TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to six of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Art. 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to act thereon.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

1. Town officers' salaries	\$2,245 50
2. Town officers' expenses	1,200 00
3. Election and registration expenses	1,200 00
4. Forest fire expenses	500 00
5. Expenses of Town Hall and other town bldgs.	1,000 00
6. Expenses of police department	800 00
7. Expenses of fire department	1,400 00
8. Control of white pine blister rust	400 00
9. Expenses for civil defense	100 00
10. Support of board of health	400 00
11. Support of town library	550 00

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance, this sum to include tarring and completing new construction from Town Beach to Camp Notre Dame.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for snow removal, about \$200.00 of this amount to be used for the purchase of new snow fence.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,900.00 for street lighting.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$905.80 thereby receiving an additional \$6,038.67 from the state for Town Road Aid.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for support of the poor.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$3,000.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for aid to soldiers and their families.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for support of the Town Beach.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$125.00 for Damage and Legal Expenses.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$194.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to allow Town Officers four and one half percent ($4\frac{1}{2}\%$) of state head taxes assessed, for administration of the State Head Tax Law.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 to defray Town's share of Old Age and Survivor's Insurance.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for interest on Temporary Loans.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for interest on Long Term notes.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to continue the Road Improvement Plan as submitted by the Town Road Committee and adopted at Town Meeting, March 10, 1953.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to tar the road from Route #9A at Tower Light Inn, past Tower Light Inn and golf course, to the tarred road at Brookside House, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the same. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 27. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to strengthen the bridge leading from north end of West Chesterfield village to the Marshall Farr Road so that it will have a load carrying capacity in conformity with the legal load limit for Town roads.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to install a street light on the northeast corner of the junction of Route #9 and the road past Walter Deselle's residence, and raise \$25.00 to pay for the same. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to install two street lights extending eastward from the last existing light, slightly west of the William Pierce residence, one light to be located at the intersection of Routes 9 and 9A, and the second to be located between the driveways leading to the Geo. Fuller and Richard Goodell property, and raise \$50.00 for same. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to purchase insurance benefits for workmen's compensation, equipment and public liability and fire insurance on public buildings.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to put the gate house and gate at the outlet of Spofford lake in good shape, the same to include painting gate house and putting new grates in front of the gate. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$52.16 from Jessie M. B. Joslin, to be added to the Geo. H. Joslin \$100.00 trust fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the George H. Joslin burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$52.16 from Jessie M. B. Joslin to be added to the Ellen M. Ball \$100.00 trust fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the Ellen M. Ball burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Mrs. Dora Hopkins, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Etta L. and Albert E. Smith burial lot in Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Etta L. Smith trust fund.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Rollin H. Brown, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Clegg-Streeter burial lot

in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Zilla Streeter Brown Trust Fund.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Mary Virginia Chickering, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Richard G. Chickering burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Richard G. Chickering Trust Fund.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint the Road Agent.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following zoning ordinance.

ZONING ORDINANCE

To promote the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the community, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, by securing safety from fire, panic and other dangers, providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights of way, by preserving the rural charm now attached to our town, by encouraging construction of buildings that are a credit to their neighbors and the community, and by other means, now therefore the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, in official meeting convened.

ARTICLE I

Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section.

A. "Home produce and products" means and includes everything of an agricultural nature grown, produced, conditioned or otherwise carried on the property of the resident, also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of the property.

B. "Right of Way" means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.

C. "Permanent Residents." A family shall be considered permanent residents when they have used any building continuously as a residence for a period of six months or more.

D. "Hotels" shall mean and include any building which contains more than twelve rooms and advertises to accommodate people with food and sleeping quarters for a price.

E. "Tourist Home" shall mean and include dwellings and cabins where transient accommodations are provided for a price.

F. "Front yard." A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right-of-way.

G. "Frontage" shall mean length of lot bordering on right-of-way.

H. "Permanent Building": any building resting on a foundation or otherwise legally defined as "improved real estate."

ARTICLE II

General District

For present purposes the entire Town shall be considered to be a General District, provided this shall not preclude the establishment of specially defined Districts for Residential, Business, and Industrial Uses where experience shows such specially defined Districts to be desirable, and where they are lawfully established by due process of Amendment to this Ordinance, as specified in Article X of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE III

General District Uses

In a general district, there shall be no restriction on the use of any building erected or altered thereon nor on the use of the land except as stated below under exceptions and shall

a.) include the following

1. Dwellings, including hotels, summer camps, and accommodations for tourists and overnight guests.

2. Churches, public buildings or clubs.

3. Farms and truck or home gardens, excluding any use injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood, but including the sale of produce raised on the premises.

4. Such accessory uses as are customary in connection with the foregoing uses and are incidental thereto. Accessory uses may include the practice of a profession within the premises in which the practitioner resides, such as doctor, engineer, lawyer, architect, real estate and insurance, or other recognized profession, and also dressmaking, millinery and similar home occupations.

5. Restaurant or other eating place.

6. Garages for storage or repair of cars, gasoline and oil filling stations.

7. Such industrial, manufacturing or recreational uses as are not injurious, noxious, or offensive to the owners or occupants or adjacent property by reason of the emission of smoke, dust, gas, noise or odor, or detrimental to the public or prejudicial to the general welfare of the community.

b.) exclusions: On all state highways and class 5 highways as designated by the State Highway Department as shown on an official map on file in the office of the Selectmen and around the shores of Spofford Lake:

1. No land shall be used to the depth of five hundred feet from the center line of any such public highway for a dump or for the storage of abandoned vehicles or parts thereof, junk, scrap paper, rags or discarded material of any kind.

2. No land shall be used to the depth of three hundred feet from the center line of any such public highway for a so-called gravel bank nor shall any part of the topsoil or subsoil be removed from any premises except in connection with construction undertaken upon the premises.

3. No land shall be used for a trailer park within three hundred feet from the center line of any such public highway or within three hundred feet from the high water mark of Spofford Lake.

4. No signs shall be permitted except the following:

Town and State Highway directional and regulatory signs, historic signs, and two signs used to advertise the profession or goods dealt in by owner or occupant of property on which placed, said signs not to total over thirty square feet in area. Also a sign reasonable in size giving the name of the property.

Also one or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total of six square feet.

Where the property owner of an enterprise lives on a less travelled highway he may also erect two signs not to exceed a total of thirty square feet on properties alongside a main travelled highway upon receipt of permission by the owners of such properties.

ARTICLE IV

1. Every dwelling house, camp or house, trailer established in a General District on the roads specified in Article III within three hundred feet from the center line of any such General District highway shall have a minimum ground floor area of six hundred square feet, outside dimensions, for each family unit.

Plans for proposed dwelling houses and camps to be erected shall be submitted to the Board of Selectmen before the beginning of the work and no such dwelling shall be erected except with the approval in writing of the Board.

No permit, however, shall be issued unless the proposed structure will present a reasonable appearance and will be in keeping with the neighborhood and unless the building is to be finished on the exterior in a permanent manner and is to be painted on the outside whenever the same is of wood or a material customarily painted.

No owner or occupant of any land in a General District shall permit any building or other structure or fire ruins to be left unfinished or incompleated thereon but shall finish or complete or remove the same within one year.

Every new building of every sort hereafter erected in a General District on the roads specified in Article III within three hundred feet from the center line of any such General District highway shall be set back from the front property line not less than thirty feet, or such distance as shall conform to the line of existing buildings on adjacent property; and shall be set back at least ten feet from the side and rear property lines.

2. All chimneys, in any District, shall be constructed of stone, brick, cement or cinder block to the ground; each shall be lined with tile and extend at least two feet above the roof to which it belongs and shall have a clean-out opening at the base. All entrances to chimneys shall be of fireproof construction. Chimneys shall not be used to support beams or timbers in any manner. No smoke pipe shall be installed so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material.

3. No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with non-combustible or fire-resistant roofing material.

4. The minimum requirement for new construction or establishment of any unit for human occupancy for the disposal of human waste shall be as approved by the State Board of Health.

5. New Development. The owner of any plot of ground intended for development or subdivision shall file with the Board of Selectmen a plan or map of the proposed subdivision and shall obtain the approval of the Board thereon in writing before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in said subdivision.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to inspect the site of such proposed subdivision and to require such roadway and other areas for common use as will eventually be acceptable by the Town, and to approve same when satisfied that such proposed plans are in harmony with and conducive to the general welfare of the Town and the neighborhood, but in no sense shall this approval be deemed an acceptance by the Town of the street or streets.

ARTICLE V

Non-conforming Uses

Any lawful use of land or of a building or part thereof at the time of the adoption of this ordinance may be continued, although such use does not conform to the provisions of this ordinance. Any building occupied by a non-conforming use may be structurally altered or the use of such building changed to any other use not more detrimental to the character of the district in which it is located. Should any non-conforming building occupied by a non-conforming use be destroyed or damaged by fire in whole or in part, it may be replaced by a building to be used for the same purpose as the one destroyed, provided that such reconstructed building or new building shall not exceed in cubic contents the original building by more than twenty-five per cent.

Provided however that where or whenever an existing non-conforming use is or becomes discontinued or abandoned for a continuous period of one year, any subsequent use shall conform to the terms of this ordinance.

No present non-conforming use shall be extended or enlarged beyond the limits or area occupied by such non-conforming use on the date of the adoption of this ordinance.

Provided further that whenever any building, the use of which has been abandoned and neglected for a period of three years, has been allowed to become in such condition as to cause it to be injurious, noxious or offensive to the neighborhood, or which by reasons of such abandonment or neglect shall, in the opinion of the Board of Selectmen, constitute a dangerous hazard, it may be razed by order of the Board of Selectmen at the expense of the Town.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Adjustment

The Selectmen shall make the initial appointment of a Board of Adjustment of five members, one for a term of five years, one for a term of four years, one for a term of three years, one for a term of two years and one for a term of one year, each term to expire on the date of the Annual Town Meeting, each member to serve until his successor is elected

and without compensation. Thereafter upon expiration of the term of any member of said Board, his successor shall be elected at Town Meeting for the term of five years.

The Board shall have authority to allow slight variances from the specific terms of this ordinance, where it can be shown that they would result in unnecessary hardship but when an objection is raised by a majority of the families residing or owning property within a radius of five hundred feet of the property in question, the Board shall hold a public hearing to receive evidence on both sides and shall have authority to decide whether the permit shall be issued or not.

ARTICLE VII

Penalties

Whoever violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars for each day of such violation.

ARTICLE VIII

Enforcement

Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen, shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

ARTICLE IX

Validity

The invalidity of any section or provision of this ordinance shall not invalidate any other section or provision thereof.

ARTICLE X

Amendment

The provisions of this ordinance may be amended or changed at any regular or special Town Meeting by a majority of the voters present as provided by law.

ARTICLE XI

Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Art. 39. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Art. 40. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1953

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 10, 1953.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, who read Article 1 of the Warrant and declared that balloting was in order under this article for all necessary Town Officers.

At ten o'clock the Moderator again called the meeting to order and the rest of the Warrant was read by the Clerk. The articles were then disposed of as follows:—

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by Henry Highton to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as last year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Oscar Ericson which was supported to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Robert Woodman, reporting for the Budget Committee, referred to the report as given in the Annual Town Report on Pages 55 to 58. He stated that every member had been present at every meeting and that he hoped more voters would attend the public meeting next year. He said that he had enjoyed the work of the Committee for the three years that he had been a member. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Wakefield Dort to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by George Joslin to raise the following sums of money for the following purposes:

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by H. Claude Mowry to raise the sum of \$12,500.00 for Town Road Maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd Fuller and supported by Charles Alden to raise the sum of \$4,500.00 for Snow Removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$1,925.00 for Street Lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$900.00 thereby receiving an additional \$5,999.97 from the State for Town Road Aid. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum

of \$500.00 for the support of the Poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Old Age Assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by Oscar Ericson to raise the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for Aid to Soldiers and their families. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd Fuller and supported by Harry Winn to raise the sum of \$150.00 for Parks and Playgrounds; this sum to include cost of construction of Float for the Keene Bi-Centennial Parade. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. The committee as nominated and elected for planning and preparing the Float is made up of John Prout representing the American Legion, Nelson Richmond for the Boy Scouts and the Community Club, Raymond Egan representing Mt. Pistareen Grange of Spofford, Merle Chickering representing Spafford Grange of West Chesterfield, and the Board of Selectmen.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post which was supported to raise the sum of \$500.00 for support of Town Cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Harold Putnam to raise the sum of \$200.00 for the support of the Town Beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Wakefield Dort to raise

the sum of \$500.00 as the Town's proportionate share for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Wakefield Dort to raise the sum of \$125.00 for Damage and Legal Expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Henry Highton to raise the sum of \$184.00 as the Town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post which was supported to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and to pay him the same rate as the state did last year which was 2%. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Harold Putnam to amend the article and to raise the sum of \$275.00 to defray Town's share of Old Age and Survivor's Insurance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative as amended.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter Post and supported by Floyd Fuller to raise the sum of \$250.00 for interest on Temporary Loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harold Putnam and supported by Walter Post to raise the sum of \$200.00 for interest on Long Term Notes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Harold Putnam to amend the Article to read "to trade the 1947 Chevrolet Dump Truck for a new 2 ton truck and to spend a sum not to exceed \$2,500.00 and to raise at least the sum of \$500.00 to be paid

this year and more at the discretion of the Selectmen providing the tax rate does not exceed five dollars. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

provements following the plan submitted by the Road Committee. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative as amended.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Octave Savard that the Road Committee be continued for another year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

SPOFFORD LIBRARY REPORT

January 1, 1953—December 31, 1953

Interest in the Spofford branch of the Chesterfield Public Library has been very gratifying this year. Fifty-seven subscribers have circulated three hundred ninety-one books during the year 1953.

We have had an exchange of twenty books every other month from Chesterfield. Between forty and fifty books have been exchanged every two months from the state Bookmobile. Special requests for individual books from the State Library have been forwarded by the Spofford librarian whenever anyone made known his wishes.

The library hours are Wednesday from 3-7 p.m., but anyone is welcome at any time the librarian is at home, and it is very true that the regular hours are only a form.

Books have been given this year by Mrs. A. U. Howard and Mrs. Jessie M. B. Joslin.

To the Trustees of the Chesterfield Library:

During the past year the library had 66 adult patrons and 72 juvenile patrons. The number of books taken out in all, including books left by the State Book Mobile, is 3,001. During the year the library purchased 62 new books for adults and 34 for children.

From April through June the library was opened on Wednesdays from 12:30 to 2:30 for the convenience of the school children. Mrs. Oscar H. Ericson was in charge of the library at that time. She received able assistance from some of the older girls. The school children, during that period of ten weeks, took out 908 books.

Several gifts were presented to the library this year, many of historical interest to the town. Among these is a Map of Cheshire County (1858), presented by the school; an original poem by Frederick Lagerholm—"The Road to Jackson Hill"; an 1832 New Testament presented by Mr. and Mrs. Walter B. Douglas of Dunstable, Mass.; a book of Methodist Hymn (1840); a subscription to the "Times Magazine" by Mrs. Jessie Farrington; plus several books.

Books have been exchanged regularly with the Spofford Branch Library during the year.

I am still concerned with the lack of awareness of the townspeople regarding the library. I would like to see the library become more of a meeting place for the town.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 9th day of March 1954, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate an additional sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be made available prior to June 30, 1954, to meet increased costs of transportation.

10. To see if the district will vote the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for installation of doors on classroom supply closets.

11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for necessary work on the school roof, or for insulation work.

12. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) to continue construction of the ball field.

13. To see if the School District will vote to discontinue the teaching of the seventh and eighth grade pupils at Chesterfield School, and to transport same to Keene or Brattleboro schools, and to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand two hundred fifty (\$13,250.00) for their transportation and tuition.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Good leadership is often the difference between success in an enterprise and failure. This is true in education as well as in private or public affairs. The staff of the Chesterfield School has solved the problem of cooperation and teamwork under the able guidance of their new principal, Mr. Gordon Decato. The effects of his guidance and devotion to his work are reflected in better pupil control and discipline; a cleaner school building; improved relationships with parents and the public as well as better school work in the classroom. The whole school staff has become an efficient and capable team.

The Central School is continuing to pay large dividends to the people of the community in other ways too. Reports of the state health inspector are excellent and the state supervisor of the lunch program now regards the Chesterfield program as outstanding.

Enrollment continues to grow each year with a maximum of 183 pupils enrolled this year, as compared to only 159 when the building was opened. This increase has necessitated the purchase of additional desks and materials; but classes which are large in a few cases, are not overcrowded. While some schools in the state have classes of fifty pupils, Chesterfield's largest class enrolls 34 pupils and two classes enroll less than 26 pupils.

With the continued cooperation among all concerned in the educational program at Chesterfield, which has been characteristic of the past year, the future school program looks bright.

LUNCH PROGRAM REPORT

The Hot Lunch Program opened September 14, 1953. The average number of pupils eating each day is 150, which is an increase of about 35 over last year.

Charges for meals are \$1 by the week, or 25c per single meal for children and 30c for adults.

I have received a variety of surplus commodities and 5c reimbursement for each balanced meal served to children. With this Federal Aid, I have managed so far to balance the budget. If, for any reason such help should be discontinued, the meal charges would have to be raised somewhat.

The past two months I have made out the menus in advance for the entire month and Mr. Decato has made copies for each child, thus the parents know what the children are eating each day.

Fifteen underweight children, chosen by Mrs. Warner, the school nurse, have a sandwich and cocoa or milk during afternoon recess.

With the cooperation of the teachers we have been teaching the younger children to like vegetables by giving each child at least one teaspoonful which they must eat before they may have seconds. We find this method very successful.

I wish to express my thanks to Mr. Cherrie, Mr. Decato, and all the other teachers who have helped to make this program a success by their cooperation and helpfulness.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

CHESTERFIELD CENTRAL SCHOOL

September 9th marked the beginning of the 1953-54 school year. The enrollment was as follows:

Grade One	36 pupils
Grade Two	28
Grade Three	21
Grade Four	15
Grade Five	33
Grade Six	19
Grade Seven	17
Grade Eight	15
Total	184

Each year finds the total enrollment figure larger, which in turn means our community is growing.

Our entire program has been enriched by the experience of having two cadet teachers from Keene Teachers College. Under the present set-up, students at the college, must spend eighteen weeks during their senior year in actual teaching conditions. Miss Shirley Witham worked in grade three for nine weeks and Mr. Frank Richardson in grades seven and eight for eighteen weeks.

All playground equipment has been set in a cement base, thus eliminating a safety hazard. A Jungle Gym has been purchased and installed through the courtesy of the Parent Teachers Association.

A student council has been formed which will in time play an important role in the formulation and carrying out of school policies. Under the direction of the council, the Safety Patrol has been re-activated and functioning effectively with the school staff and bus drivers.

A new feature of the educational curriculum is the monthly school dance. These dances are primarily designed for grades four through eight, with the provision that any member of the afore mentioned grades may bring a guest. Much can be gained by this educational experience. Not only is it a form of much needed entertainment, but will promote social growth and help to make our youngsters well rounded individuals. Thus we take a step toward meeting one of the educational goals for our school, "To prepare each child to live successfully in our complex social world."

The school lunch program, under the very able direction of Mrs. Marion Nurse, is functioning very well. The number of meals served each day approaches the 150 mark. This makes our program one of the best in the state on pupil participation. The practice of offering a mid-afternoon lunch for underweight children has been continued. An adult helper replaces student workers in the kitchen which has proved desirable from every stand point.

Thanks to our custodian Mr. Allen Cherrie and the cooperation of our children, the school building is in excellent condition. Landscaping would greatly improve the outward appearance.

The transportation problem has been worked out satisfactorily for the greatest number concerned with Mr. Henry Chickering. The lunch hour has been shortened by fifteen minutes, thus allowing the school day to end at 2:45 p.m. This gives children who have to walk after leaving the bus, a longer period of time before darkness to reach home.

Perhaps the following, taken from the school register of Chesterfield School No. 3, for the school year 1881, still has great meaning.

"If parents would visit the schools more, it would be better for all connected with them. Coming only at the closing examination, though better than no visit, is not all that is wanted or required—Who of you would put out a colt, or a yoke of steers to be trained for two or three months and not go to see how their

training was going on, though they were in the hands of experienced trainers.

Are your children of less account than your horses or cattle?—

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

The Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year, and declared him elected. He took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Nelson Richmond nominated H. Claude Mowry. Seconded by Stratton Morse. Henry Highton nominated Mrs. Clara B. Wellington. Seconded by Floyd Fuller.

Nelson Richmond moved that the nominations be closed and the vote be by written ballot. Seconded by Henry Highton. Motion carried.

A written ballot was taken. Total ballots cast 98. H. Claude Mowry received 48 votes. Mrs. Clara Wellington received 48 votes. One ballot was blank, and one was thrown out. Since neither nominee had a plurality, a second written ballot was taken. 105 votes were cast. Necessary for choice 53. H. Claude Mowry received 50 votes. Mrs. Clara Wellington received 55 votes and was declared elected. She took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Clara B. Wellington moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn to serve as Treasurer for one year.

The Moderator cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn and declared her elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office.

Mrs. Grace Welcome moved that it be stated in the final report of the Building Committee that the committee DID NOT accept the new school building. Seconded by Mrs. Anna C. Hubner, and carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the town auditors audit the school accounts this year. Seconded by Walter Post. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for

the payment of the statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the appropriation and the estimated revenue, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Mrs. Clara B. Wellington moved that the sum of \$52,168.90 be raised for the ensuing year. Seconded by Harold Putnam. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district, benefits of title 2 of the Federal Social Security Act, (Old Age and Survival Insurance) as authorized by chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of forty dollars (\$40.00) to defray the school district's share of the costs thereof. Harold Putnam moved that the article be accepted as read. Seconded by Henry Highton. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600.00) for the construction of an equipment storage shed 12 feet by 12 feet.

Mr. William Zinn moved that the article be passed over. Seconded by Lawrence O'Kelly. Motion carried.

Article 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for grading the playground preparation of a baseball field.

William Zinn moved that the article be accepted as read. Seconded by Nelson Richmond. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To take any other action which may legally come before the meeting.

Walter Post moved that the School Board place raised letters on the Chesterfield School, and pay for the lettering from any funds that may be left over from the regular appropriation. If no funds are left over to do the job, an article is to be inserted in the warrant, at the next School Meeting, to raise the money for this purpose. Seconded by Arvid Pearson. Motion carried.

Robert Woodman moved that the School Board appoint a committee to raise money and pick out proper letters for the Chesterfield School, Mrs. Anna C. Hubner and Mrs. Grace Welcome to be members of this committee, along with others selected by the School Board. Seconded by Arvid Pearson. Motion carried.
