THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk for the year next ensuing.
2. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for the two years next ensuing.
3. To choose by ballot and major vote one Selectman for the three years next ensuing.
4. To choose by ballot and major vote one or more Auditors for the year ensuing.
5. To choose by ballot and major vote a Tax Collector for the year ensuing.
6. To choose by ballot and major vote three Trustees of Trust Funds for the year ensuing.
7. To choose by ballot and major vote one or more Library Trustees for the year ensuing.
8. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town officers as required by law.
9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age, Blind, and Disability Assistance for the year ensuing.
11. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repair of highways and bridges.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct its Selectmen to take such action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgement seems most conducive to the best interests of the Town, and appropriate money for the same.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, at public or private sale, the tractor snow-plow now owned by the Town.
14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Brown Road, so-called, leading from the "Brown Place" line north forty rods to the Tom Jackson camp.
15. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$398.62, the State to contribute the sum of \$2,657.50.
16. To see if the Town will vote to empower and authorize the Selectmen to use the whole or a part of the surplus of money now in the Town Treasury for the purpose of lowering the Tax Rate for the year ensuing.
17. To see what sum or sums the Town will vote to fix as the price per day for hiring manual labor, equipment, and trucks for work on town roads.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$51.46 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 10 cents per \$1,000

of assessed valuation (1/100th of 1 per cent) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter and advertising and otherwise publicizing the advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the region

19. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Colebrook and North Country Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting, by advertising folders and otherwise, the Town and the North Country Region.
20. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Precinct for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
21. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.
22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when the same is received.
23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
24. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Town Charges for the ensuing year.
25. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting and removing the bushes from the side of the highways in such places as the Selectmen think most expedient.
26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the re-

ports of agents, auditors, selectmen and all other officers, and ratify and confirm the same.

27. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 16th day of March, 1955, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with such other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will authorize the School to sell the Valley and Union School Properties.

10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or State Agencies.
11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Superintendent's Report

Introduction

With the General Court now in session, and with a relatively large number of educational bills as well as amendments to existing laws in this field to be acted upon, a considerable amount of what takes place beneath the State House Dome during the coming weeks and months will be of significance to education. Several of these proposed measures, if passed, will affect very materially the administration and cost of operating our schools. Among the bills might be cited those relative to the establishment of minimum salaries for teachers, continuing contracts for the same group, and the determination of a bonded indebtedness limit for districts borrowing money. Two of the amendments to be considered are of particular interest to us, too, namely, one calling for compulsory school attendance of pupils in all districts until sixteen years of age regardless of grade completed up to that time, and a closely related one calling for the transportation

of these same pupils to the school to which they are assigned at district expense.

As far reaching though as may be the effect of possible positive legislation upon these bills and amendments which will tend to still further increase our mounting educational costs, perhaps of even greater significance to us will be the action taken in respect to increasing financial support to local school districts from the state level. In so far as can now be seen, this seems to be the only feasible way the tax burden of the property owner can be alleviated to any appreciable extent in paying for the high cost of conducting our schools. The recognition of this need for additional state aid is wide spread, even by the Governor, although there is disagreement between him and the many sponsoring organizations as to how more revenue for this purpose is to be raised. Whatever may be the source finally decided upon, a sales or some other form of tax, from which this money is to be obtained, and how much, there is bound to be a keen interest in the developments when this topic comes up for deliberation by the members of the General Court during this legislative session.

Teachers

With the alarmingly great proportions already reached in the teacher shortage, especially for elementary grades, and with no relief of this serious situation in sight, we may well consider ourselves most fortunate to have veteran teachers in all our schools. The Teachers who have returned to work with us again this year and their respective schools and grades are Florence B. Hughes, Church, Grades 1-4; Mary E. Gray, Cone, Grades 1-4; and Myra A. Holbrook, Grand Division, Grades 5-8.

School Nurse—Health

The importance of the work done by our school nurse, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, in constantly checking the health of our children, in conducting follow-up work when necessary, and in making arrangements

for much needed dental work, is evidenced by general good attendance throughout the year.

We are sorry that, due to his health, it has been necessary for Dr. F. Hammond Dickson to discontinue the Dental Clinic. The work that he has done year in and year out over the long period of time that he has been serving the boys and girls in this area has meant much to a great many former as well as present pupils enrolled in our schools.

It is very much hoped, that with the setting-up of another dentist office in Colebrook, that it will again be possible to make arrangements so that our school children may continue to receive much needed dental treatment at a nominal cost and convenience to them. Present plans are to again conduct a pre-school clinic in the spring, also, as it helps materially to determine the general physical condition of children planning to enter the First Grade in the fall time to receive medical attention when necessary.

Change In Organization

As is known, when it was learned that Ferne C. Fogg was not returning to teach Grades 5-8 at the Cone School for the current year, and since this group was going to be relatively small, it seemed best to transport these upper grade pupils to the Colebrook Elementary School along with those of all grades from the Valley District as was already being done. Also, since the Cone School Building, due to the recent work done on it when moved to its present location by the State Highway Department, provides more adequate facilities than does the one at South Columbia, it was believed best to close the latter school and to move the primary grades formerly assigned there to the Cone School.

Of interest to every taxpayer when any such a change in organization is made, is a comparison of the resultant costs with those of operating under the previous set-up. It is believed that everyone will be pleased to know that it is going to result in a substantial sav-

ing to the district. Although, as might be expected, tuition and transportation costs have been increased, the overall saving made in closing a school, where the expenses of keeping it open included the payment of the teacher's salary plus the cost of such items as janitorial service, retirement, fuel, lights, books and general supplies, has been even greater. Examination of the budget breakdown printed on subsequent pages in this report will show these increases and decreases just cited when comparisons are made between that of the current and next year's under the respective headings.

Buildings

Due to all the work that has been done recently in moving the Cone and Church School Buildings, in placing them upon new foundations, and the extensive alterations and major repairs made at the time in each case, and also the continued policy of keeping all buildings in a good state of maintenance, relatively little carpenter work has been necessary during the past year. Extensive interior decorating was done during the summer vacation period, however, when the classrooms in all three of the buildings presently being used were painted with attractive pastel colors.

With it apparently being only a question of time when the State Highway Department will continue its program of road construction on Route 3 in this area, and which recent surveying activities and markings indicate will be through the site where the Valley School Building now sets, it would seem advisable for the district to consider the sale of this property which has not been used for school purposes during the past several years.

On the same basis of its not having been used for a long period of time, and the likelihood of when it might be for school purposes extremely uncertain, possibly the advisability of selling the Union School Building might also be considered. As will be noted in the warrant, a copy of which will be found on the first pages of this report, provision is made for a consideration of the sale of these two buildings.

Enrollment and Attendance

As is to be expected with the closing of the South Columbia School, the moving of Grades 1-4 from there to the Cone School, and with the transportation now to Colebrook of the pupils in Grades 5-8 who were formerly assigned to this last named school, the enrollment in the schools within the district continues to decrease. At the time of this writing only 66 pupils are enrolled in the district's schools as compared to 73 last year, 77 the previous year, 81 the year before that, and 88 four years ago. The average percentage of attendance for the four schools open during the last year was 95.32, which is very good, and the average number of tardinesses was only .3 which is the lowest in several years. A breakdown of this attendance and tardiness record for each school may be found in a tabulation printed on subsequent pages in this report.

As is to be expected, also, with the decrease of pupils enrolled in the schools of the district largely due to more and more being assigned to schools outside, the number of tuition pupils from Columbia shows a decided increase. At the present time 25 are attending Colebrook Academy, 23 Colebrook Elementary School, and 1 is attending Stratford High School to make a total of 49 in contrast to 17, 11, and 2 enrolled in these respective schools last year for a total of only 30.

Notes on the Budget

For the first time in several years it is possible for the school board to submit for consideration a budget less than that of the previous year, as it is \$29,165.00 as compared to \$30,413.00 for the current year. Since the estimated income of \$6,000.00 is the same as that for this year, too, the amount to be raised by taxes by the town is likewise appreciably less. As was explained under the caption of - Changes in Organization - the decrease in the budget is explained, for the most part, by the closing of one of our schools and assigning the pupils who formerly attended there to a school outside the district.

Conclusion

I wish again to thank the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and cooperation received in our work together to keep standards high in our schools.
