STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at four of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects: (Business Meeting at 7:30 P. M.)

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear the report of the budget committee, and act thereon.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the several highways and bridges.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow paths.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to obtain State aid on town road maintenance.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in improving the cemeteries.
9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.
10. To see what action the town will take in regard to a new fire truck.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

12. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for an Athletic field.

15. To see what action the town will take in regard to the ordinance laws submitted by the Ordinance Committee.

16. To see if the town will vote to accept the Trust Funds of the late Lester Colby.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell town land acquired either by deed or tax sale.

18. (On petition of Herbert L. Collins and others) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in building a piece of road from William Cooney's to Herbert Collins'.

19. To see what action the town will vote in regard to a Heating System and what sum they will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Hall to cover same.

20. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

FOREST FIRES - OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 90 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are most shameful waste".

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public - YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION - fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit from Warden, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire willfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year, or both.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

It is with pleasure that I submit my third annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

This past year was indeed an unsettled one for education. The legislative cut state aid to schools from \$2,000,000. back to \$400,000. This fact seems unbelievable when it is generally understood that education is the basis of our democracy. The school children of today will be the citizens of tomorrow.

As a part of this report, there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the School District is using for the current year (1949-50. This is also a result of legislative action.

The expenses for the Supervisory Union have also been changed. Formerly all towns in this union paid their share of expense according to their number of teachers. Now it must be divided equally between equalized valuation (1949) and average daily membership. Danville's share of Union expenses is approximately $7\frac{1}{2}\%$.

REPAIRS

Early last fall the drinking fountains in the Eaton School were replaced with new ones. This has remedied much repair and water leakage.

It is hoped that the roof on the south side will be repaired, and another pipe from the furnace will allow more heat for the upstairs classroom. Eventually the ceiling in Mrs. Winslow's room must be replaced and it

would then be well to improve the artificial lighting in this room.

TEACHERS

It speaks well for a community to be able to hold its teachers, especially when there is still a shortage of elementary teachers throughout the country. Your teachers continue to do superior work in the classroom as well as in public performances with the pupils. The moving picture machine purchased by the P. T. A. still holds an important place in school.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to the School Board, citizens, teachers and pupils of Danville who have been so cooperative and helpful during the past year.
