

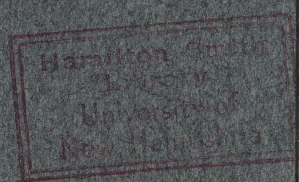

MARLOW SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The situation of the school at Marlow village makes an excellent opportunity to provide for the children of Marlow a most excellent school of modern type.

The school has been severely hampered this year by a series of inconveniences, yet the standard of actual school work cannot be severely criticized. Much can be done after a community interest is developed, comparable to that existing in other towns. A parent-teacher organization is the most important aid, in which the school and the parents may be brought closer together and a measure of welfare attained in this manner that can not otherwise be secured.

The school building needs, for the sake of convenience, several adjustments of the school material, and many improvements. Tools are needed for manual training, and new blackboards are needed badly. Greater expenditure is called for in the line of textbooks and supplies to put Marlow schools on a basis with those of the surrounding towns.

The floors in both rooms are in a bad condition of repair, and should be replaced by the first of September. More light is needed in the two rooms, and the toilets are in need of repair and of being connected directly to the schoolrooms by passageways.

Jacketing of the stoves will conserve the fuel and heat the rooms more evenly, while supplying much needed ventilation.
