#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town expenses in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise such sums of money as recommended in the budget.

5. To see how much discount the town will vote to allow on taxes paid on or before September 1st, 1935.

6. To see if the town will vote to change the flow of brook near the residence of Charles W. Clark, provided, that the abutting land owners consent, and make appropriation for the same.

7. To see if the town will vote to install two additional street lights on Pondfield St., so-called, near the residence of Mrs. LaFlamme.

8. To see if the town will vote to install street lights on the Mirror Lake road.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase a tractor and snow plow.

10. To see if the town will vote to extend the Woodstock Water System to the residence of Isabelle MacCormack and make appropriation for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to extend the Woodstock Water System to Maley's Pine Crest Cabins and make appropriation for the same.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### SKI TRAIL REPORT

February 16, 1935.

To the Selectmen of the Town of Woodstock:

At the beginning of the 1934 year the town of Woodstock could boast of two miles of completed, third class, ski trails and  $2\frac{1}{4}$  miles of passable but only partially completed trails; all on Russell Mountain. Since that time the  $2\frac{1}{4}$  mile Russell pond trail has been completed, improvements have been made to the North Trail, and a new novice trail totalling  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles in length has been laid out on Mt. Grandview but to date only about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles has been completed. It is expected that the Forestry Department will complete this trail in the spring and place a steel tower on Mt. Grandview. A new set of stairs has been built on the tower on Russell Mountain. These stairs replace a temporary ladder and makes the ascent to the tower much safer.

The entire tower with the exception of the new stairs has been painted with aluminum paint. The stairs will be painted in the spring.

The Woodstock Outing Club has on hand 100 ski trail markers which are to be used to mark a Cross Country Trail from Woodstock to Elbow Pond, thence down the Jackman Brook trail to the Warren Road. A Cross Country Trail such as this is very desirable in any community for the benefit of our guests who do not care for down mountain running but who wish to ski or snowshoe through the mountains and woods.

Through the efforts of our Secretary, Fred S. Brown, the highway department has supplied us with signs for all our trails which have been put up temporarily due to the fact they were not received until after the ground froze.

Much credit is also due the merchants in the town who gave us our supplies and materials at a much reduced cost.

It will be necessary in 1935 to repair the fireplace on top of Russell Mountain, brush and ditch two of the three trails now built as well as the maintenance in winter which is no small item when a trail is used a great deal.

On February 3, the Outing Club ran a very fine race on the North Trail taking the price of the prizes only from the ski trail account. All other expenses of the competition such as \$20 for stop watches, \$5. for numbers, \$2. for rope, etc., have been paid from the Club treasury.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Woodstock qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the twelfth day of March, 1935, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for a school playground, at North Woodstock.

10. To see if the district will vote to adopt Medical Inspection for the schools and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for High School athletics.

12. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the roof of High School building.

13. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to boys' basement at High School building.

14. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to raise the school walk at High School.

15. To see what sums of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for grading and fencing the school yard at Woodstock Center.

16. To see what action the district will vote to take regarding repair of schoolhouse at the Tannery, so called, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

17. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs at Woodstock Center school house.

18. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to petition the Superior Court to discontinue the Woodstock High School.

19. To see if the district, in the event the Woodstock High School is discontinued, will authorize its School Board to pay high school tuition, or enter into contract to pay such tuition out of high school funds.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Board and Citizens of the Woodstock School District:

I herewith submit my first report as Superintendent of Schools.

The statistical report for the school year ending June 30, 1934 appears with this report. The percent of attendance of 95.57 above the average of the state is highly commendable especially in view of the severe weather last winter. Regular attendance as this shows that parents cooperate to have their children receive the full benefit of instruction and the children acquire the habit of punctuality very important in a successful life.

This year the system of marking shows not only scholarship but also attitudes and habits of children as they appear to the teachers. Parents should examine these closely because they are fully as important as scholarships in the opinion of many. Attentive and industrious children who do passing work are fully as promising as many of more academic ability who are satisfied with mediocre results. Warning cards are sent out two weeks before report cards where children are likely to fail. In this way parents know the conditions at school and can confer with the teacher and urge their children to greater effort. Parents are cordially welcome to talk with teachers and the writer as to the problems of their children.

Tests in the fundamentals of arithmetic have been given this winter and remedial work prescribed. Number by development has been introduced in the first grade arithmetic. The excellent results of this in other systems assures success of the system with these little people.

The report of the Headmaster shows the high school motivating well. The school is approved year after year by the State Board of Education and therefor can certificate to the State University and other higher institutions. The school is a credit to the district. While larger schools can offer more courses the fact that parents can have their children with them while in secondary school is to me a very valuable asset. It appears to me advisable, as soon as finances permit, to introduce manual training in grades 7-10, in order to interest boys who are not adapted to academic work, but have mechanical ability. Some courses in Domestic Arts could well be offered in the same grades.

There are articles in the school warrant to repair high school roof, toilets in boys' basement, raising the side walk, rent of ball field for athletic association, grading at Center school yard and repairs on the Tannery school. With the exception of the appropriation asked for the athletic association these are all immediately necessary. Children should not be required to walk through water in approaching school and there is no economy in permitting buildings to deteriorate for lack of repairs. The indications are that it may cost much more to make the same repairs a year or two from now. The matter of federal grant and loan is worthy of consideration.

Athletics have become an important part of a modern school not only for those actively engaged in it, but the student body and the general public. In small places it is difficult sometimes for the athletic association to finance itself, and it is in my judgment, a fitting and dignified procedure for the district to raise the amount asked for as its benefits are district wide.

Since the last report the North Woodstock building has been painted on the outside and the halls put in first class condition. New stools and a wash bowl have been installed in the girls' toilet. A cupboard for books has been put in the language room and a bed in the dressing room for fainting and other sickness. It is expected that double windows will be in at Woodstock when this report reaches the people of the district. The primary children at the Woodstock school earned money for seven kindergarten chairs for their room. This a fine project and a credit to these little people and their teachers. There appears to be some sentiment for sending pupils to Lincoln for high school education. This matter should be carefully investigated before the district releases the control of its secondary education. A larger school could offer more courses and an enriched curriculum together with more competition. The contract should provide approved courses in manual training and domestic arts.

A Federal adult evening school started in December with an enrollment of 32 and two teachers, but the attendance did not hold up to warrant the continuation after about two months.

I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation to teachers and board for their patience and cooperation in assisting me to familiarize myself with the affairs of the district.

#### **Report of the Headmaster**

Mr. Allan M. McCurdy, Superintendent of Schools, Plymouth, New Hampshire.

I hereby submit my fifth annual report of Woodstock High School.

When school began on September 5, 1934, we had forty-two pupils. Since then two more have enrolled. We have eleven seniors, five juniors, seven sophomores, twenty freshmen, and one special student.

In spite of the adjustments which the depression forced on us I feel we can report progress. The painting of the building and the excellent repairs inside give one this feeling as he comes into our school. Other factors which seem to indicate the same are:

1. An increase of twelve in enrollment over that of 1930.

2. The very few failures which our present seniors have had during their high school experience. 3. The fine records being made by our graduates in post-secondary schools.

4. The fact that those who do not go beyond high school work hard and willingly at anything they get to do, and manage to work most of the time.

Although I do not doubt but what much of this progress is general in other schools, still I feel Woodstock should plan to continue to lead in the building of a better high school.

When we observe the education of the past we see that the quotation from a current magazine, "While our technology is of the airplane variety, much of our social thinking and organization is of the oxcart type" is very true. This year we are giving a new course in psychology and sociology to help the seniors who elect it learn to think out social problems in a technical manner. The text, "Our Changing Social Order" shows many social problems which the students may help to solve.

We are also giving a new commercial course called "Junior Business Training". The content of this course should help pupils to understand better their financial problems.

I have often felt that a small moving picture projector would be a great help to us in guidance work. Most of our pupils do not see enough of the different fields of employment. At the present time educational films aid in History and English courses, and I think many of the films would be interesting to adult groups.

I also wish the school might have a stronger music program.

In closing I would say that we have had our senior play, fall baseball, and are having winter sports. We appreciate all the town has done, especially the appropriation for sports which has helped us to develop better athletics. We hope that each reader as well as the superintendent will accept our sincere thanks.
