THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fire Station in said Allenstown, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To elect a delegate to a convention to revise the Constitution, to be held at the capital in Concord. New Hampshire on the 2nd Wednesday of May 1948.
- 4. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Budget Committee.
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to give a one percent discount on all 1948 taxes paid on or before July 1, 1948.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a street a piece of land forty (40) feet wide to be given to the Town by the heirs of the late Theodore Hamel from School Street

to Cross Street. Said Street to be named Hamel Avenue and said Street to be given if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for a sewer on said Street.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$168.28 (1-100th of one percent of the town's valuation based on the 1947 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars for continuing the control of white pine blister rust in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department, thereby receiving the usual State aid.
- 10. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to build a sidewalk on the south side of Webster Street from the residence of Joseph E. Cournoyer westerly to #22 Webster Street.
- 11. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1500.-00) Dollars for a sidewalk plow.
- 12. By Petition. To see if the Town will accept a street 550 feet in length and 39 feet in width extending westerly at about right angles with Main Street and beginning on said Main Street between the land of Arthur Courtemanche and land of Armand Moisan.
- 13. By Petition. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed \$800.00, to defray one half the cost of arc lights to be placed on Ferry

Street Ball grounds, other half of expense will be borne by the Town baseball team. Said lights to become property of Allenstown. Operating expense to be carried by the Ball Club.

- 14. By Petition. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install and maintain five street lights on River Road, on poles number 44, 51, 58, 65 and 76.
- 15. To hear the reports of auditors, agents, committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drougth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the traveling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Allenstown:

In accordance with the rules of the School Board and the laws of the State of New Hampshire, I am pleased to submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Allenstown.

Since my election, my time has been spent chiefly in studying the problems of the entire union, watching the schools in action in each district, becoming acquainted with the teachers, children, and citizens, attending meetings of the school board both regular and special, checking equipment, books, and supplies, trying to discover the strong and weak points of each system so that a thorough understanding of the needs of your boys and girls may be emphasized, and gathering data which will be necessary for future reference.

It is, then, fairly apparent that any recommendations made at this time would be somewhat hurried and would not present a clear picture of what would be the best procedure to follow. Therefore, during the coming year advice will be suggested only after careful consideration and study of the available material and the educational welfare of the children of the town.

Appreciation to the School Board

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board for the confidence it has shown toward me since July 1947. The patience and courteous consideration expressed in my behalf and for the children of the town is humbly received and I shall try to merit your continued confidence in my efforts as your educational advisor and executive officer.

Appreciations

The Commissioner of Education, Dr. Edgar Fuller, and his staff for the encouragement and help always extended to the superintendents of the state.

The Officers of the School District and Town for their cooperation with the school board and the administration in the attempt to make the school of the town efficient and an important unit in the educational system of the state.

Mr. George H. Harmon for his efforts and energy in behalf of the school and the new superintendent.

Father Collins for his cooperation with the Public School of the town.

Miss Adonia A. Douillette, the school nurse, for her unselfish work in the interests of the boys and girls of Allenstown.

Miss Gloria Gardiner in her attempt to improve the health through a well-balanced lunch for the children who so avail themselves of this privilege.

The Principal, teachers, and pupils of the school for their loyalty and aid to the School Board and Superintendent without which the school could not function.

The citizens of the town for their confidence in the administration of the educational efforts in behalf of their children.

Accomplishments

Since taking office as head of the Allenstown School, I have been impressed by the seriousness and desirability of the School Board to develop and complete the projects necessary and within the limits of the budget. The cooperation of its members in all emergencies as well as regular routine matters has been frank, earnest, and constructive.

I am thoroughly convinced that the board as well as the public want the best schools possible. In keeping with this desire, I am bringing to your attention the following items as commendable accomplishments.

School Lunches

The continuation of the school lunch program has proved advisable and worthwhile. More children avail themselves of this privilege. It is my opinion that the time is not far distant when all pupils who attend the schools of the state will be given a hot lunch in the middle of the day at the expense of the taxpayer and under trained super-

vision; this is a phase of educational growth and is just as important to the health and welfare of the youngster as his academic work. The school is fortunate in securing the services of a woman who is willing to give her time and energy for a small fee to present to your children the opportunity to get this service. The State and Federal energy for a small fee to present to your children the Government have furnished food and a portion of the financial aid until such time as the citizens are ready to accept their full responsibilities.

Repairs

Your School Board has taken the time to make the necessary routine repairs for the upkeep of the plant and building. These minor repairs have been in the form of painting wherever needed, repair of chairs, desks, windows and doors, furnace, and the general overall work necessary to maintain the entire plant.

Tests and Testing

Testing is important in the development of modern youth in his educational growth. Although much time and energy must be spent to administer the program, the results have proved very desirable. It has been the custom in the past to test the boys and girls at the close of the school year to determine in part whether or not a youngster should be promoted to the next grade or graduated. This year the tests were administered in the fall. After correcting and tabulating, teachers were able to concentrate upon the weaknesses of their pupils with the entire year to work out individual problems. This innovation has been a challenge to every teacher and a decided aid to the educational growth of the pupil. The cooperation of the teachers was excellent even though it meant extra work in the correction, tabulation, and study of the tests.

Marking System and Report Cards

Probably one of the most important changes made since September was the simplification of the report card and the introduction of a new marking system.

Evaluation of the work of the boys and girls in the school is a subjective matter at best and considerable time is spent every six weeks in order that a fair and accurate report may be made to the parent of the child's classroom activities. Many prominent educators have opposed this type of report where a subjective statement is made that does not tell the whole story. However, as long as the colleges and the State Department require some form of measuring pupil progress, New Hampshire schools must continue to keep such records. It has always been the intention of the administration to make such a report as brief as possible yet to advise the parent of the child's progress in its simplest form. It is my opinion that the new system has met widespread approval in the community.

Standardization of Permanent Records

The permanent records of the pupils and the school have been standardized. This method of permanent record-keeping is in use all over the country in the schools and should prove an asset to pupils, teachers, parents and future administrators.

Books, Supplies and Equipment

Many textbooks, supplies, and equipment have been brought up to date. Supplementary readers, geographies, and many items of equipment and supplies have been purchased. It has been my contention that the school must have at least three fundamental factors to produce the desired results. Pupils, teachers, and equipment and supplies. If you have the pupils and the teachers but the

supply of material is inadequate, to what avail is the institution? Since the opening of school, I have been careful to have the necessary supplies and equipment in order that your children might get the education to which they are entitled.

Teachers

It is my opinion that your teachers are conscientious and are trying to give the best possible services to the children of the town. Surely their cooperation and patience with the superintendent and school board has been on a high plane. There have been some administrative changes in the supervision which seems to have brought the school, the board, and the citizens in closer touch with what the schools are doing.

Vocational Training

You are fortunate in being able to send your boys and girls to Pembroke Grammar School for training in manual arts and home economics. This privilege has been continued to the Allenstown School for the coming year through the School Board of Pembroke and the citizens of the Town.

Recommendations

In view of the fact that the School Board has been very active in the matter of school improvements together with the purchase of needed supplies and equipment, it would seem logical to withhold recommendations at this time. However, there are one or two items which should be called to your attention for future consideration.

Supplies, Equipment and Textbooks

According to the data in my possession, these items have been advanced from 10 to 40 percent since October

1946. Only recently I have received notice that a further increase can be expected by March first. Provision must be made for the increase in prices in the budget for 1948-49 if your children are to be adequately supplied with material to continue the work of the school.

Repairs

Your urgent attention is called to the foundation of the building around the windows in the basement. Unless the cement and bricks are repaired very soon the district will have a major job on its hands.

Tuitions

This item in the budget last year claimed 34 percent of the entire total amount appropriated. State laws require every school district to pay the tuition of every child who attends a secondary school (high school or academy) within those laws. A year ago the district failed to raise the necessary funds to pay the tuitions of all those boys and girls who did attend high school or academy. The result was a deficit of \$708.00 which has been inserted in the warrant this year. The tuition rate has increased from \$123.79 in 1946-47 to \$138.89 in 1947-48 and without doubt will run close to \$145.00 for 1948-49. During 1946-47 there were approximately 36 boys and girls who attended secondary schools and when the data has been collected for 1947-48 the total will be about 42. It is, therefore, very important that provision be made for the year 1948-49 when we are expecting an increased number to be reported in attendance.

School Lunches

I believe that every boy and girl in the school should have a hot noon lunch. Many cannot afford the small cost

of such a lunch. It is, therefore, a question of the generosity of the taxpayer as to whether appropriation of sufficient amount will be made available.

The lunch is the important thing, but I was impressed by the supervision at the table during the lunch period. The district is to be commended in having women who are willing to aid and help these children during the time they are having the lunch. I have not seen anything which can compare with it in the entire Union, except in one instance.

Teachers

I wish to insert in this item for your consideration the fact that the salaries of your teachers must be carefully studied. Graduates of the colleges all over the country have set their own minimum wage scale which will exceed the New Hampshire State Board minimum. I would recommend that your teachers receive their share appropriated for this item to meet the continued cost of living.

Health Supervision

Your nurse, Miss Adonia A. Douillette, receives \$2400 from five districts distributed as follows: Allenstown \$553.46; Bow \$301.89; Epsom \$188.68; Hooksett \$528.30; and Pembroke \$837.67. Her salary is based on the number of pupils in each district for the previous year. This means that her salary includes her traveling expenses from her home in Suncook to the various schools in the above districts. It also includes her trips to Concord, Manchester, Boston, Hanover, Laconia, and wherever it is necessary to transport a child or group of children. She is on call at all times, and in the Town of Allenstown even in all schools, and through her generosity makes many special trips in connection with her work.

It is my opinion that the time has come to realize the great part your school nurse plays in the school system and the personal interest she takes in each and every child regardless of expense. Therefore, I recommend that an adequate amount be set aside in the budget for reasonable expenses of traveling for your school nurse.

Consolidation

Again, your attention is called to the fact that for both economic and educational reasons, the public school should seriously consider the consolidation with a larger school unit. In the report of December 1946 of the Commission to Study the State Educational System, strong recommendation has been made to "close . . . small elementary schools as soon as the necessary facilities for their consolidation can be provided." The State Board of Education through the Commissioner of Education has made this consolidation trend very vital to the education of the youth of the state and through his approval there are a few towns and schools who are considering such a move in the spring.

New Equipment

Allenstown is one of the few towns in the district which has no playground equipment. Balls and bats have been purchased for the youngsters to use during the play period, but nothing has been purchased in the form of swings, slides, and other playground equipment. I believe it is part of the educational growth of every boy and girl to have the right to expect such equipment as a physical outlet for their energy and development.

Therefore, I recommend that one or two pieces of playground equipment be purchased for the next school year as a start in the building process and the necessary money be appropriated for its accomplishment. May I again thank the members of the School Board for the assistance and advice so generously given in my behald and in behalf of the citizens, teachers, and pupils of Allenstown Public School.
