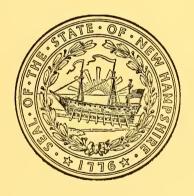

### **TOWN WARRANT**

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, in the County of Carroll in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of the town and on credit of same, negotiable notes therefore, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year from taxes collected within current municipal year.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the same time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate party caucuses and require candidates to file with the Town Clerk for Town Offices.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the betterment of the so-called Intervale Park Road.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for tarring town roads.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### Report of Forest Fire Warden

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in or near woodland. Official figures show that more than 98% of all forest fires results from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects are far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forest, the protection forest provides for game, and the supply of ground water. They upset the local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Your local warden and his deputies are doing an excellent job trying to prevent this shameful waste, but they must have the cooperation of the public and this means YOU. Remember there are laws that cover the making of a camp fire, also the burning of rubbish or debris, and also the burning of brush whether this is on your land or land of other people, and to disobey these laws can cost you a great deal of money. So please see your local warden and he will tell you how to burn the rubbish, also when you can burn it, and also issue you a permit to do so if conditions are right.

In the "Keep America Green" program there is a story of two bad boys who cause most of our forest fires. The first one we will call "I don't care," he is the person that builds a fire anywhere, never gets a permit to burn brush, or has a safe place for his home incinerator. He also is very careless with matches and cigarettes. The other one is called "I don't know any better," and the best way to describe him is he is a plain dunce. It is only with your help that these two bad actors are controlled. Their carelessness can be the cause of our valuable woodland being destroyed by fire. Even your homes can be burned by their carelessness.

It is up to you and you to report these two characters to your local forest warden whenever you see them operating. Remember it is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

# Report of Superintendent

#### To the Bartlett School Board:

The new elementary school in Bartlett Village was completed and the children moved in on January 6, 1958. It is a beautiful school. It is spacious, well lighted, has a good heating system and is attractively designed for children. If you could observe the children in this new environment you would find them extremely happy, warm and comfortable, without the extreme temperature changes experienced in the old building. They are proud of their new school and are grateful for all that has been done for them. This school is more than so much brick and mortar. It is an expression of the faith you have in education as a means of perpetrating our democratic way of life.

Almost everything we can say about the elementary school situation is good. We have good teachers, good schools, good equipment and the children are growing steadily and surely in the fundamental processes of learning.

A look at the high school situation shows no such promising picture. An inexperienced teaching staff, a declining high school enrollment, and many that attend Bartlett High School feel that the high school cannot fulfill their educational needs or their aspirations.

Below is a resumé of a study of Bartlett High School made by the State Department of Education, and their recommendations for achieving the minimum essentials of a secondary school.

# REPORT ON VISIT TO BARTLETT HIGH SCHOOL

January 21, 1958

On January 21, 1958, the following staff members of the State Department of Education visited Bartlett High School: Mr. Neal Andrew and Mr. Roland Kimball.

The purpose of the visit was twofold: first, to clarify what action, if any, is necessary to qualify Bartlett High School as an approved High School under the Minimum Standards which will go into effect in September 1958; second, to identify aspects of the school plant and program which are in need of attention if Bartlett is to offer a truly comprehensive high school program.

In addition to the comments included in this report, other

recommendations and suggestions were presented verbally to Superintendent David Appleton and Principal Chester Leone. Although these are not detailed here, it is hoped that each will be given careful consideration.

The staff of our Department is available to assist in any appropriate manner as steps are taken to implement the ideas presented in this report.

#### ACTION NECESSARY UNDER MINIMUM STANDARDS

- 1. In many respects the Program of Studies being offered at Bartlett High School this year does not meet the minimum requirements which will go into effect in September. The following points summarize this situation:
  - a. Including subjects to be taught on alternate years, there are 15 academic subjects in the school's program. The new standards will require that at least twenty academic subjects be included in the school's program.
  - b. There are only two courses offered in the vocational and practical arts area. The minimum requirements will make it necessary for the program to include at least 12 vocational and practical arts subjects another year.
  - c. There are no fine arts opportunities available in the present school program. A minimum of at least three fine arts opportunities will be required by next year.
- 2. The total number of subjects taught this year is 12. The minimum standards will require that a total of at least 20 subjects be taught each school year.
- 3. In several respects the work load of the faculty exceeds that which will be permitted next year:
  - a. The principal now has no time free for administrative and supervisory duties. Another year it will be necessary for the principal to be scheduled so that at least 25% of his time is free for these responsibilities.
  - b. No teacher may be assigned a teaching load which requires more than five different academic preparations per day. Mr. Walsh's present teaching schedule clearly demands six different academic preparations. Mr. Manna's schedule is questionable and is interpreted as requiring one too many class preparations.
- 4. It is necessary to recognize that if plans to remodel or enlarge the present school are developed, provisions for an adequate school library must be included.
  - Note: The action necessary for approval another year, as well as the recommendations to be presented in this section, clearly indicate that there is a need for additional faculty members, a wider range of instructional opportunities in the school program, and, as a consequence, improved and enlarged

school facilities. Past experience has indicated that it will be extremely difficult for Bartlett to achieve these objectives. Therefore, it is our recommendation that the community consider very seriously the desirability of closing its high school and work out alternate arrangements for the high school education of its boys and girls. At least two possibilities should be thoroughly explored: (1) the possibility of joining with neighboring communities to form a cooperative school, and (2) the possibility of working out tuition arrangements with some neighboring communities.

The following recommendations may serve as guideposts for improving Bartlett High School, if the community decides to attempt to maintain its own high school. However, it is our belief that the most important purpose of these recommendations will be to make clear to the school board and citizens of Bartlett the limitations which inevitably associate

themselves with a very small high school.

1. There are many serious limitations in the present program of studies. Attention should be directed particularly to the following points:

a. There is no foreign language instruction of any sort.

b. There is no business education program.

c. There is no opportunity for home economics instruction.

d. There is no social studies offering of any type available for 9th grade students.

e. Although most high schools normally run a four-year program of college preparatory mathematics, only a three-year sequence is available.

f. There is no organized instruction in the areas of health and

physical education.

- g. There is a very limited industrial arts program which is restricted to woodworking and mechanical drawing.
- h. There is no opportunity for fine arts instruction.

2. Instruction in several areas is now handicapped by limitations of physical facilities and equipment. The following limitations now appear to be most serious and thus, in greatest need of attention:

a. Although a good effort has been made to develop a science laboratory, it should be pointed out that the existing laboratory area is very small and places a working limit of about 10 or 12 students on class size. Equipment for experimental work in chemistry and physics is quite limited, and there is virtually no equipment for instruction in biology.

b. Although no business education program is being taught this year, it should be noted that the only equipment available for the problem of the problem of

able for such instruction is a limited number of typewriters. If the high school is to teach a comprehensive program in business education, it will be necessary to make available additional office equipment, including mimeograph, transcription equipment, and desk calculating equipment. It should

be observed that much of this equipment can be rented

if this seems to be a desirable arrangement.

c. The present shop area is adequate for the industrial arts program now offered. There is, however, a need for both additional space and equipment so that the variety of instruction can be widened, thus making it possible for the school to offer a comprehensive industrial arts program.

- d. There is a noticeable lack of common instructional aids ordinarily found in high schools. For example, there was no indication that the school subscribes to any newspapers, magazines, or other resource materials. There is a lack of maps and charts, tape recorder and similar instructional aids.
- 3. There is no school library of any sort. It is clear that a good high school must have at least a minimum high school library program, developed along the lines recommended by the American Library Association.
- 4. Several services ordinarily associated with a modern high school are severely restricted:
  - a. Because no member of the faculty has the time to devote to it, there is no guidance program worthy of mention. Beyond the fact that the pupil records are well maintained, there is virtually no time available for individual counseling, for the development of an occupational file, or for many of the other services usually associated with an effective program of pupil guidance.
  - b. The very restricted physical plant has seriously handicapped the school lunch program.
- 5. The very limited size of the school has required the establishment of certain administrative arrangements which represent questionable educational practice.
  - a. Certain schedule conflicts have developed; e.g., the sophomore program in World History being scheduled at the very same time as the sophomore program in Shop, which makes it necessary for a student to choose between two courses when it might be in his best interests to take each of these two courses.
  - b. The small class size has made it necessary to combine certain grades for instruction of English. This has served to interrupt the normal sequence of instruction in English and represents a serious instructional problem for both teachers and students.
  - c. On some occasions, it has been necessary to schedule students to study in the rear of a regular class. This arrangement never improves instruction, and often hinders it. Normal class routines tend to disturb the study students and, occasionally, vice versa.
  - d. It is apparent that the school is encountering certain disciplinary problems. While this may be due in part to the ruling which prohibits the faculty from requiring bus students

to remain at the close of school, it seems evident that a major cause of these disciplinary problems is the extremely limited program which makes it necessary for many of the boys and girls to enroll in subjects which are not well-suited to their abilities and interests. A second contributing factor is that the nature of the school makes it impossible for the school administration to provide supervisory assistance to staff members.

# Report of School Nurse

#### 1956-1957

The school health program is designed to raise the health standards of all pupils, to know what is good for one's health; to help parents to know where they can go for desired help outside of the community. The formation and extension of desirable practices, attitudes, and understandings associated with nutrition and growth; relaxation; rest and sleep; activity; fresh air and sunshine; elimination; cleanliness and care of teeth, body, and clothing; importance of and means of securing dental and medical attentions; control of infections; care of eyes and ears; posture; safety; and emotional and social adjustments.

In the Fall of 1956, 81 physical examinations were done. All pupils desiring the examination from the 1st, 4th, 7th, and 10th grades were done at the hospital. The students out for sports who were not done at the hospital were done at the high school by Dr. John Twaddle.

During the year 160, 1st, 2nd, or 3rd, shots were given of the Salk Vaccine; 87 Patch tests; 6 x-rays were taken; 203 vision tests were done; 6 vision defects discovered and 3 of these were corrected; 200 hearing tests were done, 2 defects were discovered, and 1 of these received treatment. In the Fall and Spring an Orthopedic clinic was held at the Memorial Hospital. Dr. Halfman from Laconia was the orthopedic specialist, and Dr. Ursula Sanders of the State Department of Health was the medical examining physician, 2 pupils attended.

Thirteen preschool children attended the pre-school summer round-up. Each child was weighed and measured, teeth checked by dental hygienist; and parents were advised as to the importance of immunizations that are available for polio, tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough.

I want to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation to everyone who has helped to make this Program possible.
