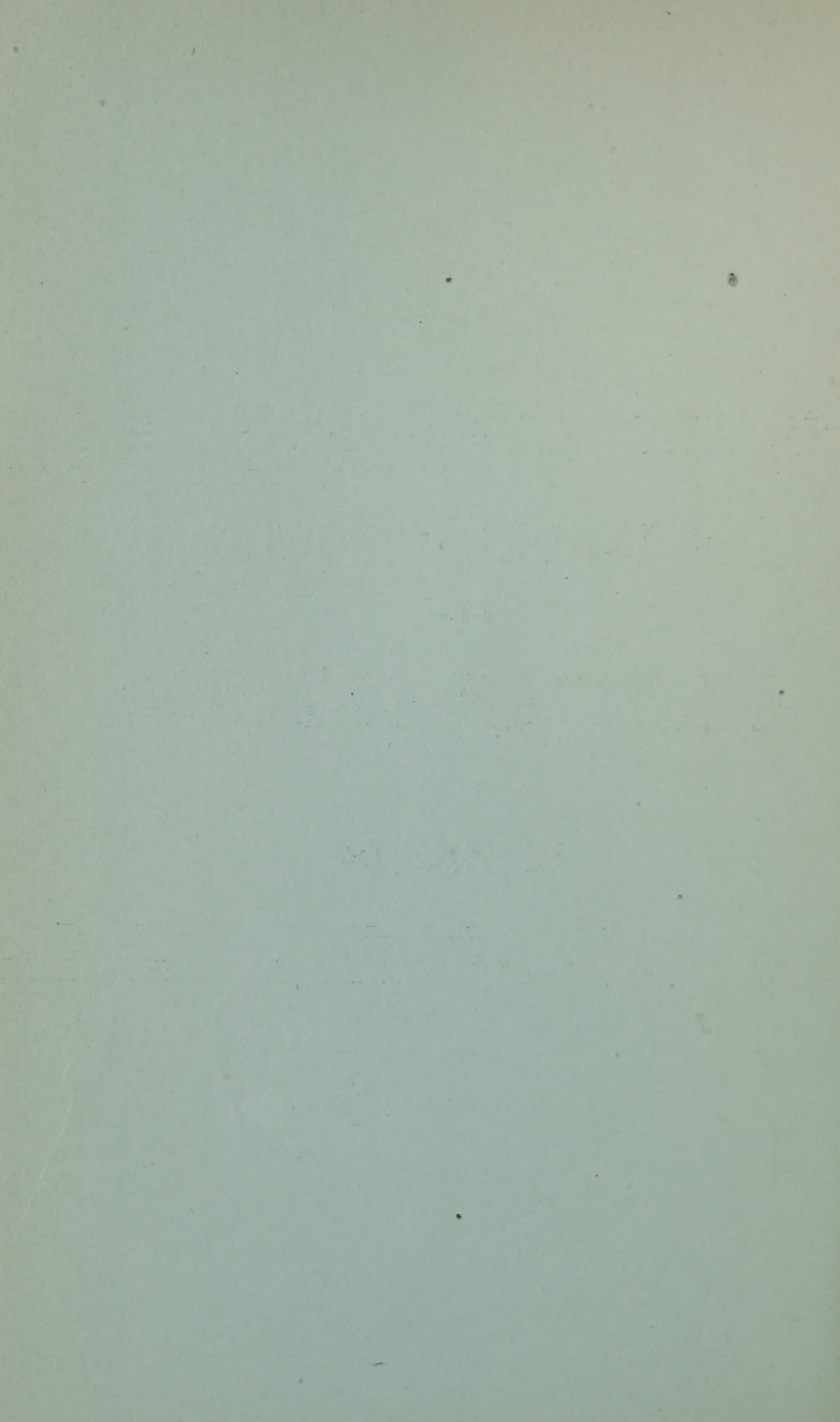

To the People of Belknap County.

In compliance with the law, we make our annual report, ending April 30th, 1888; also report of the several officers of the County, and proceedings of the County Convention.

Our superintendent and matron, Mr. Clark and wife, we are sorry to report resigned their position at the farm, to take effect May 1st. It is only just to them to say that we are regret very much that they felt obliged to take this course on account of failing health, from long and faithful service.

The farm has been very much improved under Mr. Clark's management, and the inmates lose a faithful friend in Mrs. Clark, who has been true to their every want. Their memory will be cherished by all.

We have appointed Mr. H. C. Gale and wife, of Laconia, as their successors, who have the advantage of one year's experience at the farm as assistants.

As we revert back to the convenience and sanitary condition of the buildings before the additions and repairs were made, we can hardly conceive how the inmates were made comfortable.

The buildings now are very convenient and roomy, the sanitary conditions are excellent, the care and comfort of all looked after faithfully, and it would be to the advantage and happiness of the most of those who are assisted at their destitute homes, if they would avail themselves of this home which the County has so liberally provided for them. We have fitted up a school room in the new wing and the children are provided with a competent teacher, which we think is a step in the right direction.

Our jail is roomy, airy and healthy, a terror to all law breakers, and none pass except by the door with the consent of the turnkey. Boarders not desired at these quarters. May the transgressors be few.

We invite the tax payers of the County to call and investigate for themselves, and see if their money is properly invested and the unfortunate receive due care and attention.

Proceedings of the Representatives of Belknap County in Convention Assembled.

Concord, N. H., June 8th, 1887.

Agreeably to the requirements of Chapter 23 of the General Laws, the representatives from the several towns in Belknap County met in convention in Representatives Hall, at the State House, and organized by the choice of Hon. C. F. Stone of Laconia, as chairman, and Chas. D. Thyng of New Hampton, clerk.

Mr. Neal, chairman of the board of County Commissioners, being present, laid before the convention the following estimates for the expenses of the county for the years 1888 and 1889, and recommended a county tax of \$25,000.00 for each of the years mentioned, divided as follows :

Mr. Neal, in behalf of the commissioners, extended an invitation to the convention to visit the County farm.

VOTED—to accept the invitation, and June 10th was fixed upon as

the day of the visit. Voted to adjourn to meet at the County farm on that date.

Met at the County farm according to adjournment, the chairman being absent. Mr. Philbrick of Tilton, was chosen temporary chairman.

Voted to adjourn to meet at the State House, in Representatives Hall, Thursday, June 16th, at the close of the morning session.

Adjourned to meet at the same place on Wednesday, June 22, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Solicitor's Report.

To the County Commissioners:

The county has had no case on the civil docket during the last year.

At the beginning of the year there were two cases on the criminal docket, of which one was a mere recommendation of the grand jury in a nuisance case and was dropped as of no legal effect, and the other was an assault case and was dropped on payment of costs in pursuance of an agreement made at a previous term.

During the year 34 indictments have been found by the grand jury and one information has been filed by the attorney general. These indictments were 21 for breach of liquor laws, 6 for breaking and entering, 3 for assault and battery, 1 for adultery, 1 for gaming, 1 for larceny, 1 for manslaughter. The information is for a nuisance.

Two of the liquor cases have been tried and the defendants found guilty, in one a *nolle prosequi* was entered, thirteen have been disposed of on pleas of guilty and five are still pending. One of the breaking and entering cases has been tried and the defendant found guilty, and another against the same defendant is pending; in one the defendant pleaded guilty, and another against the same defendant is pending; in one the defendant is undergoing imprisonment in another state; in the other case, which was for a comparatively trivial offense, two of the three defendants pleaded guilty, but sentence was suspended, they having lain several months in jail, and the other defendant will probably never be tried. In one of the assault cases the defendant pleaded guilty, the other two are pending. The defendants in the adultery case are out of the state. The gaming case was disposed of on plea of guilty. In the larceny case there was a trial and acquittal; in the manslaughter case a trial and disagreement. The nuisance case is pending.

Altogether there have been five trials, resulting in three convictions, one acquittal and one disagreement.

Physician's Report.

The County Physician respectfully submits his annual report of the County House for the year ending May, 1888.

The past year has been comparatively healthy when we consider the aged, infirm and broken-down class of persons of whom the residents of the County Farm are mostly composed. But the healthy location and improved hygienic appointments of the house contribute very much to maintain the health and comfort of the occupants. The hot weather of last summer was characterized by a small amount of sickness peculiar to the season. During the autumn, several of the very aged failed and died of old age and chronic diseases which had lingered for a long time. A severe epidemic of measles converted the house into a hospital for several weeks during the winter, and a large number suffered from the disease. The springtime has brought a most trying form of influenza peculiar to the season, which has spread very generally through the house.

There has been no cases of fatal, or even of a very serious, accident during the year, which, when we consider how many persons are kept there who are wholly untrustworthy and require the most careful watching, certainly speaks in the highest terms of those who exercise such careful vigil over those unbalanced and restless minds.

Eight deaths have occurred during the year, as follows: Dudley Bailey, died June 19th, of heart disease, aged 66; Mary Plummer, died August 2nd, of old age, aged 87; Benjamin Gagnon, died August 12th, of consumption, aged 60; Frank Randlett, died Sept. 13th, of consumption, aged 36; Nellie Leonard, died Oct. 24th, of consumption, aged 24; Henry Smith, died Nov. 11th, of cancer of the throat, aged 61; Susan Lock, died Feb. 7th, of old age, aged 86; John McKensie, died March 5th, of pneumonia, aged 14.

It gives me pleasure to speak in the highest terms of all the managers and attendants of the house, for they have labored most faithfully to watch and care for the sick, for to their ever watchful care and

faithful attendance upon the sick is due, very largely, the limited amount of sickness and very few deaths.

Your Honorable Board has provided so perfectly for the convenience and comfort of the sick, that patients here enjoy most of the advantages found in our city hospitals, and so highly appreciated both by patient and physician, and which contribute so largely to the comfort and speedy recovery of the sick.

Never before since the opening of this institution has it been so well fitted for its beneficent work as it now is, and never before have the demands upon it been greater.

Never before in its history have such satisfactory results been obtained, and never before has its future seemed brighter or fraught, apparently, with greater good to the unfortunate part of our people whom it was instituted to benefit.
