

Carroll County Convention met in Division 4 of Representative's Hall, agreeably to notice given by the Speaker of the House, and organized with the election of the following: James E. French, Chairman; William N. Rogers, Clerk.

The Clerk, having taken the oath of office, according to law, and no further business having come before said meeting, it was voted to adjourn subject to the call of the chair.

Concord, N. H., February 5, 1919.

Carroll County Convention met in Room 157 of State House at 3.15 P. M. agreeably to the call of the chair. Hon. James E. French of Moultonboro presided and the following members were found to be present at the roll call: Messrs. Hammond, Pitman, Chandler, Blue, Pollard, Leavitt, Philbrick, Sanborn, Gale, French, Marston, Rogers, and Young.

On motion of Mr. Rogers of Wakefield—Voted: that the convention recommend the appointment of George I. Philbrick of Freedom for County Auditor for the ensuing two years.

On motion of Mr. Sanborn of Brookfield—Voted: that the convention recommend the appointment of F. O. Leavitt of Effingham as County Auditor for the ensuing two years.

Voted: to adjourn subject to the call of the chair.

Concord, N. H., February 19, 1919.

Carroll County Convention met in Room 157 of the State House agreeably to the call of the chair. Fifteen members were present.

On motion of Mr. Young of Wolfeboro it was unanimously Voted: that the sum of (\$35,000) thirty-five thousand dollars be raised and appropriated for the year 1919, and the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) be raised

and appropriated for the year 1920, to defray the current expenses of the County.

On motion of Mr. Rogers of Wakefield—Voted: that the sum of twelve hundred (\$1,200) dollars for each of the years 1919 and 1920 be raised and appropriated for the Carroll County Farm Bureau.

Voted: to adjourn subject to the call of the Chair. Wm. N. Rogers, Clerk.

Ossipee, N. H., March 7, 1919.

Carroll County Convention met at County Farm, Ossipee, agreeable to the call of the Chair. Mr. Hodsdon, of Ossipee, was elected temporary chairman.

County Commissioner Blanchard explained the proposed purchase of the Remick estate and the Kennay property, same being land adjoining the present County Farm.

The jailer, Mr. Reed, explained to the Convention certain necessary repairs to the heating system and barn, for which appropriations should be made during the present session of the Legislature. He also asked that the County Commissioners be given authority to contract with local parties for the sale of water and transportation thereof from the spring on the County Farm to the village of Ossipee.

Discussion ensued.

A recess was then declared while the members of the convention examined the land, buildings and equipment of the County Farm and Jail.

Voted: to adjourn subject to the call of the Chair. Wm. N. Rogers, Clerk.

The foregoing constitutes a copy of the records of the meetings and proceedings of the Carroll County Convention during the 1919 session of the New Hampshire Legislature.

Gentlemen:—In submitting to you this, our fifth annual report, we beg leave to make brief note of our stewardship for the past year.

per inmate \$5.75 plus.

The extraordinary problems of the high cost of living is the same here as to all. The cost of maintenance must necessarily be high as compared with former years. The question seems to be to keep the cost at a reasonable figure under the circumstances, this we have done according to our best judgment and trust on the whole we have acted wisely.

The winter of 1918 and 1919 was very favorable in the consumption of fuel, this taken together with our opportunity of getting some wood cut at low cost, enabled us to make a saving. In consequence of this saving, we made some very necessary repairs on the interior of the main almshouse. For the most part the house above the basement is in a respectable condition.

I cannot urge too strongly the necessity of repairs on the foundation and basement of the barn, we have a waste here that is hardly excusable; we are unable to remedy this defect without a special appropriation.

We have had very little sickness in the home, the general health of the inmates has been unusually good; of the seven deaths, all, with one exception, was from causes incident to old age.

We had the pleasure of entertaining the State Association of County Commissioners on Sept. 24, dinner was served to 60; nearly all of the counties were represented.

Mrs. Mary C. Buzzell still continues the practice of providing a generous sum for a Thanksgiving dinner for the inmates, this beautiful custom is much appreciated by its recipients.

Many friends remembered us with books, magazines and other reading matter, I would especially mention the Brewster Library for books and Mrs. Velma Wiggins and Miss Ruth Kennett and the school children of Conway for Christmas gifts for the children.

We are especially indebted to the Commissioners, our Physician, Chaplain and the employees in the management of the home and the care of our wards, we hereby thank them one and all for their earnest work and conscientious co-operation.

TO THE HONORABLE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR THE COUNTY OF CARROLL:

I respectfully submit the following report as Solicitor for the year 1919.

At the May term there were found three indictments, one for non-support of wife and two for burglary by minors. The first to be disposed of was a suspended sentence, the respondent paying the costs of court and furnishing the aid to his wife which the law requires.

The juveniles were placed on probation but one violated the terms and was committed to the State Industrial School for his minority.

At the December term there were found ten indictments, seven for larceny, two for breaking and entering, and one for selling mortgaged property. Seven cases were disposed of by suspended sentences while two were given short jail sentences. One respondent is still at large.

Selectmen of Towns, and Overseers of the Poor.

Are Requested to Observe the Following Laws and Amendments Passed January Session, 1903:

AN ACT

To Reimburse the Town or County for Aid Furnished Paupers.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court convened:

Section 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such person the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after the payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

Sect. 2. All acts and part of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved March 4, 1903.

AN ACT

IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 4, 5 AND 9, OF CHAPTER 85 OF THE PUBLIC STATUTES, ENTITLED, SUPPORT OF COUNTY PAUPERS.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court convened:

Section 1. Section 4 of chapter 85 of the Public Statutes is hereby amended by striking out all said section

after the word "presented" in the first line and inserting in the place thereof the words "within thirty days after the expenditures were made, if the county commissioners shall require it," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

- "Sect. 4. The account and vouchers shall be thus presented within thirty days after the expenditures were made, if the county commissioners shall require it."
- SECT. 2. Section 5 of said chapter is hereby amended by striking out the word "thirty" in the second line of said section and inserting in the place thereof the word "ten," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:
- "Sect. 5. The overseers of the poor shall take and transmit to the county commissioners, within ten days after the expenditures were made, the affidavit of every pauper on whose account they were made, if the pauper is capable, otherwise of some well informed person, as to the pauper's age, place of birth, place of residence, time of residence in each place, and the time when and place where he or any of his family have been relieved or supported."
- SECT. 3. Section 9 of said chapter is hereby amended by inserting after the words "one year" in the third line the words "within the last five years," and said section is hereby further amended by striking out the words "as soon as practicable" in the seventh and eighth lines of said section and inserting in the place thereof the words "within thirty days," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:
- "Sect. 9. The county which shall have relieved any county pauper within one year, or in which he shall have last resided not less than one year within the last five years, shall be liable to the county in which he may afterward be relieved, if he has not resided in the latter county above three months at the time of his first relief, for all sums of money paid for his relief, support of funeral, provided a

copy of the affidavit before mentioned shall be forwarded within thirty days to the county commissioners of the county to be charged."

SECT. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved March 7, 1903.

AN ACT.

In Amendment of Section 1, Chapter 31, of the Laws of 1897, Entitled, An Act in Amendment of Section 6 of Chapter 83 of the Public Statutes, in Relation to the Settlement of Paupers.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court convened:

Section 1. Section 1 of Chapter 31 of the Laws of 1897 is hereby amended by striking out the words "last preceding the" in the fourth line of said section and inserting in the place thereof the words "preceding the last," and said section is hereby further amended by adding at the end of said section the words "provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

"Section 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of

being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

Approved, March 31, 1903.

AN ACT.

IN AMENDMENT OF SECTION 1 OF CHAPTER 83 OF THE PUBLIC STATUTES, ENTITLED, SETTLEMENT OF PAUPERS.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court convened:

SECTION 1. Section 1, Division II. of Chapter 83 of the Public Statutes is hereby amended by striking out all after words "if any she has" in the third line of said division so that said division as amended shall read as follows: "II. Legitimate children shall have the settlement of their father, if any he has within this state; otherwise the settlement of their mother if any she has."

Division IX of said section is hereby amended by inserting after the word "term" in the fourth line of said division the words "and any unmarried woman of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on her estate during that term" so that said division as amended shall read as follows:

"IX. Any person of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state, and, being taxed for his poll for seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on his poll and estate during that term, and any unmarried woman of the age of twenty-one years who shall have resided in any town in this state seven years in succession, shall have paid all taxes legally assessed on her estate during that term, shall thereby gain a settlement in such town."

Sect. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed, and this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved April 2, 1903.

AID TO PERSONS QUARANTINED.

It sometimes becomes necessary to assist a family when quarantined on account of scarlet fever, diphtheria, etc, by reason of its being deprived of the opportunity to earn wages or from other causes, and to provide for which the following law was enacted by the legislature and approved March 11, 1899.

Section 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious disease, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such a manner as in the judgment of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECT. 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes..

The above law would seem to solve, in a thoroughly satisfactory way, a question which heretofore has been considerable of a problem in some localities. The entire matter is left to the judgment of the local board of health, and whatever aid the board may deem to be wise and necessary to extend to the families in question must be paid by the town and charged up as provided for in section 2.

Public Statutes

CHAPTER 84.

LAWS IN RELATION TO AID FURNISHED TO INDIGENT SOLDIERS, AND PROVIDING FOR ENTRANCE TO THE SOLDIERS' HOME IN CERTAIN CASES.

SECT. 9. Whenever any person resident in this state,

who enlisted in the quota of this state, and was reckoned and served as a soldier or sailor from New Hampshire in the army or navy of the United States, in the War of the Rebellion or in the Spanish or Philippine wars, and who received an honorable discharge, not being under guardianship or legal restraint, shall become poor, and unable to provide maintenance for himself and dependent family, such person, his wife widow or minor children, or such of the children as are unable to maintain themselves shall be supported at the public expense in the town or city of their abode, at their own home or any such place, other than a town or county almshouse, as the overseers of the poor or county commissioners shall deem right or proper, but no person shall receive aid under the provisions of this section unless he has resided in this state three years or more before making application for such aid, and no person shall, while receiving aid under the provisions of this section use intoxicating liquor to an extent which shall render him incapable of working at his usual occupation and no person receiving aid under the provisions of this section shall sell any article furnished him, nor exchange them for intoxicating liquors, nor share any such aid with any persons other than those above named as being entitled to the benefit of these provisions. Any person receiving aid under the provisions of this section, who receives a pension from the United States government, shall, while receiving such aid, apply the pension to the support of himself and dependent family, and shall, when requested, furnish to the overseers of the poor or the county commissioners satisfactory proof that such pension has been so applied. Any person applying for such aid, shall, when requested, furnish to the county commissioners or the overseers of the poor the certificate of a reputable physician, resident in the county in which he lives, as to the incapacity on his part to perform manual labor. Neglect by any person applying for or receiving aid under the provisions of this section to comply with the foregoing provisions and conditions of this section so far as such person is concerned, and such person may be supported at the town or county almshouse.

SECT. 10. The expense of support furnished under the provisions of the preceding section shall be kept and rereported in a separate account under the head of "aid furnished to dependent soldiers and their families," and not in the general pauper account, but shall be recoverable of the person, town or county liable therefor as in other cases.*

SECT. 11. The county commissioners or the overseers of the poor of any town may require any person applying for aid under the provisions of Section 9 of this chapter, who is eligible for admission, to make application for admission to the New Hampshire Soldiers' Home, in case he has no family or settled place of abode, whenever in their discretion they deem it best; and if such person refuses to make such application, or if admitted refuses to go to said Soldiers' Home, the county or town shall be relieved from the provisions of the preceding sections so far as such person is concerned, and he may be supported at the county or town almshouse.

AN ACT

To Provide for the Punishment of Parents for the Abandonment of their Families in Certain Cases.

* This section was passed by the house and senate, but was omitted from the engrossed bill. Such references are made to it in the engrossed bill that it is evident the legislature intended it should be a part of the law.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court Convened:

SECTION 1. That as used in this act the word "children" shall be limited to mean children under sixteen years of age and also such children over sixteen years of age and under twenty-one years as by reason of physical or mental infirmity are incapable of supporting themselves; and further that separation within the meaning of this act shall include, in addition to the cases embraced within the usual meaning of the word, every case where a husband has caused his wife to leave him by conduct on his part which would be ground for divorce and also every case where by extreme cruelty or other conduct it becomes improper for children to remain with their father and have for this reason become separated from him.

SECT. 2. If any husband or father being within the limits of this state shall hereafter separate himself from his wife or from his children or from his wife and children without reasonable cause and shall wilfully neglect to maintain his children, and his wife, when such wife is destitute or dependent wholly or in part on her earnings for adequate support he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof be sentenced to jail or the house of correction for a period of not more than six months, and to pay a fine not exceeding twenty dollars or either or both at the discretion of the court; such fine if any to be paid or applied in whole or in part to the deserted wife or children as the court may direct.

Provided no such conviction, payment of fine or undergoing imprisonment shall in any manner effect the obligation of any order for support theretofore made against the defendant.

And provided further that upon conviction the court may suspend sentence upon and during compliance by the defendant with any order for support theretofore made against him as already made or as may theretofore have been modified in the manner now provided by law; and if no such order shall have been made then the court trying the defendant may make such order for the support by the defendant of his wife and children or either of them which order shall be subject to modification by the court on cause shown and the court may suspend sentence upon and during compliance by the defendant with such order as originally made or as subsequently modified by the court.

SECT. 3. If any woman or mother shall separate herself as the term is defined in section 1 of this act from her husband without cause, or from her children, she shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be sentenced to the county jail or the house of correction for a term not exceeding six months and to pay a fine not exceeding twenty dollars or either or both as the court may determine, the fine if any to be applied in the discretion of the court of the benefit of the deserted husband or children or both.

SECT. 4. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect upon its passage. Approved, March 22, 1907.

AN ACT

For the Protection of Children.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court Convened:

Section 1. If any person shall abandon an infant under four years of age, or being its parent and having made contract for its support, shall abscond or fail to perform said contract if of sufficient ability, shall neither visit nor remove such infant nor notify the proper authority of the town, ward or city in which he resides of his or her inability to support such infant, he shall be punished by imprisonment not exceeding two years; or if the infant dies by reason of such abandonment, by imprisonment not exceeding thirty years.

SECT. 2. If any person, knowingly and with wrongful intent shall aid or abet in the abandonment of such infant he shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment not exceeding two years, or both.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Approved, January 31, 1907.
