substitute:

The gift or offering for sale by any natural person in a calendar year of a single piece of property, regardless of size and of the fact that it may be part of a larger parcel, does not come within the scope or purpose of these regulations. This exception does not apply to approved lots in any approved sub-division. 3. Add before the first sentence in paragraph 2.C.:

All roads constructed in a sub-division shall meet or exceed Class V specifications. Access to a sub-division must be from a Class V or higher road.

- 4. Delete paragraph 2.D. and reletter 2.E.
- 5. Delete paragraph 3.A. and reletter 3.B., C., D., E., F.
- 6. Add a new paragraph to section 3:

F. In any calendar year, the maximum number of lots in a subdivision that will be approved by the Planning Board will be as follows:

1. In a subdivision of ten acres or less, one lot of two or more acres;

2. In a subdivision of more than ten acres, a number of lots of two or more acres equal to 20% (1/5) of the total potential number of two acre lots in the subdivision.

(Example: a one hundred acre subdivision, with a potential of 50 two acre lots, may have ten lots approved each year).

This paragraph F. shall expire on March 31, 1982.

- 7. In paragraphs 4.A. and 4.B., substitute "60 days" in each place that "30 days" appears.
- 8. Insert the following after the second sentence of paragraph 4.A.:

It shall also include or be accompanied by such other information and documents, including State of New Hampshire permits and approvals, that the Planning Board may request.

9. Delete the fourth sentence of paragraph 4.B. and substitute the following:

If this final plat meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent state statutes, and is in the best interests of the Town, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on 2 copies of the same.

10. Add a new section 7:

7. SAVINGS CLAUSE

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

48. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

In order to permit the Town of Weare to regulate its nature and growth in accordance with a carefully considered master plan, which is to be developed over the next three years, and to maintain relatively stable circumstances while a master plan is being developed, the following ordinance is adopted:

- 1. The number of building permits to be issued for residential purposes in any calendar year shall be limited to 24. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.
- 2. Notices of intent to build may be filed between January 1st and 10th, April 1st and 10th, July 1st and 10th and October 1st and 10th of each year. Building permits shall be issued in the order in which such notices are received. except that:

a. No more than eight (8) permits shall be issued in any calendar year quarter. In the event permits available for that quarter are not issued, they shall be added to those available in the next quarter. Permits not issued by the end of the calendar year shall not be carried over into the next year.

b. A person may be issued no more than one (1) building permit for residential purposes while this ordinance is in effect.

c. In the event that more than eight (8) notices of intent to build are filed in any filing period, building permits shall be issued in the order of the dates of the deeds for the lots on which the buildings are to be erected (oldest first).

3. This ordinance SHALL NOT APPLY to building permits

a. for residential additions, remodeling or construction where no additional dwelling unit is created; OR

b. to replace damaged or destroyed dwelling units; OR

c. for a dwelling unit which replaces an existing dwelling unit removed from the town; OR

d. for commercial, industrial or other non-residential structures.

- 4. No new or addition to an existing subdivision shall be created, nor shall any created be approved, by the Weare Planning Board while this ordinance is in effect.
- 5. No permit for the removal of sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be granted by the Selectmen under the Removal of Gravel, etc. ordinance of 1972, as amended, or otherwise, while this ordinance is in effect; provided, however, that existing permits may be renewed according to the ordinance of 1972, as

amended, for the removal of not more than 110% of the quantity actually removed in the preceding permit year.

- 6. This ordinance shall take effect on passage and expire on March 31, 1982.
- 7. The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.(By Petition)

49. To see if the Town will vote to amend its ordinance limiting building permits for residential purposes to one for each ten acres of land, adopted at the 1978 town meeting, by deleting sections A, B and C and substituting the following:

A. Building Permits - Residential. No person shall be granted building permits in any calendar year in excess of one for the first ten contiguous acres of land, or part thereof, and one for each succeeding ten contiguous acres, or part thereof, on which the building is to be erected. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit in a building. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.

(Example: if one owns three separate parcels, a 5 acre piece, a 2 acre piece and a 20 acre piece, he may receive 5 building permits in a calendar year, but only two may be used on the 20 acres.)

- B. Building Permits Nonresidential. The above limitations shall not apply to building permits for commercial, industrial or non-residential construction.
- C. This ordinance shall expire on March 31, 1982.(By Petition)

50. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

To protect the public health, safety, prosperity and general welfare and to secure the orderly development of the Town of Weare, the following ordinance is adopted:

The construction, remodeling, enlarging or placing of a cumulative total of four (4) or more dwelling units on any site, lot or parcel of land owned or controlled by any person or group of persons shall be treated as if it were a subdivision and shall not be undertaken until the subdivision regulations of the Town then in effect have been complied with and the approval of the Weare Planning Board has been obtained.

A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion

of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family and designed or intended to be used for residential purposes. (By Petition)

51. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

In order to permit the Town of Weare to regulate its nature and growth in accordance with a carefully considered master plan, which is to be developed over the next three years, and to maintain relatively stable circumstances while a master plan is being developed, the following ordinance is adopted:

- 1. No new or addition to an existing subdivision shall be created, nor shall any created be approved by the Weare Planning Board, while this ordinance is in effect.
- 2. A person may be issued no more than one (1) building permit for a new or additional dwelling unit while this ordinance is in effect. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit in a building. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.
- 3. No permit for the removal of sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be granted by the Selectmen under the Removal of Gravel, Etc. ordinance of 1972, as amended, or otherwise, while this ordinance is in effect; provided, however, that existing permits may be renewed according to the ordinance of 1972, as amended, for the removal of not more than 110% of the quantity actually removed in the preceding permit year.
  - 4. This ordinance shall take effect on passage and expire on March 31, 1982.
  - 5. The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

(By Petition)

52. To see if the Town will vote to amend its ordinance requiring two acres of land for each apartment, adopted at the 1974 Town Meeting, to read as follows:

To promote adequate sanitary waste disposal, to protect fresh water supplies and to preserve open space in the Town, any structure used for residential purposes and constructed, remodeled or enlarged hereafter to provide two or more dwelling units shall be on a separate lot containing not less than two acres for each dwelling unit in the structure. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family. (By Petition) 53. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

To protect and promote the rural serenity of the Town, no industrial, commercial, mining or other non-agricultural operation shall emit any sound in excess of 70 dB(A) decibels as measured at the operation's property lines.

The owner or person in charge of the operation shall be fined \$500 per day for each day on which this ordinance is violated. (By Petition)

54. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

To amend the Town ordinance governing "Removal of Gravel, etc." by adding the following paragraph (f) to the paragraph entitled "Terms and Conditions of Permit", as follows:

"(f) The maximum amount of gravel, sand, or other earth materials which may be removed under any permit shall be 30,000 cubic yards within any twelve month period. (By Petition)

55. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

### **GRAVEL PERMIT FEE ORDINANCE**

 A permit for the excavation, removal or relocation of earth, loam, topsoil, sand, gravel, clay, stone, minerals or other earth materials required under the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972, as amended, shall be subject to a fee for the use of the Town. This fee is to compensate the town for (a) the costs it will incur in maintaining and repairing town roads and bridges used by permit holders and in providing traffic control and other law enforcement services, and (b) for the aesthetic injury suffered over the lifetime of operations and the inconvenience to townspeople from increased traffic. The fee shall be as follows:

Quantity per Permit Year	Fee per Cubic Yard
Up to 25,000 cu. yds.	-0-
Next 25,000 cu. yds.	2¢
Next 50,000 cu. yds.	4q
Next 50,000 cu. yds.	6¢
Next 100,000 cu. yds.	8¢
Each additional cu. yd.	10¢

2. No permit required under the Removal of Gravel ordinance shall be issued until the fee imposed by this ordinance has been paid. The fee shall be based on the number of cubic yards of earth materials for which the permit is issued. No permit may be issued unless it specifies the maximum number of cubic yards of earth materials to be excavated, removed or relocated during the life of the permit.

- 3. The Selectmen are authorized and directed to obtain from permit applicants such information and to adopt such regulations as they deem necessary to administer and enforce this ordinance.
- 4. Any person who violates this ordinance or the regulations adopted hereunder by the Selectmen shall be fined \$100 or 20% of any additional fee due to the Town, whichever is greater, for each and every such violation. This fine shall be in addition to the payment of any fee that may be due to the Town. (By Petition)

56. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972, as previously amended, as follows, or take any other action in relation thereto:

To provide for a public hearing prior to the renewal of a permit, the section of the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972 entitled "Renewal" is hereby amended by adding the words, "after a public hearing," after the word "may" in the first line of the section. (By Petition)

57. To see if the Town of Weare will adopt the following:

Whereas the surfacing of, ground permeation of, flowage of, and pollution by untreated sewage in the Town of Weare in the environs of Highway 114, East St. and Flanders Memorial Road (Drive) is a noxious and potentially dangerous condition and has so been declared by the authorities of the State of New Hampshire and,

That the responsibility for the abatement of this nuisance is soley that of the property owners involved in originating this undesirable state of affairs,

To see if the following ordinance on this subject will be adopted by the Town of Weare:

- 1. Those owners of real property in the environs of the town center in the Highway 114, East St. and Flanders Memorial Road (Drive) area who contribute to this are solely responsible to abate their own sewage nuisance in a timely and compliant manner.
- 2. This can be performed through the addition of new or the improvement of existing septic waste systems. This can also be performed through the addition of sewage disposal systems utilizing electricity, gas, temporary sewage holding tanks, mulching type conversion systems, or any other type suitable system. Any such system must be approved by the New Hampshire Board of Water Pollution where such approval is applicable.

- 3. The owners of all property as described in paragraph 1 above are to be permitted the time needed until July 1, 1980 to survey, plan and implement the improvements to their faulty sewage disposal systems to abate the nuisance.
- 4. In the event of non-compliance with paragraph 3 above, the Board of Selectmen will, in a timely manner, with the aid of the State Board of Health, the State Board of Water Pollution Control and any and all other pertinent State agencies, not excluding the services of the various Courts of Law of the State of New Hampshire; initiate such action to have the errant, polluting premises vacated and declared to be non-habitable while such condition of non-compliance with the intent of this ordinance does exist. For the purposes of this ordinance, "in a timely manner" shall be defined as a period not to exceed 90 days.
- 5. In exceptional circumstances, the Board of Selectmen, at their discretion, may grant an additional period of time, not to exceed 3 months, that is, until November 1, 1980, for compliance as heretofore described. There shall be no other extensions of time granted beyond this date.
- 6. This ordinance supersedes all previous ordinances on this subject. Any and all monies previously appropriated towards the solution of this problem which have not as yet been spent, legally obligated to be spent are to be returned unearmarked to the town general funds. The sole exception to the foregoing are any as yet unexpended funds solely intended for the purchase of the gravel pit in this area.
- (By Petition)

58. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at Crosby's Store. (By Petition)

59. To see if the Town will vote to amend as follows, the Building Permit Ordinance adopted at the 1978 Town Meeting:

"D" Building permits are nontransferable.

60. To see what action the Town will take with respect to the Capital Budget Committee.

61. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Moderator read the first article of the Town Warrant. Harold Hall moved that reading of Articles 2 through 68 be waived at this time. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. Malcolm C. Purington moved that Town Meeting will, at the conclusion of the voting at 7 p.m., adjourn until Thursday, March 16, 1978 at 7 p.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium where it will then consider Articles 2 through 68. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The polls were declared open at 10:11 a.m. Proceeded to ballot for Town and School District officers.

The polls were closed at 7 p.m. for both the Town and School District. The ballots were counted and Neal Kurk, Assistant Town Moderator and School District Moderator, read the results of the vote at 8:54 p.m.

At 7:01 p.m. on March 16, 1978, the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Harold E. Thomson. The meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who had died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence.

The Moderator stated the rules of the meeting. He also stated that in previous years the Finance Committee had made a recommendation on an article and then a motion for expeditious reasons. This year the article will be read and, after a motion has been made, the Finance Committee will be asked for its recommendation. Then the person who made the motion will be allowed to speak.

The Moderator read the results of the Town and School District elections held on March 14, 1978. He then proceeded with the reading of the Warrant. Donald Myhr moved that the reading of the Warrant in its entirety be suspended and that each article be read as it is considered. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1978 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

Harold O. Hall moved that the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 5.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges and take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that \$919.54 be appropriated under Article 8. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$919.54. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$14,487.11, which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved the sum of \$14,487.11 be appropriated under Article 9. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$14,487.11. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 10.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the purchase of a brush shredder for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold O. Hall moved that \$3,000.00 be appropriated for the purchase of a brush shredder for the Highway Department and that we authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,000.00. After a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 11.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the purchase of a sander for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the sum of \$4,500.00 be appropriated for the purchase of a sander for the Highway Department and that we authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$4,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 12.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Donald E. Thomson moved that \$11,500.00 be raised and appropriated for the operating expenses of the Weare Police Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,000.00. Chief Thomson explained the budget needs of the Police Department and answered questions raised by the Meeting. The vote was affirmative -\$11,500.00 was raised and appropriated.

**ARTICLE 13.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,100.00 for the purchase of a new cruiser for the Weare Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose

from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Donald E. Thomson moved Article 13 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$6,100.00. After a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 14.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the sum of \$13,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the general expenses of the Weare Fire Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$13,000.00. Mr. Rhodenizer, Acting Chief of the Fire Department, asked permission to give a short talk and show where money previously appropriated has been spent. Since there was no objection, he proceeded to demonstrate the plectron radio receiver and explain how it is used by the members of the Fire Department. Members of the Fire Department modeled the new coats, boots and helmets that were purchased last year. Acting Chief Rhodenizer also explained the "C" and "I" decals that are available from the Fire Department to be placed in the bedroom windows of children and invalids. The vote was affirmative - \$13,000.00 was raised and appropriated.

**ARTICLE 15.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved that \$3,500.00 be raised and appropriated for equipment for the Fire Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 16.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved that \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the maintenance of the Town Fire Stations. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 17.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new tires for the tanker or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved that \$1,500.00 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of new tires for the Weare Fire Department tanker truck. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,500.00 towards the purchase of a new rescue van and to authorize the with-drawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

William Stafford, on behalf of the committee to look into the rescue needs of the town, moved the sum of \$5,000.00 be raised and appropriated by the Town to be matched by \$5,000.00 that has been raised by the Rescue Squad for a new rescue vehicle, and further, that the Selectmen be empowered to sell the existing rescue vehicle in the method most beneficial to the Town and apply the funds from the sale of the vehicle to the purchase of the new rescue vehicle. The motion was seconded.

John J. Killion, Jr. made a motion to substitute as follows: that we appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 toward the purchase of a new rescue van and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote on the substitute motion was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 19.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Civil Defense program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Edgar Hunt moved Article 19 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended that no money be raised under this article. Mr. Hunt stated the 1968 Dodge ambulance now belongs to Civil Defense. The vehicle needs work on the motor, exhaust system and other repairs. James B. Craig moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. Mr. Hunt stated that if the Town does not want this vehicle, it will be sent back to the State. The vote to dismiss was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 20.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for tax maps or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 20 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator declared a recess until 9:05 p.m. When the Meeting resumed, the Moderator requested guidance from the Meeting as to the best way to cover the 68 articles in the Warrant. He stated he would

entertain a motion to adjourn the Meeting at 10 p.m. or 11 p.m. until tomorrow night at 7 p.m. John Palmer, Jr. moved the meeting adjourn at 11 p.m. pending conclusion of business under discussion at that time until tomorrow evening at 7 p.m. The motion was seconded. William Boisvert moved to amend the motion that the meeting adjourn at 11 p.m. tonight or as soon as may be following conclusion of business pending at that time and that it reconvene at 7 p.m. on Thursday night -- a week from tonight. The vote on the amendment was negative. Edward Gallagher asked if the motion could be withdrawn and the Meeting be asked how many would like to adjourn at 10 p.m. and how many at 11 p.m. Mr. Palmer asked that his motion be withdrawn. The Meeting indicated they are in favor of adjournment at 11 p.m. The Chair stated he will entertain a motion at 11 p.m. to adjourn.

**ARTICLE 21.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$696.00 for the Concord Hospital or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Charles Toll moved the adoption of Article 21 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$696.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 22.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 23.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Malcolm C. Purington moved to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and that we authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee stated it would make no recommendation on this article. Harold O. Hall stated the Department of Revenue Administration has ruled this is a legitimate use of the funds. The money will be used for transportation to places of interest for the senior citizens. James B. Craig stated we do plenty for the children of the community and feels the Town should do something for the senior citizens. He recommended the article be passed. The vote was affirmative. **ARTICLE 24.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,100.00 for the care of cemeteries or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 24 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$4,100.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 25.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Band Concerts or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 25 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$600.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 26.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Camille Ahern moved to raise and appropriate \$5,900.00 for the Weare Public Library. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$5,900.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 27.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the observance of Memorial Day or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 27 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$300.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 28.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington made a motion to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for water safety. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$200.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 29.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the tennis courts.

David Dunning moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance of the tennis courts. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$200.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 30.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the lighting system at the tennis courts and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing

Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

David Dunning moved Article 30 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,000.00. After a lengthy discussion on this article a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article 30 was negative and the motion lost.

**ARTICLE 31.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for reconstruction and betterment of River Road, so called, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that \$15,000.00 be raised and appropriated under Article 31 for the construction and betterment of River Road and that said sum of \$15,000.00 be raised by the issuance of serial notes upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interest of the town. The motion was seconded. After discussion, a division vote was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 161; No - 25. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 32.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 to repair the shoulders on River Road from Robert Gordon's residence to Clough State Park Road or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 32 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$8,000.00. James B. Craig questioned whether we have the manpower to fix up these roads this year and suggested this be put on a carry-over basis. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 33.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Selectmen be authorized on behalf of the Town to make application for and accept gifts, grants, or other aid, whether Federal, State or private, and that any funds received pursuant to said gifts, grants, or aid be appropriated to the purpose for which they constitute reimbursement. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 34.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 34 be accepted as read. The motion

was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$95.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 35.** To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for increases in Town Officers' salaries and/or fees or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 35 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 36.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new heating system for the Stone Memorial Building or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 36 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 37.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for improvements to the existing water system at the Town Hall and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 37 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$900.00. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 38.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the purchase of office equipment for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's and Selectmen's offices and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved Article 38 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$900.00. After a short discussion, a division vote was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 91; No - 62. The vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 39.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of the Horse Sheds at the rear of the Town Hall or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon C. Brown moved that \$500.00 be raised and appropriated for the installation of a fire alarm system in the horse sheds. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$3,400.00. The vote was affirmative - \$500.00 was raised and appropriated.

**ARTICLE 40.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to complete the construction of the access road

to the landfill area and facilities, pursuant to RSA 147 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 to complete the construction of the access road and landfill site for the town sanitary landfill area and that said sum of \$23,000.00 be raised by the issuance of serial notes upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interest of the Town. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$23,000.00.

Mr. Killion explained the need for an appropriation of \$23,000.00 to complete this project. This was followed by a lengthy discussion. Volker Wyrenbeck moved to amend the motion by deleting the use of serial bonds. The motion was seconded. After further discussion, the vote on the amendment was taken. The vote was negative.

Discussion continued on the article. Forrest Esenwine asked if it is possible to earmark Revenue Sharing Funds in 1979 to help pay for the serial notes we are questioning here tonight. Can we make that stipulation now that at least a portion of Revenue Sharing Funds are used to help pay for this? Malcolm Purington stated it is possible and the Selectmen will take it under advisement and be prepared next year to propose that a certain amount of Revenue Sharing Funds be appropriated for that purpose.

Mr. Esenwine moved to amend it be stipulated that Revenue Sharing Funds be used to help pay for this expenditure. The Moderator stated that if we are going to spend Revenue Sharing Funds, it is his understanding that that must be specified as such in an article subject to the vote of the meeting.

Mr. Esenwine stated he was trying to find some way of making sure that this is remembered. The Moderator directed that this discussion will appear in the record. John Killion stated there are two things that can be done if it is desired Revenue Sharing Funds be used in a future year. One, you can appear at the Revenue Sharing hearing and make the request at that time; two, you can put a petition article in the 1979 Warrant.

Discussion continued until a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A division vote was taken on Article 40. The result of the vote: Yes - 171; No - 9. The vote was affirmative.

James B. Craig moved to adjourn the meeting until 7 p.m. on Friday, March 17, 1978. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The meeting adjourned at 11:24 p.m.

The adjourned Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany, at 7:04 p.m. on Friday, March 17, 1978.

**ARTICLE 41.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt mandatory recycling or to take any other action in relation thereto.

George VanFleet moved Article 41 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. After considerable discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the motion lost.

**ARTICLE 42.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a highway equipment shed or to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000.00 for the construction of a highway equipment shed and that said sum of \$35,000.00 be raised by the issuance of serial notes upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interest of the Town. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$33,000.00. After a brief discussion, a division vote was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 50; No - 101. The motion lost.

Warren Rollins made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the construction of a highway equipment shed. The motion was seconded. Forrest Esenwine made a motion to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, Mr. Esenwine asked that his motion be withdrawn. James B. Craig, who had seconded his motion, said he would not withdraw his second but would make the motion himself. Mr. Craig stated he felt this should be postponed for one year and moved to dismiss the entire article and the motion that was made on it. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

**ARTICLE 43.** To see what action the Town will take to dispose of sawlogs cut from the dump road and disposal site.

A motion was made by David Titcomb that the sawlogs which have been harvested by the Town from the town forest and road dump site be sold by competitive sale and that the funds be deposited in an encumbered account to be paid out upon vote of the Town. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 44.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt as an ordinace for the Town of Weare the following:

## PREAMBLE

Whereas, the Town of Weare is desirous of developing an Ordinance relative to fire protection in the Town of Weare and establishing guidelines and regulations for the administration of the Town of Weare Volunteer Fire Department, be it therefore ordained by the Town of Weare duly assembled at its Annual Meeting as follows:

### Section 1. Fire Wards and Fire Chief Appointment

The Fire Chief shall be appointed by the Selectmen for a term of one (1) year. The Fire Department shall make nominations for Fire Chief to the Selectmen, which nominations shall be accompanied by the recommendations by the Board of Fire Wards. The Fire Wards shall be a committee consisting of seven (7) persons, six (6) of whom shall be residents of the Town of Weare, who shall be elected for staggered three (3) year terms at the Annual Meetings on the official ballot for the Town of Weare. The seventh member shall be the Fire Chief then in office. Of the elected members, three (3) members shall be representatives of the general public, and three (3) members shall be representatives of the Fire Department.

### Section 2. Duties and Powers of the Fire Wards

The Fire Wards shall choose from their own membership a Chairman and a Clerk. The Fire Wards shall have the powers and duties normally attributed to a Board of Directors, shall determine the policies of the Weare Volunteer Fire Department, be responsible for management of financial affairs, and in other matters comply with the statutory requirements of the State of New Hampshire.

### Section 3. Duties and Powers of the Fire Chief

The Fire Chief shall be responsible as the chief executive officer of the Fire Department for the day-to-day operations of the Weare Volunteer Fire Department. He shall report to the Board of Fire Wards and see that the policies as adopted by the Board of Fire Wards are implemented. The Fire Chief shall have the powers and duties provided by New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Title XII, as amended.

### Section 4. Adoption of RSA 154

To the extent that the provisions of RSA 154 are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, the Town of Weare hereby adopts the provisions of RSA 154.

### Section 5. Indemnification

To the extent provided by the statutes of the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Weare hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless the Fire Chief, the Fire Wards and the members of the Weare Volunteer Fire Department from any claims made against them as a result of their performance of their official duties and while acting within the scope of their authority as representatives of the Town of Weare.

#### Section 6. Effective Date

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Provided, however, that the Fire Wards shall be appointed by the Selectmen to serve until the annual election of 1979, at which time two (2) members shall be elected for one-year terms, two (2) members for two-year terms, and two (2) members for three-year terms.

Malcolm C. Purington suggested the reading of this article be waived. This was approved by the Meeting. Gordon C. Brown made a motion that the article be accepted as printed in the town report. The motion was seconded. A discussion followed on the feasibility of electing the Fire Wards. John Killion stated the Board of Selectmen support the article as printed.

George E. Welch made a motion to amend Section 1 as follows: to require the Fire Wards be appointed by the Selectmen. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative and the motion lost. Larry Damour moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote on dismissal was taken. The vote was negative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the adoption of the ordinance as printed was affirmative.

John J. Killion, Jr. made a motion to suspend the rules and proceed to Article 47. The motion was seconded. After a brief discussion, the vote was taken. The Moderator stated it was manifest that the motion failed.

To see if the Town will vote that whatever authority ARTICLE 45. or control, if any, was granted to the Conservation Commission under Article 46 at Town Meeting in March, 1977 (1) to conduct and supervise a program of forest management of Town-owned forest properties including weeding, thinning, pruning, selective cutting or harvesting of timber and disposition thereof; (2) to collect, appropriate, expend or invest monies from or for such a program; (3) to establish a Weare Town Forests Account; (4) to extend roads in Town-owned forest properties; (5) to prescribe or permit uses of Town-owned forest properties; (6) to conduct or spend money for survey of Town-owned properties; or (7) to manage, supervise or control Town-owned forest properties in any other way, IS HEREBY RESCINDED; provided however, that the Conservation Commission may make recommendations to the Board of Selectmen in accordance with RSA 36-A, as amended, regarding a forestry management program and the Selectmen shall direct the preparation and management of such a program approved by vote of the Town Meeting; or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Edward Gallagher made a motion that Article 45 be adopted. The motion was seconded. Mr. Gallagher spoke on the duties and powers of the Conservation Commission and told the Meeting why he was opposed to the action taken at Town Meeting in 1977 regarding the management of the town forest by the Conservation Commission. He felt Article 45 should be adopted rescinding authority or control granted to the Conservation Commission at last year's meeting and stated the Con-

servation Commission should be put back on the track, not only for the good of the present Commission, but for the interest of the Town and the good and interest of any future Conservation Commission. Mr. Gallagher received a round of applause from the Meeting.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was negative. William Martin, Chairman of the Conservation Commission for the past year, reviewed the work of the Conservation Commission during this time. He described the procedure in awarding the bid to Henniker Hardwood Pallet for the harvesting and improvement work in the town forest and gave a breakdown of the harvest sold. The funds from the harvesting were deposited in an interest-bearing account in the Concord National Bank.

David Titcomb gave a report on the work of the Conservation Commission and stated a complete package of bid proposals, contracts and regulations was presented to the Selectmen prior to the bid openings. Mr. Titcomb described the town forest as an invaluable asset to the Town and projected the harvesting of the town forest over a period of years. He stated foresters estimated that 1,000 acres could provide 100,000 board feet perpetually if managed as you manage your country garden. He asked the Meeting to vote down Articles 45 and 46 and vote for Article 47.

Malcolm Purington stated the Board of Selectmen support the action of the Conservation Commission in their management of the town forest. He stated that at the meeting held on January 12, 1978 between the Conservation Commission and the Selectmen, it was universally agreed that Mr. Gallagher's suggestion that the control of the funds realized from the sale of timber should be placed in an encumbered account and placed under the control of the Selectmen. The Selectmen have prepared an amendment to Article 47 to accomplish that purpose.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A division vote was requested on the adoption of Article 45. The result of the vote: Yes - 23; No - 102. The motion failed.

**ARTICLE 46**. To see if the Town will vote that the Board of Selectmen shall prepare a program of forestry management for approval by vote of the Town Meeting.

- 1. They shall establish specifications for selective cutting and other necessary procedures; for sale and removal of timber; specify the period for cutting, the area for cutting in such period, the procedure for bids and a plan to provide available fuel wood to needy residents and for sale to other residents.
- 2. After each such period the Selectmen shall report to Town Meeting

the work performed and by whom; the quantity and disposition of all timber cut and to whom sold and at what price, and an account of all receipts and expenditures.

3. All monies received from the program shall be deposited to the general account of the Town and expense of the program shall be paid by the Town.

Edward Gallagher moved the adoption of Article 46. The motion was seconded. After a brief discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the adoption of Article 46 was negative.

**ARTICLE 47.** To see if the Town will vote to affirm the previous action under Article 46 of the 1977 Annual Meeting in relation to the Weare Conserveration Commission and to authorize said Commission to continue with the development of the Town Forest Management Program, including the survey of the town properties and the annual thinning and harvesting of selected sections of the town forest. The implementation of said program to be subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Martin moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. David Titcomb made a motion to amend the article by adding the following: The expenses of the program will be disbursed upon approval of the Selectmen. The balance of any receipts will be deposited in an encumbered account to be paid out upon vote of the Town. The motion to amend was seconded.

Donald Myhr made a motion to reconsider Article 46. The Chair stated there is a motion on the floor. After a short discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the amendment was affirmative.

After discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A standing vote was taken on the article as amended. The result of the vote: Yes - 138; No - 6. The article was adopted as amended.

The Meeting was recessed at 9:55 and called back to order at 10:10 p.m. by the Moderator. Larry McManus made a motion to limit debate for each speaker to 5 minutes due to the lateness of the hour. The motion was seconded. The Chair announced this motion is not debatable. A division vote was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 90; No - 44. The motion carried.

**ARTICLE 48.** To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money as may be necessary to have the taxable property of the Town

reappraised either by the State of New Hampshire or a private professional firm, as to be decided by the annual Town Meeting.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 under Article 48 to have the taxable property of the Town reappraised, the said sum of \$40,000.00 to be raised by the issuance of serial notes upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interest of the Town. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$40,000.00.

A motion was made and seconded to dismiss the article. The vote was affirmative. Neal Kurk pointed out that the person making the motion had not been given an opportunity to speak on his motion. The Chair agreed and Mr. Killion spoke on the reappraisal of the Town. He stated that if the State were to reappraise the Town, it would not occur until 1979 and would be completed in 1980. Charles Brown spoke in opposition to the article. The motion to dismiss was voted on. The vote was affirmative and the article dismissed.

**ARTICLE 49.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance:

Whereas the new high school has recently been opened, at a building cost of over \$680,000, and whereas the elementary and high schools are nearly at capacity, and whereas unlimited housing development would add to the nearly overcrowded conditions of the schools, and whereas police and fire departments are financially limited in their expenditures, the Weare Planning Board proposes to the voters for their consideration the following Ordinance to regulate the growth of the Town of Weare and to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents of Weare:

A. Building permits - Residential. No person shall be granted building permits for the year running from April 1 to March 31 in excess of one (1) for the first ten acres of land, or part thereof, owned on April 1, and one (1) for each succeeding ten acres, or part thereof, owned on April 1 of each year.

B. Building Permits - Nonresidential. The above limitations shall not apply to building permits for commercial, industrial or non-residential construction.

C. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage, but shall not apply to applications pending before the Board of Selectmen as of the date of passage.

Murray Wigsten moved that Article 49 be accepted as written in the Warrant. The motion was seconded. Mr. Wigsten explained that the real intent of this article is to restrict the issuance of building permits to

approximately 20% per year in the case where a person subdivides land and proposes to build houses on it.

John Palmer, Jr. moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. Mr. Palmer stated he felt this ordinance is ill-advised and recommended the Planning Board establish a qualified committee to review its' practices and procedures and adopt a plan to bring its total actions and proposed rules into compliance with the State statutes.

Arthur Brennan stated his view on the growth of the community and spoke in favor of continued growth of the Town rather than adopting slow-growth ordinances.

A lengthy discussion followed. A division vote on the motion to dismiss was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 43; No - 114.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the adoption of the ordinance was affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the Meeting until Saturday at 9 a.m. The vote was negative. A motion was made to adjourn until 2 p.m. on Saturday, March 18, 1978. The motion was seconded and the vote was affirmative. The Meeting adjourned at 11:20 p.m.

The adjourned Meeting was called to order by the Moderator at 2 p.m. on Saturday, March 18, 1978. The Moderator announced we would continue with the 5 minute debate rule of last evening. The Moderator read quickly through the remaining articles to see if anyone sponsoring any of the remaining articles wished to have it dismissed.

**ARTICLE 66.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey title to lands in Londonderry, New Hampshire under such terms and conditions as they and the trustees of the Hillside Cemetery in South Weare, New Hampshire deem advisable and in the best interests of the town.

Malcolm C. Purington moved to dismiss Article 66. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

**ARTICLE 50.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in their discretion and in an attempt to settle certain long-standing suits, to convey by separate Selectmen's deeds to Alice Edmunds and Marguerite Paquette, two certain parcels of land along Oak Hill Road as now located and being abandoned portions of the original Oak Hill Road.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. After an explanation of the article and a short discussion, the vote was affirmative.

Harold O. Hall moved that the rules be suspended to permit consideration

of Article 61 at this time. The motion was seconded. A division vote was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 107; No - 0.

**ARTICLE 61.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five townspeople to study the space needs of the departments of the Town of Weare and submit their recommendations to the 1979 Town Meeting.

Harold O. Hall moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five townspeople to study the space needs of the departments of the Town of Weare and submit their recommendations to the 1979 Town Meeting and, further, move that the previous action of the Town directing the Selectmen to sell the old high school building be withdrawn and the subject matter of the old high school building be referred to this committee. The motion was seconded.

William Stafford moved to amend the article to read: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a committee of 10 townspeople with such committee to be called the "Weare Long Range Planning Committee" of which committee one member shall be a Selectman and one shall be a member of the Planning Board. This committee shall prepare a report and submit their recommendations at the 1979 Town Meeting. The motion was seconded.

After a short discussion, the vote was taken. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the amended article was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 51.** To see what action the Town will take with respect to retaining or disposing of the old high school building.

Harold O. Hall moved that the previous action of the Town directing the Selectmen to sell the old high school building be withdrawn and that the subject matter of the old high school building be referred to the committee established under Mr. Stafford's motion. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 52.** To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and repairs of the old high school.

Harold O. Hall moved that the sum of \$200.00 be raised and appropriated for the care and maintenance of the old high school building. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$100.00. James B. Craig moved to amend the motion by changing the sum of \$200.00 to \$100.00. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 53**. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Ordinance:

The Town of Weare will only accept a road built in an approved subdivision as a town road upon the following conditions:

- a. The road is to be built to Class V specifications as established by the State of New Hampshire Highway Department (width of surface, shoulders, slope and drainage);
- b. The road must have a minimum of 3" of tar (farmer's mix or hot top).

The Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent shall determine if the road meets the conditions outlined in A & B above. Upon approval of the road by the Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent, said road will automatically become a town road. This ordinance to take effect upon date of passage.

Harold O. Hall moved that the Town accept this article as written. The motion was seconded.

Henry Scarfo moved to amend the article as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Ordinance:

The Town of Weare will require developers of approved subdivisions to construct roads for acceptance by the Town according to the following conditions:

- a. The road is to be built to Class V specifications as established by the State of New Hampshire Highway Department (width of surface, shoulders, slope and drainage).
- b. The road must have a minimum of 3" of tar (farmer's mix or hot top). The Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent shall determine if the road meets the conditions outlined in A & B above. Upon approval of the road by the Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent, said road will automatically become a town road.

Roads already existing in approved subdivisions, fully or partially developed, and built to Class V specifications can be considered for acceptance by the Town according to those procedures and/or Ordinances already established. This Ordinance to take effect upon date of passage. The motion was seconded.

After some discussion of the intent of the article and the amendment, Frank Farmer moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded. The vote on dismissal was negative.

Mr. Scarfo withdrew his amendment and moved to accept Article 53 as read eliminating Section B referring to the 3" of farmer's mix. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative.

Neal Kurk made a motion to amend the article by striking the next to the last sentence which reads, "Upon approval of the road by the Board of Selectmen and the Road Agent, said road will automatically become a town road." The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative.

Keith Harbert moved to amend the article by striking out the word "only" and substituting the word "automatically" in the first line of the ordinance as printed. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. A division vote on the article as amended was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 80; No - 38.

**ARTICLE 54**. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road shown on a plan known as "Plan of HFR Corporation Subdivision, Weare, New Hampshire" as a town road.

Henry Scarfo moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Wilfred Foote, Road Agent, moved to amend by restricting acceptance to the main road -- the main artery of the road from Rt. 114 down to the cul de sac, around and back up -- no side roads off the main road to be accepted. The motion to amend was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 55.** To see if the Town will vote to accept Lawrence Road, so called, as a town road.

James B. Craig moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator stated that if articles by petition are desired in the Warrant, he will expect the leading names on the petition to be present at Town Meeting to support the article they are asking the Town to consider.

**ARTICLE 56.** To see if the Town will vote to re-open a portion of road approximately 4/10 of a mile, off Mt. Dearborn Road, known as LaFrance Road, and accept same as a Class V highway.

Alan Cobb moved that LaFrance Road be accepted as a Class V highway. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 57.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Merrimack Valley Day Care Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended no money be raised under this article. James B. Craig moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen

to enter into agreement with neighboring towns for their use of the Town of Weare's landfill site, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interest of the Town.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Selectmen be and are hereby authorized to enter into agreements with other towns for their use of the Weare sanitary landfill, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interest of the Town, as provided in RSA 53-A. The motion was seconded.

Harold E. Thomson registered his objection to the article. He stated that at the rate of growth of the Town, we cannot afford to use up our available space for landfill purposes by permitting other towns to use our space.

Gordon C. Brown moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

**ARTICLE 59.** To see if the Town will vote to assume responsibility for all improvements and additions made to town property under the Bicentennial Beautification Project.

Robert Munro moved that the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 60.** To see if the Town will vote to re-classify a portion of Burnt Hill Road from the Dumont residence to where it meets the dump road (measures 1/4 mile) from a Class VI to a Class V highway.

Arthur Brennan moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

**ARTICLE 62.** To see if the Town will vote to establish a fee of \$10.00 for application for a building permit, the penalty for failure to secure a building permit to be \$100.00.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to accept the article as read. The motion was seconded. James B. Craig moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. The vote to dismiss was negative.

James B. Craig moved to amend the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to have a \$100.00 penalty for failure to secure a building permit. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, the vote was taken on the amendment. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 63.** To see if the Town will establish a quorum for regular and special town meetings.

Neal Kurk moved that a quorum of 100 registered voters be established for any business to come before annual and special Town Meetings, except for the selection of town officers. The motion was seconded. After discussion, Ken Glaude moved to dismiss the article. The motion was seconded. After a lengthy discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A division vote on the dismissal of the article was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 72; No - 34. The article was dismissed.

**ARTICLE 64.** To see if the Town will vote to require the finance committee to circulate copies of its recommendations at least 30 days prior to the annual town meeting.

Neal Kurk moved that the firnance committee be required to circulate copies of its recommendations at least thirty days prior to the annual town meeting and to set forth the impact of its recommendation on the tax rate. The motion was seconded.

William Stafford moved to amend the motion as follows: that the departments of the town furnish the finance committee their budgets by January 31. The motion was seconded. Mr. Kurk accepted that amendment to his motion.

After discussion, Mr. Kurk stated he would change the "30 days prior to the annual town meeting" to "7 days prior to the annual town meeting". After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the amendments was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 65.** To see if the Town will vote to require the Town Clerk to make available at a reasonable price copies of the ordinances to be compiled from time to time at the Town Clerk's discretion with annual supplements covering ordinances enacted since the most recent compilation.

Neal Kurk moved to adopt the article as read. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, Malcolm C. Purington moved to amend the article to read: — the Selectmen will be responsible for carrying out the initial work of compilation and publication of the ordinances. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 67.** To see whether or not the Town will vote to amend as follows the gravel ordinance adopted at the March 1977 Town Meeting:

A. The paragraph entitled "Permit Required" in the ordinance adopted March 1977 is hereby rescinded and the following shall be substituted:

#### PERMIT REQUIRED

Unless and until a permit is obtained from the Board of Selectmen, no sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be removed from land in Weare. This includes existing and/or proposed land alterations. A permit is not required if the alterations to the contours of the land are for your own personal use (grading, landscaping, cellar holes, septic systems, well, etc. are exempt).

B. The paragraph entitled "Existing Alterations" as approved at the March 1977 Town Meeting is rescinded upon adoption of this article. The intent of this ordinance is to require a permit for removal of sand, gravel, stone or earth materials, and to strike the paragraph which attempted to exempt existing operations from applying for a permit.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Burton Brown moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded. After a lengthy discussion, the vote on the dismissal was taken. The vote was negative. The vote on the article as read was affirmative.

**ARTICLE 68.** To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Neal Kurk moved a standing vote of thanks to the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany to which the Meeting responded enthusiastically.

Neal Kurk moved that the financial information appearing in the Town's annual reports include the same categories of data and in the same degree of detail as appear in the 1976 annual report and that the Selectmen be ordered and empowered to see that this is done. The motion was seconded.

The Moderator stated that this would be treated as a consensus of the meeting motion rather than a binding article. The vote was affirmative.

The Moderator recognized the work the finance committee has done during the several months prior to Town Meeting and also the work of the Selectmen during the past year.

Nancy Taylor moved the Selectmen have the town report distributed at least two weeks before Town Meeting. The motion was seconded. The Moderator stated this would also be treated as a consensus of the meeting motion. The vote was affirmative.

James B. Craig moved to adjourn the Meeting. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The meeting adjourned at 5:25 p.m.

# RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING July 6, 1978

The Special Town Meeting was called to order in the Weare School Gymnasium at 7:34 p.m. by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. The pledge of allegiance was given by the Meeting without a leader in memory of Harold E. Thomson, who has led the meeting in giving the Pledge in the past.

The Moderator appointed the following members to the Finance Committee: Gertrude Murdock, Leon Paulding, Charles Brown, Jr. and Raymond Viti.

The Moderator, after stating the rules of order, read the Warrant for the Special Town Meeting, the Court Order giving permission to hold the Special Town Meeting which was signed by Justice Martin F. Loughlin and the Certification of Posting of the Warrant.

**ARTICLE I.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) to pay for unexpected increased cost in construction of the Town's sewer project; said sum to be raised by the issuance of Bonds or Serial Notes of the Town, pursuant to RSA 33, upon terms and conditions as established by the Selectmen, or take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that Article I be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Mr. Killion asked that the representative from Anderson-Nichols be allowed to speak to the Meeting to give a brief presentation as to the history and background of the sewer project and how we arrived at tonight's meeting.

Donald Myhr asked if the Finance Committee has a recommendation on this article. Ruth Jones, Chairman, stated the Finance Committee reserved making a recommendation at this time. After information has been presented, the Finance Committee asks that we recess briefly and the Finance Committee will then arrive at its recommendation.

Donald Thomson objected to the presentation of a plan tonight for us to decide on without sufficient time to analyze and study the new plan. The Moderator stated it is the intention of the Chair to call a recess after the facts have been presented for a brief caucus on the part of the Finance Committee, at which time we may receive their recommendation and consider that. He told Mr. Thomson if he wishes to make a motion to recess the meeting, it will be in order at that time.

Arthur Brennan made a motion to recess the meeting. The motion was seconded. The Moderator stated that this meeting is held pursuant to a court order and in compliance with other orders outstanding. He told Mr. Brennan that if he wished to make a motion to recess, it will be necessary to make a motion to recess to a time certain so that we may dispose of the business placed before us by the Court. Mr. Brennan then moved that this meeting be recessed until Friday, July 21, 1978 at 7:30 p.m. at the Weare Town Hall. The motion was seconded. The Moderator stated there is no debate permitted on this. The Moderator asked for the vote. The vote was not recognized because the Moderator was in doubt that the parliamentary situation was clear. He then explained the parliamentary procedure on this motion. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative.

Doris Hadley asked if the representative from Anderson-Nichols might still explain to the Meeting the sewer project so that we may think about it before the next meeting. The Moderator stated that after the motion to recess has been put and voted upon, if it prevails, the Meeting will then necessarily be recessed. The Chair will then summon a Committee of the Whole which may not take official action as a Town Meeting, but will be perfectly legally caucused to hear any recommendations, to hear any discussion of facts, to ask any questions that it wishes to of these people.

The vote to recess was taken. The vote was affirmative. The Meeting recessed at 8 p.m. to meet again Friday, July 21, 1978 at 7:30 p.m. at the Weare Town Hall.

The recessed Special Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany at 7:35 p.m. on July 21, 1978 at the Weare Town Hall. Mr. Tiffany summarized the minutes of the July 6 Special Town Meeting. He then asked for the Finance Committee recommendation. William Stafford, as representative of the Finance Committee, stated the Finance Committee recommends zero funds be appropriated for this project. He stated the recommendation was based primarily on lack of confidence in the figures presented to date on the overall project.

A lengthy discussion followed regarding the pollution in Weare Center; the testing that was done on July 12 and July 17, 1978 and the results of this testing; the order of abatement against the Town issued in 1956 and its validity; and whether there is a time limit on the action to be taken so that Federal funds are not lost. The Meeting was told that funds that have been granted the Town - both State and Federal - will lapse in approximately one year's time. Discussion continued.

James B. Craig moved that this Meeting recess for 30 days; that an informational meeting be held in 3 weeks to hear: 1) a sewer ordinance from the Selectmen and 2) a statement from Anderson-Nichols explaining what this system will do to pollution in Weare Center and Moody Pond;

and that the articles be voted on when this Meeting is reconvened in 30 days. The motion was seconded.

After further discussion, Volker Wyrenbeck moved to amend the motion to read 90 days instead of 30 days. The motion was seconded.

After a short discussion, a motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A division vote was taken on the amendment. The vote: Yes - 73; No - 45. The vote on the amendment was affirmative.

Discussion continued. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the motion to recess as amended was negative.

Volker Wyrenbeck moved that Article I be dismissed. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal of Article I as read was affirmative and Article I was dismissed.

**ARTICLE II.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. R.S.A. 33: 7-b et seq., as amended, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Robert Hyman moved Article II be dismissed. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal of Article II was affirmative and Article II was dismissed.

**ARTICLE III.** To transact any other business as may lawfully come before the meeting.

Robert Hyman moved that it is the consensus of this Meeting that the Selectmen shall not spend any money previously appropriated for this project that has not already been committed. And that any funds that have been committed should be examined by the Selectmen with a view towards cancellation. The motion was seconded.

Eldon Townes moved to amend the motion as follows: this consensus not withstanding, the Selectmen's authority to expend funds for the purchase of the land for which negotiations have already been made will persist. The motion was seconded.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the amendment was affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the motion as amended was affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the Meeting. The vote was affirmative and the Meeting adjourned at 9:22 p.m.

#### WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

An average of 50 calls per week or 7 calls per day were received during these three months. An interesting point here is that the largest number of calls occurred during the summer months when the population of the town is much larger due to seasonal residents. It is estimated that the town population more than triples during these three summer months.

A breakdown of manhours spent during 1978 by general category indicates approximately:

35% on patrol work which consists of checking vacant residences and businesses and routine motor vehicle law enforcement. This figure represents about a 10% decrease over last year, due mostly to an increase in other activity.

23% on criminal work including investigation, arrests, courtroom appearances and report writing. This represents about a 3% increase.

9% on motor vehicle accidents including courtroom action.

8% on various motor vehicle complaints including speed, DWI, and motorist assistance.

7% on juvenile cases.

5% assisting other departments.

5% on other miscellaneous complaints.

4% on animal complaints.

4% on other report writing not included above.

During the year, a new cruiser was received, equipped and put into operation. A radar was purchased by the men of the department requiring no town money for this item.

Sgt. Hunt has recently completed a specialized course dealing with juvenile offenders. In line with this, he is now designated juvenile officer for the department and is handling juvenile related problems.

During the past year, four from the department, Raymond Eaton, Paul Hadley, William Tiffany and Bernard Phelps attended a school for part-time police officers presented by the Police Standards and Training Council for the State of New Hampshire. Another course is being offered in 1979 and several members of the department have already signed up to attend. There is no charge to the Town or the officer for these classes and those attending spend the 32 hours of time required to complete the course without pay. The Police Standards and Training Council has advised this department that legislation is being introduced this year to require training in the fundamentals of police work. They also advise that firearms training and qualification should be required of all active officers. I am happy to say that all but one officer has received at least a minimum qualification in firearms and all have attended at least one course of training sponsored by the Police Standards and Training Council.

As you will note I have indicated above that criminal cases have increased during the past year. In one period of four weeks, 14 burglaries were reported to this department. These mostly were in the daylight hours. We are again requesting your help in attempting to control this type of crime. Please report anything suspicious you notice; and if a vehicle is involved, try to get the registration number and description is also very important. Any information we receive will be treated confidentially, if you request. Remember, it takes your help to enable us to solve these crimes.

## WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

We would like to thank our dispatcher, Mrs. Wheldon, for all her work and dedication to the department. She answered 437 calls this year, which is 94 more calls than last year. There were 18 out-of-town rescue calls, 154 calls for aid or information, 7 stand-by calls to aid other towns, 118 in-town rescue calls, 21 chimney fires, 24 brush fires, 5 building fires, 2 dump fires, 3 car fires, 9 service calls, 28 wrong numbers, 15 false alarms and 33 calls for the police.

When reporting a fire or rescue, please make sure to let the phone ring at least three times. Information calls should be called into 529-2379. Police calls should be called into 529-2323.

We wish to give a large thanks to the businesses that allowed their employees time off to answer fire and rescue calls. We also want to thank the ladies' auxiliary and others who have helped us during the past year.

We pooled our new equipment order with New Boston and Goffstown

during the first of last year. As a result, this enabled us to get more for our money.

We had a very successful drill early last year that involved eight towns and at least twenty trucks. Water was moved from Moody Pond to the school buildings by both a tanker and a four inch hose. A drill like this shows us our needs in the areas of more training, equipment and different methods, in some cases. The officers from the Kearsarge Mutual Aid that watched the entire operation said that for a drill of that size it ran very smoothly and everyone learned from it.

Remember, a permit must be obtained for any residential open burning, unless the ground is entirely covered with snow. If you plan on doing any burning while the ground is covered with snow, please call our dispatcher (529-2379) as it will save our time and your money.

We received a very nice thank you from the town of New Boston, along with a pressure demand oxygen valve for our new rescue van. New Boston now has their own new Rescue van and will be more than happy to help us if we ever need it.

Weare is still bothered by a shortage of help during the daytime hours, when most of our fire and rescue personnel are working. This affects both fire and rescue to a certain extent. The need of a full time man at the fire station to handle the maintenance and daytime calls may be closer than we all think. Weare is growing very fast. Anyone with any ideas on this problem please contact Chief Chester A. Rhodenizer. If anyone is interested in becoming a fire or rescue member, we still have openings.

The Fire Department had Santa Claus at the station this year for the first time and is planning on asking him back next year.

We are also pleased to see the use of the (C) stickers to help us locate childrens' bedrooms in the event of a fire.

We again wish to thank all those who supported us at town meeting last year. It is very important to maintain our equipment because it is vital to saving lives and property in our town.

#### WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

During the last year, the Rescue Squad made 136 runs, of which 108 were medical emergencies and 28 were automobile accidents. We also assisted New Boston during the year on several calls where transportation to a hospital was necessary. New Boston has since purchased their own rescue vehicle and Weare will now have to assist only on multiple calls where more than one vehicle is needed for transportation. In return, New Boston will be able to assist us if the need should arise. The squad wishes to extend their thanks to all of those employers in town who allowed members to leave their jobs during working hours to respond to emergency calls. It is this kind of cooperation that allows us to serve all who need help regardless of the time of the day.

In the early part of last year, the Rescue Squad sponsored a fund raising drive to raise money for a new van. Our goal was to raise \$5,000.00 to be matched by \$5,000.00 from town funds voted on at town meeting. Through the many generous donations we received, both from townspeople and non-townspeople, we were able to reach our goal. We purchased a 1978 Ford Van which was built to meet our requirements and on which the majority of work needed to prepare it for use was done by people from town. This vehicle should be capable of serving the town's needs for many years to come.

Again, the members of the Rescue Squad wish to thank everyone who sends donations to us. All money received is used to keep the Rescue vehicle equipped and serviced and the members fully trained, ready at all times to serve you, the townspeople of Weare.

#### WEARE FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

To clarify certain aspects regarding open burning by the local resident. This report by the Weare Forest Fire Warden will help you to better understand some of the rules set forth. All open burning must be done by first applying for a "Permit to Burn" from the Warden. The permit will be approved on the basis of type of burn, area, weather. The burning of wood over 5" thick is not permitted. A permit is not required for backyard cooking providing the burning be limited to cooking only. This means the cooking fire must not be prolonged after cooking by adding refuse or wood, etc. A permit also is not required for open burning of brush when the ground is completely covered with snow. When there is a snow cover on the ground, it is requested as a matter of courtesy to notify the Weare Fire Dispatcher, Florence Wheldon, 529-2835, of the burn so that we may be aware of smoke spotting which will necessitate an investigation or sending fire apparatus on an unnecessary fire call.

All commercial burning will be strictly enforced. Prior to this type of burn, there must first be an approval applied for through the New Hampshire "Air Pollution Control Commission" at Concord (phone 271-2487). A burning permit will still be required from the local fire warden after the approval of this burn by the Air Pollution Control Commission.

In the past, there has been good cooperation in the area of open burning by the members of the fire department and the forest fire warden.

For the year ending 1978, Weare has had a total of 18 connected forest fires with a total burn of 6 acres.

#### WEARE TAX MAP PROGRESS REPORT

At this writing, the mapping of all properties in the town has been completed on preliminary map sheets which are ready for public inspection. This inspection will permit land owners to verify the placement of their respective properties prior to final drafting of the map sheets. By April 1, 1979 the final map will be delivered to the town for use by all. The map will consist of twenty five map sheets, forty two inches square, bound into a hard covered book. Twelve map sheets are at a scale of one inch to four hundred feet and cover the entire town. The village areas are mapped on three sheets at a scale of one inch to two hundred feet, another ten sheets have been prepared at a scale of one inch to one hundred feet covering the small lot development around the lake shores in town. The Selectmen may secure arrangements to make tax map sheet copies available to citizens at a nominal cost.

Indexing is now in progress and will be completed by town meeting. Two indices will be maintained, one is a numerical listing of all parcels and their owners, and the other is an alphabetical listing of all land owners with the parcel numbers that they own.

The tax map will be found by all users to be a valuable tool, however, its value will deteriorate rapidly if the map is not kept up to date. This should be done yearly, supplementd by a simple monthly annotation of land transfers handwritten on the map sheets.

#### WEARE COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT 1978

The Community Nursing Service provided 318 home visits. Nursing services included injections, change of dressings, postural drainage, exercises, blood pressures, baths and hot packs. Transportation was provided for patients to cancer and mental health clinics and to hospitals and doctors' offices. Clinics were held in cooperation with the N.H. Division of Public Health for blood pressures, diabetes, hemoglobin testing (anemia) and immunizations in cooperation with the Weare School Health program. Numerous health pamphlets were made available on such subjects as arthritis, blood pressure, cancer stroke, etc. The Community Nurse Service cooperated with the W.I.C. (Women, Infants and Children) program which provides supplemental food for pregnant and nursing women and children under 5 years of age. Vouchers are given for the purchase of baby formula, infant cereals, juices, milk, cheese, etc. The clinic was held at the Nurse Service facilities at the old High School. At the same clinic, clothing for both adults and children were available without cost to all persons. These were donated to the Service by people of Weare.

The Service cooperated with the School Health program in the Feingold program which deals with special dietary treatment of children suffering from hyper or hypo-activity and/or learning disabilities. Also, it provided financial support to the School Health program for the purchase of test books on basic health principles. The Board of Directors of the Service believe that the teaching of essential health subjects in the school is most important to the protection and promotion of good health for the people of Weare.

The nurse clinic and office facilities at the old High School building were completed. Heaters, tables, chairs and other equipment were

## WEARE CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Acting under the authority of Article 46, Town Meeting March 8, 1977 and Articles 46 and 47, Town Meeting March, 1978, the Conservation Commission continued the program of Forest Management.

The Commission's first act was to provide the Selectmen with the Weare Town Forest Savings Account which had a balance of \$5,294.43, the income from selective cutting #1 in the Town Forest, executed March 15, 1978.

The Commission's second act was to develop a bidding procedure for the sale of the logs cut and stockpiled at the Weare dump site. Four bids were received. The high and successful bidder was Claremont Lumber Company with a bid of \$91.55 per thousand board feet, executed March 28, 1978.

The Commission's third act was to develop a bidding procedure for the survey of the Town Forest lands. Four bids were received. The low and successful bidder was Robert B. Todd at a rate of  $75\phi$  per linear foot for a chain and compass survey with blaze and mapping of boundaries, plus steel boundary markers and \$12.00 per hour for deed research and analysis. On May 11, 1978, the Conservation Commission unanimously passed the motion that the town spend \$7,500.00 as estimated by

surveyor, Todd, for the survey of the six tracts of land as indicated in the 1977 Town Report. The funds for this service to be spent out of the proceeds developed from the timber sales. A second motion was made and passed unanimously that if the Selectmen reject the previous motion, that a minimum of 2 of the 6 tracts be surveyed known as the "Town Forest" and "Poor Farm" tracts estimated combined acreage of 890 acres, at a cost estimate of \$5,100.00. On May 27, 1978, the second motion was approved unanimously by the Selectmen. A property plan of this estimated 890 acres will be available at Town Meeting for taxpaying residents of Weare.

The Commission's fourth act was to develop a Timber Stand Selective Harvest #2 in the northeast section of the "Town Forest". The County Forester marked approximately 150,000 board feet for selective cutting. Four bids were received. High bidder, Lorden Lumber Company, could not conform to conditions of the Town of Weare's contract and withdrew. The second high bidder withdrew his bid at time of bid opening. The third bidder, Henniker Hardwood Pallet, then became the successful bidder with a bid of \$56.00 per thousand board feet of pine and \$51.00 per thousand board feet of all other species. The company subscribed to all contractual agreements. Executed December, 1978.

#### CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK ANNUAL REPORT 1978

The Park opened May 26 and closed October 15, 1978. Four persons served as gate attendants during various times. They were Joseph Grimley, Daniel Grimley, Kenneth Fletcher and David Hadley. Bernard Phelps served as Park Caretaker and as special police officer during weekends and at band concerts. The Park was made available to various groups in Weare without charge, such as swimming lessons, sponsored by the Town and Red Cross, band concerts, Weare school classes and various civic and social groups for picnics.

The facilities were repaired and painted as needed including picnic tables, toilets, wharfs and dressing buildings. A waste can storage facility was constructed because the town dump was not open daily. Dead trees were cut down and several signs were painted. The grounds and beaches were maintained in a clean and orderly condition. The swimming area was encircled with floating plastic containers although the cord was severed several times by boats. Water was tested at the laboratories of the N.H. State Water Pollution Commission and proved to be safe for swimming and the well safe for drinking. Vandalism included break-in and theft of food at the snack bar, stealing of two life preservers and destruction of picnic tables.

The Park Commission established the following rates of admission:

# HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TOWN REPORT

We started the year out with finishing the New Dump road, 1 mile and 3/10ths, in order for the Dump or Landfill Area to open in May. The Landfill area was prepared for dumping and rubbish disposal.

During this time, we combated snow storms, flooded roads, mud and some roads completely washed out due to the depth of frost this year. Slack's Hill, on Memorial Drive, erupted to the point the road had to be closed in order to temporarily repair the hill. It definitely will need costly repair work to bring it in shape.

The River Road Project was an exceptionally lengthy and costly road due to constant combating of traffic and daily watering of the road while being built. This road was State supervised and controlled while being built.

As for the rest of the year, Town roads were oiled in June due to an exceptionally dry year. T.R.A. runds were used to haul gravel to Mountain Road. We cut and chipped brush, removed trees, replaced several culverts, graded and raked town roads. Gravel was hauled to shape up some roads for winter.

During the summer, the transmission went on the A-W grader. It was repaired at this time. In September, the engine went. No parts could be found as of November; therefore, we rented a grader for the winter months in order to keep the town open.

# RECORD OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT MARCH 8, 1978

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m., by Neal Kurk, Moderator.

Neal Kurk led those present in a salute to the flag.

It was announced that O. Harfield-Jones rules of order were to be used and each person who wished could speak only twice on any one article and a third time after everyone else who wanted to speak had spoken.

It was moved by Mr. James Craig, and duly seconded, that we dispense reading the articles of the Warrant. Motion carried.

The Warrant was read.

**ARTICLE 1.** It was moved by Mr. Thomas Clow, and seconded by Mr. Robert Munroe, that the salaries of the School Board and other elected officers be determined as set forth in the series 100 of the printed budget. Motion carried.

**ARTICLE 2.** Moved by Mrs. Nancy Taylor, and duly seconded, that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Annual Town Report. (Annual Town Report was not available at School District Meeting.) YES - 30, NEAS - 37. Motion was defeated.

**ARTICLE 3.** Moved by Mr. Frank Farmer, and duly seconded, that we elect Town Auditors as the School Auditors. Discussion followed: Mr. Farmer stated that \$225.00 was allocated in the budget to pay for auditor's fees and that the normal procedure was to have the Town Auditors also audit the School District's books. Motion was carried.

**ARTICLE 4.** Moved by Mr. Paul Knox, seconded by Mrs. Elizabeth Straw, that the School Board be authorized to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, or take any other action thereto. The question was raised by Mr. Dave Hibber as to what sort of funds would be accepted and for what purpose would they be used. Mr. Knox stated that funds were available for all sorts of things. Last year, for example, funds were used to get equipment (the school was reimbursed by the federal government for having certain appliances in the Home Ec. Room); the school was partially reimbursed by the State for the Driver Education program. The school's needs, said Mr. Knox, vary from year to year and if funds are available they would apply for them. Motion was carried.

ARTICLE 5. Moved by Mr. Frank Farmer, and duly seconded, to

change the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund, which was originally established to provide funds for a new boiler, to a new purpose which will provide funds for capital improvements to the Weare School buildings. Mr. Farmer informed the voters that Burnham Brothers, of Goffstown, stated the boiler was in excellent condition and that it should last for years. Going on this information, the School Board felt that the sum of 3,464.79 in Capital Reserve would be more useful for Capital Improvements to the Weare School buildings. This article required 2/3 vote in order to pass. Motion was carried well in excess of 2/3 vote.

**ARTICLE 6.** Moved by Mr. Frank Farmer, and duly seconded, that the amount of \$3,464.79 be transferred to the General Fund from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of capital improvements to the Weare School Buildings. Mr. Farmer explained that the money would be used for: purchasing handrails (as required by federal government standards), emergency lights, extend fire alarm system, purchase storm windows for the high school (as an energy-saving measure), and painting. Motion was carried.

**ARTICLE 7.** Moved by Mr. Thomas Clow, and duly seconded, that the District appropriate such funds as may have been received from the United States Government pursuant to the C.E.T.A. Program to the payment of the deficit created in the 1977-78 budget by the payment of funds to C.E.T.A. employees and related costs, or take any other action in relation thereto. Mr. Clow stated that this money was appropriated to the Weare School District, from the C.E.T.A. Program, a federal program, for the purpose of a library aid. There was not a provision in last year's budget in which to accept these funds, so it was placed on this year's warrant so that it would be on record. Motion carried.

**ARTICLE 8.** Moved by Mr. Knox, seconded by Mr. Thomas Clow, that the District appropriate any funds received from the United States Government to the payment of obligations of the District for which said Government funds constitute full reimbursement, or take any other action in relation thereto. Motion was carried.

**ARTICLE 9.** Moved by Mrs. Nancy Taylor, and duly seconded, that the District appropriate \$725,000 for the support of schools, for the payment of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectment the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

Mr. Hatfield, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the Finance Committee were unanimously in favor of the School Board's proposed budget.

It was then moved by Mr. James Craig and duly seconded, that the meeting be adjourned until next Wednesday, March 15, 1978, at 7:30 p.m., when the Town Reports have been circulated so that the voters can make a good, logical recommendation for the school budget. The School Board stated that the budget as given to the Town's people this evening basically is the same budget that is printed in the Town Report, and the Warrant would not change. Motion failed.

The original motion made by Mrs. Nancy Taylor was then returned to and after a line-by-line presentation of the budget by the School Board members, Mr. Joe Brennan made an amendment to the original motion. Mr. Brennan moved, and it was duly seconded, that we raise and appropriate \$700,000 for the School Budget rather than the proposed \$725,000. Motion failed.

Mr. Thomas Clow moved the question and it was duly seconded. The voters proceeded to vote on the original motion made by Mrs. Taylor. YEAS - 66; NEAS - 5. Motion carried.

Moved by Mr. Arnold Rocklin-Weare, seconded by Mr. Craig Knowles, that in future years the School District have distributed to its members, before the meeting, a line-item budget in the expanded form. It was suggested by another voter that Mr. Rocklin-Weare attend School Board and Finance Committee meetings, as they were open to the public, and that such a request as he made was a "waste of paper". Motion failed.

Moved by Mr. Arthur Brennan, seconded by Mr. James Craig, that the School Board make sure its present administration either stop the vandalism going on in the school completely, or that the present administration get out. Motion failed.

It was moved and duly seconded that the meeting be adjourned. Meeting declared adjourned at 10:55 p.m.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF WEARE

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

I herein submit my 1979 report relative to the Weare Schools.

The word "accountability" in education has been getting a great deal of space in the media and its been getting a great deal of attention not only from the educators here in New Hampshire, but also throughout the Country.

An educational accountability plan has the child as the primary recipient of the benefits flowing from the improvement of our educational efforts.

Basically, accountability begins with the statement of objectives -- what do we want our schools to do for our children, what do children need to be successful in today's society and tomorrow's society. In other words, the Weare School District must develop essential student outcomes. Essential student outcomes represent specific expectations of what students should be able to do at a designated point in his/her education. These essential outcomes should be the end results of the educational program, should be specific and clearly stated.

Once these outcomes are set, the next step entails the establishment of indicators for each essential outcome. The indicators are nothing more than measurable and identifiable behaviors that tell us whether or not the student is reaching the stated objective. Thus, the indicators of the student's progress in his attempts to reach the stated goal are specific and related to programs.

The third step in the process will be assessment. Assessment is a structured experience by which the student demonstrates how effectively he/she has mastered the indicator. The assessment must be validated and proven reliable and it must measure the student's performance against the indicators. Each instrument should be designed to provide objective information.

The analysis of the information collected follows. This analysis of the data is an attempt to determine the level of the student's performance in relation to the stated objectives.

Once this information has been synthesized then it is reported to the community and to the State Department of Education. This information is also used to develop a system whereby changes can be made to improve student performance. In other words, the information will give direction to the Weare School District.

In summary, the accountability model calls for:

a) The setting of essential student outcomes

- b) The setting of indicators
- c) The assessment
- d) The analysis of the data
- e) The reporting of the data and its analysis
- f) The development of changes to increase student performance

To ensure that this plan with all of its particulars are in place by June, 1981, a committee of teachers and administrators met in October to discuss an accountability policy and to formulate a committee (called the Local Planning Group), the purpose of which would be to develop a timetable for the completion of the necessary components of the accountability plan, and to organize subcommittees to ensure each component is fully developed.

Subsequently, this following policy was passed by the Weare School Board: "The Weare Board of Education believes the primary purpose of our educational system is to help each student fully realize his/her potential for learning. The Board also recognizes that one of the available techniques in the realization of this goal is an accountability plan. An accountability plan should clearly describe essential student outcomes, provide for an assessment and develop a procedure whereby results of the assessment will be used to chart priorities and programs. It is the Board's intention to use the accountability plan to provide a better education for students. The Board does not intend the results to be used for the comparison of students, schools, districts nor for the evaluation of staff members."

Finally, the Weare School Board approved the composition of the Local Planning Group. This group will be composed of the following:

- 1 Administrator
- 4 Faculty Members
- 1 School Board Member
- 2 Committee Members

The Local Planning Group will be charged with the production of a plan that will serve as a road map to our goal of having an operational accountability model in place by June, 1981.

This venture will take an extraordinary amount of time, effort and dedication. It is essential that the teachers, administrators and the citizens of Weare work in a spirit of cooperation, keeping in mind the welfare and the educational benefits of the student.

I would like to express my gratitude to those who have contributed and to those who will contribute to this undertaking.

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the administrators, teachers, school board, and citizens

of Weare. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued education.

A standard 20-hour First Aid Course was once again offered in the fall. Eight faculty members and employees completed the course and obtained a three-year certification.

Routine physical exams with required lab work was given to all school cafeteria personnel. T.B. Tine Tests were once again made available to all personnel.

A Dental Program was offered to all elementary school children with a total of 131 children participating. Mrs. Ellen Cluche, our dental hygienist, was available from October to December for cleanings, dental checks, fluoride treatments and individual instruction for each of these children. Hopefully, more will participate in the coming year as the program becomes established. We are now in the process of obtaining some of our own equipment so that this program might also eventually be offered in the high school.

In the health teaching area, films illustrating the dangers of smoking were shown to students in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades, and a program of classroom instruction was conducted within the 5th grade. The 5th and 6th graders were also presented with a program on adolesence.

The Nutrition Program was continued in the 4th grade for the second year. Discussing, tasting and applying foods and their groups to daily menus was practiced by the students. Through community organizations we were able to take the children to Durochers Ice Cream Plant in Nashua where they were able to see the process of making ice cream.

A program on alcohol and drugs was presented on a community level by David Wilson from the State Department through the efforts of our Guidance Dept.: many parents, teachers and students were able to become involved in these programs. Plans on incorporating this program within various areas of school and community activities are now in the process. Various programs and films on drugs, alcohol and Venereal Disease were also included in the junior and senior high programs this year.

March of Dimes Representative, Mr. P. Higgins, presented an assembly in the spring on birth defects. Twenty-nine students from Weare participated in the 200 mile Walkathon held in Goffstown, bringing in a total of \$719.10 in pledges, nearly \$100 more than last year's figure.

A preschool vision and hearing program sponsored by the Sugar and Spice Kindergarten was held in May in conjunction with first grade registration. Fifty-four children were screened for vision and hearing and thirty-seven were registered for the first grade in September.

All incoming first grade children were invited to spend a day at the school as guests of the present first-grade children. Approximately 35 children participated.

A series of three immunization clinics were held in the months of March, April and May. The breakdown of those receiving immunizations is as follows:

An immunization evaluation of the entire school population was done this year and although the junior high and high school levels fall below the present standards, we are coming close to 100% immunization for the last few years of elementary school enrollments. This is due mainly from the high requirements set by the State and our own school policies enforcing them.

A total of 154 school physicals were done during the school year, twenty-nine in the 4th grade and the remainder for athletics and driver's education.

Originally the Manchester & North Weare R.R., the line was reorganized in the 1890's as the Manchester & Henniker R.R.

The Boston & Maine operation of the line ceased after the flood of 1938.

Tree-grown stretches of abandoned roadbed, sturdy stone abutments, and an occasional rotting tie or section of rusting fence are stark reminders of changes in Weare.
