TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Acworth in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Acworth on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a road agent.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks at the time of taking inventory.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the Pinard lot, so called.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the Young lot, so called.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to direct the time at which the Collector of Taxes shall give notice to those persons whose poll taxes are then unpaid, with the amount thereof.
 - 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow the

Collector of Taxes additional compensation for collecting State Head Taxes.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

TO THE TAXPAYERS

A few words to point out what has been accomplished in the past year and what is hoped for the next year in the Highway Department.

At the last meeting an appropriation of \$1000 was voted for the purchase of a used truck to replace the present town truck. After much shopping around we decided that nothing could be obtained for this amount that would be gainful to the town's interest. A little at a time, the present truck has been put in usable condition. Among other things, new motor, transmission, front drive and clutch.

The tractor is in excellent shape and both snowplows have been repaired and reinforced.

A supply of wrenches, hammers, shovels, etc. sufficent for our needs has been built up.

A gas pump has been installed at the garage giving both Town and School District a saving of about 5 cents per gallon on gas, as well as wholesale prices on oil, fuel oil, anti-freeze, grease, etc. This totals a substantial saving in the course of a year.

During the past summer, nineteen new culverts have been installed in various places, including the four foot one on Crane Brook. The majority of these were purchased this year. This has made a costly item but a necessary one.

About eight miles of brush has been cut on the roadsides.

As we see it, the greatest need on the roads, as in the past, is gravel and more gravel.

We feel that little mone yis spent which gives us less benefit than shoveling gravel by hand.

We have been fortunate enough to locate a loader, practically new, which is made for our tractor and can be bought reasonably from the unexpended \$1000 new equipment appropriation. It is felt that this would go

a long way toward giving the town more gravel, faster sanding and both at a lower cost per load.

In closing, may we thank those townspeople who have had the patience to realize that the little equipment we have cannot service 85 miles of road all at once.

Trustee's Report for 1952

The year has passed uneventfully, except for the change of librarians. The change in the days and hours the library is open during the summer months, appears to have increased the usefulness of the library. While some progress towards finishing the installation of the standard system of classification, shelving and recording of the library service, this was interrupted by circumstances which could not be controlled, and finally by the loss of Mrs. Barrett as Librarian. This, however, was in a large measure later off-set by the kindness of Mrs. Brang, who undertook the librarian's responsibility.

There still is much to be done in the way of painting, repairs and minor alterations, to prevent deterioration of the building and to improve the convenience of a

librarian in her work.

It is a source of regret that the necessary work relating to the books must be done during the open season, when there is the least free time to devote to it. A new heating system would do much to make the Library an active educational and recreational source for both young and old.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March, 1953, at eight o'clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto

thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding \$1537.50 to pay interest of \$37.50 and principal of \$1500 out-

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Acworth, I herewith submit my first annual report as Superin-

tendent of Schools:

The Acworth Town School was cleaned, and painting was done on the interior, during the summer and fall. The sale of the South Acworth School has made available several articles, such as light globes, window shades and doors which may be utilized at no additional expense other than installation charges. The flagpole was painted, equipped and erected with the assistance of the power company.

The two new teachers have assumed their duties, and helped the pupils present an excellent Christmas program. Evidence of handicraft work is especially noticeable in the primary grades. It is believed that the use of television in our school is one of the first uses of this type of education in New Hampshire.

The acquisition of a converted ambulance for use as a school bus has helped to solve the tremendous transportation problem in Acworth. Although a considerable amount of money has been spent to keep the vehicle operating in all kinds of weather and on poor roads, the amount expended for purchase and operation seems justified. To further ease the transportation problem, Mr. Harvey Bascom has been employed to transport the Derry Hill pupils during the winter and during the mud season.

There is need for greater playground area. Attempts are being made to purchase land to the north and east of the building. This would allow for an adequate area to separate the primary and intermediate pupils during recess, before and after school. Through the generosity of Dr. Amsden and Women's Club, a "jungle gym" has been acquired for the primary pupils. In addition new attachments, chains and seats have been

purchased for the swings.

To improve the offerings to the Acworth pupils, a sum of money has been placed in the budget to assist in meeting the expenses of a more adequate musical program. This would allow for greater emphasis on music fundamentals and appreciation, and make it possible for pupils to take private lessons on musical instruments.

I wish to express my sincere thanks for the cooperation of the teachers, school board and parents in the few months I have been privileged to work with you. I would especially like to call attention to the efforts of Dr. Amsden to serve you by traveling from Troy, New York, and back again on the same day, in order to be present and assist in the routine work of the school board and your superintendent. May we all realize more fully the responsibilities of each citizen to the youth of the town, and make it possible for them to obtain the best possible education.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

Healthy development of the child is of basic importance. Good health is essential to effective living. What better place than the school to teach "GOOD HEALTH HABITS"? Good health is an important goal of education.

Your school nurse has been privileged with the opportunity to continue to improve the health of your school child. The methods used are not new. A yearly inspection is done. This includes weight and height. An inspection of posture, skin, hair, teeth and throat are also a part of the routine. Your child's vision is tested by means of the Massachusetts Vision Testing Machine. Hearing is tested individually by means of the audiometer. Hearing is done about every other year as the testing apparatus is loaned by the State Board of Education. As time permits, your nurse visits the classrooms and has discussions with the children on different phases of the health problems. Now to explain what happens following the inspec-

tion. A "Notice to Parents" is sent home by the school nurse. What is on this notice? The defects observed by your nurse are sent to you for your consideration. You may request the assistance of the nurse, check that you will consult your family doctor or family dentist. Home visits are made by the nurse where it is necessary: to discuss the plan to be taken: to discuss health problems; to give suggestions in the care of the sick child as needed.

A health record is kept on your child so that the nurse, teachers, principal and superintendent may have access to the health progress of each child. Should parents wish to discuss this record, they may consult the nurse at their convenience. A close relationship between local, state, social and health agencies is gratefully appreciated. There is a full cooperation with the State Board of Education, State Health Department and State Department of Public Welfare. Thus through the cooperation of "ALL OF US", our endeavor will be to keep the school child healthy in mind and body.
