## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,195 50
2. Town officers' expenses	1,200 00
3. Election and registration expenses	1,000 00
4. Forest fire expenses	500 00
5. Expenses Town hall and other town bldgs.	1,200 00
6. Expenses of police department	1,000 00
7. Expenses of fire department	1,400 00
8. Control of white pine blister rust	400 00
9. Expense of civil defense	50 00
10. Support of board of health	400 00
11. Support of town library	550 00

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for Snow Removal.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,925 00 for Street Lighting.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$900.00 thereby receiving an additional \$5,999.97 from the State for Town Road Aid.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Support of the Poor.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their families.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Parks & Playgrounds. This sum to include cost of construction of Float for the Keene Bi-centennial Parade.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for Damage & Legal Expenses.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$184.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and to fix the amount thereof.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$175.00 to defray Town's share of Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for interest on Temporary Loans.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for interest on Long Term Notes.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to trade the 1947 Chevrolet Dump Truck for a new 2 Ton Truck and to spend a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 and to raise the sum of \$500.00 as first payment in 1953. Balance to be paid in 2 yearly payments of \$1,000.00 each and to authorize Selectmen to borrow money for same.

Article 26. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for two culverts and graveling so-called Zinn Road. (\$200.00 approved by Budget Committee, \$600.00 not approved.)

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to submit for bids any capitol addition or major improvements in the amount of \$100.00 or over. Such bids to be opened publicly at an advertised date.

Article 28. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 to start a five year plan for the definite purpose of rebuilding Town Roads. This sum to be used for work to be done in conjunction with the road survey report, as submitted by the Road Committee appointed at the previous Town Meeting. (Not approved by Budget Committee.)

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on Route 9A in front of the Lake Spofford Hotel and raise \$25.00 to pay for same.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following portions of roads:



- A. Prospect Hill Road so called that runs North & South of new Road at Station 321-20 of State Plan No. FA317 (2).
- B. Ferm Road so called that runs parallel to new Road between Stations No. 387-60 & 389-90 Rt. a distance of 235 ft.
- C. A section of road beginning at a pin in the road near the barn of Walter DeSelle, thence southerly to the new highway.
- D. West Swanzey road so called, beginning at the southern private driveway of Hans Lange and running southerly to the new highway.
- E. To see if the Town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars, Lovers Lane so called leading from Route 63 south of the Stone House Four Corners to Route 9A near the Putney Cottage.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Harry A. Pierce Estate, the income from same to be used for the Perpetual Care and maintenance of the Harry A. Pierce Lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Irene Nugent, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the Perpetual Care and upkeep of the Irene Nugent Burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Irene Nugent Trust Fund.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mrs. Charles Ebbighausen, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the Perpetual Care and upkeep of Harlan Streeter burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Harlan Streeter Trust Fund.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the Maude P. Hopkins Estate, the income to be used for the Perpetual Care and maintenance of the J. Willard and Rosette M. Cook Cemetery Lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Marjorie Davenport, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the Perpetual Care and upkeep of the Fossey-Davenport burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Fossey-Davenport Trust Fund.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Estate of Raymond D. Allen, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the Perpetual Care and upkeep of the Raymond D. Allen burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Allen Trust Fund.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Dorothy E. Fuller, the income thereof to be used for Perpetual Care and improvement of the Pattridge-Fuller burial lot in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Pattridge-Fuller Trust Fund.

Article 38. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Article 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## TOWN MEETING, 1952

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Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 11, 1952.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read Article 1 of the Warrant and declared that balloting was in order under this Article for all necessary Town Officers and also for the Presidential Primary. Kenneth Wiggin and Mildred Gauthier took their oaths of office as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk, respectively.

At ten o'clock the Moderator again called the meeting to order and the Warrant was read by the Clerk. The Articles were disposed of as follows:—

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Harold Putnam to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Grace Welcome to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. George Joslin, Chairman, gave the report of the Budget Committee. He reported no special meetings were required throughout the year; that the first meeting was held Jan. 31, the public meeting on Feb. 13 and the last meeting on Feb. 15 to make out the present budget. He urged everyone to attend the public meetings in the future for a good discussion of the amounts to be raised. He praised the members of the Committee for their work and thanked them for their cooperation. He referred to the report of the Budget Committee as given on pages 52 to 55 of the annual Town Report.

Robert Woodman said that a full Budget Committee was necessary and one representing the whole town. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Walter Post to accept the report of the Budget Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by William Worthley to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes :

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,085 50
2. Town officers' expenses	1,200 00
3. Election and registration expenses	1,000 00
4. Expenses of town hall and other buildings	1,000 00
5. Expenses of police department	1,000 00
6. Support of the fire department	1,200 00
7. Control of white pine blister rust	400 00
8. Forest fire expenses	500 00
9. Support of the board of health	400 00

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Arvid Pearson to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Harold Putnam to amend the article to read "to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for snow removal". Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the article as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$1,800.00 for Street Lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$894.52 thereby receiving an additional \$5,963.47 from the State for Town Road Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Library System. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Support of the Poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$500.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their families. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Parks and Playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Chester Burnham to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of the cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Robert Mitchell to raise the

sum of \$200.00 for support of the Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry Winn and supported by George Joslin to raise the sum of \$125.00 for damage and legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$179.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$350.00 for interest on temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Harry E. Winn to buy a Power Loader to cost approximately \$6,000.00 and to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 as the first payment, the balance to be paid in five yearly payments, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow the money for the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Newton Darling to amend the Article to read, "To see if the Town will vote to trade the Truck V Plow and keep the Grader plow." Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the Article as amended. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Herbert A. Cooper and supported by Ronald Guyette to observe Old Home Day. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Walter Post to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of



Title II of the Federal Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as Authorized by Chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by George Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan of Article 25 and to designate the Town Treasurer as the Officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Arvid Pearson to pass over this article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. A motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Anna Hubner to amend the article to read \$250.00 instead of \$500.00 was withdrawn. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wakefield Dort and supported by Robert Woodman to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Newton Darling to amend Section two of the Article to read, "to appropriate a sum of money up to and not exceeding \$600.00 for construction of said extension and culverts". Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on the Article as amended, as follows:

1. To extend Mountain Road north to junction of Route 9, through property owned by B. H. Tyrrell known as Riverside Cabins, right of way to be deeded to Town of Chesterfield without cost.

2. To appropriate a sum of money up to and not exceeding \$600.00 for construction of said extension and culverts.

3. To abandon present road from junction of Gulf Road and Mountain Road by the Cabins to junction of Route 9.

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Zinn and supported by Ronald Guyette to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the purpose of laying out a road from the Swanzy Road to the so-called Zinn home. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Paul Welcome to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Dexter Thomas to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of resurfacing with gravel the Jackson Hill Road as far as that amount will go, doing the parts in poorest condition first. As the vote seemed close the Moderator called for a show of hands. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the Negative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by John McKeon to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Robert Mitchell to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Gladys Puffer Thomas and Evelyn L. Winn to be added to the Clara J. Puffer Trust Fund, the income thereof to be used for perpetual care and improvement of the Warren C. Puffer burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Robert Mitchell to accept the sum



of \$100.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of Norman G. Colburn burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Norman G. Colburn Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Robert Mitchell to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of East one-half of Hiram Morgan lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as Colburn-Morgan Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Grace Welcome and supported by Robert Mitchell to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Norman G. Colburn, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for perpetual care and upkeep of George Colburn and Charles Davis burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Colburn-Davis Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Esther Carey asked for a report on the Lusby-Carey road. It was reported that it would probably cost about \$1,000.00 to build it and \$100.00 to maintain it, and it was suggested that anyone interested should bring in an article for the 1953 Town Warrant.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Jack Gold that the Selectmen shall appoint two men from each section of Town to form a Zoning Committee which shall report at the next meeting, said committee to also include the three Selectmen. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman which was supported that whoever is responsible for getting out the reports shall have them out a

week before Town Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Harold Putnam that the Town vote permission to the Chesterfield Community Club to install heat in the annex, kitchen and Selectmen's Office and install running water in the kitchen as a gift from the said Club, with the amendment that if there is money enough left that new toilets shall be put in and that the three Selectmen and three members from the Community Club shall supervise the spending of the money which shall be an outright gift to the Town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Paul Penning as a member of the Board of Library Trustees asked the people to vote if they wished the Town to discontinue the Branch Libraries. This was supported by Paul Welcome, also a Library Trustee. Voted by voice vote on the above and the vote was declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wakefield Dort and supported by Alfred Gattey that a committee be appointed to develop with the aid of the State Highway Department a ten year road improvement program for Chesterfield, the committee to consist of the Selectmen, two members of the Budget Committee and three others to be appointed by the Moderator, this committee to report to the 1953 Town Meeting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

No other business appearing the Moderator recessed the meeting but declared that voting by Australian Ballot would continue.

At six o'clock the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of the ballots cast resulted as follows:

Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Town Treasurer. Alice L. Spaulding had 219 votes, Warren Allen had 4 votes, Chester Burnham had 1 vote, Laura Atema had 1 vote, Grace Welcome had 1 vote. Alice L. Spaulding was declared elected.

For Tax Collector. James C. Fisher had 239 votes, James O'Neil had 1 vote, John Prout had 1 vote. James C. Fisher was declared elected.

For Road Agent. Newton E. Darling had 187 votes, Donald K. Porter had 35 votes, Roger Spaulding had 15 votes, Arvid Pearson had 1 vote, James Dodge had 1 vote, Albert Skinner had 1 vote, Leslie Fowle had 1 vote. Newton E. Darling was declared elected.

For Fireward. Arvid W. Pearson had 225 votes, Roger Spaulding had 2 votes, Ronald T. Guyette had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote, Louis Humphrey had 1 vote, Harold Foster had 1 vote. Arvid W. Pearson was declared elected.

For Auditors. Dorothy C. Spaulding had 210 votes, A. Wilson Homestead had 22 votes, Virginia Parker had 5 votes, Paul Penning had 4 votes, James Fisher had 3 votes, Kenneth Wiggin had 1 vote, Blythe Benedict had 1 vote, Paul Welcome had 1 vote, Dorothy Fuller had 1 vote, Harry Winn had 1 vote, Clara Wellington had 1 vote, Paul W. Lawton had 1 vote, George Joslin had 1 vote, William Benedict had 1 vote, Marjorie Morse had 1 vote, Claude Mowry had 1 vote, Dorothy Parker had 1 vote, Maurice Amidon had 1 vote, Mrs. Harold Putnam had 1 vote, Mrs. Lyle Chickering had 1 vote, Grace Welcome had 1 vote, Viola Tuttle had 1 vote. Dorothy C. Spaulding and A. Wilson Homestead were declared elected.

For Budget Committee for Three Years. James C. Fisher had 216 votes, Arvid W. 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January 1, 1953.

To the Trustees of the Chesterfield Library :

I shall try to make this report as complete as possible under the circumstances. During the past year the number of books loaned from the main library was 3,233. There has been quite a drop in circulation because the state book mobile now leaves books at the school.

Carolyn Dutton should be given a great deal of credit for the time and hard work she put in to clean the library. Everyone who has come into the library has mentioned how nice it looks.

For the past two months we have had a storytime for the children of the town at 4:00 o'clock Saturday afternoons. Mrs. Helen Robinson, Mrs. Laura Atema, and Barbara Nurse have assisted me with this time. During the next year it is my hope that we can interest more children and grownups in this project. The children who have been coming seem to enjoy it a great deal.

The Children's Room has undergone a change. The books have been rearranged and grouped differently to aid the children in selecting those that they want. The younger children's books have been placed more conveniently for them. Cushions have been placed on the floor in order that the children may sit down and really look at the books. The chairs are too high for most of the children.

I have enjoyed my work a great deal. My only wish is that the townspeople were more aware of the fact that there are few towns of this size that can boast of such a fine library. Any person visiting the library for the first time is really amazed.

As far as I can judge, 77 new books have been purchased this year. We have also received several donations.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

(Old Age and Survival Insurance) as authorized by chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of forty dollars (\$40) to defray the school districts share of the costs thereof.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) for the construction of an equipment storage shed, 12 ft by 12 ft.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for grading the playground in preparation of a baseball field.

12. To take any other action which may legally come before the meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

The school children of Chesterfield continue to profit from the advantages of their modern school building and its comfortable and attractive facilities. After the first year of making the many adjustments necessary for living together under one roof, instead of three old ones, the school program is running smoothly and well.

Only one change has taken place in the past year in the teaching staff. Mr. Lawrence Hoik resigned to accept the principalship of a Massachusetts school and Mr. Robert DeLancey was employed to take his place as teacher of the seventh and eighth grades and principal of the school.

Mrs. Marion Nurse is carrying on the lunchroom program in the same tradition of good cooking as established by Mrs. Hooper. The children must enjoy the meals for a larger percent of the enrollment participates in the lunch program, than in any other school in the supervisory union.

The transportation problem has smoothed out well with Mr. Henry Chickering providing the community with safe and dependable service on the major bus routes.

One of the best measures of a successful elementary program is shown in the success of those pupils who continue on into high school. Many of our high school pupils are doing excellent work and only a few have failing grades in some subjects. During the past few years, the rate of drop-outs from high school has been very low, less than half that of neighboring communities.

The people of Chesterfield have every reason to be proud of their school house and satisfied with the work of the instructional staff. As school superintendent, it has been a pleasant experience to work with a progressive and capable school board during the year.

## LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

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The Lunch Program opened the first day of school, September 8, 1952. I served 1,912 meals during September, 2,582 in October, and 1,789 in December. Owing to a water shortage, no meals were served in November.

Charges for meals are the same as last year; \$1.00 the week or 25 cents per day. The Program has been self-supporting with the help of surplus commodities received and reimbursement of 6 cents for each balanced meal served to a child. So far I have received one reimbursement check (\$148.63) for the month of October. September and December are still due.

December 19th I served the following Christmas dinner:

Each child in school was invited to eat this meal.

Every day, two children help set tables and serve, and two others help wash the dishes. The servers receive 50 cents a week and the dish washers \$1.00. Mr. Cherrie is always there to help in any way he can.

At the request of Mrs. Warner, the school nurse, I have been making sandwiches and cocoa for several underweight children. These refreshments are served during afternoon recess.

I think, as a whole, the program is proving successful, with very little waste and plenty of cooperation from the teachers, pupils, and Mr. Cherrie.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

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### CHESTERFIELD CENTRAL SCHOOL

On September 3rd, 1952, the Chesterfield Central School opened with a total of 163 pupils. The number of children has decreased to 156, at the present time. The largest single grade is at the 4th grade level with 29 children enrolled.

The school was closed during the last week in November at which time the artesian well was deepened to alleviate any further water shortage. The three extra days of vacation will be made up at a later date.

Since any good education program is dedicated to the development of the whole child, all activity throughout the school year must be directed toward the academic, social and physical growth maintaining along the way close contact between both home and school environment.

Visual aids are extremely valuable as methods of instruction and thereby helpful in promoting academic growth. The school is most fortunate in owning both a motion picture projector and a filmstrip projector. Various films are shown from time to time to the entire student body and filmstrips are used by some of the teachers in classroom instruction. Such films and filmstrips are selected to coincide, as closely as possible, with current school work and vital human problems.

Square dancing, both as a part of the music program and as recess recreation, has been very enthusiastically received by the children. Two albums of records are owned—one of which was a gift from the P. T. A. It is hoped that interest in such worthwhile recreation will continue.

This year's magazine drive was a great success. A profit of \$106.36 was realized, which will help finance the annual trip of this year's graduating class. Many thanks are due all who supported this social activity.

The school lunch program is under the management of Mrs. Marion Nurse of Chesterfield. She is assisted daily by two students from grades seven and eight who set tables and serve and other designated students who do dishes. An estimated 125 children are served a hot, well-balanced, noonday meal at a very low cost. In addition to the regular lunch, underweight children enjoy a milk drink and sandwich during the afternoon recess.

The P. T. A. meetings to date have been rather well attended. Of special interest have been the two at which Superintendent Charles Bowlby has clarified school law in relation to both the parent and the pupil.

Safety of our children is of great concern to us all. Since transportation of the school children occurs along well-traveled roads, steps are being taken to assure maximum safety. A child is permitted to leave a school bus only when such action is considered safe by the driver. Each child has been instructed not to cross the road until the bus has proceeded onward and both ways are clear. Such precautionary measures tend to approximate the care each one of us, as a parent, would give our own child.

It is the wish of all that all of the youngsters may continue to grow in stature, and in mind, and with an increasing ability to adjust to the everyday problems around them.

Minutes of the Annual District Meeting of the Chesterfield

The Chesterfield School District meeting was opened by Harry Winn, Moderator, at 3:02 p.m. The warrant was read by H. Claude Mowry, Clerk.

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

George Joslin moved that the Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn for Moderator for the coming year. Seconded by Robert Mitchell. Motion carried in the affirmative.

The Clerk cast one ballot for Harry Winn and declared Harry Winn elected Moderator for one year. After signing the required "loyalty oath," he was sworn in by Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Harold Putnam nominated H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year. No other nominations were made. Harold Putnam moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry to serve as Clerk for the ensuing year.

Moderator Harry Winn cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry to serve as Clerk for the ensuing year, and declared H. Claude Mowry to be elected Clerk for the ensuing year. After signing the required "loyalty oath," he was sworn in by Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

George Joslin moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for Harold Putnam for a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Seconded by Robert Mitchell. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Moderator Harry Winn cast one ballot for Harold Putnam for member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and declared him elected a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering, after having signed the required "loyalty oath."

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Robert Woodman moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for Evelyn L. Winn to serve as Treasurer for the ensuing year. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Moderator Harry Winn cast one ballot for Evelyn L. Winn for Treasurer for the ensuing year and declared her elected Treasurer for the ensuing year.

She was sworn in, after signing the required "loyalty oath," by Imogene Chickering.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Clara B. Wellington moved that the Article be passed over. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Harold Putnam moved that the town thank the School Building Committee wholeheartedly for the excellent job it did, and that it be relieved of any further duties. Seconded by Ronald Guyette. Motion carried unanimously in the affirmative.

Mrs. Grace Welcome gave the final report of the School Building Committee, stating that the Committee was well satisfied that we had received a very good building for the sum expended.



Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Harold Putnam moved that we employ the State Auditors to audit the School District's accounts, as was done last year. Seconded by Mrs. Anna C. Hubner. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salaries of the School District officials, and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Harold Putnam moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$52,717.85 and to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board exclusive of state aid, and upon the determination of the amount of state aid to be received by the School District during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the School District Clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assesment to be raised by the town for school purposes. Seconded by Mrs. Agness Chickering. Motion carried.

Article 9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand seven hundred six (\$2,706.00) dollars as a deficit appropriation to be made available before June 30th 1952, to meet the additional cost of transportation, insurance and janitor services.

Harold Putnam moved that the Article be passed as read. Seconded by Mrs. Agness Chickering. Motion carried.

Article 10. To see what action the district will take to authorize the use of the balance of the well appropriation for construction costs of the new school, as requested by the state tax commission.

Mrs. Clara B. Wellington moved that the Article be passed as read. Seconded by Mrs. Agness Chickering. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see what action the district desires to take regarding the disposal of the old Chesterfield school building.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that the old Chesterfield school be kept. Seconded by Mrs. Margaret Nurse.

Walter Post amended the motion to include Article 12. Seconded by Arvid Pearson.

Robert Woodman moved that the amendment be amended to read 'that the old Chesterfield school building be kept for one year, and that a committee be appointed to report back next meeting as to what should be done'. Seconded by Walter Post. On a voice vote the amendment was lost, and on a voice vote the motion was declared by the Moderator to be lost.

George Joslin moved that the Chesterfield School District sell the Old Chesterfield school building to the Chesterfield Post No. 86 of the American Legion for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00). The depression left on the removal of the building to be rough graded by the said Legion. Permission is granted by the school district to remove said building after July 1, 1952. No trees to be cut except by permission of the School Board. Seconded by John McKeon. Motion carried in the affirmative by a unanimous vote.

Article 12 To see if the Chesterfield School District will vote to authorize the Chesterfield School Board to sell all or part of the old Chesterfield Center schoolhouse to Chesterfield Post No. 86 of the American Legion for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) on condition that Chesterfield Post No. 86 of the American Legion remove all or part of the old Chesterfield Center schoolhouse on or before September 1, 1952.

Walter Post moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by John McKeon. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. To see what action the district desires to take regarding the balance on hand in the building fund account.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that four hundred forty-three dollars (\$443.00) of this balance be spent for cupboard doors, counter tops, etc., toward finishing the new school, and the remainder one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) be applied to payment on the bonds. Mrs. Anna C. Hubner seconded the motion. The motion was declared lost by the Moderator on a voice vote.

Harold Putnam moved that the balance on hand in the building fund account be given to the School Board to be used toward finishing the new school building. Seconded by James O'Neil. Mrs. Anna C. Hubner moved that the motion be amended to specifically include a stage curtain for the new school stage. Motion was supported and carried in the affirmative. The Motion, as amended, was carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. To take any other action which may legally come before this meeting.

Harold Putnam moved that Mr. Paul Penning be extended a vote of thanks for the fine work he did in securing the eagle for the top of the new school. The motion was supported and passed by unanimous voice vote.

Mrs. Paul Welcome moved that the School Board hold the dedication of the new school separate from the graduation exercises. Seconded by John McKeon. Motion carried in the affirmative.

George Joslin moved that the annual School District meeting be held at two o'clock instead of three o'clock in the afternoon. Seconded by Ronald Guyette. Motion carried in the affirmative.

John McKeon moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Ronald Guyette. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Meeting adjourned at 5:09 p.m.
