TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Orford Free Library, and for Orford Social Library.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and convey any property acquired by tax deed.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1-100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessments of 1944 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$437.42 for that purpose.
- 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to transfer from the unincumbered surplus for the purpose of establishing a reserve fund to buy road equipment.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to make the Davis Hill road, so called, from the Quint Town four corners to the entrance to the Frank Finney farm, so called, subject to gates and bars.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in the general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dunbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

18. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

NO ONE is exempt from helping to win the war! EVERYONE, regardless of age, has his or her place in the overall effort! Some men, because of age, are called upon to bear arms; man ships, submarines and planes: minister to the injured and maintain morale. Women, in large numbers, are serving with the armed forces as nurses and members of the several women's military organizations-WACS, WAVES, SPARS, etc. War industry has taken millions of men and women whose accomplishments have been the marvel of the world. Civilians at home are doubling up on their activities because of the shortage in manpower, purchasing bonds, assisting in numerous patriotic undertakings, maintaining home morale and, on the whole, carrying on with a cheerfulness and determination that is typically American. Yet, despite the time, thought and effort we are all putting into the war effort in general, we are, true to our peculiar American characteristics, heedless and careless about many important things and one of these is FIRE as it relates to our forests.

Much harm can be done the war effort because of our carelessness with fire. Lumber has gone to war in a BIG WAY! Our New Hampshire forests are contributing their full share insofar as manpower permits. Fire, the greatest enemy of the forests, destroys, during each of these critical years, hundreds of acres of valuable trees that could contribute to the war effort. Forest fires disrupt the war's business by taking men from their important work in industry and on the farm and reduces production of necessary war materials and food. Forest fires require the spending of much money and material that might otherwise be diverted into vital war channels. Forest fires are, for the most part, unnecessary and avoidable for ninety-eight percent of such fires are, annually, the result of human carelessness-yours and mine. This can and should be remedied-NOW! YOU can HELP THE WAR EFFORT BY PREVENTING FOREST FIRES; The rules of the game are simple.

- 1. Always be careful with fire in or near wood-lands.
- 2. Comply with regulation governing the use of starting of fires there. Remember: (a) You need written permission from your local forest fire warden for debris burning fires when the ground is not covered with snow. (b) Be sure your match, cigar, cigarette and pipe ashes are OUT before dropping them.
- 3. Be fire-minded NOW as never before; be careful; caution others to be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden, your town, your nation and yourself!

Help the war effort by preventing forest fires.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Orford:

The seventh annual report of the present superintendent is herewith submitted and made a part of the report of the School Board to the School District. This report includes the usual financial accounting and the customary school records regarding attendance and teachers personnel.

Surveys: A brief review of the work of the year reveals that the main purpose of the schools is being carried on with reasonable efficiency. This work has been supplemented by the efforts to arouse the pupils' consciousness of the fact that we are all members of a larger society than that measured by our school grounds, our villages or our township. All groups have participated in the salvage programs of the government. Paper, cans, milkweed pods have all been gathered for the collectors and sent on their way to aid in the war effort. All groups have also purchased war stamps and bonds to make possible the pay for the necessary material for the army. The school lunch programs have been continued successfully, due to the response of both parents and other citizens. It can be truly said that not only the fundamentals of learning have gained but that those activities which help to make cooperative American citizens have been undertaken.

Budget: There is little change in the proposed request for school expenses for the year 1945-1946. The increase is due to the increasing cost of teachers and to the fact that there is not likely to be a balance at the close of the year. It is possible that state aid may be slightly increased, although this cannot be determined until after the legislature has made its appropriation.

High School: The major factor of interest in the High School has been the change in Headmasters. Miss Twitchell, who had been in that position for seventeen years resigned to accept a Principalship in another

school. Her place was filled by Miss Elsie Davis, a teacher with many years' experience in Massachusetts. Now that all have become accustomed to her leadership the work is progressing well. The boys and girls are fitting themselves for the next step in their lives.

Canning Center: Perhaps the most forward looking part of our program was the setting up of a canning center at the High School. Through the aid of the State by the use of federal funds this center was in operation for many weeks. It is now fully equipped and will serve the citizens of this area from early summer to as late in the fall as there are crops to be canned. Those who used the facilities spoke well of its success and wished to have the work continued.

Health: It is emphasized more and more that the physical growth and development of the child is one of the most important factors in his life. Proper diet, sufficient exercise of the right kind and skilled medical and dental attention where needed all contribute to physical well being. Orford is indeed fortunate that so much has been done and is being done by interested citizens and the School Board to assist in this field. The school nurse is doing her part. If every parent would cooperate fully we could make sure that this generation of boys and girls would be in better physical condition to meet the crises of life whether in war or peace.

Post War Planning: A forecast of the future needs of the Orford schools is not too easy to visualize. It is apparent that maintenance costs of the buildings will be sure to increase. New toilets and painting at the Orfordville school are among the first objectives. A provision for more play space for the pupils of the High and upper grade rooms at the Street, better seating facilities for several of the rooms, a reasonable amount of new teaching materials, such as globes, maps, and the like in all of the schools and other material improvements will need to be made. A careful survey might establish the desirability of a reorganization of grades in such a way as to lessen the number of grades to be taught by each teacher. All of this and more may need to be done to assure the better teaching of the tools of learning. No plan in this newer period will be complete unless in the earlier years of the pupil's life we begin to lav a foundation for a full understanding of the American way of life, economic, political and social. So, also character training will need to be stressed. All to the end that the fine traditions of our fathers may be perpetuated and built upon in order to develop a more broadly trained citizenry ready to meet changing conditions and avoid the pitfalls of the many "isms" which have plunged the world into chaos and confusion. The adjustments made by the millions of our young men and women in these times of stress is abundant proof that our schools have not failed. They but point the way for us to buttress our ideals with still more intensive practical methods of making the teaching and learning more realistic. Citizens, as parents and friends of the schools can make their contributions not only in support of the schools, but also in providing a wholesome home atmosphere where helpfulness; cooperation and tolerance are woven into the everyday experiences of the boys and girls.

It is a privilege to express confidence in the spirit of cooperation with the schools which pervades the citizens of Orford. All of the persons connected with your schools are thereby doubly obligated to give of their best to the cause of education in your community.
