- Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To hear the reports of town officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 3. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.
- Art. 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of town highways and bridges.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for police.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for fire protection.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for fire trails and fire roads.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the library.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for public welfare.

- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Week during 1959 and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefore.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the general care and upkeep of the Town Memorial Forest.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to purchase from the Brown Company the piece of land known as Jewell Field at Evans Cemetery for cemetery purposes.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for a furnace in Town Garage.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Gorham Recreation Center.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town's share of co-operative participation in the White Mountains Region Association.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Roadside Improvement Committee for the care, improvement and upkeep of the town's roadsides.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Town Clerk to have a copy of the minutes of this and ensuing meetings of the Town of Shelburne in the hands of the Selectmen within two weeks of this and ensuing meetings.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint three additional members to the existing number on the Budget Committee.

- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks when taking inventory.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Judges selected for this event were Mrs. Gerard Morin and Jack Storey of Berlin, and Alvin Googins of Gorham. The winner of the first prize, \$10.00 in the adult group was Geneva McLain and second prize of \$5.00 went to Elizabeth Chase. The first prize, \$5.00, in the juvenile group was awarded to Marlene Hayes; second prize of \$3.00 to Donna and Belinda Hayes, and third prize, \$2.00 to Roy and Wally Gutowski. REPORT FROM THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

1958 was a busy year for the White Mountains Region office, particularly in the information and transportation fields.

In view of foreseen drastic consequences, the Region took a very active part in representing our towns in fighting transport curtailment, particularly with regard to the railroads. We appeared at hearings in Concord, North Conway, and Littleton and engaged in a considerable amount of travel and correspondence in the effort to prevent the Boston and Maine and the Maine Central railroads from cutting out their passenger service. While only limited success resulted it should be pointed out that such curtailments will go through without even a delay if they are not strongly contested. We have also taken an active part in proceedings before the Civil Aeronautics Board in attempting to secure better air service for northern New Hampshire; the final decision on this is not vet in. In the meantime, we have worked with bus companies to publicize their service in the hope that bus travel may take up some of the slack.

Demands for White Mountain literature of all types continue to increase, and we have been considerably crowded to satisfy them. The new N. H. Montreal office, turnpike information booths, and new sources contacted while out of state have all upped the quantity of literature we need to distribute. As satisfying the requests for folders about our region means dollars to our towns, it is extremely important that we receive enough funds to supply the need.

We have continued our customary and tested programs of 4-H awards, Youth Awards in science, and of liaison with all types of organizations and departments who in one way or another are working for the benefit of our area and our state. We have confidence that 21 years has proved them worthwhile. We have continued to travel to areas outside our state to carry the White Mountains message, and have co-operated with attractions operators and others who are doing the same job in different ways.

We'd like to remind every town again in this legislative year that holding the line in taxes in New Hampshire will be possible to a large extent only as much as we continue to bring in out-of-state visitors to help finance our main sources of revenue (Ex.: they pay over 40% of the gas tax and others). To do this, we have to continue to reach out and bring them in, and put up the small sums (which return many times over) that publicity costs. It's for our own benefit, and it does pay off. At a small outlay to any one town, an area publicity program operates that benefits all our towns. Our surveys in four consecutive years have shown consistently $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 times the town monies coming back to the area out of just a few inquirers surveyed.

Your town's part in this work is important, and is appreciated. This is one way where we in New Hampshire can still do things for ourselves.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Shelburne qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Shelburne on the 11th day of March, 1959 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To chose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the report of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, committees, in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or other funds for educational

purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Supervisory Union Board decides the local share of the Superintendent's salary and other Union expense. The share paid by the several Districts toward the Superintendent's salary for 1958-59 is as follows: Dummer, \$168.00; Gorham, \$3,321.60; Jefferson, \$427.20; Milan, \$494.40; Randolph, \$158.40; Shelburne, \$230.40. The State Treasurer also reports the amount of the per capita tax, while the Teachers' Retirement Board assesses the amount for the teacher's retirement and the State Emplovees' Retirement Association assesses the amount for the Superintendent's retirement and other District employees that belong to the system. In those towns that are under Social Security, the amount to be paid by the District is established by law.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Gorham School District:

Foreword

By the time this report reaches you, the addition to the Gorham High School should be substantially completed except for a few minor details outside the buildings. When the rooms are in proper use, Gorham should have one of the best school systems in the state. In addition to the new facilities at the high school, the Fenn School, completed three years ago, is one of the most modern buildings in the North Country.

The pupils of the Fenn School will now be able to make better use of the facilities in that building. Activities in the cafeteria will not be curtailed by having to share the room with the high school pupils, except in rare instances. This should mean that the staff can plan more learning activities in the fields of music, dramatics and physical education. Many of these experiences can be correlated with the work being done in the fundamental skills.

As was pointed out last year, the addition of new facilities at the high school will enable the staff to offer a much more comprehensive program. No longer will the former gymnasium-auditorium be contested for by the basketball coach, the music teacher, the dramatics coach and even the cheerleaders. All of these things can be handled simultaneously, depending on the size of the groups.

More important, however, are the classroom facilities and what they will mean to the curriculum. In science, chemistry, physics, and biology, students will have modern work areas to carry on experiments which will broaden each one's scope in this field. In the physics and chemistry laboratory, one will find six four-pupil science units besides the instructor's demonstration table. These units, when fully equipped, will certainly make these subjects more meaningful to the stu-

dents. A second classroom in the new wing will be used for a combination science and shop classroom. General science classes, mechanical drawing, and theoretical shop work will be given in this room.

The home-making department is now isolated from the traffic that has constantly been a disturbing factor in that program. Four kitchen units complete with sinks, new stoves, and cooking utensils, will aid the girls in this course. Also in the home-making department, additional sewing machines will give each student more opportunity to learn the skills necessary in this art.

In the manual training department additional space will make possible the inclusion of new programs of work such as metal-work, electricity, auto-mechanics and some welding. The type of shop work that we will have is designed to give each boy the basic knowledge of many of the skills mentioned previously. We do not have the necessary size staff, the equipment, or space to give a vocational type background. This new program will certainly offer the boys a much better background in the field of manual training and in the future the students will not be limited entirely to wood-working, or a related field.

Other facilities that have been added include the new locker rooms, an enlargement of the gym, the combination cafeteria-assembly room, as well as a music room in the basement of the Ann Lary School. The locker rooms will accommodate groups as large as 35 and are well ventilated by a separate zone, thus, assuring a healthful environment. The girls' locker room, painted in bright yellow, has five individual shower stalls, while in the boys' side, which is painted a pastel blue, one will find seven showers. The gym has been seen by many at some of the home games during the past few weeks and is considered one of the finest in the state. With the addition of new bleachers in the summer, the gym will have a seating capacity of 600-800 people. The cafeteria-assembly room will enable students to eat in the building and will offer facilities for both the high school and junior high school to hold assemblies, conduct dramatic activities and music activities without interruption from athletic programs. This room will be used for public showing of plays, small musical programs, P. T. A. meetings, etc. The stage, while a little smaller than the former one, will be adequate for play productions of the type presented by the school, and the audience will certainly be able to hear what is being presented. It is felt that this room will be used most extensively, and will give the school much flexibility in its curriculum.

The new addition will also serve to increase the value of the old building very much. The noisy activity of the shop is now isolated from the other classes; the old home economics room will be used for an art room and dressing room for the stage when necessary, and more space can be given to guidance activities and a room can be set aside for the nurse on the second floor.

Special mention should be made of the heating system, which has performed very satisfactorily this past winter, even in the bitter cold experienced during December and January. The older sections of both the Ann Lary and High School are heated with steam. The Ann Lary has two vertical zones, while in the high school each room is thermostatically controlled. The gymnasium has radiators controlled by one set of thermostats and two unit heaters for additional heat controlled by a second thermostat. The remainder of the building is heated by forced hot-water with separate zones in the basement of the Ann Lary School, which has never been heated previously, a zone for the cafeteria, a separate zone for locker rooms and a zone for the shop and science rooms. At this date it is too early to determine the cost of operation, but it appears that the efficiency of the system will make it possible to heat the old buildings and the new addition for about the same money that it cost to heat the two buildings before the addition was constructed.

Basically, the building is constructed of cinder bloc with a brick facing. Most of the rooms have acoustical tile ceilings, asphalt tile floors and are painted in pastel shades. The Brideau Construction Co. of Berlin was the general contractor and worked very diligently and cooperatively to enable us to make use of the facilities so early in the year. Irving T. Hersey Associates of Durham were the architects on the building.

Tuition

The tuition rates in Gorham for next year will be about the state average, which is the most that Gorham can charge as a basic rate. In addition to the basic rate, 2% rental charge can be added, and Gorham this year is adding this charge to both the high school and elementary rates because of the new facilities that have been constructed. The state average cost per pupil for 1958-59 is as follows:

High School \$388.00 Elementary \$240.00

The Gorham School Board has set the basic rates for tuition as follows: High School, \$375.00; Junior High School, \$240.00; and Grades 1-6, \$240.00. The rental charge is figured by the value of the buildings multiplied by 2% and divided by the capacity of the building. The valuation of the properties was established by the Tax Commission in January 1957 and the new addition costs were added to these figures. Upon completion of the formula it was determined that the amount of \$20.00 should be added to the basic high school and junior high school rates, and \$15.00 to the elementary rates, thus making the total tuition rates in Gorham as follows: High School, \$395.00; Junior High School, \$260.00; and Grades 1-6, \$255.00.

At the present time Shelburne has 11 pupils in high school and 25 in grades 4-8. In addition parents are paying the tuition of three pupils in grades lower than the fourth. Next year it is expected that there will be at least 16 in high school, 5 in junior high school, and 19 in grades 4-6.

The above tuition rates were discussed with the Shelburne School Board, and are also in keeping with the feelings of the Advisory Committee that was formed in 1957-58 school year.

Budget

The total budget of \$22,817.83 is \$2,889.95 more than was asked for last year. More than \$2,000 of the increase results from the greater number of tuition pupils going to Gorham next year, especially in the high school grades. This fact coupled with the increase in tuition rates, accounts for this item in the budget to go up. Budget increases can be expected in

the future with the number of children entering school remaining at its present rate.

Warrant

The warrant for the annual meeting contains only the customary business that has to be transacted, with no special articles being posted by the School Board.

Buildings and Equipment

The school house is in good condition and each year the Board has added to the comfort and safety of the pupils. This past summer, better plumbing fixtures were added to the boys' basement, a heater was attached to the furnace stack making the basement warmer and just recently a second door was added to the classroom. This will give two egresses from the classroom in case of fire.

A new duplicating machine was purchased last summer and a second hand typewriter was bought recently to aid the teacher in duplicating seat work for the pupils. Our supply of reading materials is very good and the children take much interest in doing a lot of extra reading.

Teacher

Mrs. Ruth Gutowski was hired to fill the vacancy created when Miss Madeline Lary accepted a position in Gorham. Mrs. Gutowski formerly taught in Gorham and Vermont, and took special courses in Plymouth last summer to strengthen her background in primary grade teaching.

The state average for elementary teachers for 1958-59 is \$3,981 or more than \$600 above the salary of the Shelburne teacher. As it has been stated before, the difficulty of getting and retaining good teachers is growing each year. Shelburne has given raises for its teacher each year, but the rest of the state has given larger increases, thus we are falling farther behind other districts annually. I hope that the District can see fit to remedy the situation as much as possible in the near future.
