Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1918, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Jailer, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1918.

We consider the County is fortunate in being able to keep Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam as Superintendent and Matron at the Almshouse.

The County Delegation was called together on March 14, 1918, to consider the question of purchasing the Charles Willard lot, containing about two hundred acres of land.

This lot is located about one mile from the County farm, and the object in purchasing this land was on account of a large lot of wood and timber standing thereon and valuable springs of water.

The Convention voted to give the Commissioners authority to purchase the land, and to borrow money to pay for same, which has been done.

We appreciate the service rendered by the Overseers and Selectmen in their careful oversight of the cases which have come to their attention.

Solicitor's Report

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

During the year from January 1st, 1918, to January 1st, 1919, there have been no civil suits begun in which the County was a party and none are now pending. The suit against the Town of Andover mentioned in my last report was settled without trial by the payment to the County of the sum of \$100.00.

The County has been quite free from crimes commonly regarded as of a serious character. Under the State and Federal statute now in force there has been somewhat less of illicit sales of intoxicating liquors, though there is plenty of work yet to be done. The County and Town prosecuting officials have received considerable unjust criticism regarding the bringing of liquors from other States into this County. Critics should know that the Webb-Kenyon Law, so called, is a Federal Statute and that State, County and Town officers have no powers, rights or duties connected with its enforcement. Local officers can draw no fees nor even reimbursement for necessary expense incurred in assisting the Federal authorities in such cases. Nevertheless the Sheriffs and Policemen in Sullivan County have been the means of procuring the conviction of between fifteen and twenty offenders under this law since it has been in force and have been out of pocket for their expenses for conveyance, etc., and have received no fees. I believe that they should be heartily commended.

A tabulated statement of my work in criminal cases during the past year follows. An increasing proportion

of cases are being handled in behalf of the different State Departments such as Fish and Game, Highways, Automobiles, etc. Probably there will be more in aid of the Commission of Weights and Measures if that department ever gets organized so as to do business. It will also be noted that a large number of cases come within the category of "Police Offenses." These should more properly be handled by town officials and prosecuted by counsel of the several towns and should not engage the attention of the solicitor at all. I have been glad to be of any service I could in connection with such cases in recognition of faithful and hearty character of the assistance the policemen have uniformly rendered me, but by handling such matters I have established no precedent binding upon my successor.

There were five indictments returned by the Grand Jury in May and one in November. One was for larceny, one for forgery and four for adultery. There were no jury trials, as in each case the respondent pleaded guilty.
