## Warrant for Annual Meeting

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes of three per cent if paid in full before July 1, and two per cent if paid before August 1.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the Francestown Turnpike, and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$679.50, or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$452.03.

5. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through Tax Collector's deeds.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate sum of \$100 for the use of the Town Health Officer and Board of Health due to the war emergency.

8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We hope that the library more than ever before, may fill an important place in your community life, since in a time like this, when confusion and fear are prevalent, good reading may be of exceptional help in providing temporary escape, or a better understanding of events as we choose to read Mrs. Miniver or Berlin Diary. Never before has our need of diversion and release from realities of a war-torn world been equalled.

Many interesting books have been published this year, particularly of a biographical nature, and we notice an increasing interest in this type of literature and are glad to cater to it as far as possible, since "truth is stranger than fiction" and oftentimes more entertaining.

The circulation of books and magazines has been satisfactory, averaging 72 1/3 a week, 145 books have been added, 64 by purchase, 17 by gift of State Aid and 64 donated by the following persons: Mr. W. #### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

## To the School Board and Citizens of Mont Vernon:

I herewith submit my third annual report, the thirtyseventh in the series. I desire to cover briefly three topics; Policy, Personnel, and Recommendations.

#### Policy

Schools close one Friday night with the nation at peace. They reopen Monday at war. Instead of a helper, we are a participant with the other democracies. Naturally the policy of a school changes to meet existing conditions. As I see it, essential school services are not to be dropped but rather their emphasis changed. We dislike to think of abandoning the fundamental training but feel proud that we may have a part in directing pupil activities into desirable duties for our country's welfare and for post-war America.

What can the schools do to help? We are already salvaging waste paper and materials. We have helped raise funds for the Red Cross and other agencies. Health and physical efficiency are being promoted. We are making provision for the protection of pupils during Air Raids. We are re-emphasizing the ideals of democracy. We are helping to maintain the morale of our pupils at a calm and quiet level. We are definitely sustaining loyalty to America. We have even released workers to produce some of the products needed for the people. We hope to graduate some of the workers needed for war industries and services.

#### Personnel

"This subject is by far the most important matter educationally at the present time because there is a serious shortage of trained teachers and a more serious shortage of teachers about to enter training." Thus writes my predecessor in his first report twenty-two years ago. I might well have written the same sentence for this report. As was true in his time so is it true now that low salary is largely to blame for the shortage. But added to this is the tremendous demand made upon labor, man or woman to fill positions in our war industries, governmental agencies, and the fighting forces. People who would become teachers are being attracted into other channels.

Mont Vernon has been extremely fortunate that no changes have taken place. In many instances, rural schools (or one teacher schools) have experienced the most changes.

#### **Recommendations**

I hope that the budget as presented will be adopted, as it provides funds sufficient to maintain a fair level for salaries. Any reduction in this amount would seriously handicap you in obtaining the services of a desirable person.

I am very appreciative of the effective support given my efforts by the School Board, teacher, and citizens. A busy year has passed successfully. We have much to be thankful for as we face the uncertainties of the future.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To Mr. Harold C. Bowley Superintendent of Schools:

In accordance with your request, I herewith submit a report of the school nursing for 1941.

The routine medical inspection was made by Dr. Burns in November, a detailed report appears elsewhere. All children have been weighed and measured.

Among the health projects this year is the testing of hearing by the use of the audiometer. We are fortunate indeed to be able to give this type of test which, while more time consuming is very much more thorough and accurate than the old methods, especially the whisper method.

It will be noted that the number of children having dental defect is high. This age group is the group in which we hope to make prompt and complete corrections, in fact through preventive dentistry we hope to have no defect. The dental health of an individual during his whole life-time is forecast during the early years of his life by the condition and care of his teeth.

In closing I wish to thank everyone but especially the superintendent and teachers for the kind help and co-operation which they have so generously given me.
