WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Freedom, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To choose Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

4. To vote on the question "Shall sweepstake tickets be sold in this town."

5. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of 5600.00 to defray town charges, consisting of town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, town hall expenses, and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of 400.00 for the use of hydrants and appropriate money for the same.

of one thousand three hundred dollars for street lights and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars for general expenses of highway department and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for Public Library and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars for winter highways and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred and forty dollars and eleven cents for class five roads and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars for town needy and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand and two hundred dollars for insurance and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand six hundred dollars for old age assistance and appropriate money for the same. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars to help defray the expenses of Old Home Week Celebration and Memorial Day and appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four thousand eight hundred dollars for summer highways and appropriate money for the same.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars for the fire department.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars for maintaining the town dump and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see if the town will vote to use the revenue from 1963 Severance Tax to cover any overages.

21. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.

22. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and twenty-three dollars and seventy-four cents, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town; to the Lakes Region for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources for the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of six hundred dollars for interest on long term and

short term notes and appropriate money for the same.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for Social Security and appropriate money for the same.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three thousand dollars for the grader note and appropriate money for the same.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars to be given as a donation and divided between North Conway and Huggins Memorial Hospital.

28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars to place underlayment and tile on the kitchen floor.

29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars for plowing driveways.

30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the money to lay a new floor in upper hall.

31. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a section of the road on the westerly shore of Danforth Bay and accept a new section which has been constructed by the land owner.

32. To see if the town will vote to close the road, subject to gates and bars, leading to the Buzzell Property.

33. To see if the town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars to reconstruct and gravel Kidder's Hill.

34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars to reconstruct and tar Chase Hill.

35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the seatees and purchase additional metal chairs.

36. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the practice of the posting of the minutes of town meeting.

37. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Non-Partisan Ballot System as outlined in paragraph 59:73 of the New Hampshire Primary and Election laws of 1964.

38. To see if the town will vote to employ a Janitor for the Town Hall, said Janitor to be in attendance when ever the Hall is open for public use and appropriate money for the same. Salary and duties to be arranged by the Selectmen.

39. To see if the town will vote to require all persons not owning property in Freedom, to post bond, before the cutting of timber, for the payment of the Yield Tax.

40. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort 54

and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience - - a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.

2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump - its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.

3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.

4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Lets all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1964, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for education purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtained from the State or Federal Government or any department or agency, thereof, or any other sources.

10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to arrange for the education of the pupils of grades 7 and 8 at Kennett High School.

11. If the vote on the preceeding article is in the affirmative, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4510. for tuition.

12. To see if the district will vote to authoize the school board to accept gifts in the name of and on behalf of the school district.

13. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Freedom:

The scholastic year witnessed the greatest change of the school administrative unit in many years. The Interim Commission reported to the 1963 session of the General Court that it was desirable to decrease the number of administrative units. This, of course, implied that the administrative units would be increased in size. The State Board of Education, prompted by the creation of the Governor Wentworth Regional District, dissolved Union No. 36 as of July 1, 1964.

Freedom as a result will be a part of Union No. 9 (Conway) as of July 1, 1964. Since pupils of Freedom will be attending Kennett High School, this is probably desirable. Regardless, it is a fact and the educational program must be geared to the situation. The program will necessarily be changed to conform to Union No. 9 specifications. Since this was a year of transition, no attempt was made to change. Changes in the ensuing years is probable. It therefore was desirable to avoid change this year since it could be compounded in the immediate future.

The physical facilities of the Freedom School could be improved without a major expenditure. Two areas of physical environment are in need of improvement. In both rooms the lighting can be improved to provide more and better light. The visual activities of pupils in the educative process are demanding. High levels of candle power with absence of glare are required by the reading and study processes. A study of existing conditions with recommendation for improvement are desirable. Sight, a priceless sense, is worthy of preservation. Proper artificial lighting tends to prevent visual weaknesses from developing into serious visual deficiencies. In addition, the heating problem is worthy of study. The current system seems to provide the primary grades with inadequate heat if the upper grades are comfortable. An analysis of the problem so as to balance the heat delivered could result in greater comfort for pupils and a saving to the district.

In this same area, a realistic appraisal of the situation in regard to fire protection, could effect changes in the present protective devices. As a fire retardant carbon tetrachloride is recognized as one of the best. It does, however, present a problem. Its fumes are noxious. A study of the current situation and recommendation for change, is desirable, by an agency not concerned with sales of equipment should be obtained. Recommendations, as a result of such studies, could be temporarily expensive. If, however, sight is preserved, study conditions are enhanced and health is protected, the study and resulting expenditures are amply justified.

The educational program, per se, is dependent to a large extent on the teacher personnel available. Curriculum changes are certainly to be expected in this century of advance and change. Any desirable changes in the curriculum are dependent on the staff. The district has been fortunate in the teachers who have served it in the past. Problems in the future are concerned with the availability of teachers who can continue to provide for the children of Freedom the best educational opportunity available within the resources, physical and financial, of the community. This means that the teaching personnel should be provided with the audio visual aids that make a direct contribution to the educative process. Availability of many varied types of both kinds of equipment, audio and visual, has resulted in change in teaching techniques. It has also provided wider vicarious experiences for the pupils in our schools. Projectors of all types and the material needed to implement their use are costly at the time of purchase, but provide a stable and relatively inexpensive source of teaching materials for many years after acquisition.

Implementation of these suggestions could result in better education for all pupils of the Freedom Schools. The competition in all phases of the world's economic structure makes it imperative that youth be provided with the best education possible so that he can meet this competition. Such provisions as can be made to enable Freedom children to enter this competitionj on an equal footing should be initiated as soon as possible.

It has been pleasant to work with the Freedom School Board in an effort to provide for the education of your children. The board is devoted to the cause of education and strives to provide the best possible for Freedom's children.
