You are hereby notified to meet at Vilas High School in said Alstead on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance and for the support of the poor.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 for highways and bridges.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4000.00 to Oil Town roads.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2700.00 for payment of Long Term notes: \$1200.00 to complete payment on the Bucket Loader note and \$1500.00 to be applied on the Fire Truck note.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Medical Program.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell real estate acquired by tax sale.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the care of the cemeteries.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for Memorial Day.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$230.00 for the Elliott Community Hospital. By request.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the care and maintenance of the Town Clock.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for the Police Department for the protection of persons and property.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$225.00 to rent and maintain land for a public dump.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of Pine Blister rust.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$132.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven Towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of parks and playgrounds.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the support of band concerts.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for fire protection and support of the fire company.
- 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the expense of Social Security administration.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds of \$200.00 or more, each, received for the perpetual care of Cemetery lots.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to install 2 additional street lights on the lower end of River Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,224.96 for street lights.

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$629.75 for T R A construction, the State to contribute \$4,198.33.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck and snow removal equipment.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Alstead for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector. Town Clerk, Road Agent, Trustees of Trust Funds and Vilas Pool.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1955—December 31, 1956: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Net Debt of \$85.30 to a Surplus of \$284.46 during the year 1956.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

#### Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 — A-4)

Comparative statement of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$847.01, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$48.13, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$798.88.

#### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1956, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1956, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

#### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

#### Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Alstead for their assistance during the course of the audit.

You are hereby notified to meet in the Vilas School Auditorium in said district on the 9th day of March, 1957 at 8:00 in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agent in the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to receive and use in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof, or any state or private agency.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Alstead:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

All the teachers of Supervisory Union 60 are participating in a program of professional growth and development this year. Monthly teachers' meetings are planned by the principals who meet with the Superintendent a week in advance of the date of the teachers' meeting. Topics that have been considered to date are: Planning for Better Teaching; Getting the Most Out of Our Teaching Resources; and Science Education.

The Charlestown and Walpole Supervisory Unions held a joint teachers' meeting at Charlestown in October for the purpose of discussing ways and means of improving the teaching of handwriting. Miss Kittle, a nationally recognized authority in the field of writing, was obtained as a consultant for this meeting.

The results of achievement tests given in April each year show that Alstead compares favorably with national and area averages.

Only one change occurred in our faculty this year. Mrs. Dorothy Kaffel replaced Mrs. Eleanor Graham. Mrs. Kaffel is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College and formerly taught in Shrewsbury, Massachusetts.

An additional feeder transportation route was added this year which allows Alstead pupils who formerly attended the Gilsum School to attend the Alstead Elementary School. This resulted in a saving that had to be used to pay for transportation of a pupil that cannot be transported to Alstead because of distance and road conditions. The transportation of this one pupil who lives at the Old Blake Place costs as much as the average cost of eight pupils who travel on regular routes. Consideration might be given to the advisability of the town buying farms that are inaccessible places when occupancy of these farm houses are so costly in terms of road maintenance and school children transportation.

One of our school buses operates on a route that includes the "Slade Hill" area. Snow conditions in the winter are such as to make this road very narrow, to the extent that it is hazardous for a truck and school bus to pass each other. Widening and reconditioning this road would do a great deal to increase the safety and reduce the cost of operation of this bus route.

We have teacher drivers this year which assures that school bus conduct is similar to the classroom situation.

Teachers' salaries are increasing in our state as they are all over the nation; book prices have increased; supplies have gone up in price approximately fifteen percent; we are no longer able

to employ custodial services at former prices; and the fuel bid price went up 1.3 cents per gallon this year. These are a few concrete examples of why this year's budget is more than last year's.

In addition to increased costs we are faced with decreased income from elementary tuition this next year and our balance at the end of the year will be negligible due to the loss of more than the usual number of tuition pupils during the year.

I believe that the people of Alstead are interested in a good educational program for the children. It is not possible to maintain a good educational program at the same cost when the cost of materials, supervision, fuel, repairs and teachers continues to increase.

#### Tuition

Tuition rates have been increased by the school board for the next year. The new rates are in keeping with the increased costs experienced during the current year.

Comparison between the charts given above show that gains and losses in grades one through eight have balanced this school year except for the fact that losses in grades seven and eight has meant loss of three tuition pupils.

The total high school enrollment has decreased since October and the decrease is due to loss of tuition pupils who find it difficut to finance the cost of transportation.

The enrollment projection chart shows a decrease in tuition pupils for the year 1957-58 at the seventh and eighth grade levels. However, this decrease will be more than made up in 1958 and 1959

- 128 pupils participated in the Patch Test Program
- 36 pupils and teachers were x-rayed
- 10 pupils attended Pre-registration clinic
- 124 pupils participated in the Diabetic Testing Program School Health Services include the following:
- 1. Appraise the health status of pupils.
- 2. Advise pupils, parents and others of the appraisal findings.
- 3. Encourage correction of remedial defects.
- 4. Assist in the identification and education of handicapped children.
- 5. To help prevent and control diseases.
- Provide necessary emergency service for injury or sudden illness.

These school health services are aims that can be reached through the cooperation of a community. We are most fortunate to have had this cooperation in Alstead.

#### VILAS HIGH SCHOOL REPORT, 1955-56

We wish to thank the citizens and parents of our students for their splendid support over the period of years of our annual school fair. Your appreciated help in our parade, on the exhibits and your attendance go to make our fair larger and more successful each year.

The honor students for 1955-1956 were: Valedictorian, Ruth Miller; Salutatorian, Patricia Burke.

Our Girls' State representatives were Madelene Edson. Bernadette Burke and Rose Knight.

Our Boys' State representative was Raymond Spencer.

Mary Goff was the Legion Oratorical Contest Winner.

We wish to thank the American Legion Auxiliary, Langdon Community Club and the Alstead Outing Club for their fine support in the above activities.

Our Good Citizenhip Girl was Madeleine Edson who was sponsored by the Abigail Stearns Chapter of D. A. R. of Walpole.

Dale Dustin and Carl Bean were our representatives to the Y. M. C. A. Conference.

The California Reading, Language and Arithmetic tests were again administered to the seventh and eighth grades.

The University of New Hampshire ability and interest tests are being administered to the students each year. They are of great help in guiding the student either for an advanced education or for a future occupation.

We were very fortunate to have Mrs. Burroughs to teach pottery making; Mrs. Hatch, carving; and Mr. Chase wood-working to aid us in our fifteen weeks' activity program. Other activities such as photography, dramatics, dancing, mechanical drawing, manuscript writing, firearm safety and auto-driving were conducted by members of the faculty.

The high school and elementary teachers have been participating in a monthly in-service training program. The topics of discussion have been instructional materials, lesson planning, science and social studies. These meetings are in conjunction with the other schools in the Supervisory Union No. 60.

Vilas entered its eleventh play-off in the last twelve years of state competition in basketball. We defeated New Boston at Hopkinton and lost to Charlestown at Walpole.

Everett Bragg won the annual Dick Bath foul shooting trophy.

We wish to thank the citizens of Alstead for their support in making it possible for us to journey annually to Boston and see the New England Basketball tournament. It is not only recreational but educational.

#### Vocational Agriculture

This year's enrollment, while somewhat lower than in the past, is in keeping with the trend throughout the state. The vocational agriculture classes receive considerable information covering the employment that may be obtained in related occupations. These include, in part, chemical companies, grain companies, milk companies, and the machinery industry. The Federal Government is supporting programs, such as the soil conservation service, which employ many young people.

More emphasis is being placed on farm management including such subjects as farm credit, farm records, income taxes, social security, marketing, and the efficient production.

In the interscholastic judging contest the Vilas teams placed second in poultry, second in egg grading, and third in dairy cattle judging. The poultry team will represent New Hampshire at the Eastern States Exposition next fall.

This year the school will be host to four other schools for the parliamentary procedure contest.

Three boys are regularly attending F. F. A. leadership meetings at Concord during the agricultural teachers' monthly meetings.

Income from the greenhouse is behind schedule, but the group made its first bond repayment this year.

Two boys attended the state F. F. A. convention at Durham and in the fall most of the boys attended the Eastern States Exposition.

#### Homemaking Department

This year there are 67 girls enrolled in homemaking classes making it fairly obvious that present facilities are inadequate. Some of the strain is lessened, however, by dividing the Homemaking 9 and 10 class on two days of the week. Scheduling makes this impossible the remainder of the week.

The Juniors and Seniors are studying the Home; a course which includes every aspect of a house from choosing the land site to the final completion of the interior of the same. Laboratory periods are included in this study during which time girls learn how to renovate furniture, make home furnishings or any other practical skill which they deem necessary or desirable.

The freshmen and sophomore girls are again dividing their time between studies of Foods and Clothing. Their foods work this year consists of food preservation, batters and doughs, nutrition; table service, meal planning and preparation of dinners. On alternate years breakfast and luncheon units are taught in place of dinner units. In clothing the girls make the garments they need or desire. As few girls work with the same speed or amount of skill a great deal of individual attention is necessary.

The clothing semester is divided into two parts; one half being devoted to working on fabrics suitable for winter wear; the other being used to work on light weight materials. Problems concerning choice of garments, care of clothing, and textile fibers are also included in this study.

The junior high girls consider a variety of topics such as Child Care, Good Grooming, Food Preservation, Personality Development, Meal Planning and preparation, Table Service, Clothing Construction, Clothing Selections, Housekeeping Duties, Making Rooms Livable, etc. Many opportunities are given for the practice of skills required by these phases of homemaking.

Home projects and visits are an essential part of our homemaking program. Many field trips, to enrich our learning, are taken

Joan Bugbee won the Betty Crocker Search for the Home-maker of Tomorrow Contest and Ruth Miller received the American Agriculturist Award for outstanding achievement in home-making.

Sixteen of our girls participated in the D. A. R. Dress Review held at Westminster, Vermont, last spring. All took home ribbons, 13 of which were firsts.

Five of our members attended the State F H A Meeting at Dover in the spring and thirteen girls attended the State F H A meeting at K. T. C. this fall.

Our program committee met early this fall and planned the program for the entire year. Our aim is to complete at least one project a month. They are as follows:

September—Co-sponsor the Annual Vilas High School Fair October—Promote a record hop for the school

November-Nurse's Room Project

December—Helping a Needy Family at Christmas
Sponsor the Annual Vilas High Christmas Party
January—Work on Homemaking Degrees
February—Mother and Daughter Banquet
March—Work-day for the club
April—Plan for State F. H. A. Meeting at Vilas
May—Make letters for the Athletic Association

Thus far our plans have been carried out most successfully. We take special pride in our Nurse's Room Project. Our club purchased a roll-away bed and enough yard goods to make a cover for the same, drapes for the windows and a cover for the screen. Some of our girls made the furnishings. We feel the room is greatly improved.

#### Commercial Department

The subjects offered this year in the Commercial Department are: Bookkeeping, Commercial Typing, General Typing, Shorthand, and Office Practice.

The bookkeeping class started the year with eighteen members but due to the large drop out in the sophomore class we have reduced our number to twelve. In the study of bookkeeping we try to get the basic fundamentals that are common to all types of record keeping. We use the popular Twentieth Century Bookkeeping text with a workbook that has all the needed forms and record paper to do the various problems. Towards the end of the course a "practice set" consisting of actual business forms and record paper is used to give the students practice in maintaining actual records.

There are two typing classes this year consisting of fourteen students each. Every available space is in use as typing has become a very popular subject. The typing classes are designated as: Commercial—for those students who are taking the commercial course, with stress on the business phase of typing, and General—for students who want typing to help them in school work now and in the future, with stress on personal and theme typing.

As shorthand is offered for only one year, the aim of this class is to develop a good basic shorthand vocabulary, with stress on transcription only for the students who seem to be superior in their grasp of the fundamentals.

The office practice class, consisting of seniors only, is one of the largest we have ever had. We have spent most of the first half of the year working on individual assignments involving the use of the calculating machines, dictaphone, legal typing and clerical arithmetic problems. Each student has chosen an occupation that he is interested in and has written to numerous places to obtain information about it. It was with the hope that this would create interest in advanced study that this project was started, and it has achieved its aim in at least two cases. To further this idea, trips are planned to Plymouth Teachers College and other schools in the area where a real interest and desire is shown.

The annual issue of the VERNACULAR was published and the experience and practice obtained was well worth the time and effort spent.

#### Mathematics Department

The mathematics department at Vilas is offering five regular mathematics courses plus a Senior review course. The five regular courses are General Math, Algebra I, Algebra II, Plane Geometry and Advanced Math and Trigonometry.

General Math is principally a freshman subject designed for those who plan no further education beyond high school. Emphasis is placed on the fundamentals of arithmetic which are needed to carry on everyday activities such as shopping, banking and installment buying.

Algebra I is also a freshman subject, although we find many upperclassmen trying to work it into their schedules. Students often try to avoid mathematics only to find, after they start considering future employment and schooling, that it is essential to entrance into their chosen field. The solving of equations, literal problems, use of formulas, signed numbers, graphs and the beginning of quadratics are covered during the year.

Algebra II is a continuance of Algebra I and the work becomes more challenging. During the year topics like variation, series and sequence, ratio and proportion, solution of quadratic equations and introductions to logarithms and trig are covered.

Plane Geomtry for Juniors tries to develop in each student an understanding and ability to use a logical scientific pattern of thought. Since each statement made must also include a reason based on logic and definition, the student should learn to be somewhat skeptical of rash statements, gossip and prejudices until he can determine the reliability of the source or the soundness of their reasoning. Appreciation of the art of geomtry and the ability to visualize are also desired goals of this course.

Advance Math and Trig is a college preparatory course designed for those planning a career in science or engineering. Following a review of algebra we study functions, identities, graphing, both polar and cartisian, solution of right and oblique triangles, logarithms and introduction to calculus. Mr. Heman

Chase again aided us with both time and equipment so that the practical side of trigonometry may be realized.

The Senior Review course is for those Seniors who, after taking an exam, show a deficiency in the fundamentals of arithmetic. Due to the difficulty of scheduling, this is a very informal group, meeting whenever possible and studying the particular problems that each Senior is having with the basic fundamentals.

This year we are fortunate to have had Mr. Herbert Merritt, a cadet teacher from Keene Teachers College, helping out with the math program. Due to his help it was possible to introduce the General Math course which had not been taught for some time, and provide for much more individual attention that would have otherwise been impossible. At the same time, we feel that Vilas has aided in the education of another teacher to help obliviate the increasing teacher shortage.

#### World History

As people of the world come nearer together it becomes more and more important that we study how people of other countries live and act as they do. History through its study of social, economic, and political cultures interprets the present occurrences through a knowledge of past experiences. Students have prepared detailed papers on countries of their choice. In addition to its historical value it increases their ability to use reference materials. This year some members of the class along with others from other social studies classes participated with other high schools in this area in a Model Council of Europe held at Keene Teachers' College.

#### Civics

This course shows the student the responsibilities of citizenship in a democracy. In doing this he studies local, state, and federal governments, constitutions, court systems and finance. In addition to this an introduction to economics and vocation. Behind all this it tries to point out how one should act in his community and the problems he must help solve.

#### French

During the year 1956-57 three classes in French are being offered to Vilas students. The general objectives of all three classes are the same; to teach students to read and write the language, to speak it easily, and to understand something of French culture.

Special effort is being made to help the students acquire a better pronunciation and a proper intonation through the use of French movies and the tape recorder. Students are also corresponding with students in France.

#### One-Act Play Contest

The ninth annual play competition was held in the Charlestown High School auditorium on April 19, with Vilas, Charlestown, and Walpole High School again competing.

The plays presented were: "Ringing in the Groom" by the Charlestown cast; "Two Crooks and a Lady" by Walpole; and "Sunday Costs Five Pesos" by Vilas.

The honors went to the Vilas group with their action-packed Mexican comedy. William Gilbert of the Vilas cast carried off the title of "best actor of the evening."

It was the sixth time out of nine tries that students from Vilas have wen the competition.

#### Girls' Athletic Program

Our physical education program includes all girls from grades five through twelve. Although the department carries on an interscholastic schedule in basketball and softball, the emphasis is upon intramural activities.

Gym classes for the fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth grades are conducted by volunteers from the junior and senior girls under the direction of the physical education instructor.

Each high school girl has at least one hour of gym per week during school time. In addition to this, the noon-time program includes all girls in the four high school classes. Opportunity is given to these students to plan, direct, coach, and officiate for many of the sports.

In September the Girls' Athletic Association held its annual election. Members of this association are the cheerleaders, and the girls who are elected to serve as heads of sports. These heads of sports, selected by the girls of the student body, are given the responsibility of organizing and supervising the athletic activities during the noon hour activity period.

This athletic association also sponsors, with the lettermen from the boy's teams, the annual A. A. Dance. The dance this year was held November 9th.

The intramural program this year has included, thus far, soccer, tennis, archery, volleyball, dodgeball, and calisthenics. Tentative plans for spring athletics include tennis and softball competition.

#### Instrumental Music Department

The music activities in the Alstead School District are increasing in quality and in quantity. Children are given the opportunity to show their talent with the pre-band instrument, called the song flute, which is started in the fourth and fifth grades. From this elementary level they progress to band and

orchestra instruments. This year we have a grade school band, junior high band and in the senior high, both band and a string orchestra.

During the school year these music groups perform for many school activities such as the school fair parade, the Christmas Concert, the Spring Concert, and Memorial Day exercises.

Vilas was represented in the All-State Orchestra by Carlene Bean and in the All-State Band by Dale Dustin.

It is important that the students have the appropriate material to work with. These tools are necessary in building the program to a standard of quality.

Much satisfaction and pride are derived from seeing your children progress from learning to play an instrument to being part of a New Hampshire All-State group.

I would like to thank the Alstead P. T. A. for the help in securing band uniforms. I would also like to thank the superintendent, headmaster, teachers, school board, students, and townspeople for their help and co-operation.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1955 and June 30, 1956, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$3,688.60 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1956.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues; (Exhibit C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1956, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$4,758.18, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$318.66, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$5,076.84.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1956, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1956, is indicated in Exhibit F. Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1956, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Alstead School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.
