You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, March 10, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, and any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- 1. To choose all Town Officers for ensuing year.

- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating to same.
- 4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

- 6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to refund outstanding notes, or take any action relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing same.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day, or take any action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Cemeteries or take any action regarding same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of Highways or take any action relative thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to allow land damage for the completion of road in West Brookline or take any action regarding same.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise any money for equipment to remove snow, place snow removal on a contract basis, or take any action relative thereto.
- 16. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Clinic.

To the School Board of Brookline:

I herewith submit my seventeenth annual report which is also the seventeenth in the series of such reports.

Union No. 40

Beginning with the school year 1933-1934 Hollis was added to the four districts which had comprised this union since 1919. The apportionment of joint expenses of the districts is at present as follows: Amherst 17%, Brookline 8%, Hollis 14%, Milford 56%, and Mont Vernon 5%.

Instruction

The objectives of instruction are quite different for various groups or ages of pupils. In the primary years the most important thing is to have the child learn to read with understanding as this is the key to all knowledge even in after-school years. In Brookline the Winston system of primary reading is being used, together with many supplementary reading books. Much practice and drill is given both in oral and silent reading to the end that children may learn to enjoy books as well as to get information from the printed page. Arithmetic is also a basic subject in primary grades and the objective is to acquire facility in simple computations of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. These things also require much drill to become fixed in children's minds. Probably the most difficult problem of the primary teacher is to provide motivated seat work, that is, a type of work for children who are occupied at their desks which will tie up closely with their reading or arithmetic lesson and thus help further to teach the points brought out in the recitation. Without care seat work can easily become a waste of time. In addition to the basic subjects the primary children have work in hygiene, music, drawing, history and geography. This is accomplished largely through the use of supplementary reading books.

For intermediate grades the emphasis is placed on getting the thought from the printed page. In this connection geography, history, and hygiene are considered content or fact subjects—

facts about different countries, facts about different heroes or places in history, facts about diet and care of the body. In arithmetic much drill is continued and more and more problem work is presented. Finding out and explaining how to do a problem is just as important as getting a correct answer by computation. Music and drawing are continued and English language and grammar is begun as a formal subject. Pupils in intermediate grades are expected to be able to work alone with more or less independence.

In the grammar room the formal subjects are arithmetic, history, geography, hygiene, English including grammar, language, literature, spelling, and penmanship, music, science and drawing. Now that so many of the pupils go on to High School it is important to have them well prepared to do the work of High School. To prepare them properly for these four years ahead the two most important things are (1) ability in English which means being able to read and understand what is read, that is, to get the main thought from a written paragraph and to be able to express thoughts clearly and accurately in either oral or written English including spelling and penmanship, (2) skill in arithmetic which includes accuracy in computation and ability to analyze a problem.

The work being done by Brookline pupils now attending High School shows that on the whole they have been adequately prepared for study on the secondary level. Of course, it is true that there are always pupils who find any school work difficult and perhaps are unable to do High School work well. More often however, failure in High School is due to lack of study each day. Parents can render a very valuable service by seeing to it that their children make their school work come first and place other activities second during the school years of their lives. If the pupil's time is properly budgeted there will be time for healthful outdoor exercises and some community social life as well as sufficient time for school work.

High School

During the last few years there has been an increasing number of children attending high school. The prospects are that the number will increase rather than decrease which, of course, involves a larger expenditure for tuition. As has been pointed out before, the district is not responsible for transportation at least for pupils under fourteen years of age, although it is legal for the district to provide funds for high school transportation as well as for elementary transportation under two miles. This extra transportation is seldom attempted by a School Board unless specifically authorized and instructed by the district to do so. It may be thought by some that it would be feasible to offer some high school work in Brookline as was done some years ago. To provide subjects of high school instruction for the first year that would satisfy the different needs of pupils would be very difficult due to teaching time required. In the long run it would seem far better to stress thorough preparation for high school and encourage our girls and boys to undertake a regular high school course of study with seriousness of purpose. It is doubtful too whether any saving of money would be made in the long run by maintaining the first year of high school in connection with our grammar room.

SCHOOL PLANT

All children are accommodated in three rooms at the village, the grammar room at the Daniels Academy Building with grades VI-VII-VIII, the two-room primary building on Milford Street with grades I-II in the east room and III-IV-V in the west room. Teaching classes for grade III are divided between the two teachers.

All rooms have had interior painting recently and the Daniels Academy Building exterior painting. The next paint project should be the exterior of the primary building.

All three rooms conform well to lighting standards but fall short of proper ventilation. The remedy for this is installation of a foul air duct in the grammar room and correct use of the ventilating system installed several years ago at the primary building.

There is no water supply yet at the primary building, a condition which has been mentioned frequently in past years. Could a suitable water supply be arranged, flush toilets could be provided. Chemical toilets now in use, although much better than the old privies, are inferior to a good flush system.

During the past year it was possible to arrange with Mrs. Maxwell for the children at the primary building to cross her land to the town baseball field and thus have a fine playground area. It would seem wise to make a more permanent arrangement to reach this field, which can be done if land east of the building were purchased. This land would also be usable in connection with a flush toilet system.

The porch at the side entrance to the grammar room still needs a thorough renovation.

In conclusion it is gratifying to report that our girls and boys in school, teachers, school officials, parents, and citizens are showing a keen interest in the education of our youth and are anxious to provide for them the very best that they can possibly afford.

Report of School Nurse

To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Brookline, New Hampshire:

The following is my fourth report of the health work in the Brookline schools, it being the sixteenth year of this work.

The annual medical inspection was made in September by Dr. Abbott L. Winograd of Nashua. A tabulated report of defects will be given in the report of the school physician.

Forty-three school room visits have been made during the school year for health instruction, classroom inspections, and special attention to the individual needs of the children. Home visits have been made when necessary to follow up corrective and health work.

Milk was supplied from Federal Funds to the children needing it during the winter months of 1934-1935. This proved to be very beneficial to the children who bring daily lunches.

Only a limited amount of cod liver oil was available for pupils needing it.

Two children were vaccinated by Dr. Winograd in the fall. We still have two unvaccinated children attending school without proper excuses. They have been reported to the health officer. It is hoped that these will be taken care of in the spring.

Brookline has been very fortunate in not having had any severe epidemics during the year. One case of scarlet fever has occurred in school but there was no further outbreak among pupils, thus showing the value of proper quarantine and cooperation of the parents.

The dental clinic will be held at Daniels' Academy Building during the month of February, 1936, with Dr. Danforth as dentist.

The visual examinations will be made later this year.

With the parents, schools, and health authorities working together for the good of the pupils, we should have this year another healthy year.


