# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the requirements of the statute we hereby submit our annual report. It has been our earnest endeavor to secure the best teachers, experienced when possible. We believe every teacher has worked earnestly to make interest in their respective schools, thus giving satisfaction to both parents and school board.

We would like personally to mention the great success in some of the schools of the little tots that have been but one or two terms. We could but notice the great pains the teacher took with them. We have some superior teachers with us and would recommend to the next board if they can to retain the most of our present staff. It is only by effort that we can ever hope to see our public schools reach the high standard which we so much desire. We can never even hope to secure the same advantages that are given the city schools by reason of our population being so scattered as to render it impossible to establish graded schools. Yet personal observation and information secured from the best schools in neighboring cities go very far to show that in many instances the average country pupil is found to be in advance of the city scholar of equal age.

We have seen fit to give the pupils the benefit of two more weeks' schooling, which means much when everything is in running order. It was thought advisable to change the geographies the past year; also to introduce the new Aldine Primer.

Mr. Dow generously gave land for a yard at North Bow, providing that we build a stone wall on two sides. This was readily accepted and the wall built. In the way of general repairs we have painted the outside of the Bog schoolhouse and made other necessary repairs inside. At Brown Hill we shingled the house and shed. Although unused for a few years it was thought best to retain it for school purposes.

The Wood Hill and North Bow schoolhouses need painting and other repairs.
