WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of the Selectmen and other Town Officers.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town maintenance.
 - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (c) Oiling Town roads.
 - (d) General expense of highway department.
5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$492.30 for Class V road construction.
6. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for public welfare.
 - (a) Town poor.
 - (b) Old Age Assistance.
7. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.

8. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for Patriotic purposes.

(a) Old Home Day.

(b) Memorial Day.

9. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to complete the construction of the Hy-Mar Fire House and provide for the maintenance of same.

(a) To raise and appropriate the sum necessary to support the Hy-Mar Fire Company.

10. To raise and appropriate the sum necessary to erect a building to house the tractor snowplow.

11. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the Town by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1947, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new snow removal equipment.

13. (a) To see if the town will vote to build a combination town-hall and schoolhouse.

(b) To see what action the town will vote to take to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town, by issuance of long term notes, a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00 for the purpose of adding to the money now available for future town buildings.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to making plans for a combination Town and Schoolhouse.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept a Trust Fund for the amount of \$100.00 from the Ada F. Clough estate.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1 1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in connection with the State's program for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust.

18. To approve or disapprove of the construction by the United States of a certain section of new highway beginning at a point on the Province Road, so-called, approximately 500 feet southerly of the Webster-Salisbury town line and thence extending approximately one mile westerly and northerly to the Webster-Salisbury town line and continuing northerly through Salisbury to Prince's Mills, all as more particularly shown on a certain plan of the U. S. Engineer Department entitled "Plan of Proposed Highway Relocation in Towns of Webster and Salisbury, Blackwater Reservoir, New Hampshire".

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SELECTMEN

The year 1946 was our first fiscal year following the end of World War II. Our returning Veterans have in many cases resumed their former activities or have returned to college to complete their education, interrupted by their years in the service. Each Veteran was given a reception at the Grange Hall following his return or discharge from the service.

At the Annual Meeting in March, town and school appropriations were routine in nature, with a special appropriation to erect a building to house the new fire truck presented to the town by Mr. Clarence E. Hyde.

Early in the year a piece of land was bought on Corser Hill and work started on the building, but due to severe shortages in building materials it has not yet been completed, although the truck was moved in about November 1st, and a heating system installed.

A series of meetings were held to organize a fire company by a group of interested citizens with the Selectmen. An appointed committee drew up a set of by-laws which were adopted, and a volunteer company formed to be known as "THE HY-MAR FIRE COMPANY".

About two miles of road was rebuilt in the White Plains District and Lake Winnepocket Road by the use of T.R.A. Funds and through the financial assistance of Mr. Clarence E. Hyde a bridge was widened and the Lake Road was improved and oiled. In our opinion more money should be raised to resurface and oil such roads as have been widened and graveled during recent years.

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

PREVENT FIRES — IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the

fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

Two of the more important problems of the district which should come up for consideration are:

1. Advancement of teachers' salaries.
2. A new central school building.

The first problem is common to all the districts of the state, in fact it extends all over the United States. The sharp rise in the cost of living and the low salaries of teachers fixed by contract have caught teachers in a position where they are unable even to meet their monthly expenses. In many towns teachers have asked for a bonus or enough additional salary for the year to tide them over so that they can at least meet expenses. Many towns and cities have already responded to this request by voting at special meetings sums of \$200. to \$400. for each teacher. Other districts have waited until the annual school meeting in March for consideration of this matter. We believe that unless a very substantial increase is made in teachers' salaries, it will be very difficult for the small districts having schools of more than two grades to secure teachers for next year. Only about forty elementary teachers will be graduated from the Teachers' Colleges in New Hampshire in June, 1947. It is expected that these beginners will receive salaries of at least \$1700. Some are already signed up for next year. The district which offers the best salaries will get the best teachers.

We are aware that in many districts the property tax is already high and that any substantial addition will become unbearable. This situation may be avoided if the Legislature votes a substantial amount of money for state aid to all districts as outlined in Commissioner Fuller's recently announced plan. We hope that every school board member and every citizen who is interested in the advancement of education in his district will do everything possible to secure the passing by the Legislature of this plan or one quite similar to it.

2. In order to secure better educational advantages for their children adjoining districts in some parts of the state

are considering the possibility of pooling their resources and uniting in a larger school unit. Two or three districts of this supervisory union where a new building is needed and schools are scattered might well consider the same plan. By this means four or five hundred elementary pupils and three hundred high school pupils could be brought together. No more teachers would be required than at present, but elementary teachers, instead of having one or more grades as now, would have only a section of a grade.

Much more and better equipment could be provided, more and better courses offered. Such a plan has many advantages. One of the difficulties is the convenient location of the school plant so that all districts included are well served. However, it is possible to overcome all such difficulties. The plan is already in effect in large sections of the United States. The need for a new building for this district continues and becomes more acute. Some action should be taken to secure better school opportunities for the children of this district.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

WEBSTER, N. H.

1945-1946

During the school year the physician's examination, diphtheria immunization and Tuberculin Patch Test were given by Dr. Putnam assisted by the nurse.

Various clinics were attended and pupils received treatment as follows:

- 1 Orthopedic for correction of deformity
- 5 Optical—all received glasses
- 7 Diphtheria Immunization
- 22 Dental—all emergency work was completed
- 50 Tuberculin Patch Test—2 slight reactions
- 2 Tuberculin Clinic in Manchester for X-Rays—both had negative reports following this examination.

There were 18 cases of measles, 4 cases of scarlet fever and many cases of throat infection of varied degrees. One pupil was hospitalized for treatment for Trench Mouth.

The Audiometer was used and after re-testing 14 pupils no defects were noted.

Health conditions in general seem much improved.

Appreciation is extended to those whose help with cars for transporting pupils, kindly cooperation and offering homes for necessary activities made possible the amount of work done this year.

Time devoted to school work—151 hours.
