Highway agent for the ensuing year,

One cemetery trustee for three years,
One trust fund trustee for three years,
Three auditors for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Third. To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Fourth. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for town officers' salaries.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for election and registration.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Police department expense.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Forest Fire Department.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Volunteer Fire Department.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the Health department, including Vital Statistics.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$2,000.00 for winter roads, \$200.00 for bridges and culverts, and \$500.00 for general expenses of highway department.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for street lights.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$582.06 for Class V roads, (TRA—town's share.)

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the library.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for town poor.

Nineteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 for old age assistance.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Soldiers' Aid.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars' worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners, and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveals the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up the fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on his guard. He should

1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.

2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
 - b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
 - c. Seeing that others comply with the requirements.
 - d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting—that PAYS!

The increase in elementary enrollment is peculiar in that every grade with the exception of grades one and eight show small increases. The possibility that the elementary schools will see a gradual increase for the next five years is borne out by reports of the census bureau. The increase is not however at present anticipated to be high enough to cause any severe problem as concerned housing. It will probably mean however an increased teaching load for teachers of the primary grades in the immediate future and in the upper grades somewhat later.

ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

In last year's report the reasons that teacher replacements were hard to obtain were pointed out. The situation is no different now than then. In face of existing conditions the town has been fortunate to retain the services of experienced teachers. The position at the Village School vacated by the resignation of Mrs. Jensen was filled for the balance of the school year by Mrs. Elizabeth Bartholomew. The schools have been staffed this year by the same group. The only change in teacher personnel came in the position of music teacher. Mrs. Frances Kelley filled the position formerly held by Miss Ruth Napier.

The delays of the previous year in the field of books and scholar supplies were aggravated somewhat over last year. Supplies with the exception of pencils were delivered on time. After a short delay pencils with metal ferules and good erasers were obtained. Supplies used in connection with our reading program were again in short supply and deliveries were so delayed that some interference with the normal progress of pupils was observed. This condition may continue until the paper shortage is over.

Gradually the acquisition of readers and arithmetics is meeting the replacement needs in these fields. Geographies, histories (especially in the lower grades) and spelling books will be replaced or furnished in the near future. No special effort has been made to secure replacements in the social science field because of the danger of obsolescence. The need is not so serious as to occasion undue haste in the selection of books which will be obsolete because of changed world conditions.

The usual program of testing has been followed. The tests administered to the entering pupils are helpful to teachers in recognizing early in the school program those whose special abilities or disabilities require special handling. An effort is being made to provide extensive reading (at all grade levels) in a variety of subjects for those with special abilities or disabilities. Such a program is necessarily slow

for books that provide such opportunities to extend and enlarge the pupils' reading vocabulary can be purchased in small quantities only when the basic needs are met. Over a period of years such a program will result in the accumulation of sufficient variety and quantity of books to make a worth while contribution to the education of your children.

The spring tests results were as usual encouraging in some phases and discouraging in others. Reading, the basic tool subject, is again above the national norm in practically every grade. This result tends to bring the general level of achievement up in all subjects. Individual strengths and weaknesses are a guide to the best procedures to follow if we are to furnish each pupil with the best education possible. The discouraging features are those cases where whole grades have not made a normal year's progress in some subject. This is discounted by the fact that the weaknesses of the previous year have become strengths. Teaching time and effort have stressed previously revealed weaknesses and allowed strengths to develop naturally. This problem is one that always is a source of difficulty. The judicious apportionment of time in relation to subjects is dependent on so many factors that it is not unusual to have results of this nature.

The heating problem at Severance school continues to be a serious one. Several distributors of large space heaters of the oil burning type were contacted and not until the middle of winter could one supply heaters of the required size. Heating contractors were contacted to obtain estimates for a central heater. The need is self evident. The District should consider whether the expense of such an installation is too large to warrant the expenditure in light of the comfort and well being which will be provided for the pupils in attendance.

In addition to the usual cleaning and normal repair program the interior of the Village School was painted. The roof at Severance School needs some attention in the near future. With this exception no outstanding major repair items are anticipated in the near future.

BUDGET

The budget as proposed indicates an increase of \$2,406.34. This is a 19% increase in the gross budget. Two items are responsible for almost \$2,300 of the increase, teachers' salaries and high school tuition. The item of teachers' salaries is increased substantially because of existing conditions. A study of teachers' salaries on a state wide basis revealed that the district should increase this item substantially. Estimated salaries are in accord with the salary levels of towns of similar size and also with the salaries paid in contiguous areas. The item of high school tuition is increased \$1,420. A study of the state average for the past five years indicates the reason for this. The legal liability of the school district is the state average instructional cost. The trend is indicated by the following figures:

An additional factor enters into this estimate. Up to the present year the tuition charge at Manchester has been \$100 a pupil. With the rising cost of instruction this charge was raised to \$114.59. In light of the trend an estimated cost of \$120 per pupil was used in arriving at the budget estimate.

One new item appears in the budget under Statutory Obligations. In the amended Teachers' Retirement law the school district is now an additional contributor to the system. This amount will vary each year in accord with two variables. The assessment is based on a percentage of the annual salary of teachers employed who are members of the retirement system. The percentage may vary from a minimum of 2% to a maximum of 6%. The annual rate is determined by the retirement board.

The total net increase is \$1,945.18. Increased state aid has added to the estimated revenue so that the gross increase

is decreased approximately 16%. There may be an additional increase in this item since state aid is partially based on the amount of teachers' salaries. If however the demand on this equalization fund exceeds the amount set up in the state budget, this anticipated increase in 1947-48 may not materialize.

The future trends in elementary education are not easily predictable. There is a nation wide feeling in lay publications as well as professional that the national health should become of greater concern to all. The role of the schools in a program of physical education which aims at development of all to a higher peak of physical efficiency and well being is important. An extension to the elementary level of a program which aims at the correction of remedial defects and the promotion of the ancient Greek adage *mens sana in corpore sano* (a healthy mind in a healthy body) is a development that may become more and more urgent.

Your school board and teachers are continually striving to make the educational opportunity for your children equal to any district in the state. The cooperative attitude of parents, pupils and townspeople are indicative of the desire on the part of all to provide in the schools the finest possible opportunity for education. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to strive to assist these groups in their endeavor.
