The Public Schools

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Cornish:

I hereby submit my sixth annual report for your consideration.

We have a corps of teachers who are capable, energetic, and resourceful. The condition of the schools has never given me more satisfaction. Good discipline, cordial relations between teachers and pupils, and improved instruction prevail. The improvement in spelling during the past few years is one of the subjects worthy of special mention. Our work in spelling compares favorably with that of the State. In a recent six weeks' contest by grades three to eight inclusive, including twelve 20-word tests selected from words studied during the contest period the average rank of the twenty-four classes in the contest was 98 per cent. The lowest rank was 92.1 per cent.

The records of the September enumeration show that there were in town between the ages of 5 and 16 one hundred and seventy-four children. Of these one hundred and thirty-four are registered in the local public schools, five in parochial or other private schools, three in elementary schools outside the district, and seven in high schools and academies outside the district. The total number of children reported in school is one hundred and forty-nine. Twenty-five children were not registered in any school in the district or elsewhere. Of these twenty-one were between five and eight, one was excused by the board because of physical or mental condition, and three have completed the course of study for elementary schools.

Fifteen pupils from the district are attending second-

ary schools elsewhere. Their tuition is paid by the district.

The fall term opened on the second of September. The teachers' names and each school's enrollment for the fall term are recorded in the following table:

General Statistics for the Year Ending June 30, 1924:

Owing to loss of time from various causes the schools closed on various dates from June 11 to June 20. One hundred and forty-two pupils were enrolled. The average membership was one hundred and seventeen. The average attendance was one hundred and seven. Seven pupils were perfect in attendance, having been reported neither absent nor tardy for the entire year. The list follows:—

Dorothy Nelson, Veronica Barton, Warren Becker, Celia Hood, Myra Hood, Vernon Hood, Lionel Tracy.

Sixteen Cornish children were registered in secondary schools. Two of these were graduated in June: Lura Chadbourne from the Windsor high school, and Doris Tewksbury from the Stevens high school.

The registers record four visits by school board members, one hundred and ninety-nine visits by the superintendent, and two hundred and eighty-five visits by other citizens.

The schools were actually in session three hundred and fifty-three half days. Seven half-days were lost for holidays and other causes. This is a most satisfactory session record probably equaled by few districts in the entire State.

Of the eight members of grade eight, one having reached the compulsory age limit, left school within the year, three failed of promotion, and four received promotion. One of these, Harry Scruton, in September entered the Windsor High school. The other three have presumably completed their school life.

Health

A large amount of dental work was done last spring under the direction of Miss Elizabeth M. McCauley with the generous aid of the Cornish Red Cross Association who assumed the full expense of the dentists' fees. The dental work was done by Dr. F. K. Phillips of Claremont and by Dr G. A. Danforth. The children were transported to the clinics by the school nurse.

Sixty-nine children received treatment, fifty-four at Claremont and fifteen at Plainfield. There were a total of 236 operations; prophylaxis 66, amalgam fillings 89, porcelain fillings 5, cement fillings 1, temporary fillings 1, pulp capped 2, extractions 71, cheek dissected from gun 1. All the pupils of the Tracy school received 100 per cent of dental attention.

In addition to the work described above the nurse reexamined every pupil and visited many homes to discuss remedial measures.

During the year the books from the Carnegie endowment have continued to come and are very much worth while reading. As in former years we have acknowledged the many gifts of books or magazines by personal notes of thanks, but we would like to repeat our thanks publicly at this time. Space forbids our going into an itemized account of these gifts but we would just mention the fact that Mrs. Barrett, from far

India, remembered us and added to our Boy Scout Library which she gave some years ago, so that it is "up to date." Just a word about our financial statement.
