To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 2 through 48 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 13, 1980 at 7 p.m. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year

1980 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85,000.00 for summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,053.41 to be used with the sum of \$13,689.38 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,960.74 as a set-off against that reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire known as the Duncan Fund, for use on Class V highways.

9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$20,927.75 which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$24,972.29 as a set-off against the State reimbursement known as Highway Subsidy Funds.

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,000.00 for the purchase of office furnishings and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purchase of office equipment and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,700.00 for repairs to the Old High School, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,550.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,500.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repaving of the South Weare Fire Station driveway or to take any other action in relation thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,800.00 for new equipment for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the salaries of two full-time fire department members, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for operation and maintenance of the land-fill area, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against the following debt service representing a prorated 1980 repayment on the principal of a note to the New Hampshire Municipal Bond Bank:

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,694.00 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the care of cemeteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Civil Defense program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of fences at the cemeteries in Center Square, so-called, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to the Sawyer Estate at Tavern Village, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00, said sum to represent a town contribution not to exceed \$10,000.00 and a matching grant from the State of New Hampshire for the construction of a combination softball/youth baseball field on the old dump site off Route 77. And, furthermore, that the Selectmen appoint a committee of three townspeople to assist in the planning of this construction, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement or to take any other action in relation thereto.

30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
(By Petition).

31. To see if the Town will reaffirm the action taken at the 1979 meeting with respect to the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds or to take any other action in relation thereto.

32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street signs for Weare and a corrected map of roads in Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.

33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.

34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,854.00 for a new York Rake for the Highway Department, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance and supplies of water holes or to take any other action in relation thereto.

36. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Subdivision Regulations as follows:

Paragraph 2. General. B. Delete the words "natural person" and substitute the word "owner".

37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of property taxes and authorize the collector of taxes to accept such prepayment pursuant to RSA 80:52-a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of resident taxes and authorize the collector of taxes to accept such prepayment pursuant to RSA 80:1-a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the collector of taxes to appoint a deputy tax collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 41:38 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action with respect thereto:

HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE PERMIT ORDINANCE

For the protection of public health and safety, the following is hereby adopted as an ordinance in and for the Town of Weare:

1. Permit required; hearing. No person, organization, corporation or trust shall in the course of business dump, dispose of, manufacture, remanufacture or otherwise process, transport over Town-maintained roads, store or deal in or within this Town any hazardous substance unless and until a permit authorizing such activity shall have been obtained from the Board of Selectmen after a public hearing at which the views of townspeople shall be given substantial weight. Any expense incurred in connection with the hearing or the issuance of the permit shall be borne by the applicant.

2. Issuance of permit; revocation. The Board of Selectmen may issue a permit only if a) the benefits to the Town from such activity outweigh the costs and b) a bond or an insurance policy, issued by a company licensed to do such business in this state, is posted or obtained in an amount the Board deems appropriate to save the Town and its residents and property owners harmless from any damage such activity might cause.

2.1. Conditions. A permit may contain such limitations and conditions as the Board may deem necessary to fulfill the purposes of this ordinance, including limitations and conditions on quantity, quality, time and place of operation, equipment, facilities and personnel.

2.2. Term; revocation. No permit shall be valid for longer than 365 days from the date of its issuance, and it may be revoked by the Board at any time upon a finding by the Board, after the permit holder has had an opportunity to be heard, if the situation allows, that its terms have been violated.

3. Penalty; enforcement. Any person, organization, corporation or trust which shall be found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100.00, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense. The Board of Selectmen shall expeditiously obtain an injunction and/or take other legal action to prevent the violation of, and to enforce, this ordinance.

4. Definition. A "hazardous substance" means a solid, liquid or gaseous substance, or combination of substances, which because of its quantity, concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics may

- a) cause, or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or incapacitating reversible, illness; or
- b) pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly dumped, disposed of, manufactured, remanufactured or otherwise processed, transported over Town-maintained roads, stored or dealt in or within this Town, and includes, but is not limited to, toxic, corrosive, flammable, explosive and radioactive substances.

5. Exceptions. This ordinance SHALL NOT APPLY to any person, organization, corporation or trust with respect to any hazardous substance used or sold by him or it

- a) for his or its personal purposes and not in the course of his or its business; or
- b) in connection with, but only as a minor and incidental part of, his or its business in this Town; or
- c) at retail in this Town in substantially the same form as originally manufactured,

nor shall this ordinance apply to the Town of Weare as a corporate body. (By Petition).

41. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Notice of Building and Permit Ordinance so that the penalty for failure to secure a building permit shall be \$100.00, and each day on which any construction shall occur until the day on which a building permit is issued shall be deemed a separate offense, or to take any other action with respect thereto. (By Petition).

42. To see if the Town will vote to install underground Fuel tanks and metered pump at the landfill area for the use of the Fire, Police and Highway Departments at a cost of \$3500.00 completely installed. (By Petition).

43. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money as may be necessary to have the taxable property of the Town reappraised either by the State of New Hampshire or a private professional firm, as to be decided by the annual Town Meeting. (By Petition).

44. To see what action the Town will take with respect to the Capital Budget Committee. This committee would be established to study, in light of current and/or future needs, and make recommendations to the Town regarding any capital expenditure to be made by the Town in excess of One Thousand Dollars. That such Capital Budget Committee be composed of six members whose membership shall initially be appointed by the Selectmen, who shall appoint two members for three years, two members for two

years, and two members for one year. That thereafter, the members of the Committee be replaced by election of two members per year for a term of three years and whose names shall appear on the ballot in compliance with the laws established for other elected officials. That the Committee be authorized to require that the various department heads and Town Officials or individuals suggesting a capital expenditure submit their proposal and statement of need for each capital item, which shall include a statement of the expected longevity of the item, to the Committee prior to December 31, of any calendar year. That the Committee as a whole and/or its individual members shall make such inquiry or investigation as it deems necessary and shall have authority to require such further information from the individual department head or Town Official or individual submitting the proposal as may be necessary to make a determination with reference to the item's impact on the community. That prior to December 31st of each year, all of the various departments and offices of the Town be required to prepare an inventory, in duplicate, of all property owned or leased by the Town which is in their possession or within their control. One copy of such inventory shall be considered a matter of public record to be stored in the Town Office and open to public inspection, and the other copy will be submitted to the Capital Budget Committee prior to its taking any action on any capital expenditure proposed by a department head or Town Official.

45. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at the Weare-Deering Town line. (By Petition).

46. To see if the Town will vote to reinstate the power back to the Selectmen on Driveway Permits, and remove it from the powers of the Planning Board. (By Petition).

47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

48. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1979

The annual Town Meeting of the Town of Weare was called to order at 10:00 a.m. by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. The polls were declared open and the Moderator announced that Article 4 would be the first article of business when the Meeting reconvenes on Thursday evening, March 15. Mr. Tiffany stated that absentee ballots would be cast at 3:00 p.m. in accordance with the law.

The Moderator read Articles 1, 2 and 3. Malcolm C. Purington moved that the reading of Articles 4 through 61 be waived at this time. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that at the conclusion of voting at 7:00 p.m. this evening the Meeting be adjourned until Thursday, March 15, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. at the Weare School Gymnasium. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

At 10:08 a.m. the Meeting proceeded to ballot for Town and School District officers.

ARTICLE 2. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000."

If the provisions of this subdivision are adopted by a town or city that had not previously adopted this subdivision, the provisions of RSA 72:39 and 72:40 are no longer effective in that city or town.

If after adoption of this subdivision as amended, a town or city votes to rescind such adoption, RSA 72:39 and 72:40 shall take effect at the same time such rescission becomes effective. (By Petition)

Yes - 467; No - 84

ARTICLE 3. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system; which exemption shall be in an amount of 100%?" (By Petition)

Yes - 189; No - 341

The polls were closed at 7:00 p.m. The ballots were counted and the Moderator read the results of the vote at 9:45 p.m. At 9:50 p.m. the Moderator declared the Meeting recessed until Thursday, March 15, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. at the Weare School Gymnasium.

At 7:05 p.m. on March 15, 1979, the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Gordon M. Tiffany. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by James B. Craig. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who had died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the reading of the Warrant in its entirety be waived at this time. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of \$795,000 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, the sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$170,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that we vote the sum of \$770,000 for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, the sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$170,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended and pass any vote relating thereto. The motion was seconded by Harold O. Hall.

The Moderator recognized William Stafford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who introduced the members of the Finance Committee. Mr. Stafford stated that, if all the articles in the Warrant are passed, it is estimated that the increase in the tax rate for 1979 will be in the vicinity of \$8.00. Mr. Stafford stated the Finance Committee agrees with the recommendation made by John Killion.

Mr. Killion stated that the land for the sewage disposal site has been purchased and that just about \$37,000 has been spent to date. We have received a letter from the State of New Hampshire stating we are still under the cease and desist order issued in 1956. We have also received a letter from the EPA stating that if we do not take some action tonight in the affirmative, they will proceed to take action against the Town. Mr. Killion stated that the sewer project has gotten to the point it is because the Town has admitted having a sewer system in existence - a drain system. This system has made us eligible for Federal funding. The grant which was awarded the Town on March 29, 1978 is available for a one year period. If we do not vote the project tonight, we will lose our Federal and State funding and go to the bottom of the list. \$770,000 is the total we are going to spend in addition to the \$75,000 raised and appropriated at the 1976 Town Meeting. The \$170,000 is the increase in State and Town portions of the sewer project. Of the \$170,000, \$57,000 is the Town's portion. Of the \$57,000 to be raised through local taxation, \$15,000 is to hook up the high school. The total cost to the Town is the \$23,000 appropriated in 1976 and the \$57,000 we are appropriating tonight for a total of \$80,000. Of this \$80,000, \$15,000 is for hooking up the high school, \$12,000 is for interest and the remainder is for the actual construction. Of the \$80,000, \$37,000 has already been spent for land cost, engineering fees, legal fees and survey fees. Mr. Killion stated the Selectmen are in unanimous agreement that the project should be done. The Selectmen received a report today that the town well is polluted. They have restricted the use of that water to non-drinking purposes.

Robert Hyman moved that Article 4 be dismissed and that Article 57 be put on the floor in its place at this point in time. Mr. Hyman withdrew his motion when the Moderator ruled the motion out of order.

Donald Myhr moved to amend Article 4 by inserting in its place the language of Article 57. The Moderator ruled that whatever motion would substitute Article 57 for Article 4 at this time would be out of order. A division vote on the Moderator's ruling was held. The result of the vote: Yes - 138; No - 86. The Moderator's ruling prevailed. Discussion continued on Article 4. Harold Hall made a motion to move the question. The motion was seconded. The result of a division vote: Yes - 152; No - 91. The vote was affirmative and a motion was made and seconded to vote by written ballot. The result of the written ballot: Yes - 109; No - 205. Article 4 is lost.

Landfill -- for the purpose of increasing this category -- by adding \$4,000.00 for proper maintenance of the dump road to the amount recommended by the Finance Committee making a total of \$169,700.00. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative. The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

Harold O. Hall moved that the provision for the collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1979 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 for summer and winter maintenance of highways, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95,000.00 for summer and winter maintenance of highways and bridges. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation on Articles 8 and 9 - \$105,900.00; recommendation on Article 8 - \$65,900.00.

James B. Craig moved to amend the motion to \$85,900.00. The motion was seconded. Mr. Craig made a motion to move the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The vote on the amendment was negative. The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

At this point, the result of the written ballot on Article 4 was announced. The polls had remained open for one hour, after which the ballots were counted.

Volker Wyrenbeck made a motion to dismiss Article 4. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal of Article 4 was affirmative.

Robert Hyman moved that Article 57 be considered next. The motion was seconded. The result of a division vote: Yes - 174; No - 0. The meeting proceeded to Article 57.

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town of Weare will adopt the following:

Whereas the surfacing of, ground permeation of, flowage of, and pollution by untreated sewage in the Town of Weare in the environs of Highway 114, East St. and Flanders Memorial Road (Drive) is a noxious and potentially dangerous condition and has so been declared by the authorities of the State of New Hampshire and,

That the responsibility for the abatement of this nuisance is solely that of the property owners involved in originating this undesirable state of affairs,

To see if the following ordinance on this subject will be adopted by the Town of Weare:

1. Those owners of real property in the environs of the town center in the Highway 114, East St. and Flanders Memorial Road (Drive) area who contribute to this are solely responsible to abate their own sewage nuisance in a timely and compliant manner.
2. This can be performed through the addition of new or the improvement of existing septic waste systems. This can also be performed through the addition of

sewage disposal systems utilizing electricity, gas, temporary sewage holding tanks, mulching type conversion systems, or any other type suitable system. Any such system must be approved by the New Hampshire Board of Water Pollution where such approval is applicable.

3. The owners of all property as described in paragraph 1 above are to be permitted the time needed until July 1, 1980 to survey, plan and implement the improvements to their faulty sewage disposal systems to abate the nuisance.
4. In the event of non-compliance with paragraph 3 above, the Board of Selectmen will, in a timely manner, with the aid of the State Board of Health, the State Board of Water Pollution Control and any and all other pertinent State agencies, not excluding the services of the various Courts of Law of the State of New Hampshire; initiate such action to have the errant, polluting premises vacated and declared to be non-habitable while such condition of non-compliance with the intent of this ordinance does exist. For the purposes of this ordinance, "in a timely manner" shall be defined as a period not to exceed 90 days.
5. In exceptional circumstances, the Board of Selectmen, at their discretion, may grant an additional period of time, not to exceed 3 months, that is, until November 1, 1980, for compliance as heretofore described. There shall be no other extensions of time granted beyond this date.
6. This ordinance supersedes all previous ordinances on this subject. Any and all monies previously appropriated towards the solution of this problem which have not as yet been spent, legally obligated to be spent are to be returned unearmarked to the town general funds. The sole exception to the foregoing are any as yet unexpended funds solely intended for the purchase of the gravel pit in this area.
(By Petition).

Robert Hyman moved the adoption of Article 57. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article 57 was affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn until Saturday, March 17, 1979 at 9:00 a.m. The vote was affirmative and the meeting adjourned at 11:05 p.m.

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator on Saturday, March 17, 1979 at 9:10 a.m. Robert Hyman made a motion to adjourn the Meeting until some evening next week. The motion was seconded. Gertrude Murdock moved to amend the motion to postpone the Meeting until we see if there is an adequate number of people present with which to proceed in a democratic manner. The motion was seconded. Robert Munro moved to amend

the amendment to state we wait until 10:00 a.m. to see if we have a sufficient number of voters present. The motion was seconded. The vote on the 10:00 a.m. motion was affirmative. At 9:20 a.m. the Meeting was adjourned until 10:00 a.m.

At 10:00 a.m. when the Meeting was called to order, the motion to adjourn was withdrawn. The Meeting voted in the affirmative to the withdrawal of the motion.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved that \$40,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the general expenses of the Highway Department. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,083.83 to be used with the sum of \$13,892.21 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee stated they support article as read. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$892.23 as a set-off against that reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire known as the Duncan Fund, for use on Class V highways.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$892.23. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,284.98 which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$16,284.98. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,117.30 as a set-off against the State reimbursement known as Highway Subsidy Funds.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$25,117.30. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 for a Highway Grader.

Malcolm C. Purington made a motion to vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 for a highway grader and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or

notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$70,000.00.

Wilfred Foote made a motion to amend so as to permit the Road Agent to trade-in the old grader in addition to the value of \$70,000.00 which is to be raised and appropriated by the Town. The motion was seconded. The Chairman of the Finance Committee stated the Committee concurred with the amendment.

After discussion, Robert Munro moved to amend the amendment as follows: subject to a sales agreement which has town counsel's approval. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment to the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. A division vote on the article as amended was affirmative, the Moderator stating the vote was manifest that we have almost 3/3 voting in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,200 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Donald E. Thomson moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee recommended \$12,000.00 and the Chairman of the Committee moved to amend the motion by substituting the sum of \$12,000.00. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,950.00 for the general operation budget of the Weare Fire Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$16,950.00.

Chief Rhodenizer displayed one of the five smoke detectors donated by Wilson's Triangle Inc. to be used in homes of the elderly or handicapped residents of the town. He stated the Fire Department and Rescue Squad members, through fund-raising events, have been able to purchase 7 small radios for use by department members at no cost to the Town. He requested, and received, a round of applause for these members. The vote on the article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the sum of \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the repaving of two fire station driveways or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$900.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a new fire truck or to take any action in relation thereto.

Gordon C. Brown moved that the Selectmen be authorized to spend the sum of \$59,707.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck from the surplus money left over from last year. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$59,707.00 for the purchase of a new fire truck. The Chairman of the Finance Committee stated the information presented to the Committee did not deal with surplus.

After an explanation of the surplus amount by Mr. Purington, Mr. Brown changed his motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$59,707.00 through serial notes for the purchase of a new fire truck. The motion was seconded.

Robert Hyman moved to amend the motion as follows: to expend surplus funds as delineated on pages 22 and 23 for the purchase of the fire truck, any balance over and above this will be raised by serial notes. The motion was seconded. After discussion the Moderator stated he has noted little opposition to the purchase of a fire truck. The opposition stems from the manner in which it will be financed. The Chair offered the following motion for consideration: Weare votes to raise and appropriate the sum of \$59,707.00 for a new fire truck, that amount of money to come from such surplus as may be available and, to the extent that the surplus is not available, it will be made available through the issuance of serial notes. The motion was seconded.

Harold O. Hall moved the question. The motion was seconded. However, the vote was abandoned and the Moderator declared a five minute recess. The meeting was called back to order at 11:47 a.m.

Robert Hyman moved the Town authorize the sum of \$59,707.00 for the procurement of a fire truck. The Selectmen are directed to utilize any cash surplus that we have for the attainment of that objective. In the event there is inadequate cash on hand, we authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes for the balance. The motion was seconded.

Arnold Rocklin-Weare moved to amend the motion as follows: that the Selectmen determine an appropriate way to buy this fire truck to affect the tax rate of Weare in the least possible way possible in the next couple of years. The motion was seconded.

Robert Munro moved to amend the motion as follows: that we take from the surplus funds an amount of \$39,707.00 and raise \$20,000.00 by issuance of serial bonds for a period of time suitable to the Board of Selectmen. The Moderator stated the motion to amend is out of order until the prior motion to amend is voted down.

The vote on Mr. Rocklin-Weare's amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative. The Moderator stated that this vote, to the extent that it might deal with serial notes, was a full 2/3 vote in the affirmative. There was no question in the vote.

The Meeting recessed at 12:10 p.m. for lunch with the Moderator stating it was his intention to complete the Warrant today if humanly possible.

The Meeting resumed at 1:04 p.m.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$2,500.00 for updating the tax map, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,500.00 for operation and maintenance of the landfill area, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington made a motion to dismiss Article 21. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreements with commercial rubbish haulers for the use of the town's landfill site upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem in the best interests of the Town.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of the article as read. The motion was seconded.

Gordon C. Brown made a motion to dismiss Article 22. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,510.00 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Camille Ahern made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,510.00 for the Weare Public Library. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$9,510.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the care of cemeteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 24 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$4,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Civil Defense Program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Edgar Hunt made a motion to accept Article 25 as read. The motion was seconded. William Stafford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved to amend the article by substituting the amount of zero dollars. The motion was seconded.

Robert Munro made a motion to dismiss Article 25. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$95.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 26 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Selectmen be authorized on behalf of the Town to make application for and accept gifts, grants, or aid be appropriated to the purpose for which they constitute reimbursement. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for renovation of the old High School Building for town office or to take any other action in relation thereto.

William Stafford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,300.00 under Article 28, the said sum of \$30,300.00 to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interests of the town. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Stafford gave a report on the work during the year of the Long Range Planning Committee and the recommendations of this committee. Thomas Clow moved to table the motion until 3:00 p.m. in order to give everyone in attendance a chance to read the printed report of the Long Range Planning Committee. The motion was seconded. The result of a division vote: Yes - 112; No - 14. The original motion was tabled until 3:00 p.m.

The Meeting returned to Article 28 at 3:00 p.m. A motion was made by Robert Hyman to dismiss Article 28. The motion was seconded. The vote to dismiss was negative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The result of a division vote on Mr. Stafford's motion: Yes - 143; No - 19. The vote was affirmative.

Robert Munro moved, under other action which may be taken with relation to Article 2-, to raise and appropriate \$8,000.00 for a vault. The motion was seconded.

The Moderator stated it was the intent in this motion that the funds raised and appropriated would be done by serial notes. A division vote was taken. The Moderator stated it is manifest that at least 2/3 of the members of the Meeting stood and that serial notes are affirmed by the Meeting.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for a new heating system for the Stone Memorial building or to take any action in relation thereto.

The Moderator stated that Article 29 depends in large measure on what the Meeting votes to do under Article 28. He stated consideration of Article 29 will be put off until Article 28 is voted upon.

Following the vote on Article 28, Charles Brown moved to dismiss Article 29. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee had no recommendation for Article 29. The vote to dismiss Article 29 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see what part of the surplus, if any, the Town will vote to return to the general fund, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

A motion was made to indefinitely postpone Article 30. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for office equipment for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office and the office of the Selectmen, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Malcolm C. Purington made a motion Article 31 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,500.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the sealing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved that \$10,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the sealing of town roads. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of that portion of Memorial Drive known as Slack's Hill or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,262.00 under Article 33. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$16,262.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire independent public accountants to perform the financial audit of the town records for the year ended December 31, 1979 and also a compliance audit required of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 34 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from its Social Security plan services performed by election officials or election workers for each calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such services is less than \$100.00.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 35 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town and further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the purpose of re-assessing real estate values within the Town and further to authorize the Selectmen to contract on behalf of the Town with the State of New Hampshire or other parties as they deem in the best interest of the Town to accomplish the job. The motion was seconded.

Robert Hyman made a motion to dismiss Article 36. The motion was seconded and the vote to dismiss was affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the "Notice of Building and Permit Ordinance" adopted at the March 5, 1974 Town Meeting by inserting the following after the third full paragraph, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

A notice of intent to build and building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family and designed or intended for residential purposes.

A notice of intent to build may only be filed by, and a building permit only issued to, the owner of record of the land on which the building is to be erected, or his authorized agent.

A building permit shall be valid for twelve (12) months unless active and substantial construction has begun during that period. A building permit may not be transferred or otherwise assigned.

These amendments shall take effect upon passage.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 37 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. After discussion, a motion to amend was made to delete the words "and substantial" from the third paragraph. The motion was seconded and the vote on the amendment was affirmative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to seek other means of covering Town employees for Workers Compensation.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that Article 38 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Conservation Commission to survey and map the remaining tracts of Town land (not originally surveyed and mapped), and to authorize said Conservation Commission to withdraw from the Forestry Account an amount not to exceed \$ for the purpose of surveying and mapping, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Dave Titcomb moved the adoption of Article 39 with the insertion of the amount of \$3,500.00. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee: no recommendation. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article 39 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to take such action as may be necessary to acquire on behalf of the Town such tracts of land as are determined by the official map of the Town not to have any ownership and to authorize the withdrawal from the Forestry Account an amount not to exceed \$ for said purpose or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Dave Titcomb moved the adoption of Article 40 with the insertion of the amount of \$250.00. The motion was seconded.

William Southworth moved to amend the article by substituting the word "identify" for the word "acquire" in the second line of the printed article. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative.

The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

The Meeting recessed at 4:08 p.m. and resumed at 4:26 p.m. At that time the Moderator stated it was his intention to resign at the conclusion of this Meeting.

ARTICLE 41. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Town Shed for the Highway Department or take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved to raise money for a highway garage. The motion was seconded. William Stafford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, moved to amend the motion as follows: to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,000.00 under Article 41, said sum of \$33,000.00 to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interests of the Town. The motion was seconded.

Robert Hyman made a motion to add the following words to the article: -- to be built on town property. This amendment was accepted.

The division vote result on the article as amended: Yes - 160; No - 1. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold O. Hall moved that Article 42 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee: \$500.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for winter maintenance of East Shore Road, so-called.

Craig Slattum moved the acceptance of Article 43 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: zero dollars. The vote was negative.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to accept Lawrence Road, so-called, as a town road.

William Mattil made a motion to accept Lawrence Road as a town road. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road shown on a plan known as "land of Leslie and Pearl Durant, 'Windsong Heights', Weare, N.H.", and known as Windsong Heights Road, so-called.

Lawrence McManus made a motion to accept Windsong Heights Road as a town road. The motion was seconded. The result of a division vote: Yes - 74; No - 74. To break the tie, the Moderator cast his vote which was negative and the motion failed.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to accept the remaining portion of Ridgeview Road as a town road.

Marilyn Carson moved that Article 46 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The meeting was recessed until 7:45 p.m.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendments to its Sub-Division Regulations of 1973, effective on passage, or take any other action in relation thereto:

1. Delete paragraph 2.A. and substitute:

A sub-division is defined as any parcel of land that is divided into two (2) or more pieces and offered for the purposes, whether immediate or future, of sale, lease or of building development.

2. Delete paragraph 2.B. and substitute:

The gift or offering for sale by any natural person in a calendar year of a single piece of property, regardless of size and of the fact that it may be part of a larger parcel, does not come within the scope or purpose of these regulations. This exception does not apply to approved lots in any approved sub-division.

3. Add before the first sentence in paragraph 2.C.:

All roads constructed in a sub-division shall meet or exceed Class V specifications. Access to a sub-division must be from a Class V or higher road.

4. Delete paragraph 2.D. and reletter 2.E.

5. Delete paragraph 3.A. and reletter 3.B., C., D., E., F.

6. Add a new paragraph to section 3:

F. In any calendar year, the maximum number of lots in a subdivision that will be approved by the Planning Board will be as follows:

1. In a subdivision of ten acres or less, one lot of two or more acres;

2. In a subdivision of more than ten acres, a number of lots of two or more acres equal to 20% (1/5) of the total potential number of two acre lots in the subdivision.

(Example: a one hundred acre subdivision, with a potential of 50 two acre lots, may have ten lots approved each year).

This paragraph F. shall expire on March 31, 1982.

7. In paragraphs 4.A. and 4.B., substitute "60 days" in each place that "30 days" appears.

8. Insert the following after the second sentence of paragraph 4.A.:

It shall also include or be accompanied by such other information and documents, including the State of New Hampshire permits and approvals, that the Planning Board may request.

9. Delete the fourth sentence of paragraph 4.B. and substitute the following:

If this final plat meets the requirements of these regulations and all of the pertinent state statutes, and is in the best interests of the Town, the Weare Planning Board will annotate an approval on 2 copies of the same.

10. Add a new section 7:

7. SAVINGS CLAUSE

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

Murray Wigsten moved that Article 47 be accepted as read in its entirety. The motion was seconded. After discussion, Mr. Wigsten amended his motion so that Section 8 would read as follows:

8. Insert the following after the second sentence of paragraph 4.A.:

It shall also include or be accompanied by such other information and documents, including State of New Hampshire permits and approvals, that the Planning Board may reasonably request.

Robert Hyman moved to dismiss Article 47 in its entirety. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote to dismiss Article 47 was negative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Mr. Wigsten's amended article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

In order to permit the Town of Weare to regulate its nature and growth in accordance with a carefully considered master plan, which is to be developed over the next three years, and to maintain relatively stable circumstances while a master plan is being developed, the following ordinance is adopted:

1. The number of building permits to be issued for residential purposes in any calendar year shall be

limited to 24. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.

2. Notices of intent to build may be filed between January 1st and 10th, April 1st and 10th, July 1st and 10th and October 1st and 10th of each year. Building permits shall be issued in the order in which such notices are received except that:
 - a. No more than eight (8) permits shall be issued in any calendar year quarter. In the event permits available for that quarter are not issued, they shall be added to those available in the next quarter. Permits not issued by the end of the calendar year shall not be carried over into the next year.
 - b. A person may be issued no more than one (1) building permit for residential purposes while this ordinance is in effect.
 - c. In the event that more than eight (8) notices of intent to build are filed in any filing period, building permits shall be issued in the order of the dates of the deeds for the lots on which the buildings are to be erected (oldest first).
3. This ordinance SHALL NOT APPLY to building permits
 - a. for residential additions, remodeling or construction where no additional dwelling unit is created; OR
 - b. to replace damaged or destroyed dwelling units; OR
 - c. for a dwelling unit which replaces an existing dwelling unit removed from the town; OR
 - d. for commercial, industrial or other non-residential structures.
4. No new or addition to an existing subdivision shall be created, nor shall any created be approved, by the Weare Planning Board while this ordinance is in effect.
5. No permit for the removal of sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be granted by the Selectmen under the Removal of Gravel, etc. ordinance of 1972, as amended, or otherwise, while this ordinance is in effect; provided, however, that existing permits may be renewed according to the ordinance of 1972, as amended, for the removal of not more than 110% of the quantity actually removed in the preceding permit year.
6. This ordinance shall take effect on passage and expire on March 31, 1982.

7. The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

It was moved and seconded to dispense with the reading of the article. Neal Kurk moved that Article 48 be accepted as printed except that Sections 1, 2 and 3 be eliminated and the remaining sections be renumbered. The motion was seconded.

Russ Laventure moved to dismiss the article in its entirety. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal was affirmative and the article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to amend its ordinance limiting building permits for residential purposes to one for each ten acres of land, adopted at the 1978 town meeting, by deleting sections A, B and C and substituting the following:

- A. Building Permits - Residential. No person shall be granted building permits in any calendar year in excess of one for the first ten contiguous acres of land, or part thereof, and one for each succeeding ten contiguous acres, or part thereof, on which the building is to be erected. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit in a building. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.

(Example: if one owns three separate parcels, a 5 acre piece, a 2 acre piece and a 20 acre piece, he may receive 4 building permits in a calendar year, but only two may be used on the 20 acres.)

- B. Building Permits - Nonresidential. The above limitations shall not apply to building permits for commercial, industrial or non-residential construction.
- C. This ordinance shall expire on March 31, 1982.

Neal Kurk moved that Article 49 be accepted as printed. The motion was seconded. Russ Laventure made a motion to dismiss Article 49. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal of Article 49 was affirmative. A division vote was called for. The result of the division vote: Yes -79; No - 67. The article was dismissed.

Les Knox made a motion to dismiss Articles 50 through 56. The Moderator stated this motion was out of order and that each article must be taken up separately.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

To protect the public health, safety, prosperity and general welfare and to secure the orderly development of the Town of Weare, the following ordinance is adopted:

The construction, remodeling, enlarging or placing of a cumulative total of four (4) or more dwelling units on any site, lot or parcel of land owned or controlled by any person or group of persons shall be treated as if it were a subdivision and shall not be undertaken until the subdivision regulations of the Town then in effect have been complied with and the approval of the Weare Planning Board has been obtained.

A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family and designed or intended to be used for residential purposes.

Neal Kurk moved the adoption of Article 50 as read. The motion was seconded. Russ Laventure made a motion to dismiss Article 50. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the dismissal of Article 50 was negative.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote on the article as read was affirmative. A division vote was called for. The result of the division vote: Yes - 113; No - 25.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

In order to permit the Town of Weare to regulate its nature and growth in accordance with a carefully considered master plan, which is to be developed over the next three years, and to maintain relatively stable circumstances while a master plan is being developed, the following ordinance is adopted:

1. No new or addition to an existing subdivision shall be created, nor shall any created be approved by the Weare Planning Board, while this ordinance is in effect.
2. A person may be issued no more than one (1) building permit for a new or additional dwelling unit while this ordinance is in effect. A separate building permit shall be required for each dwelling unit in a building. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.
3. No permit for the removal of sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be granted by the Selectmen under the Removal of Gravel, etc. ordinance of 1972, as amended, or otherwise, while this ordinance is in effect; provided, however, that existing permits may be renewed according to the ordinance of 1972, as amended, for the removal of not more than 110% of the quantity actually removed in the preceding permit year.

4. This ordinance shall take effect on passage and expire on March 31, 1982.
5. The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions.

A motion was made and seconded to dispense with the reading of the article. The vote was affirmative.

Neal Kurk made a motion to dismiss Article 51. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to amend its ordinance requiring two acres of land for each apartment, adopted at the 1974 Town Meeting, to read as follows:

To promote adequate sanitary waste disposal, to protect fresh water supplies and to preserve open space in the Town, any structure used for residential purposes and constructed, remodeled or enlarged hereafter to provide two or more dwelling units shall be on a separate lot containing not less than two acres for each dwelling unit in the structure. A dwelling unit is a building, mobile or modular structure, or a portion of any, containing normal housekeeping facilities for one family.

Neal Kurk moved Article 52 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article 52 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

To amend the Town ordinance governing "Removal of Gravel, etc." by adding the following paragraph (f) to the paragraph entitled "Terms and Conditions of Permit", as follows:

"(f) The maximum amount of gravel, sand, or other earth materials which may be removed under any permit shall be 30,000 cubic yards within any twelve month period."
(By Petition)

Steven Colombo moved the adoption of Article 54. The motion was seconded. Russ Laventure made a motion to dismiss Article 54. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. A division vote was called for. The result of the division vote: Yes - 96; No - 51. Since this was not a 2/3 majority, the Moderator ruled that debate would continue.

Robert Hyman moved a five minute limitation on each speaker unless the house, by a 2/3 vote, overrides the call of the Moderator on the five minute rule. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

A division vote on the dismissal of Article 54 was taken. The result of the vote: Yes - 86; No -72. The vote was affirmative and the article lost.

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or take any other action in relation thereto:

GRAVEL PERMIT FEE ORDINANCE

1. A permit for the excavation, removal or relocation of earth, loam, topsoil, sand, gravel, clay, stone, minerals or other earth materials required under the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972, as amended, shall be subject to a fee for the use of the Town. This fee is to compensate the town for (a) the costs it will incur in maintaining and repairing town roads and bridges used by permit holders and in providing traffic control and other law enforcement services, and (b) for the aesthetic injury suffered over the lifetime of operations and the inconvenience to townspeople from increased traffic. The fee shall be as follows:

Next 25,000 cu. yds.	2¢
Next 50,000 cu. yds.	4¢
Next 50,000 cu. yds.	6¢

2. No permit required under the Removal of Gravel ordinance shall be issued until the fee imposed by this ordinance has been paid. The fee shall be based on the number of cubic yards of earth materials for which the permit is issued. No permit may be issued unless it specifies the maximum number of cubic yards of earth materials to be excavated, removed or relocated during the life of the permit.

3. The Selectmen are authorized and directed to obtain from permit applicants such information and to adopt such regulations as they deem necessary to administer and enforce this ordinance.

4. Any person who violates this ordinance or the regulations adopted hereunder by the Selectmen shall be fined \$100 or 20% of any additional fee due to the Town, whichever is greater, for each and every such violation. This fine shall be in addition to the payment of any fee that may be due to the Town.

Neal Kurk moved the reading of the article and the article itself be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972, as previously amended, as follows, or take any other action in relation thereto:

To provide for a public hearing prior to the renewal of a permit, the section of the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972 entitled "Renewal" is hereby amended by adding the words, "after

a public hearing," after the word "may" in the first line of the section.

Katherine Lum moved to amend the Removal of Gravel Ordinance of 1972, as previously amended, as follows:

To provide for a public hearing prior to the renewal of a permit, the section of the Removal of Gravel ordinance of 1972 entitled "Renewal" is hereby amended by adding the sentence, "A public hearing will be required before a renewal of a permit is granted if the Selectmen are petitioned by 20 residents of the Town of Weare."

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 58. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at Crosby's Store.

Chester A. Colburn made a motion to raise and appropriate \$25,000.00 for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at Crosby's Store. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$18,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town will vote to amend as follows the Building Permit Ordinance adopted at the 1978 Town Meeting:

"D" Building permits are nontransferable.

Malcolm C. Purington moved Article 59 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

William Johnson made a motion to reconsider Article 54 by amending the "Removal of Gravel, etc." ordinance as follows:

No permit for the removal of sand, gravel, stone or other earth products shall be granted by the Selectmen under the Removal of Gravel Ordinance of 1972, as amended, or otherwise while this ordinance is in effect provided, however, that the existing permits may be renewed according to the ordinance of 1972, as amended.

The motion was seconded by Nancy Bjorkgren. The vote on the motion to reconsider was negative.

ARTICLE 60. To see what action the Town will take with respect to the Capital Budget Committee.

Malcolm C. Purington read a report from a committee which the Selectmen appointed and made a motion that a Capital Budget Committee be established to study, in light of current and/or future needs, and make recommendations to the Town regarding any capital expenditure to be made by the Town in excess of One Thousand Dollars. That such Capital Budget Committee be composed of six members whose membership shall initially be appointed by the Selectmen, who shall appoint two members for three years, two members for two years, and two members

for one year. That thereafter, the members of the Committee be replaced by election of two members per year for a term of three years and whose names shall appear on the ballot in compliance with the laws established for other elected officials. That the Committee be authorized to require that the various department heads and Town Officials or individuals suggesting a capital expenditure submit their proposal and statement of need for each capital item, which shall include a statement of the expected longevity of the item, to the Committee prior to December 31, of any calendar year. That the Committee as a whole and/or its individual members shall make such inquiry or investigation as it deems necessary and shall have authority to require such further information from the individual department head or Town Official or individual submitting the proposal as may be necessary to make a determination with reference to the item's impact on the community. That prior to December 31, 1979, and thereafter annually prior to December 31st of each year, all of the various departments and offices of the Town be required to prepare an inventory, in duplicate, of all property owned or leased by the Town which is in their possession or within their control. One copy of such inventory shall be considered a matter of public record to be stored in the Town Office and open to public inspection, and the other copy will be submitted to the Capital Budget Committee prior to its taking any action on any capital expenditure proposed by a department head or Town Official. The motion was seconded.

Neal Kurk moved that this matter be tabled. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Neal Kurk moved that the report read by Mr. Purington be printed in the Town Report next year for consideration next year under an appropriate article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 61. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Martha Knox moved that the Finance Committee shall be made up of twelve members appointed by the Town Moderator. Each member shall be appointed for a three-year term and no member shall serve two consecutive 3 year terms. These twelve appointed members shall, on a yearly basis, elect a chairperson and a secretary from among themselves.

The Finance Committee shall be informed of any article requiring its attention at least 30 days prior to any Town or School District Meeting. In order to allow the Finance Committee sufficient time to evaluate and advise on the upcoming budget, each department supervisor shall be encouraged, in the fourth quarter of each year, to present a budget request for the ensuing year. Further, the Finance Committee shall be notified of any changes in budget proposals prior to any Town or School District Meeting.

It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to:

1. Explain the tax impact of monies raised at each Town or School District Meeting.
2. Review and evaluate warrant articles based on short and long term ramifications and make recommendations pertaining to the same.
3. Withhold recommendations if there is insufficient information.

The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Neal Kurk asked the Town, by a standing vote, to express its appreciation to Mr. Tiffany for his many years of good, solid and , sometimes humerous, service as Town Moderator. The Meeting responded with a standing ovation. Mr. Tiffany expressed his thanks to the meeting.

Earlier in the Meeting, Mr. Tiffany unveiled his gift to the town -- a large-scale replica of the Town Seal painted in permanent egg tempera and framed with the rope that originally hung from the town bell.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The meeting adjourned at 12:02 a.m.

RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

September 20, 1979

The Special Town Meeting of the Town of Weare held in the Weare School Gymnasium on Thursday, September 20, 1979 was called to order by the Moderator, William G. Herman, at 7:50 p.m. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Gordon M. Tiffany.

The Moderator announced that the following people have been appointed to three-year terms on the Finance Committee: George Benham, Jr., Janet Bidwell, Forrest Esenwine and Janice Jenkins. Murray Wood has been appointed to fill the one-year unexpired term of Joseph Lanctot who has resigned.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to suspend the reading of the Warrant. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The Moderator stated that each article would be read as it is taken up.

The Moderator read the court decree signed by Justice Carl O. Randall giving permission for the Special Town Meeting and the return of the Warrant. The Moderator stated this is a legally constituted Special Town Meeting. A ruling was issued by Justice Randall modifying his earlier decision and the decree now states the Meeting is to be held on Thursday, September 20, 1979.

Malcolm C. Purington moved to suspend the rules and take up Articles I, II and III for the purpose of discussion. The motion was seconded and the vote unanimous to suspend the rules.

John J. Killion, Jr. spoke for the Board of Selectmen and stated that under Article I the total cost to the Town will be \$58,000.00. This includes the hookup of the five municipal buildings: the Town Hall, the present town office, the library, the fire station and the old high school. Mr. Killion read a letter recently received from the State stating they are willing to have the Russell and Corsetti properties included in the sewer system. He gave the following breakdown of the total cost of the project:

Contingency	30,000.00

This figure was rounded up to \$850,000.00. Mr. Killion answered questions and then introduced Wesley Brown of Anderson-Nichols who, with the approval of the Meeting, spoke briefly and answered questions of the Meeting.

John E. Palmer, Jr. gave a report of the Sewer Committee which has worked with the Selectmen, Anderson-Nichols and the State agencies during the summer to prepare information to be presented to the Meeting. He asked that the Meeting allow a representative from Anderson-Nichols give this presentation. Robert Hyman voiced his dissent and the Moderator stated the representative of Anderson-Nichols would not be allowed to give the presentation.

It was suggested that the Meeting recess and then the representative from Anderson-Nichols could give the presentation to those who wished to remain during the recess. Robert Hyman moved that the Meeting recess long enough to hear the presentation prepared by Anderson-Nichols. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The Meeting recessed at 8:45 p.m. to hear the presentation of Anderson-Nichols during which time questions were also answered.

The Meeting resumed at 9:30 p.m. to take up Article I.

ARTICLE I. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$850,000.00) for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251, etc.) and will qualify the Town for federal funds, the sum to be raised by issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed One Hundred Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$170,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire RSA 33:1, etc, as amended) and authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grant section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C., § 1251, etc.) and, further, to reappropriate such monies as have heretofore been raised and appropriated for the within purposes. And to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to adopt Article I as read. The motion was seconded by Eldon Townes. The Finance Committee recommended that Article I be accepted with the adoption of an amendment to be presented by the Selectmen under other action on Article I.

James B. Craig moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The Moderator stated that the vote would be taken by written ballot and that the polls would remain open for a period of one hour. He declared the polls open at 9:40 p.m. and the Meeting proceeded to ballot on Article I by written secret ballot.

The Meeting resumed at 10:00 p.m. with the polls remaining open until 10:40 p.m.

Robert Hyman moved that all articles relating to the issuance of bonds be dismissed. The Moderator ruled this motion out of order on the advice of town counsel. Mr. Hyman objected to the ruling and requested that his objection be noted in the record.

Neal Kurk moved that no buildings, or alterations to existing building, begun after September 20, 1979 shall be permitted to connect to or add sewage to the sewage system approved in this article. The motion was seconded. The vote was negative and the motion defeated.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved that the Town shall allocate all original and operating costs attributable to the correction of pollution from non-town owned buildings to the owners of said buildings. Further, that any action of the Town herein shall not be deemed a precedent for the resolution of any future pollution problems in the Town of Weare. The motion was seconded by Janet Snyder.

Robert Hyman moved to amend the motion as follows: that no householder in Weare Center who is not a proven pollutor can be compelled to hook up to any sewer system that is approved. After a short discussion, Mr. Hyman withdrew his amendment.

The vote on Mr. Killion's original motion was affirmative. This was a unanimous vote.

After further discussion, Mr. Hyman moved to reinstate his amendment as a motion, the motion being that no householder in Weare Center who is not a proven pollutor can be compelled to hook up to any sewer system that is approved. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. A request was made for a division vote. The result of the vote: Yes - 39; No - 9. The vote was affirmative.

Charles Toll asked if this would be a valid and binding ordinance. Town Counsel stated that if the Selectmen requested a formal and written opinion from him on this ordinance, he would give an opinion. Malcolm C. Purington stated that the Board of Selectmen would request an opinion from town counsel on this matter.

At 10:40 p.m. the Moderator closed the polls and the Meeting was recessed for the counting of ballots by the Supervisors of the Check List.

The Meeting was called back to order at 10:55 p.m. and the Moderator read the result of the vote: Yes - 108; No - 17. Article I was accepted.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) for the purpose of constructing a , reduced scope, sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C., § 1251, etc.) and qualify the Town for federal funds, the sum to be raised by issuance of serial bonds or notes not to

exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire RSA 33:1, etc., as amended) and authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Weare, and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grant section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C., § 1251, etc.) and, further, to reappropriate such monies as have heretofore been raised and appropriated for the within purposes. And to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to dismiss Article II. The motion was seconded. A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article II was affirmative and the article was dismissed.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00) for the purpose of abating alleged pollution emanating from municipally-owned buildings and for the purpose of assisting residents in the Weare Center area to abate pollution coming from their private residence or other private structures; any funds used for the assistance of private residence or persons shall be recovered by the Town in the form of a betterment assessment pursuant to RSA 252 over a period not to exceed twenty (20) years; further, to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to apply for and expend such grants and aid as may be available to the Town from the United States Government under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C., § 1251, etc.) and the State of New Hampshire and any other public or private source of funds; the sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes is not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire RSA 33:1, etc., as amended) and authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Weare; to authorize the Selectmen to purchase on behalf of the Town of Weare or take by eminent domain on behalf of the Town of Weare such rights-of-way, easements or land area as may be necessary to allow the creation or construction of a neighborhood or community waste treatment area and to do all other acts on behalf of the Town as may be necessary to provide for an individualized program of abatement of the alleged sewerage in Weare Center. Or take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved to dismiss Article III. The motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on Article III was affirmative and the article was dismissed.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the designing of, construction of a sewerage or waste disposal system, for the Town or any part thereof, and authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in New Hampshire RSA 33:7-b, etc., as amended, and to take any other action in relation thereto.

John J. Killion, Jr. moved Article IV be adopted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote was affirmative.

ARTIVLE V. To transact any other business as may lawfully come before the meeting.

Gordon M. Tiffany moved that when this Meeting considers the matter of adjournment, they adjourn by a standing vote of great appreciation and thanks to the Moderator for a job well done. A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. The vote was affirmative and the Meeting responded with a standing vote of thanks to the Moderator. The Meeting adjourned at 11:05 p.m.

CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK
ANNUAL REPORT 1979

Chase Park had a very busy summer this year. There was an increase in both the resident and the non-resident attendance which provided for an increase in income to the Park. However, the increase was offset by increased expenses due mainly to improvements to the Park and labor costs. The improvements included a new drainage system installed in the rest rooms as well as interior painting of the rest rooms. The gate house was given a new roof. Two new picnic sights were prepared which now makes use of all available space in the Park. Brush and tree trimming was completed. Six new concrete picnic tables and benches have been added. Also, lumber has been purchased to replace two of the older boat docks, and plans are underway for improvements to the beach area. General repairs to the buildings and equipment were done as needed. New life rings were purchased and new buoys, to encircle the swimming area, were installed and maintained.

The Park Commission would like to take this opportunity to thank T.A.W. for their contribution of \$200.00 which was used for the purchase of concrete picnic tables and benches.

This year the Park experienced little vandalism. Many thanks to all who used the Park with consideration for others, so that all who wish to may use the Park and enjoy it.

Many group outings were held again this year at the Park. All local groups may use the Park at no charge. Out-of-town groups must pay the regular rate for admission.

Some of the groups using the Park this year included the following: Senior Citizens; many school grades; Fire Department for fireworks; Sugar and Spice Preschool dance; Kendall Hadley outing; P. J. Currier Lumber Company outing; N. H. Bass Fishermen's Association outing; plus other social and civic groups.

The lake water was tested and found safe for swimming and the well water was tested and found safe for drinking. Swimming lessons were held at the Park again this year.

In June, the Park Commission voted to increase the non-resident rate for adult admission to \$1.50 per person per day. This increase went into effect July 1, 1979. In 1980, there will be an increase in the resident rate to \$5.00 per family per year. These increases are due to the additional operation and maintenance expenses to keep the Park up to its high standards. The Commission also voted to appoint a Superintendent to manage the Park operations. Gilbert Bockus was appointed to this position and it is most fortunate that the Park has a person of his capabilities and expertise for this responsibility.

Members of the Park Commission are: Sylvia Brown, Secretary; Dr. Frederick J. Vintinner, Chairman; Jane Munroe, Richard Perkins and Leon Taylor. Bernard Phelps served as maintenance and police officer on weekends and on special occasions, such as Band Concerts. Richard Demers and others served as gate attendants.

WEARE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT
ANNUAL REPORT

The year 1979 began with very stormy, windy and icy weather which proved to be costly for the Highway Department. Then, as usual the mud season came and many roads had to be posted until they could be made passable by hauling in gravel.

Soon dusty roads appeared and they had to be oiled. We were advised that this would be the last year for using oil for the control of dust on the roads.

During the year, we had several projects in addition to the regular road maintenance. Reservoir Drive, from Crosby's Market to the bridge, was completely redone. Slack's Hill was excavated, had drainage put in and was resurfaced. Abijah Bridge was replaced with a new bridge and widened to the State's satisfaction. Hodgdon and Thorndike Roads were patched and sealed so they will last longer.

Work was continued on Mountain Road with T.R.A. funds. In order to complete this project, we will need to put in some underdrain, haul gravel and do some slopping. We replaced Peacock Bridge with a culvert.

Work continued on other roads. Trees and brush were cut on dangerous corners. Tar roads were patched, but there are still many in need of repair. With all the miles of dirt roads in Weare, and all the new families living on them, added attention has been required and is going to continue to be required.

As the winter had only snow flurries, we were able to finish repairs and haul gravel to many roads that needed it.

During the summer, the new Highway Building on Gregg Road was built and was ready for use by September. It is definitely appreciated by all employees.

WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT
ANNUAL REPORT

The department received an average of 44 calls per week during 1979, which represents about a 15% increase over 1978. Again this year, as last year, the largest number of calls were received in June, July and August, when the Town has a large influx of seasonal residents.

A summary of activities for 1979 breaks down as follows:

Crime prevention accounted for approximately 40% of the man-hours spent during the year. Included in this activity is the routine checking of vacant buildings, business establishments after hours and motor vehicle law enforcement. Summonses to court for over 100 motor vehicle violations were issued last year for speed, non-inspection, yellow line, stop sign and defective equipment. In addition, more than 200 warnings for these same violations were issued.

Motor vehicle related activities, in addition to those above, covered by the department which were a result of an officer being called out, accounted for about 25% of the man-hours for the year. This activity included:

- 75 motor vehicle accidents
- 8 motor vehicle violation arrests
- 7 motorist assistance rendered such as out of gas or car trouble
- 82 assist other police departments by serving summonses, subpoenas, and arrest warrants relating to motor vehicle charges
- 48 complaints relating to motor vehicles including speed, excessive noise, DWI, etc.
- 9 DWI complaint investigations resulting in arrests

Criminal related activities accounted for 25% of the man-hours for 1979 also. These included the following items:

The legislature has passed a law requiring that all part time, as well as full time, police officers be certified by the Police Standards and Training Council of the State of New Hampshire. This certification will require attending an approved police training school and/or passing an examination on the subjects taught in the school. All officers who carry firearms and who have the power of arrest will be required to be certified under minimum training standards established by the Police Standards and Training Council.

As the price of the precious metal has skyrocketed during the past few months, the department recommends that all persons take whatever precautions that are necessary to protect these items against unauthorized taking.

As inflation continues to climb, an increasing number of burglaries and thefts are being reported. Report any suspicious activity you notice, and if a vehicle is involved, try to get a description and the registration number. Four subjects were arrested and charged with two burglaries in Weare and several burglaries in surrounding towns as a result of a person making note of the registration number of a suspicious car and subjects. We will treat your information as confidential if you request. Call the police line 529-2323 and leave the information or request an officer to call you back. It's going to take the efforts of everyone to reduce this type of crime.

STATE FOREST FIRE WARDEN & STATE FOREST
FIRE SERVICE REPORT

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charges him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be needed to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipale forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State

bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

In 1979, there were very few brush and grass fires. Less than one acre total burned. The prompt reporting of fires from look-out towers and local residents helped up keep property damage and cost of extinguishing fires low.

For all open burning, a "Permit to Burn" is required from the Warden. Open burning of brush when the ground is completely covered with snow requires no permit. For commercial burning, approval from the N. H. Air Pollution Control Commission and a permit from the Warden are required.

Timber cutting in Weare has left some areas that will be dangerous during the coming forest fire season.

We have added more hose and tools to the forest fire kit.

During 1979, we held nine training sessions and are planning more in 1980. These sessions were on the use of tools, pumps, locating and extinguishing grass and brush fires. We will also be continuing our fire prevention program at the school.

Many thanks to former Warden, Frank Campana, for his countless hours of effort to help make a much safer and fire conscious community.

WEARE CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

Acting upon the authority of Article 46 of the 1978 Town Meeting, the Conservation Commission continued the program of forest management on the 657 acre Town Forest and 163 acre Poor Farm tracts.

The first act was to develop a timber stand selective harvest #3 in the north section of the Town Forest. Forester, Robert Todd, marked approximately 93,000 board feet for selective cutting. Seven bids were received with prices ranging from a low of \$35.00 per thousand board feet to a high of \$61.50 per thousand board feet. The high bidder was Fitts Logging Corp. of Candia, N. H. This company conformed to all contractual agreements. Contracts were executed on November 2, 1979. The operations and inspection of same was completed January 28, 1980.

A Forest Management Plan for the Weare Poor Farm Tract and the Town Forest Tract has been completed.

Over the next ten years, timber harvests are scheduled with two main objectives. First, to shape and improve the structure of each forest stand in order that increased yields and better quality timber will be available for harvest in the future. Second, to provide a continuous, even flow of timber from the forest to the greatest extent possible.

The Commission's second act under the authority of Article #39 of the 1979 Town Meeting was the planning and development of a list of town owned parcels not currently used for town purposes.

There are 25 town owned parcels, 12 of the parcels are not in use. The size of the tracts range from 3/10 of an acre to 16 acres. The lots in excess of 5 acres were viewed and found to be undesirable from the standpoint of forest management. Usually, this was due to the lack of good quality growing stock and a poor prospect of income from timber harvests. Lack of access is a problem in many cases and the boundaries of some lots are indistinct. It is the opinion of the Commission that the 12 tracts mentioned above, be sold via proper bidding procedure so that the tracts can return to private tax paying owners.

The Commission's third act under the authority of Article #40 of the 1979 Town Meeting was the planning and development of a list of unknown ownership tracts of land by the official tax map.

There are 23 unknown ownership parcels in the town of Weare, ranging in size from 2/10 of an acre to 52 acres. A total of 10 of the larger lots had on ground inspection and most were found to be undesirable from the standpoint of forestry management. Usually, this was due to a dominant amount of wetland, lack of good quality growing stock and poor prospect of income from timber harvest. Also, a lack of access is a problem in many cases and boundaries are indistinct.

It is the opinion of this Commission that all the unknown ownership parcels should be acquired by the Town and then sold via proper bidding procedure so that the tracts can return to known private tax paying owners.

WEARE RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

In 1979, the Weare Rescue Squad responded to 140 medical emergencies. Thanks to its members and the people of the town, we were able to respond to these calls in a new rescue van. This vehicle was put into service last February. We have since updated and equipped it with needed supplies such as a new stretcher, a portable radio, traction splints, bag masks and oxygen equipment. We received numerous memorial gifts plus \$1,166.24 memorial money donations. These gifts enabled the squad to purchase more supplies.

Throughout 1979, we held many fundraising events such as dances, raffles, etc. The money raised from some of these activities went toward purchasing radios for the squad members. Also, we purchased a Resusci-Anne C.P.R. doll, which we feel will be a great help to Rescue Squad and Fire Department members wishing to use it for practice sessions. This doll is also available for town functions with the discretion of the Rescue Squad.

Around March, 1980, we plan to offer an advanced First-Aid and EMT course in hopes of getting more new members to join the squad. In 1979, our daytime supply of help was limited. In

order to prevent future problems in this area, we need volunteers. Otherwise, we are going to need full time people in the very near future. A special thanks to employers who have let their employees respond to calls during working hours.

WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Florence Wheldon, our dispatcher, answered approximately 385 calls in 1979. We want to give her a special thanks again this year for all her hard and dedicated work.

There were 140 in-town rescue calls, 17 chimney fires, 4 brush fires, 2 dump fires, 2 grass fires, 97 aid or information calls, 25 burning permit calls, 17 building fires, 2 car fires, 15 service calls, 27 wrong number calls, 8 false alarms and 8 calls for the police.

When reporting a fire or rescue, please let the phone ring at least three times.

If you are going to be doing any burning, you must have a permit, unless the ground is completely covered with snow. If you do burn, please call this number (529-2379).

We feel that unless we have a great number of new volunteers soon, we will be in desperate need of a full time person for the department. Last year 57% of all emergency calls were between 7:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. Most of the volunteers work out of town and this puts a very heavy burden on those few who work in town.

It also means they have to take time from their job to respond to these calls. We would like to thank those employers who let their employees leave. We thank them for their patience and understanding with their employees who are on the Rescue Squad and the Fire Department.

Santa made a return visit this year to the firehouse. Over 100 children came to have a chat with Santa. Free photos with Santa were taken and refreshments were served. "Hot Dots" and "C" stickers were available.

The department has six more smoke detectors to give away this year. They were purchased with money from a raffle.

The Farrar Company was awarded the contract to build our new fire truck and we expect completion in mid-summer. This is the same company that built all our other trucks.

We also want to thank the Police Department, the Ladies'

Auxiliary and all others who helped us in the past year.

We want to thank everyone who supported us at last year's Town Meeting. It is very important to maintain our equipment because it is vital to saving lives and property in our town.

FIRE WARDS REPORT

The Board of Fire Wards was elected for office in 1979 for the first time. In past years, they have been appointed by the Selectmen.

This past year, the Fire Wards and the Truck Committee purchased the new fire truck cab and chassis - a 1980 Ford LN-8000 Diesel, which has been delivered. The contract for the body was awarded to Farrar Company, Inc. of Woodville, Massachusetts, with delivery expected in July, 1980. This is the same company that has made the bodies for our fire trucks in the past. Hopefully, the same quality craftsmanship will be given the Town of Weare as in the past.

During the past year, the fire wards have met many times and have worked closely with the Fire Chief. At the present time, our biggest problem is the Rescue Squad - not having enough qualified members on hand to respond and transport at all hours of the day and night. As in most volunteer departments, the people that work in the local area are the ones that are available and leave their jobs to respond to the rescue calls. Each year the rescue calls increase and many of these people cannot afford to give this time from their workday or take the time away from their jobs. The Rescue Squad needs your help in order to continue the excellent response it has been giving the residents of the Town of Weare.

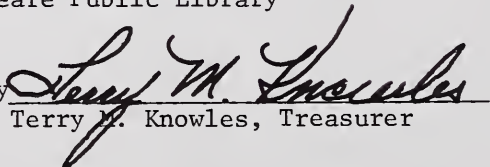

One on April 3, 1979, after the Three Mile Island incident. We were asked to monitor the air in this locality to determine if any radioactivity might have escaped into the atmosphere and come this way. I am happy to report that the readings were zero.

We were asked because we are one of the towns in New Hampshire that is working on being prepared to handle any incident "natural or nuclear" that may jeopardize the health and welfare of our people. This is why it is important that the people of this town help and support the Civil Preparedness Agency.

The other time we were called was in the Spring just before Memorial Day. The call came in on a Saturday afternoon. We were told that silt was coming down the brook destroying the swimming area at the Cold Spring Campground. It was running into the lower area of the Cold Spring brook and possibly doing harm to the fish in the area.

We discovered that the Army Reserves had been clearing a swamp area at the Goffstown Fish and Game Club and the run-off was going into the brook. After a few telephone calls, we found out who was in charge and on Sunday the Reserve Unit repaired the problem.

This to me is what Civil Preparedness in this town is for. It is to help people of Weare when there is no place else to turn.

WEARE COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT 1979

The Community Nursing Service provided 380 home visits in 1979. Nursing services included change of dressings, baths, hot packs, blood pressures, exercises and specific medications. Blood pressure measurements were provided for the Senior Citizen organization. Transportation of persons to and from doctors' offices was provided as needed. In cooperation with the "Women, Infants and Children" (W.I.C.), program clinics were held. This program provides for supplemental food for children under 5 years of age. Vouchers are issued for the purchase of baby formula, infant cereals, juices, milk, cheese, etc. Also, at these clinics, clothing for both adults and children were available without cost. The clothing was donated by the people of Weare. Two hospital beds, walkers, crutches and health education publications are available for use by the people.

The Board of Directors are: Dr. Richard Backus, Jan Bidwell, Ann Colburn R.N., (secretary) Harold Hall (selectman) and Dr. Fred Vintinner (Chairman). The Community Nurse is Evelyn Reade, R.N.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Weare qualified to vote in District affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE WEARE SCHOOL GYMNASIUM IN SAID DISTRICT ON WEDNESDAY, THE FIFTH DAY OF MARCH, 1980, AT SEVEN-THIRTY IN THE EVENING, TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

1. To see if the District will determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the District.

2. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

3. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$8,105 for the purchase of cafeteria tables, student desks/chairs, teachers' desks/chairs and entrance mats.

4. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$56,000 for construction of a two classroom addition including furnishings and equipment, architectural and other fees, site development and other items incidental to and necessary for such construction, and to raise said sum by the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the School District in accordance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, the time and place of payment of interest, the rate of interest, provision for the sale of notes and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith, to be left to the discretion of the School Board.

5. To see if the District will vote to purchase two portable elementary classrooms at a cost not to exceed \$32,500 and to raise said sum by the issuance of notes or bonds upon terms and conditions as determined by the School Board or take any other action in relation thereto.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$12,360 for deficit spending for the 1979-80 school year.

8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the state of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said government funds constitute full reimbursement, or take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see if the District will vote to create a cooperative school district planning committee of three (3) voters, one of which will be a board member, and two others selected by the board to work with similar committees appointed in neighboring school district to study the feasibility of forming a cooperative school district in accordance with RSA Chapter 195 as amended by laws of 1955, Chapter 334; and to prepare a report to be presented to the voters at either a special meeting or at the next annual school district meeting.

10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$6,000 for site improvement, or take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the District will raise and appropriate Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) for repairs of ceiling - foyer (gym), seamless floors (elementary bathroom) and general repairs.

12. To see if the District will vote to provide for the hiring of ten part-time aides, at minimum wage, to work bus duty, recess duty, lunch duty, and to assist in the libraries of the Weare Schools. (Submitted by petition)

13. To see if the District will vote to restore the money cut from the shop budget by the School Board. (Submitted by petition)

14. To see if the District will vote to provide for Weare High School to be a "Comprehensive" High School by New Hampshire State Standards by June 1, 1981. (Submitted by petition)

15. To see if the District will vote to provide the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the purpose of hiring a part-time grant writer who will seek alternative funding sources for the Weare Schools, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Submitted by petition)

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE WEARE SCHOOL GYMNASIUM IN SAID DISTRICT ON WEDNESDAY, THE SEVENTH DAY OF MARCH, 1979, AT SEVEN-THIRTY IN THE EVENING, TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

1. To see if the District will determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the District.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
4. 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ANNUAL MEETING OF
THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT
March 7, 1979

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m., by Neal Kurk, Moderator, in the Weare School Gym.

Mr. Kurk led those present in a salute to the Flag.

Town legal counsel, Mr. Hatfield, addressed the problem of the proposed budget not being posted on time and suggested two alternatives: (1) cancel this meeting and schedule another, or (2) continue with the meeting and then ask the Legislature to legalize the meeting. Nancy Taylor moved to continue with the meeting and immediately, in conjunction, file a petition with the Legislature to legalize the meeting. Thomas Clow seconded the motion. YEAS: 56 NAYS: 12 MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Kurk announced that the guiding manual for the meeting will be Roberts' Rules of Order Revised.

Nancy Taylor introduced the new Principal, Mr. Richard Finlaw, who gave a brief report of his plans for the school.

Mr. Kurk asked for a motion to dispense with the reading of the entire Warrant -- each Article to be read individually as it is taken up. This was duly moved and seconded. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 1. Nancy Taylor moved that the salaries of the School Board and other elected officers be determined as set forth in the Series 100 of the printed budget. Thomas Clow seconded the motion. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 2. Nancy Brennan moved that we dismiss this Article. This was duly seconded. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 3. Nancy Brennan moved that we appoint the town auditors as School District auditors. This was duly seconded. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 4. Thomas Clow moved that the District vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the state of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said government funds constitute full reimbursement. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 5. Thomas Clow moved that this Article be dismissed. Nancy Brennan seconded the motion. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 6. Frank Farmer moved to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$4,708 to repair the shower room floors. Nancy Taylor seconded the motion. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 7. Mr. Rheinheimer moved that the District vote to authorize parents/custodians to educate their own children at home in lieu of enrolling them in state-approved public or private schools, subject to the supervision and evaluation of the children's educational progress by the District, and the Weare School Board is directed to develop and promulgate no later than June 30, 1979, rules and regulations to implement this policy. The District will provide such parents/custodians without charge educational materials normally used by the District. Ruth Jones seconded. Mr. Arnold Rocklin-Weare raised the question of the legality of the motion. Town counsel, Mr. Hatfield, answered that the motion was legal except for the last sentence ("The District will provide such parents/custodians, without charge, educational materials normally used by the District.") More discussion followed. Thomas Clow stated that the School Board is unanimously opposed to the Article as printed. Helene Kurk motioned to amend the article by deleting the last sentence. Mr. Rheinheimer seconded and the motion was carried. The Article, as amended, was then voted on. NOT CARRIED.

ARTICLE 8. Frank Farmer moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,500 for excavation near the gymnasium. Paul Knox seconded the motion. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE 9. Nancy Taylor moved that the District raise and appropriate \$835,917 for the support of schools, for the payment of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. Paul Knox seconded the motion. A detailed review of the proposed budget followed, presented by members of the School Board. Mr. Stafford presented the Finance Committee's recommendation that the total of Instruction Salaries be reduced from \$396,556 to \$382,056. Discussion followed. No action was taken to reduce the total of the Instruction Salaries portion of the budget. There was no discussion of any other item in the budget. Frank Farmer then made a motion to stop debate and vote on Article 9. June Purington seconded and it was voted to accept the 1979-80 proposed School District Budget.

Helene Kurk moved to raise \$12,000 to be appropriated for the sole purpose of hiring a specially selected and qualified teacher for gifted children in grades 1 through 8. Discussion followed including a question on whether it was the legal obligation of the District to provide for the needs of gifted children as well as handicapped children. Mr. Hatfield stated that there was no clear answer to this, although one interpretation of the law could include gifted children. After some further debate, Marjorie Eaton moved that debate be stopped and this motion was duly seconded. The original motion was put to a vote. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

ARTICLE 10. Mr. Rheinheimer moved that the Moderator appoint a committee of 8 town citizens, to include members of the School Board, the School Principal and interested parents, to examine various questions surrounding the issue of home education of children and make a recommendation to the town at the next School District Meeting. Mrs. Kurk seconded the motion. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Mr. Rocklin-Weare moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion was duly seconded. MOTION CARRIED.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:35 p.m.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS
OF WEARE

I herewith submit my 1979 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

Like everything else, the cost of education nationally has risen considerably over the past few years. Because of this rise in the cost of educating a youngster in Weare, I would like to take this opportunity to explain some of the causes that are involved in this increase. Although most of the following statements are in general terms, I earnestly hope that they will provide for you an insight into the financial situations that Weare School District confronts.

In the past, we have generally equated increasing costs with increased enrollments. The pupils new to the school system have carried the brunt of the rationale for budget increases. Although a new increase in enrollment does contribute to the increase, it does not represent the sole reason. The finances of the public school system are more complex than a single, oversimplified response such as increase in enrollment.

Schools, like the rest of us, have felt OPEC's squeeze on oil that has driven prices to a level undreamed of a few years back. The budgetary implications have been staggering as our energy cost has soared. Transportation is not unaffected by the oil crunch; it too has escalated.

New environmental protection laws and a slow-growth national economic policy are affecting school costs. For example, despite constantly increasing demand, paper manufacturers are reluctant to invest in the construction of new plants because borrowing costs are high and environmental regulations make it difficult to get approval of building locations. Companies that produce paper for textbooks, workbooks, and notebooks are operating at or near capacity, and future demands will cause a paper shortage that will inevitably lead to higher prices for these classroom staples.

Inflation is a nasty word that has hung around for some time and now has overstayed its welcome. Although inflation has been around for some time its devastating effects have been intensified in the past few years. The median price of a new home in this country has risen from \$45,000 in 1975, to \$57,000 in 1977, and it is projected to reach \$70,000 by 1980. In recent years, clothing prices have risen about 5% annually; property taxes, 8 to 10%; electricity, about 7½%; and natural gas 13%. Even dining out in a restaurant costs us more each year - about 7½% more. From 1967 through 1978, prices more than doubled. All of this means that a family of 4 earning \$10,000 in 1967 needed over \$20,000 in 1978 just "to stay even." The price of your morning orange juice rose 42% in one year. The chocolate bar packed in a child's school lunchbox jumped 31%.

Educational programs have increased considerably under mandates from Federal and State regulations. For example, Public Law 94-142, known as "The Handicapped Law," requires school districts to provide a total educational service program for "special needs" children. This has resulted in dramatic improvements in education for an extremely disadvantaged group of young people - but the program has a dramatic price tag, too.

There are other demands - demands for new curriculum offerings to keep pace with our changing society. Career education is an example; the accountability movement also has a price tag. The testing factor involved in the program alone can be startling.

As you can see our educational system is confronted with costs that are beyond its control: energy costs, supplies, inflation and mandated programs. However, you can be assured that we struggle constantly with the Board of Education to control this soaring cost as much as possible. We seek the lowest bidder and least expensive product; we insulate buildings to save energy; we cut back thermostat settings; we control and eliminate programs without jeopardizing the quality of education. We cringe to see our costs inflate, but we do not bend in our efforts to control and to reduce wherever we can.

WEARE ELEMENTARY AND HIGH SCHOOLS

Weare School District experienced unprecedented growth this past academic year. June 1979 saw 542 children leave school and September 1979 saw 539 return. Not stopping there, at the writing of this report in December, our school population numbered 605 with the majority of the new students concentrated at the elementary grade levels. We anxiously anticipate the coming year. . .

This anticipated growth as well as the need and desire to strengthen existing programs brought several changes to the entire school. These changes occurred in the areas of curriculum, faculty, pupil personnel, and special education.

In the area of curriculum the elementary grades adopted and implemented the AIRS (Andover Individualized Reading System) through an adaptive/adoptive grant written by Mrs. Saunders (grade 1) and Miss Vasil (grade 2). The entire elementary faculty attended a week long workshop during the summer prior to the placement of the program in the school. AIRS is a program involving a total approach to the teaching of language arts through the integration of grammar, phonics, spelling, and oral/written communications skills. The curriculum is highly structured and builds on a skills continuum so that students move through the 9 levels upon skill mastery. The language arts curriculum was further strengthened at the junior/senior high school level

with the adoption of a new basic grammar program. Throughout, it has been the goal of the school to implement a language arts curriculum which is built around a skills continuum and competency skills. There were also some changes within the social studies curriculum with the adoption of several new tests and the inclusion of a required course for all students in United States Government.

Aside from faculty turnover, there were several new positions added to the existing staff. At the elementary level, growth in student numbers required that an additional teacher be added to the 3rd grade. Also due to increased numbers and the desire to provide the children a stronger primary program, two paraprofessionals were added to grades 1 and 2. With the resignation of Mrs. Perrigo, our reading teacher for many years, and an individual we will miss greatly, Mrs. Wechsler became the reading teacher for grades 1 through 6. At the junior-senior high school level there were two new positions created in the areas of business/math and social studies/English. This not only increased the course offerings, but assisted in reducing class sizes to a more workable student-teacher ratio. Mrs. Conda became involved on a full-time basis with the special needs program as both teacher and coordinator. At the administrative level, Mr. Lockwood, became involved full-time as the assistant principal relinquishing his teaching duties of the previous year. Mrs. LaMarche was also added at the administrative level as a secretary to the elementary grades, health services, special education, and guidance.

Pupil personnel was also strengthened with the development and implementation of the Student/Faculty Advisor Program. This provides all high school students with a personal counselor and faculty contact who can assist them with academic as well as personnel concerns. The program was developed through the office of the guidance counselor, Mr. Heavy, and Mr. Vines, a social studies teacher. Each teacher and administrator works directly with seven to nine students. The discipline program is now in its second phase with the incorporation of the merit/demerit system. Under this program the majority of school rules have been tied to a specified number of demerits with the number of demerits determining the severity of discipline. Students also have the opportunity to reduce their demerits by earning merits through improved grades and school related service projects. The program is student based with the responsibility for a student's behavior directly on the student. The primary work in the development of this program was done by the assistant principal.

Special Education in Weare has received, as it has throughout the state and nation, special attention this past year. Compliance with federally mandated guidelines such as 94-142 and the 504 codes has required the rapid development and implementation of special education programs at all levels designed to meet the identified needs of specific students. Aside from the school CORE Team, a diagnostic-prescriptive team works directly with the school on a regular basis from the SAU Office. This team works with students, faculty and parents to assist in the proper programming and placement of children identified as having special educational needs. In-school programs are coordinated and managed by the special education teachers and classroom

teachers as the child's program requires. Title I, with two aides, also provides support to the teacher and student by working with specific students in the basic skill areas.

Work has also been done in the area of industrial arts and vocational education. Mr. Parkinson, the industrial arts teacher has expanded the program to include metals, welding, and small engine repair. He has written a grant which has been accepted to develop a class in solar energy through the building of a solar collector. Mr. Pierson, a mathematics instructor, is acting as coordinator of the vocational program for the school and works directly with Concord School District to increase our school's involvement in that district's new facility and program.

There has been renewed interest in a parent group. Calling themselves AWARE, this group is composed of parents, community members, and faculty working towards a common interest of improving the educational program. Mrs. Picollo, our volunteer coordinator has done a fine job of involving community in the school as a "helping hand" to teachers and students. Our thanks to them for their efforts well done!

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the administrators, teachers, school board, and citizens of Weare. Without the assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued education.

A standard 15-hour CPR course was offered in the fall. Eleven faculty members and employees completed the course and obtained one year certification.

Routine physical exams with required lab work were given to all school cafeteria personnel. T.B. Tine tests were once again made available to all personnel as was routine blood pressure checks.

A dental program was offered to all elementary and Junior High students with a total of 188 children participating. Miss Diane Bertrand, our dental hygienist, was available from October to December for cleanings, dental checks, fluoride treatments and individual instruction for each of these children.

In the health teaching area, the N. H. Lung Association visited our school and presented a film and puppet show entitled "Octopuff" which illustrated the dangers of smoking. This program included children from grades one through four. A program of classroom instruction was also conducted in the fifth grade on this subject. The fifth and sixth grades were also presented with a program on adolescence. In May, Smokey the Bear visited the elementary school and presented a program on fire safety to grades one through three. Various classroom programs with films on drugs, alcohol, and venereal disease were also included in the junior & senior high curriculum.

As part of the second grade health program, the children were taken on a field trip in June to the Children's Science Museum in Nashua and then out to lunch at MacDonalDs. Monies for these trips are raised entirely through community organizations for the benefit of our children's growth in the area of health education.

The Weare Community Nursing Service also generously voted to donate \$325 for the purchase of new health books. We do not, at this time, have a specific health series in our schools. With this donation we were able to purchase texts that will be used primarily in the fifth, sixth grades. Hopefully, we will be able to add on in future years so that each grade will have a series to share thereby providing continuity to the elementary school health program.

A vision/hearing clinic sponsored by the Sugar & Spice Kindergarten was held on May 16th at the Town Hall. A total of 67 children participated, 47 of which were screened for the first grade students. Thirty-seven children participated.

School physical examinations totaled 110 during this school year and were done in August, October, and November. Thirty-three fourth graders were examined, the remainder for athletics and drivers education.
