3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the notes of the Town in anticipation of Taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a one and one-half per cent discount on taxes paid within thirty days after tax mailing date.
6. To see what the Town will vote to do about new equipment and to make motions relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town wishes to elect a woman chairman of Hospital Day.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$125.00 to oil road, approximately 300 yards in front of Twin Lake Village and make appropriation of the same.
9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Forest Fire Prevention Is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 per cent of all forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Carelessness and perverseness, however, continue to be big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted materials—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Springfield:

I submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment as of January 1, 1958 was 61—divided as follows: Primary Room (Grades 1-4) 25; Upper Room (Grades 5-8) 36.

I wish to point out again this year that the enrollment in the Upper Room of 36 pupils is too heavy a load for any teacher to handle effectively—especially when it involves teaching four different grades. Next September, it is expected that the enrollment in this room will climb to 37 pupils—if four grades are continued. I urge each of you to seriously consider the recommendation that is made later in this report to improve this situation next year.

IMPROVEMENTS

Both classrooms were painted. Most of the pupils' desks were sanded and re-finished. The driveway was oiled—pursuant to the vote of the special article at the last Annual School Meeting.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS

There have been no physical examinations for pupils for many years. Funds have been included in the Budget recommended by the School Board to renew this service. Such examinations would be given—only with the parent's permission.

RECOMMENDATIONS

HIGH SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION—Pursuant to the vote of the 1957 School Meeting, the School Board advertised for bids for transporting high school students to New London. A very reasonable bid (\$9.80 per day) was received. Funds for providing this service were included in the School Board's recommended Budget.

EIGHTH GRADE TO NEW LONDON—In view of the expected large enrollment next September in Grades 5-8 at Memorial School

(37), it seems necessary to consider some action to reduce this size. By sending students in Grade 8 to New London, we would be able to operate with 29 students in grade 5-7. This would provide a much better learning situation for the students in these grades—which, of course, is the real reason for operating the school.

Students in Grade 8 would have certain advantages at New London. These Junior High-age people would have the advantages of Shop, Home Economics and Physical Education, as well as being in class only with others of the same grade. They should obtain a better background for high school—at which time they come in competition with other students from several communities.

Financially, the Eighth Grade students could be sent to New London without added tax burden on the citizens of Springfield. The tuition from Grafton children and from the State Wards now enrolled would cover this cost. They could be transported on the same bus taking the high school students. I firmly believe that the educational welfare of those students going to New London and those remaining at Memorial School would both be improved by such action.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation of the School Board, School Staff, and Citizens during the past year.

Report of Helping Teacher

The position of Helping Teacher in this supervisory union is now in its fourth year of providing services as directed by the Superintendent of schools and as established by law: “. . . to give helpful advice, counsel, and assistance to teachers, pupils and parents of a school system as a constructive means of improving the educational growth and development of children, solving pupil problems of retardation and maladjustment, adapting the program of studies to meet the needs of children and the community, bringing resources outside of the school to classroom teachers, pupils, and community, and in general acting as consultant to the entire staff and community in recognition of educational needs.”

The cooperation and encouragement given me by all school personnel in Newport, Sunapee, New London, Springfield, and Croydon have constantly helped me to keep in focus and seek the fulfillment of the objectives mentioned above. I wish to express my deep appreciation to all who have guided and helped me to realize the various responsibilities and services outlined below:

1. **TESTING PROGRAM**—This includes the achievement tests scheduled at all grade levels for the entire school at the end of the school year; mental ability tests administered to pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7; and individual or small group tests administered as needs arise. Test scores, whether taken from tests or readiness, aptitude, mental ability, or achievement, are meaningful only to the extent they are used to guide the educational growth and development of children and of the school system as a whole. With increased interest and need for providing better education for the exceptional child, whether below or above the average, a closer look at test scores in achievement and mental ability, together with careful consideration of all cases through conferences with teachers and principal, may indicate the need for more effective grouping of pupils within the classroom.

2. **CLASSROOM VISITS**—Visits are made with a purpose and make it possible to share the physical, emotional, and educational atmosphere of the classroom. Follow-up conferences with teachers are intended to exchange ideas, review general observations, and to promote instructional improvement, especially with new teachers and experienced teachers in new positions.

3. RESOURCES AND MATERIALS—These are essential in providing enrichment in teaching, with greater interest and learning for pupils. New texts, references, bulletins, and other memoranda bring to the classroom a variety of teaching aids and all help to strengthen the overall curriculum. Science at the elementary level, and English at the secondary level have been more recently under study with the hope of improving the curriculum in these areas.

4. MEETINGS AND CONFERENCES—Whether a formal staff meeting, an informal chat with a teacher, participation in P.T.A. discussions, or attending educational conferences, such meetings cover a variety of topics, including the reporting of pupil progress to parents, curriculum materials, promotion of pupils, tests and their use, pupils with special problems, ideas for special grouping of pupils, and many other topics—all aimed at providing the best education for all.

5. AUDIO-VISUAL AIDS—The filmstrip is still the most useful and effective teaching aid in this field. Although the sound motion picture film is an excellent aid to teaching, it is rarely available when it is needed most. This year, with new filmstrips added in the fields of social studies and science, our library has seen considerable use in all schools. Future plans include the purchasing of more filmstrips in other areas of the curriculum.

The work of Helping Teacher shares in many other services and responsibilities of education, including conferences with parents, individual testing of pupils, the provision for in-service training of teachers through extension courses, assisting teachers with problems of keeping the school register, and many other interesting and varied experiences. The cooperative spirit of all teachers and the mutual interest in the best education for all make this work a purposeful pursuit.
