

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year, the sum of \$2,000 for winter and \$1,000 for summer roads.

4 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 for interest and insurance.

5 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

6 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

7 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$500 to cover long term notes, P. W. A. bond.

8 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$50 for Old Home Day Celebration.

9 To see if the town will raise for Town Road Aid the sum of \$592.50 to the State's \$3,038.14. Or, the town to raise for State Aid construction the sum of \$592.50 to the State's \$1,184.00. Only one of these available each year.

10 To see if the town will raise \$700 for street lights.

11 To see if the town will raise \$300 for Blister Rust Control, or pass any vote relating thereto.

12 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

13 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$39 for the Monadnock Region Association.

14 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

DEERING, N. H., MARCH 10, 1942

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order by the moderator, Albert A. Holden, at nine o'clock in the forenoon. After the warrant was read it was voted to keep the polls open until six o'clock. It was voted to take up the articles following article 1 at eleven o'clock.

Article 1. Votes were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for 3 years—Carroll E. Greene had 42 votes, Ernest Johnson had 78 votes and took oath of office.

Selectman for 1 year—Stuart H. Michie had 49 votes, Leroy H. Locke had 77 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk—Marguerite L. Dutton had 106 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer—Marguerite L. Dutton had 103 votes and took oath of office.

Highway Agent—Ralph B. Adams had 31 votes, Howard E. Whitney had 92 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor—Chairman of Selectmen had 51 votes, Arthur O. Ellsworth had 61 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector—Chester P. McNally had 113 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors—Eunice E. Willgeroth had 104 votes and took oath of office. Marjorie A. Holden had 111 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee—Ida D. Hart had 35 votes, Helen I. Taylor had 73 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds—Mary B. Holden had 104 votes and took oath of office.

Constables—Everett H. Abbott had 95 votes and took oath of office. Harold G. Wells had 106 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber—Herbert C. Spiller had 42 votes. Everett H. Abbott had 65 votes and took oath of office.

Article 2. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$2,000 for town charges.

Article 3. Upon motion made by Howard E. Whitney it was not voted to raise \$3,000. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$1,500 for winter roads, \$1,000 for summer roads.

Article 4. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$500 for interest and insurance.

Article 5. Upon motion made by Harold G. Wells it was voted to authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.

Article 6. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to authorize selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$750 to cover long term notes and P. W. A. bond.

Article 8. It was voted to raise \$50 for Old Home Day.

Article 9. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted to raise \$592.50 for first part of article.

Article 10. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth it was voted to raise \$700 for street lighting.

Article 11. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted not to raise the money.

Article 12. Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally it was voted to raise \$500 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

Article 13. Upon motion made by Marie Wells it was voted not to appropriate.

Article 14. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson it was voted to raise \$50.

Article 15. Upon motion made by Harold Wells it was voted to raise \$50.

Article 16. Upon motion made by Harold Wells it was voted to raise \$50.

Article 17. Upon motion made by Howard Whitney it was voted to raise pay 10c per hour for town labor.

Upon motion made by Harold Wells it was voted to pay town officials same pay as road help, except salaried officers.

Article 18. Motion made by Marie Wells that vote of confidence be given selectmen for their action in paying lookout observers 3c per mile.

Motion made and voted to rescind vote made eight years ago to hire man to patrol summer cottages during winter months.

Motion made and voted to adjourn without date.

REPORT TO THE CITIZENS

Under the stress of our present terrible world conflict we should ever be mindful that our first and primary object is to do everything possible to win the war. After we have done everything we can for this, then our foremost consideration should be the education of our children. If our children, the future citizens of this land, are not adequately trained to accept their responsibilities when the war is over, we will have fought in vain.

The present school house in West Deering seems to be quite adequate in every respect. The pupils and teacher have shown their appreciation by keeping the building in good condition.

Rural districts, such as Deering, will find it increasingly difficult to give their children a proper education. The rising cost of supplies will show a corresponding rise in the amounts required for education. Besides this the shortage of teachers, which began to show up last summer is becoming more evident all the time. This shortage

strikes most heavily on rural schools for teachers will take these schools only as a last resort. The work in rural schools is difficult and few, if any, advantages can be offered the teacher to draw her into this work.

Our boys and girls are doing their part in the war effort. They collected a lot of scrap during the drive last fall and West Deering placed among the first ten in amount of scrap per pupil collected by rural schools in the state. Besides this they are buying war saving stamps, making posters, and doing other things to assist the nation.

Hot noon lunches are being served the children with the assistance of food given by the government for this purpose.

In conclusion I want to thank the school board and teachers for their efforts in trying to maintain good schools in Deering.
