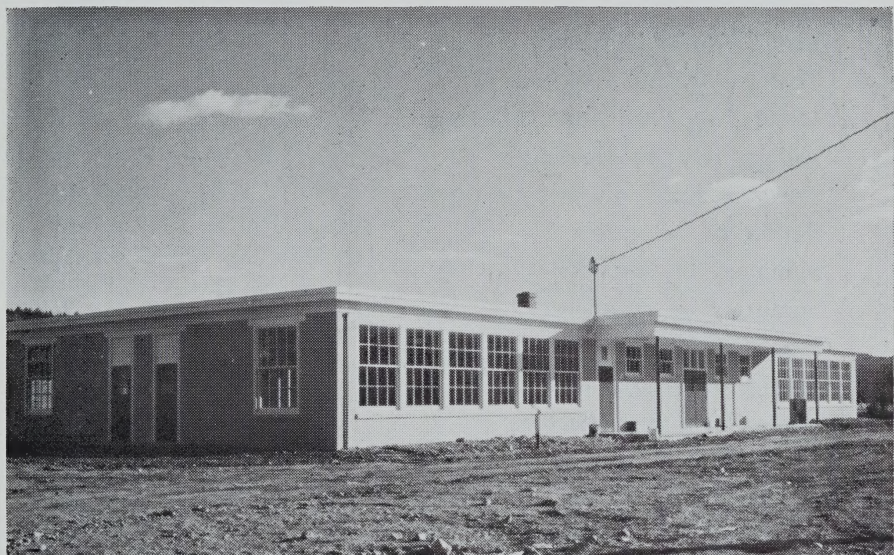

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee under the authority of the municipal budget act. (This budget may be considered item by item or as a whole but may not be increased more than ten percent in any item as a whole).

4. To hear the reports of agents and auditors and take any action thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class VI roads or take any other action relating thereto to raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV and Class V roads; construction, reconstruction or betterment aid and raise and appropriate the sum of \$696.82 which is 15% of the State apportionment, and the State contributing \$4,645.44.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.

*8. To see if the Town will vote to have the New Hampshire State Tax Commission reassess the Town's taxable Real Estate under the Tax Commissioners' reappraisal program and

to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,375.00 for the reappraisal program.

*9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$347.50 for filing equipment and supplies to enable the Town Clerk to comply with the new uniform Commercial Code Law adopted by the 1959 New Hampshire Legislature and effective July 1, 1961.

*10. To see if the Town will permit the use of the Town Hall for basketball providing the supervision and the sponsoring committee or organization meets with the approval of the Selectmen. It is also understood that if in the opinion of the Selectmen unacceptable damage is done to the building the privilege will be rescinded.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$114.00 (1/100 of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

*12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used to dredge and widen Mill Brook in East Westmoreland.

*13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) to buy single chairs for use in the Town Hall.

*14. To see what action the Town will take relative to changing the hours of Town meeting so that said meeting would be held in the evening or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$592.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.

*16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one Road Agent for the entire Town or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Fund.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Library.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the upkeep of the cemeteries.

*20. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars the Butterfield Hill Road so called, starting at the residence of Donald Hale to the residence of Abbot Royea.

21. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The meeting was called to order at 9:20 o'clock A. M. by the Moderator, Paul D. King, who read the Warrant. It was moved, seconded and carried that Articles #1 and #2A would remain open for the duration of the meeting. The Moderator then declared the polls open. The polls were declared closed at 6:55 P. M. by the Moderator.

It was moved, seconded and carried that Articles #2 and #3 be taken up together, item by item.

It was then voted to raise and appropriate the following sums:

Article #4. It was voted to accept the reports of Agents and Auditors.

Article #6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Elliott Community Hospital and is included in the appropriation for the Health Department.

Article #6. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class VI roads.

Article #7. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$705.00 for construction, reconstruction or betterment aid for Class IV and Class V roads.

Article #8. The sum of \$7,900.00 was voted under Articles #2 and #3 for summer maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article #9. After some discussion, Mr. A. F. Hudson moved that no action be taken on this Article. On a voice vote his motion was defeated. Mr. D. A. Paine then moved that the road be closed subject to gates and bars. This motion was approved by voice vote.

Article 10. It was voted that the income from the Jotham Lord Fund be used for the support of the library.

Article #11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the library.

Article #12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the upkeep of the cemeteries.

Article #13. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$97.00 for the Monadnock Regional Association.

Article #14. No other business was brought up under this Article.

Note: In considering the item of Town Construction — \$800.00 in “Purposes of Expenditures” under Article #3, Mr. Carl Messer moved that this money be “earmarked” for an approach to the new school house — if and when built. This motion was seconded and carried by a voice vote.

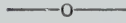

To the inhabitants of the school district of the Town of Westmoreland qualified to vote in district affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said district, on the 18th day of March, 1961 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary school district officers for the ensuing year. The polls will be open from 2:00 P. M. to 7:00 P. M.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officers, and pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

6. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.

7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Walpole School District.

8. To see what action the school district wishes to take in regard to the Village School and East School Buildings.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred and fifty (\$850.00) for the purpose of engaging the services of the firm of educational consultants,

Engelhardt, Engelhardt and Leggett to make a complete study of the Westmoreland school system.

10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

11. To see what action the district wishes to take in regard to balance in the building fund.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SCHOOL MEETING

March 12, 1960

Agreeable to the warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, John Terry, at 2 P. M. The warrant was read and the following articles were acted upon.

Article 1 through Article 4. Mrs. Kirk Aldrich made the motion which was seconded and voted, that these articles be held open until the polls closed at 7 P. M.

Article. 5. Mrs. Amos Hatt made the motion which was seconded and voted that we come back to Article 5, 6, and 7.

Thomas Barrett made the motion which was seconded and voted that Articles 8, 9, and 10, be taken up individually.

Article 8. Cameron Paine made the motion which was seconded and voted that the district authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

Article 9. The motion was made, seconded and voted to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Keene School District.

Article 10. The motion was made by Thomas Barrett, seconded and voted, to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Walpole School District.

Article 11. Robert Moore, Jr. made the motion, which was seconded and voted, that the district vote to accept the services of a helping teacher for supervisory union #60, in accordance with RSA 186:11, XXIII, as amended by Laws of 1957, 252:1, and RSA 189:44 and 47.

Article 5. Robert Moore, Jr. made the motion which was seconded and voted that the district vote to raise and appropriate \$72,000 for the purpose of erecting in that part of town known as the South Village, a new elementary school and furnish and equip the same, and the grading of the lot, and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; to accept and use such funds of the district as are now available; and gifts which may be received to reduce the

amount of the appropriation; and that the district vote to raise such sum through the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and the time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, and any amendments thereto.

A ballot vote of 2/3 is needed to carry.

Ballot clerks appointed to assist in counting the ballots were Bertha Staples, Gertrude Makinen, and Royal McGirr.

157 votes were cast. 109 Yes. 48 No.

(Needed to carry - 105) Motion carried.

Article 6. Carl Barrett made the motion which was seconded that the district authorize the school board to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper, and advisable in connection with the construction of the new elementary school and for the purchase and furnishings for same or to take any action thereon.

Lawrence Russell made the motion which was seconded that the motion be amended to include the words "together with the selectmen and building committee" following "school board."

The motion that was made seconded and voted was that the district vote to authorize the school board, together with selectmen and building committee, to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper, and advisable, in connection with the construction of the new elementary school and for the purchase and furnishings for same or to take any action thereon.

Article 7. Robert Moore, Jr. made the motion which was seconded and voted that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$66,943.50 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectment the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Carl Barrett made the motion to amend this article - "in addition to the \$72,000, voted under article 5." Mr. Barrett withdrew the amendment as both sums were included in the school budget, and both were approved by the budget committee.

Article 12. Robert Moore, Jr. made the motion which was seconded and voted that the school board be instructed to meet with other towns of area and bring in information regarding the co-operative high school plan.

Meeting was adjourned at 7 P. M. and the polls closed.

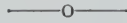

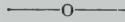

The following is my report for the Year Ending June 30, 1960:

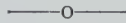
- 146 pupils had vision tests given by the school nurse
- 4 pupils received vision notices
- 68 pupils had hearing tests given by the school nurse
- 139 pupils were weighed and measured by the school nurse
- 145 pupils were inspected by the school nurse
- 22 pupils were in need of dental care
- 16 pupils attended pre-registration clinic
- 100 pupils attended polio clinics
- 16 pupils were checked for smallpox vaccination and necessary follow-up done
- 117 pupils were instructed in dental health

Within our school health program we attempt to attain health improvement of each individual within the group. No two children are exactly alike, each child has distinctive characteristics and special needs. Today we have better understanding of nutrition, new methods of instruction, materials for instruction are more plentiful, interest in mental health has a deserved prominence, school environment is improving in most areas, and with continued cooperation and interest a child's total development will benefit from the school health program.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank you all for cooperating with the school nurse, Mrs. Damon during my leave of absence.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS



To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

The completion and use of a new six-room elementary school is an accomplishment for which the School District of Westmoreland is to be congratulated. The community should be proud of its school board members who have given unthinkingly of their time and made it possible through their efforts for the community to have a building at a cost far below the usual figure. The time and effort given by citizens and the many gifts that will improve the educational program deserve the thanks of all members of the community and especially the pupils who are the direct beneficiaries.

During the 1959-60 school year there were several joint meetings of the school boards of Alstead, Acworth, Marlow, Langdon, Walpole and Westmoreland for the purpose of discussing the Possibilities of forming a cooperative district. This year the school boards of Gilsum and Surry have also attended the meetings.

Interest last year was directed toward the formation of a grade 7-12 cooperative. However, information presented by Superintendent Keach and Mr. Russell, from the State Department of Education, indicated that a grade 1-12 cooperative would be more beneficial than the 7-12 cooperative.

Considerably more study is needed to gather factual material that is needed by the school boards of each community in order that they may have information to aid them in making their recommendations and also to aid the citizens of each district in their decision as to what is the best educational pattern to follow.

Each board is planning to include an article in the school district warrant that gives the opportunity for the district to decide whether or not to take part in an educational survey.

An educational survey will cover every major aspect of the school situation in each town including an analysis of existing

facilities, forecasts of future enrollments, study of the educational needs, suggested curriculum offerings, a review of the advantages of establishing a cooperative school district, and an analysis of the financial problems and tax implications of a cooperative system versus continuing as a separate unit.

Three of the school districts mentioned above send their high school pupils to Keene as tuition pupils. It would appear that these communities should have available alternate plans in the event that Keene decides to discontinue their present policy of taking tuition pupils from surrounding communities.

I strongly recommend that each district vote to take part in this educational survey. A district may decide not to follow the recommendations, however, the decision can be made on the basis of factual information.

Westmoreland teachers plan to take part in a Supervisory Union workshop to be held August 30, 31 and September 1st at the Walpole High School. It is planned to study methods of improving teaching techniques in Science, Arithmetic and Reading with the help of outstanding consultants in each field.

The workshop is in addition to the 180 day school year for pupils as is the day allowed in the schedule for the annual teacher convention in October.

Five Hundred Dollars has been carried over since 1957 under the item "Reserved for Special Purposes." This is in accordance with a motion voted at the March 9, 1957 School District Meeting.

This year the State Tax Commission utilized the \$500.00 to reduce the amount of money to be raised by taxation for the school year 1959-60.

A letter was sent to Commissioner Chandler that quoted the action taken at the March, 1957 School District Meeting and requesting the restoration of the amount taken from the balance. Mr. Chandler's reply was to the effect that it was too late to remedy the situation.

Mrs. Jane Harris replaced Mrs. Dorothy Wilson as teacher of Grades Two and Three. Mrs. Juliana Hooper replaced Mrs. Sandra Whippie as teacher of Grades Three and Four. Mr. Stanley Rice was employed as a new teacher for Grade Seven.

Grade Seven pupils were not sent as tuition pupils to Walpole this year and next year Grade Eight pupils will not go to

Walpole as tuition pupils. That means that high school tuition pupils who plan to attend Walpole High School may find considerable difficulty in getting transportation.
