[L. S.] TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers as provided by law.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart \$3,500. provided that the State Highway Department apportion an equal amount, to constitute a joint fund for the reconditioning of Bridge Street, beginning at the State Line and extending northerly for a distance of approximately three miles, in conformity to a proposition made to this town by the State Highway Department, as State Aid maintenance.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount necessary for construction of permanent highways under the law passed January session 1905.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance of highways and bridges, and determine in what manner the same shall be expended.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200. for the control of White Pine Blister to be used with a like amount appropriated by the State.
- 7. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to appropriate for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.

9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

10. To choose two persons for three years as Trustees of Cemeteries; to choose one person for three years as Trustee of Public Library; to choose one person for three years as Trustee of Trust Funds of the Town.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when they make their appraisal in April.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on 1927 taxes paid on or before September 1st, 1927.

13. To see what action the town will take relative to the removal of snow from the highways and to make appropriation and raise sufficient money to carry the same into effect, or take any other action relative thereto.

14. To see if the town vote to borrow through the Selectmen and Town Treasurer a sum not to exceed three thousand dollars in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the town will vote to provide electric lighting for its streets in any portion of the town, and if voted in the affirmative to raise and appropriate money and appoint a commitee to carry the same into effect or take any other action relative thereto.

16. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$500. from the general fund of the town treasury to build a Fire Engine House and if voted in the affirmative to see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition thereto, for the same purpose, and to secure a site therefor or to take any other action in relation to this subject.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PUBLIC LIBRARY

TRUSTEES' REPORT

Only one purchase of new books was made during the last year, but rather more were bought at that time than usual. We are contemplating another purchase of new books at an early date.

The roof of the library building was repaired last summer and a new book rack built in the attic to accommodate the books which must be removed from the stock room.

Perhaps a word in regard to how the library money is expended might be pertinent. Prior to 1922 the town paid for repairs, janitor service, fuel, etc., and in that year \$225.00 was raised and appropriated for the library. Since then the Trustees have taken over the entire care of the library and \$400.00 has been raised annually for this purpose from and including 1922. The additional \$175.00 being to take care of this additional expense.

There is a balance of \$509.53 in the treasury at the end of the fiscal year, but in this balance is included a part of the bequest of the late M. Amanda Cloyd which is still unexpended. In view of these facts the Trustees recommend and request the usual appropriation of four hundred dollars.

As was stated in our report last year, the reports of the librarian and treasurer contain all the essential information regarding the library. For this reason, unless something especially worthy of note transpires and the idea does not meet with too strenuous opposition, the Trustees' report will hereafter be omitted from the annual report.



You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 19th day of March 1927, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
 - 9. To see how much money the district will vote to

raise and appropriate for the repairs of school-houses and buildings.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to insure its schoolhouses against loss by fire, and if voted in the affirmative to see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to carry this article into effect.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize and instruct its School Board to pay the tuition of its pupils attending other High Schools or Academies in case the local High School does not furnish instruction and practice complete in the course so taken in any school year.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Pelham,

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit herewith my eighth annual report as superintendent of your schools. To this I have attached a report from your school nurse to which I direct your attention.

HIGH SCHOOL

The expense of maintaining a two-year school in Pelham is not substantially larger than it would be for a one-year school. It does not require any additional teachers and the extra cost expense for books, supplies, and the larger fraction of the teachers' time charged to the high school, is likely to be offset by a saving in tuition. It is doubtful also whether the board has any legal right to discontinue a second year which has been established by vote of the district without orders for so doing from the court. It would seem advisable to me to leave the school in statu quo. I believe that the Pelham people will do well to consider the following figures taken from the general statistics reports for the past seven years before taking any retrogressive steps.

These figures show that the number of your children attending high schools has doubled since the establishment of the Pelham High, while the average membership of all your schools is at present even less than it was seven years ago. Our public school system has grown up in this country on the theory of the desirability of the general diffusion of knowledge rather than confining it to the chosen few. The continuance of the Pelham High School is in conformity with this theory. It should receive the support of all, and the parents patronizing the school should not make it necessary for the school officials to inaugurate a campaign each year in order to secure a per cent of attendance high enough to insure its approval by the state authorities.

MEMBERSHIP

The number of your pupils have been fairly stationary for the past four years. At the present time the number of pupils at No. 4 is larger than at any other school except the consolidated school. This is probably due to the fact that this section of the town has been more accessible to larger centres. With your main highways kept in as good condition as they have been this winter, better than the streets of the cities, you may except an increase rather than any farther decrease in population in some other sections of the town.

TEACHERS

Four new teachers were employed for this year, two from the Lowell Normal and two from the New Hampshire University. All four seem to be conscientious and painstaking in their work and are apparently getting very good results.

SCHOOL COSTS

I conceive it to be the duty of school officials first of all to establish and maintain as good schools as the funds at their disposal may permit, and second, to advise their constituents as to the amount of funds necessary for maintaining as good a system of schools as they can afford. It has been my observation and experience that a community will be generous in its financial backing of its school officials as long as it feels that it is receiving a hundred cents' worth for every dollar expended, and that it will commence to be niggardly in its appropriations when it is suspicious of any waste of its funds. The total costs of the elementary schools of New Hamp-

shire per pupil of average membership in the different school districts varied for last year from \$37.60 to \$266.64 with a medium cost of \$78.57. The cost in Pelham last year was

\$70.15, or \$8.42 less than the median for the state.

This is not, however, the whole story as far as it concerns the tax payers. The large number of children in proportion to the taxable property may make the support of the public schools burdensome. The expenditure for public education, including both the elementary and secondary schools, per \$1000 of equalized valuation ranged in this state for last year from \$1.29 to \$28.68 with a median at \$9.90. For Pelham the expenditure was \$14.18 of which sum \$4.58 was borne by the state, leaving \$9.60 for Pelham's share as against \$8.25 as a median expense to the school districts of the state.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER

Pelham, N. H., February 8, 1927.

Mr. Louis D. Record, Supt. of Schools,

Pelham School Committe,

Citizens of Pelham:

I herewith submit an annual report of activities and work accomplished in Pelham High School from September 13 to date.

On September 13, 1926, the Pelham High School commenced it's second year as a two-year high school. This fact proves that last year's experiment of a two-year high school was a success. The enrollment this year consists of nine pupils in the ninth grade and three pupils in the tenth grade.

The standing of the high school may be shown by the fact that a member of the tenth grade transferred to Nashua High School and entered the Sophomore class there.

The high school curiculum is as follows:

YEAR I English 40 min. period—5 days per week
Hist of Civilization 40 min. period—5 days per week
French II 40 min. period—5 days per week
Alegebra 40 min. period—5 days per week

YEAR II English 40 min. period—5 days per week
Mod. European Hist. 40 min. period—5 days per week
French III 40 min. period—5 days per week
Algebra 40 min. period—5 days per week

For a 20 minute period each day the two classes have fundamentals. Fundamentals consists of a review drill in the subjects which form the basis of all education, such as arithmetic, spelling, grammar, geography and silent reading.

As in previous years the Junior High and High School held a bazaar. This was practically entirely under the control

of the pupils. An organization was formed, the president of which conducted all the business meetings to plan for the bazaar. This organization also had a secretary and treasurer, the latter took all charge of the money from sales and entertainment. The school planned to use the money, received from the bazaar, to put the name "Pelham Junior High School" in front of the building.

During the week of November 15 the members of the school sold various magazines published by the Crowell Company. One half the price of each year's subscription was received by the school. This money was deposited in the bank with the bazaar fund.

The fact that the school lacked a janitor was criticised by the State Inspector, Mr. Morrison. This would be an improvement in several ways: first it would improve the appearance of the rooms and basements, second it would hold the respect of the pupils for their school building and third, it would take from the high school teachers a responsibility which requires much time and which is not in their programs.

I wish to extend the thanks of the Pelham High School teachers to the superintendent, the school board, to the parents and all the citizens of Pelham who have contributed to the success which may have been attained during this school year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the School Board and Citizens of Pelham:

I herewith tender my report as school nurse for the past

year.

The number of children with defective teeth and enlarged tonsils remain high. There have been some corrections made in these defects, but, there are still a great many more that need corrections.

I think a large number of the children who are underweight are those who come a long distance and bring their lunch. I wish the parents could realize how much a child would benefit from a hot lunch such as a hot soup or other foods that could be put into thermos bottles. I notice very little milk brought for lunch in the whole town.

Most of the children with defective vision I have found in Gage-Hill School and No. 1 at the Centre. I think we should try to find out if it is due to the lighting of those

buildings and if so try and remedy it.

There has been very little sickness in the schools. A

few cases of chicken-pox and some mumps.

I find the children very much interested in health work and show the results.

I have spent as much time as possible in the homes as I believe in that way we get the confidence of the parents and get better and more results. There should be a lot more time spent in the homes, but, my time is divided perportinally between the towns of the district and can give only a certain amount to Pelham, but it is in the follow-up work or home visits where you get the results of your work.
