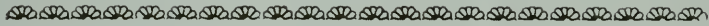

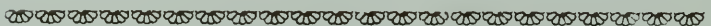

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. As recommended by the Budget.
3. To see if the Town will vote the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy Liability Insurance on Town Labor and pay same out of Highway Department.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following trust fund: Grace Morrison \$200.00 for income care of Colbath Cemetery.

7. To see what action the Town wishes to take towards starting a fund. \$1500.00 as a capital reserve fund to go towards the purchase of a new Tractor.

8. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

## (b) Report of the Superintendent

As I prepare my annual report, I remind myself, as I should like to remind you, that this is a report of YOUR public schools, a vital part of our way of life. They must be maintained at a high level of operation and efficiency if we are to produce the educated, intelligent electorate so essential to the preservation of our democracy. The fact that our area is typical of 80% of our country should show us that we cannot relax and rely on the large centers of population to produce our future leadership.

### 1. Problems and Conditions General to the Union

#### *Teachers:*

Acquiring and maintaining a superior faculty continues to be the most pressing problem. At no time this year have all of the children in this Union been under the direction of regularly assigned teachers. Some students have had as many as four different teachers. Twenty-seven new teachers of fifty-five in the Union were needed for the opening of schools this past fall. Six additional vacancies have occurred during the school year. Three additional teachers were required to meet increased enrollments.

Despite the fact that the average district in this Union raised its teachers an average of four hundred dollars over a year ago, several very fine teachers were lost to schools, both in and out of New Hampshire, paying four to six hundred dollars more than was offered in this area.

The continued inflationary trend has tended to offset this increase which seemed such a forward step a year ago.

The shortage of teachers continues. New Hampshire institutions will graduate 167 teachers in June and, at this time, 197 vacancies are known. Fortunately, teachers do not seek salaries alone. With your help in providing adequate housing facilities, in making teachers feel that they are welcome members of the community, and by supplying them

with equipment and pleasant places in which to work, we have been able to secure for your children a fine corps of teachers. Mothers' Clubs have helped materially. Interested parents mean a great deal to any teacher. In several cases, former teachers have returned to help keep your schools operating. It is to be hoped that this fine group of teachers can be retained for another year.

#### *Buildings:*

During the past year all districts have made some strides in repairing and painting buildings neglected during the war years. In two districts all class-rooms were redecorated. Some floors were re-surfaced. New heating units were installed in two schools. Two districts provided additional space. Four districts began to replace poor lighting and one other district is prepared to start its program this year.

#### *School Lunches:*

Five of the six districts in this Union have Hot Lunch Programs in operation. In one district this was made possible through the Mothers' Clubs soliciting six hundred dollars for permanent equipment.

#### *Text Books:*

Text books, worn and out-dated, since they could not be replaced during the war years, are rapidly being discarded as new text books can be selected and secured.

#### *Transportation:*

While transportation is being provided for all children legally entitled to receive it, only one new vehicle was secured during the entire year. However, of the twenty-eight vehicles operating, only two can be considered to be standard, and both of these are operating on routes over which it would be impractical to place better equipment so long as the roads are as bad as they are.

*Recommendations:*

School Boards must continue to be provided with adequate funds to attract qualified and capable teachers if instructional standards are to be kept high.

Parents and interested citizens must continue to press for state and federal legislation in behalf of the schools.

Desirable living quarters must continue to be made available to teachers.

Minor repairs must continue to be made to restore long neglected buildings to protect the buildings, as well as the health and safety of the children.

Transportation facilities should be improved when equipment becomes available.

## II. Our Local Situation

*Teachers:*

The increased funds provided to the Board for teachers' salaries made it possible to increase these salaries to the average paid other village elementary teachers throughout the state.

The reception to the faculty by the Mothers' Council and the cordial attitude of many teachers and townspeople have been an encouragement to both the teachers and superintendent.

*Buildings:*

When school opened in the fall all classrooms and hallways had been freshly painted. One room in the Center School was improved with modern lighting since the last district meeting. This was shown to the parents and friends who attended the meeting at which Mr. Paul Farnum of the State Department spoke, and brought forth much favorable comment.

*Instruction:*

In an effort to improve teaching techniques there have been several teachers' meetings conducted by your principal, and



two meetings in Pittsfield with the teachers of the Union for the examination and discussion of new text books and teaching aids. Two of your teachers went to Concord for a fifteen weeks course in Audio-Visual Aids, to prepare themselves to make the best use of the new moving picture machine provided for the schools by the generous contributions of various local organizations. A regrouping of the upper classes with two grades to a room has made possible improved instruction.

*Needs:*

The Parade School needs improved heating facilities and running water. The three rooms that do not have improved lighting could benefit thereby.

All classrooms are taxed to capacity and twelve children are being sent out of town, three to Alton, six to Gilmanton, and three to Pittsfield. Any substantial increase in enrollment will necessitate some readjustment, or more classrooms space in Barnstead to accommodate the larger number of children. To prevent misunderstanding through false rumor, I wish to present in this report my recommendation in this regard. I believe that the upper grades could have improved instruction and other benefits important to their age group, such as music, shop, home economics and physical education, as well as the opportunity of association with more pupils of their own age and abilities by being transported to a larger school. But I also believe that the ultimate solution should be in accord with the wishes of the people of Barnstead, especially the parents of the children who would be so affected. I believe that the school board would welcome an expression of opinion from these parents.

To the School Board, Mothers' Clubs, parents, interested citizens and teachers, I should like to express my appreciation for their cooperation and encouragement.

## PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

### (a) Report of School Health Work

*To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of  
Schools:*

Aside from the recent chicken-pox epidemic, no serious illnesses have been reported in Barnstead. The chicken-pox cases were visited wherever it seemed best to enable all possible children to take part in the various Christmas programs.

One spastic paralysis case was taken to Manchester for another check-up. This child seems to be doing nicely, so no further recommendations were made at this time. In cooperation with the State Board of Health Nurse, one family was advised in the case of a baby believed to be completely deaf. This child was taken to the Massachusetts General Eye and Ear Clinic for tests, and advice, and will be followed up with all possible care.

An annual program to keep the toxoid immunizations up-to-date was planned with the State Board of Health. Thirty-five were immunized this last year. Some pre-school children came in for these shots.

Audiometer tests of hearing were given all pupils with the group testing machine, but no very bad cases were found requiring special work.

Three children were operated on in tonsil and adenoid clinics. It is now very difficult to get this work done in clinics. Nearby hospitals prefer to honor only cases referred privately by physicians, and those only during the months when there is no danger from infantile paralysis.

Several welfare cases were helped and several other problems were solved which were troubling families. Four were taken to Concord for Eye Clinic work and more are planning to go.

Some conferences were held relative to resuming the dental clinic program interrupted by the war for lack of a dentist. An American Legion and Auxiliary committee are looking into the possibilities and this will be taken up with the State Dental consultant, Dr. Shirley Dwyer.

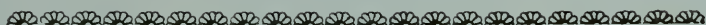

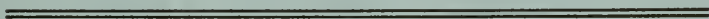
