WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town maintenance.
 - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (c) General expenses of highway department.
4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$490.20 for Class 5 road construction.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for public welfare.
 - (a) Town poor.
 - (b) Old Age Assistance.
6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.
7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Patriotic purposes.
 - (a) Old Home Day.
 - (b) Memorial Day.

8. To see if the town will vote to accept a Fire Truck as a gift from Clarence E. Hyde.

(a) To raise and appropriate the amount necessary to purchase land and erect and maintain a suitable building to house the fire equipment.

(b) To raise and appropriate the sum necessary to organize and support a fire company.

9. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to disposal of the Plane Observation Post.

10. To raise and appropriate the sum necessary to provide care for cemeteries.

11. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town, by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00, in anticipation of taxes for the year 1946, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new snow removal equipment.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousands dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.

- b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
- c. Seeing that others comply with requirements.
- d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting.—that PAYS!

The above table shows very little change from the figures of the previous year. There has been a very commendable decrease in tardiness and the percent of attendance is higher. The number of pupils living in the district and enrolled in public school was as follows:

During the winter of 45-46 lunches are being served in both schools by Mrs. Robert Roby who brings a hot meal to the younger pupils at Putney Hill first, then drives to Corser Hill to supply the needs of the upper four grades.

At the next March meeting the district should take steps toward the erection of a new centralized school building. Federal aid, if needed, will soon be available, not only for plans but for construction as well. The plan of having a school building, library and town hall in the same building is feasible, but should be arranged so that the latter is entirely apart from the school. A dining room and kitchen should be included and situated so that these facilities could be used either by the school, or a gathering in the town hall. A suitable lot of land, well located, easily accessible and large enough for ample play grounds should be selected. The location of a lot was the rock on which the previous meetings to consider a new building struck and came to naught. We hope that at the next meeting when this matter comes up for consideration the partisans of the different sections of the district can bury their differences and agree on a location. The important thing is not *where* the school building should be, but that there *should be* a new building in the near future. In the meantime, the pupils of the district are poorly housed on lots hardly large enough for them to run around the school building. Both schools are located so that the pupils are more or less exposed to the hazards of passing traffic. There is no place to prepare lunches at either school. These conditions are well known to all the inhabitants of the district, or can easily be verified. Some action looking toward the construction of a new building should be taken as soon as possible.

Students in first four grades were accompanied to diphtheria anti-toxin clinic.

Schools were supplied with communicable disease charts issued by State Board of Health.

All children were weighed and measured and frequently inspected. Notes were sent to parents as deemed advisable.

First aid kits were replenished throughout the year.

Several visits were made to State school officers in Concord and two conventions for school nurses were attended.

Appreciation is extended to parents and friends of our students for maintaining health standards.
