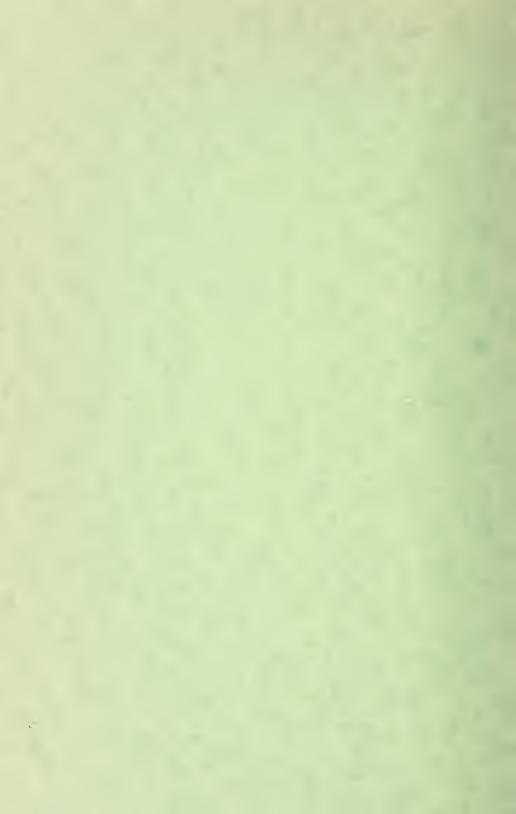

## TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The town must raise \$247.86 and the state will contribute \$1,652.39.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the town for non-payment of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for tarring.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the use of the Road Agent to repair the broken culvert at the foot of Main Street opposite Sunnyside Cemetery.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Memorial Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$144.00 (1/100th of 1% of Town valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern N. H. for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Region.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying a new highway truck and raise and appropriate money for the same. It is the opinion of the Selectmen that in the best interests of economy the present truck should be used barring any major

breakdown. The Selectmen recommend that a committee of four be elected to serve with the Selectmen and said committee of seven be authorized to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$6,500.00 for the purchase of a new truck if in their opinion it becomes necessary before next Town Meeting.

- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to augment the amount already appropriated for the purpose of repairing the engine hall doors and necessary cement work.
- 13. To hear the report of the committee for the purpose of erecting a permanent Honor Roll and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 14. To hear the report of the committee for the purpose of repairing the Town Hall heating system, their recommendations as to additional repairs to the Town Hall, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to buying 12 rubber coats, hats, and boots for the fire department and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 16. To see if the Town will raise the Firemen's wages as follows. Attending meetings, \$1.00 each; \$1.25 per hour for practices; \$1.50 per hour for fighting fires.
- 17. To hear the report of the committee pertaining to by-laws governing the use and maintenance of the Town Hall and take any action necessary thereto.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the Towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

- 1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
- 2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
- 3. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.

- 4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
- 5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE REGARDING REPAIRS TO TOWN HALL

Town Moderator: Bennington, New Hampshire.

This committee was appointed by you, as authorized by vote of the 1957 Town Meeting, to investigate and report at the next town meeting on the following subjects:

- 1. To investigate regarding the boiler and heating system of the Town Hall and to recommend for or against the installation of a new boiler and heating system based on oil.
- 2. To investigate and recommend regarding the painting and decorating of the outside of the Town Hall.

Your committee met more than once and decided to have an impartial inspection made by an outside insurance inspector and to also obtain quotations regarding the cost of making any necessary repairs.

An inspection was made in which the inspector recommended some minor repairs and expressed the opinion that it was reasonable to expect some more years of dependable service from the present boiler.

The committee was able to obtain information as to a source of replacement grates and as a result of the inspection and discussions with the Selectmen, the Selectmen decided to buy new grates and make a few other necessary repairs to put the present boiler in good operating condition.

Your committee recommends against the installation of a new boiler and oil burning heating system at this time as not warranted or necessary under the circumstances.

Your committee also inspected the Town Hall outside and obtained two estimates as to the cost of repainting the outside. Both estimates were based on the recommendation of removing the blinds and estimated a cost of approximately \$1,400. If the blinds were not removed but repaired and repainted the cost would be considerably more.

It is recommended from this committee, to the voters of the town, that in order to preserve the building and improve its appearance the Town Hall be repainted after removing the blinds.

## By-Laws for Bennington Town Hall April 22, 1957

## ARTICLE I

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Janitor to keep the hall in proper condition at all times. He shall make necessary repairs. He shall preserve order at all gatherings or have a responsible person of 21 years of age or over, and see that no damage is done to the furniture or building. He shall keep all children and other persons from going on the stage or behind the curtains unless they have business there and shall report any damage done to the stage, scenery, or other properties to the person or persons using the hall, and see that the damage is taken care of by such persons.

He shall require all traveling shows to settle for use of hall and all damages (if any) before removing their effects.

Section 11. All purchases for the hall shall be made in the name of the Town, and the Janitor shall present itemized bill of the same, and at the end of the month shall make a report for the Selectmen's approval and payment. He shall turn over to the Treasurer at the end of each month all monies collected for the use of the hall and take his receipt therefore.

Section III. The Janitor shall have no authority to change any of the prices for the use of the hall named in these by-laws.

Section IV. The Janitor shall keep a record at all times in a book furnished by the town, which shall be kept in the Selectmen's room.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bennington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my fourth annual report for your consideration.

It was fortunate indeed that the School District at their last annual meeting appropriated sufficient funds to enable the School Board to place an additional teacher into service. Our September enrollment of 1957 increased to 90 as compared with 74 for September 1956.

The enrollments by grades this year are as follows:

Grade 1—16	Grade 5—11
Grade 2—12	Grade 6— 6
Grade 3—11	Grade 7—12
Grade 4—15	Grade 8— 7

The additional teacher has been a big help to the teaching staff in providing an opportunity to more adequately present their material. However, we are still faced with the situation wherein a teacher can devote only one-half of her time to an individual class. Good work, however, can be accomplished under these circumstances by an experienced teacher and we are fortunate to have an experienced staff under the able leadership of Mrs. Ruth Cody. I am pleased with the teachers' efforts to improve the standards of accomplishment of the pupils. These standards must be improved if our graduates are going to compete successfully with their high school classmates, most of whom have already acclimated themselves to the problems connected with departmental organization.

The high school pupils are attending three different high schools this year. Nineteen in Peterborough, four in Antrim and six in Hillsboro. The amount of money needed next year for tuition purposes is considerably lower than was anticipated this year and will be reflected by Bennington being one of the very few communities able to reduce the total school budget.

It has again been a pleasure to work with the School Board, teachers and citizens of Bennington and I wish to express my appreciation to them for their cooperation with me in working for the education of our youth.

## FIVE-TOWN COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Five-town Cooperative School Study Committee respectfully submits its conclusions and recommendations to the School Districts of Antrim, Bennington, Francestown, Greenfield and Hancock, N. H.

These towns constitute a natural geographical, social and economic unit. A centrally located school to serve these communities seems to offer an unusual opportunity to establish a permanent secondary school system in which all would not only share the expense, but more importantly would have a vote in management. The committee, however, considers it unwise for the proposed member towns to initiate petitioning action for the creation of a cooperative school district at the forthcoming district meetings, but it does feel very strongly that the program merits further study and considerations.

The basis for the foregoing statements is as follows:

- 1. OPERATION: An analysis of conditions and costs made by this committee over the past seven months indicates that a centrally located school, with a high level curriculum approved by the State Department of Education, to serve the projected student population of the five (5) towns for grades 7-12, can be operated at a per pupil cost, including transportation, equal to or less than the state average.
- 2. School Plant: Based on the recommended curriculum and room requirements to serve adequately a school population of 350 students, a floor plan and cost estimates were drawn up and submitted to the committee by Alfred T. Granger Associates, Architects and Engineers. The committee also selected a promising site in Bennington which is available at a nominal cost. These combined costs, plus interest charges, constitute debt service or building cost. This, in effect, is the "price tag" or added cost that the towns would pay for. It appears to the committee that the present method provided by law for distributing these costs among the towns should be modified in order to arrive at a more favorable apportionment.
- 3. FINANCE: The accompanying tables show the estimated cost of operation, building, and distribution, based on the present law.
