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

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, N. H., February 1, 1932.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I have the honor to present my third annual report. The statistics appended are for the school year ending June, 1931 and comparisons are given for the two years preceding.

There occurred one change in teachers at the beginning of this school year; Mrs. Bertha P. George of Newmarket replacing Miss Daley at the Center School. The same high quality of work has been maintained and I am pleased to note that Madbury Center School reported the highest attendance of any of the twenty-seven schools in my union for the fall term this year, 98.7%. North Madbury School had no tardy marks and the 61 pupils enrolled in the town had only 6 tardy marks recorded against them. This record is especially gratifying following a poor record last year. The enrollment in both schools is still at a maximum, both buildings being crowded. As I have said in each of my former reports any improvement we make can only be temporary without increased facilities. Although both of the buildings could be made to appear better and be made more sanitary by the use of a little paint on the interiors. The same repairs are needed this year as last, nothing of any consequence having been done. In addition the roof of

the shed passage-way at the Center School will have to be made rain proof.

We have more pupils in Dover High School than in the years preceding. This will necessitate a larger appropriation for tuition. An article is inserted in the warrant calling for a vote to pay the high school tuition in full. Dover charges \$100 per pupil per year and the maximum which it can collect from the District of Madbury, or which the School Board can pay without vote of the district is \$98.93. Dover must collect the balance of \$1.07 per pupil from the parents unless the District of Madbury votes to pay it.

The nurse has continued her visits every fortnight and the results are reflected in the pupils and their regular attendance.

Richard Whitney, President of the New York Stock Exchange, says, "We are in the midst of a depression more severe than any within the memory of man". I know that because of this, efforts will be made in Madbury to reduce the cost of maintaining its schools. I do not see how it can be done. We are operating on a minimum budget now. The per pupil cost in Madbury is \$46.01 and the State median is \$83.67. We are among the lowest in the state in the purchase of books and supplies. "All other retrenchments should be made before using the pruning knife on the school budget", says the National Education Association Secretary, and continuing, "Buildings can wait. Scores of costly things can wait. But the child's education must go on. The debt eternal must be met vear by year in time of famine or in time of plenty". The schools must not be allowed to slip back, the children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. They would never forgive us should we give them less than the young people of the last decade have had. Another writer has said-"At home times are hard. In many schools depression has possessed the teachers and even in some churches

the ministers are dispensers of gloom. Children are entitled to a better heritage than this. We have raw material, capital, machinery, and man power to give all the people all they need and more as soon as the problems of distribution are worked out. And they will be solved. We shall all come into the possibilities of a richer and fuller life, economically and spiritually. Some of us are losing sight of the beautiful, the grand, the idealistic. The character developing elements of education. Too much is sought to be gained by precept and workbook and too little by appreciation of what is worthwhile". This is the time to give of the best in Reading, Musie and Art. These lead to appreciation and happiness.

Superintendent, teachers and nurse are cooperating with your school board to give you the best possible schools we can for the money. We must have the help of the whole community to go forward and not back.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board, Citizens and Superintendent of Madbury:

"Experience teaches wise men that the discovery of good hygiene makes it possible for man to live in houses, to eat cooked food, wear clothing and be healthy, strong and well". These points kept constantly in mind improve a community.

During the past year there were 61 children examined, weighed and measured. Of this number I found the following:

45 with defective teeth, 8 corrected10 with defective eyes, 3 corrected29 with defective tonsils, 2 corrected

During the past year there were:

34 cases of measles15 cases of whooping cough11 cases of pediculosis

Hygienic talks were given to the children and it is remarkable how they have done their utmost to comply with the advice given.

A toxin-anti toxin clinic was held in the town hall and children of pre-school age were given the privilege of receiving the treatment, as well as the school children. 38 children were given the treatment.



Again the grim messenger has entered our community and taken a life long citizen—Frank Eli Tibbetts. His whole life was spent in the house where he was born, Dee. 17, 1865, the son of Charles E. and Sarah A. (DeMerritt) Tibbetts, and where a long line of ancestors had lived before him. His boyhood days were occupied in the district school at "the little red school-house", where he was a bright and apt scholar, and later a few terms at Franklin Academy, Dover, which in those days was the mecca for ambitious youths of the city and country-side. His attention was turned to various pursuits, but he finally gave them up to settle on the farm. Here he proved efficient in raising crops and in other farm ways, especially in the production of small fruits and vegetables.

His efforts were untiring in the care of the farm and family for good results. He was kind to neighbors, and always ready to respond to calls from others in sickness and health by whom he will be greatly missed, as well as by his family of eight sons and two daughters. He married Nov. 7, 1897, Anna Belle McRae of Barrington, who survives him.

In polities Mr. Tibbetts was a Republican and worked for the welfare of the town. He held various offices, among them that of Auditor, and for several years served as Moderator at the annual town meetings until the time of his death. His influence was strongly felt in public questions and matters pertaining to the interest of his party and cause. Although leading a secluded life, he was a deep reader, and understood the vital issues of current events. On the maternal side, Mr. Tibbetts was a lineal descendant from Elie de Merit who took his first grant of land in ancient Dover, April 11, 1694. The first son of

this emigrant, Eli by name, born March 1, 1696, married Tabitha Pitman, the daughter of Nathaniel Pitman, who was one of the first settlers in this part of Dover, taking a grant of land of thirty acres here June 23, 1701, including land where now stands the present Tibbetts house which may have been built by him. Ebenezer DeMerritt, the son of Eli and Tabitha, born Apr. 20, 1726, certainly lived here during his life—as also his son. Ebenezer second. It is interesting to note that the first Ebenezer was the first Town Clerk when Madbury was set off as a Parish with Town privileges in 1755, which office he held until Apr. 21, 1776, the date of his death. He was succeeded by his cousin, and neighbor, John DeMerritt from 1776 to 1802, but again in 1803, Ebenezer second, of this house, took the office and served until 1808; and in 1815, the son of Ebenezer second, James Young DeMerritt, signed as Town Clerk to 1847, a stretch of thirty-two vears.

Thus it is quite a remarkable coincidence that three of the early Town Clerks, representing a period of nearly sixty years, should have been born, lived and died in this—the Ebenezer DeMerritt house. Mr.Tibbetts was the great-great-grandson of Ebenezer first through his grandfather, Eli DeMerritt.
