#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at four of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects: (Business Meeting at 7:30 P. M.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear the report of the budget committee, and act thereon.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid on town road maintenance.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 10. To see if the town will accept and maintain the Firehouse and Equipment from the Danville Firemens' Association.

- 11. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to permit basket-ball to be played in the Town Hall.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for an Athletic field
- 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to zoning laws.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949 the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.
- 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate for economic advancement of the town through promotional services of the Seacoast Regional Development Association in co-operation with other regional communities, a sum not exceeding \$37.00.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over  $90\,\%$  of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Danville, N. H.

I hereby submit the annual report of the music department.

The Eaton School has had a year of many and varied activities. Following the operetta, "The Magic Beanstalk" which was presented during the winter term, the pupils prepared musical numbers for the Parent Teachers' Association and for graduation in the spring. The Christmas program this year was in the form of a pagaent. It was given at the Danville Church, Dec. 21st. The entire school participated.

In addition to the above activities, the usual program has been carried out. Each child has been given instruction in music theory, music appreciation and folk dancing appropriate to his grade. The pupils enjoy their music and are willing students. Great interest is especially shown in folk dancing. Rhythmic activities of any kind are very popular.

It is the aim of our school music program to give a broad intellectual experience and to present it in such a way as to create interest and enthusiasm. It is hoped that through the activities above named our aim has been accomplished.

The annual health examination of eyes, ears, teeth, throats and skin was made during the early part of the

school year. This examination was followed up with home calls for the correction of physical defects, and any other conditions which would result in having healthier and happier children.

The usual health program is being carried on with frequent visits to the schools, close contact with parents, teachers and pupils.

Our greatest need is dental work. It is impossible to secure the services of a dentist for clinic work. This condition exists in all parts of the State. Therefore, I ask the parents to assume the responsibility of getting their children to their own dentist at least once a year.

I sincerely thank the School Board, teachers, parents and many others for their continued fine cooperation.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

January 6, 1949

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville: It is with pleasure that I submit my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The major problem facing all of us today is finding the money to give our children the type of education they deserve. All phases of education are costing more money and there seems little chance of a recession. One item which has affected the budget in the past two years is High School tuition. In 1946 this item amounted to \$2,012., next year it will be approximately \$7,000. All other budget items are on the increase comparatively.

We are also experiencing increased enrollments in the elementary school which will be felt for the next ten years.

It is hoped the same form of State or Federal legislation will aid this situation financially in the near future.

### GUIDANCE

No school can have an efficient instructional program without knowing what it is accomplishing. It must know what is happening to boys and girls as well as what it is teaching them. The children in your schools are being given new type intelligence tests this year that measure both verbal and non-verbal. These tests will tell what a child is thinking as well as doing. Parents are urged to consult with teachers concerning their childs school progress.

The tests are being corrected and processed in the Superintendent's Office thus saving much valuable time. Standardized Achievement tests will be given next year.

### REPAIRS

The School Board has replaced the worn out water pump and installed an oil burner in the furnace. These two items were of an emergency nature and had to be fixed in order to keep the schools open in an efficient manner. Other minor repairs have also been completed.

### **TEACHERS**

Danville is fortunate in retaining a veteran teaching staff who are an asset to any town. Fine work has been done in public assemblies and art work.

### P. T. A.

The P. T. A. has raised sufficient money to purchase a motion picture projector for the Eaton School. This is a fine gesture and will greatly aid the teachers in furthering better education. Citizens of Danville should be proud of their P. T. A. and should give thanks for the fine work they are doing.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens of the community for their hearty cooperation during the past year.
