

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of summer highways.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for permanent improvement of road on Iron Mountain.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, not exceeding Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for poor relief.

10. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to move iron bridge, now alongside Pinkham Notch road, and erect same across Great Brook, on cross road near home of L. A. Fernald,

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for support of library.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars for Band Concerts during summer.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize payment of North Conway Fire Department when summoned to Jackson.

14. To see what action the Town will take relative to constructing an office and vault for selectmen, and raise and appropriate money for same.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

16. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I beg to submit herewith my report of the work done by the Library and a statement of its condition for the year ending 1936.

The Library has been open 116 days. From July 1 to Cctober 1, the hours were from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. daily and for the remaining months from 2 to 4 p. m. every Saturday. In this time the total number of books given out was 3,000.

There has been added to the Library by gifts 46 volumes, and by purchase 67 volumes, making a total number of volumes in the Library 4,234. In addition to these we have on file the following magazines: National Geographic, Nature Magazine, Good Housekeeping, Saturday Evening Post, Atlantic, Popular Science, Ladies' Home Journal, Pictorial Review, American, Woman's Home Companion and Home Arts.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Jackson:

Two excellent teachers, Miss Stevens and Miss Hackett, resigned during the summer to accept higher salaries elsewhere. Miss Elizabeth Sanborn at Jackson and Miss Aimee Stevens at Dundee were chosen as their successors. Both have maintained the high standards of their predecessors. Miss Sanborn is a graduate of both the junior high and elementary courses at Gorham Normal school, and Miss Stevens has had a wide and successful experience as a teacher.

The statistics for last year disclose an inexcusable record of tardiness and a percentage of attendance of 93 which is too low. There is undoubtedly considerable absence for trivial cause.

The medical inspection also showed a large number of defects with very little remedial work. The services of a nurse who will have time to do some home work is very desirable.

The school at Dundee is the largest for many years. A modern heater was installed which was the gift of the dissolved Livermore district. The school is now so large that modern sanitary toilets are needed. The cost would be at the outside about \$150.

The amount of the per capita tax for next year is \$120. In order to qualify for state aid the district would have to raise and expend for elementary purposes only

under an approved budget \$3,813.18. Respectfully submitted,
