## **COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

Your Commissioners herewith present their report together with reports of the Sheriff, Solicitor, Clerk of the Court, Jailer and Treasurer and the Auditors and Superintendent, Physician and Chaplain of the County Farm for the year ending December 31, 1920 and a statement of the financial standing of the County at the close of the year.

When the estimates for appropriations were made two years ago there was a general feeling that the limit of high prices had been reached and the commissioners made their estimates for the two years with that in view, but such was not the case, and although economy has been practised in every department a decrease in the surplus has been unavoidable.

The high prices of provisions, clothing and fuel have increased the cost of supporting paupers on and off the Farm, a great deal over any previous two years. The inventory at the Farm shows a decrease from last year, owing to the drop in prices of live stock last fall, although we have a larger and better stock than last year.

The Farm is still under the management of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Parker, Superintendent and Matron, and Mr. H. D. Harriman, Assistant Superintendent, all of whom are working for the best interests of the county, giving the inmates good care and attention. The Farm produced the past year, 350 tons of hay, 700 bushels oats and 300 tons ensilage, besides a large quantity of potatoes and vegetables of all kinds.

The live stock consists of 157 head of cattle, con-

sisting of 21 thoroughbred Holsteins, 16 thoroughbred Herefords, the balance high grade of both breeds; 87 hogs and 5 horses.

The Farm and equipment are worthy of inspection and the public is always welcomed and shown over the place.

# Selectmen of Town and Overseers of the Poor

Your attention is called to the following extracts from the laws of 1903

#### CHAPTER 42, SECTION 1

SECTION 1. Any town or county furnishing any assistance to any person within six years preceding his death shall be entitled to recover from the estate of such persons the sum or sums paid out for such assistance, the said claim to be a preferred claim against his said estate after payment of funeral charges, expense of last sickness and expenses of administration, provided he leaves no widow or minor children living at his decease.

#### CHAPTER 106, SECTION 1, as amended

"SECTION 1. No town shall be liable for the support of any person unless he, or the person under whom he derives his settlement, shall have wholly gained a settlement therein during the ten years preceding the last date of application for support; provided that no person having a settlement in any town in this state upon arriving at the age of seventy years shall lose that settlement on account of being exempt by law from paying a poll tax, if he still resides in said town."

CHAPTER 110, SECTION 1, last clause as amended "Also to Chapter 67 of the laws of 1903, Chapter 84 of the Public Statutes, Chapters 1 and 71 of the laws of 1907, relating to paupers, and the following from Chapter 110, Public Statutes, relating to 'assistance to persons in quarantine.' "

SECTION 1. Whenever any person or family is placed in quarantine by a board of health, to protect the public against small pox, scarlet fever, diphtheria or any other dangerous, infectious or contagious diseases, it shall be the duty of said board to assist such person or family while in quarantine in such manner as in the judgment of the board may be deemed wise and necessary.

SECTION 2. All expenses thus incurred, or such part thereof as the board may determine, shall be deemed a legitimate expenditure for the protection of the public health and shall be charged to the account of incidental expenses, but not to any indigent pauper account, nor shall such expenditure be construed to mean a public aid to the person or persons so quarantined and assisted unless such person or persons are already paupers as defined by the Public Statutes.

ORA A. BROWN, Ashland, N. H.—Ashland, Alexandria, Bristol, Bridgewater, Campton, Ellsworth, Hebron, Holderness, Lincoln, Groton, Plymouth, Rumney, Thornton, Wentworth, Waterville, Woodstock, and present their bills to the commissioners at Plymouth the second Tuesday in May.

HARRY E. MORRISON, Orford, N. H.—Dorchester, Enfield, Canaan, Grafton, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orford, Orange, Piermont, and present their bills to the commissioners at Lebanon on the first Tuesday of January.

GEORGE H. TURNER, Bethlehem, N. H.—Bethlehem, Bath, Easton, Franconia, Haverhill, Landaff, Littleton, Lisbon, Lyman, Livermore, Monroe, Warren and present their bills to the commissioners at Woodsville the second Tuesday in September. If considered advisable, additional dates for settlement with towns may be arranged.

All applications for aid should be immediately reported to the commissioners, as under the laws of 1903 no bill will be paid for more than 10 days' support previous to the proper affidavit being received. Affidavit blanks will be supplied by the commissioners upon request.

# Total cost of supporting paupers at County Farm for the year ending December 31, 1920 \$27,469 18

In accordance with Chapter 30, Section 1, Public Statutes, the Superintendent of the County Farm, shall make up his report to January 1, annually, and also Section 2 of said chapter requires that the Superintendent's report shall contain, in addition, a list of paupers actually supported at the Farm, and the number of weeks each was supported, also a statement of the average cost per week for each pauper, with an explanation of the basis upon which said calculations were made.

The whole number of persons supported and partially supported for the year ending December 31, 1920 was 135. The number of weeks' board is ascertained by taking the number of days between the day of admittance and the day of departure of each individual, and dividing that number by seven, which gives the total number of weeks each was supported.

The whole cost of supporting paupers at the Farm for the year ending December 31, 1920 was \$27,469.18. This sum divided by the whole number of weeks furnished, viz; 3,575 gives \$7.62 plus, as the price per week.

Before closing my report I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the Commissioners, Chaplain, Physician and all connected with the institution for their hearty cooperation at all times, also the W. C. T. U., Tracy Ross Post of the American Legion, and kind friends who so generously remembered the inmates at Christmas and at various times throughout the year.

## Report of County Physician

To the Commissioners of Grafton County:—

The work accomplished at the County Hospital during the past year, under the management of Supt. and Mrs. Alvah H. Parker, has been of a very high order. As in similar Institutions most of the patients admitted are chronic cases of long standing, many of whom have been poorly and irregularly nourished. To such, the Hospital with its comfortable rooms, clean beds and proper food, kindly nursing and pleasant surroundings, has proven a real haven of refuge.

It is the policy of the Institution first to redouble efforts for a cure and when that is impossible, to smooth the pathway for them and in every way possible to comfort them in their declining years.

The sanitary arrangements of the Hospital are excellent, and there has been no epidemic or any cases of contagious disease. I would particularly mention the cleanliness which at all times prevails, not only in the Hospital but also in the Almshouse, House of Correction and the Jail. Those of you who have had experience in such matters know how hard it is to maintain an Institution of this kind in a sanitary condition. Nevertheless this Institution is at all times clean.

During the past year, there has been a steady growth in the morale of patients and inmates, all of whom seem to be trying to do their best and therefore harmony and good fellowship prevails among them. The sincere work of our Chaplain, Rev. Dick Burns, is bearing fruit.

From my continued observation I would highly commend Supt. and Mrs. Alvah H. Parker and Asst. Supt. Henry D. Harriman for their efficient management of the Institution and their unfeigned interest in the welfare of every patient and inmate.

I particularly desire to express my deep appreciation of your moral and financial support in caring for the sick poor of Grafton County.

To the members of the County Delegation I would report that I have visited several other County Hospitals and it appears that in the care of patients and inmates, the Grafton County Institution is equalled by few and excelled by none.

## Report of County Solicitor

Enfield, N. H., December 31, 1920.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for the County of Grafton:

I herewith present my second annual report covering, substantially, the work of this office for the year ending on the above date.

Grafton County is fortunate. The wave of crime now sweeping the country seems not to have reached it to an alarming extent. Belief is general that within a short period the pulse of industry will again become strong and man will turn from the pursuits of crime to the pursuits of industrial peace and plenty.

There have occurred within the county but two, or three, cases of wilful and malicious killing and these have been disposed of with merited and substantial sentences without vexatious and expensive trials.

In dealing with juvenile offenders, where the offence is not too serious in its nature. I find that much can be saved to the county by preferring a charge of delinquency in the lower courts thus making it there heard and determinable. This saves the expense of witnesses before the grand jury and many trips from some point in Grafton County to the Industrial School in Manchester. In dealing with offenders under seventeen years of age for the ordinary crimes, the sentence, if imposed, is usually an Industrial School sentence, and by the adoption of the above method the the same results are obtained with a minimum of expense.

Municipal Court Justices should be more prompt in forwarding copies to the Solicitor as they should also be more careful in making such copies. Many of them are loosely and carelessly made with many failures to return the list of witnesses, their attendance and travel. This practice is productive of much trouble since in making up the pay-roll such witnesses are omitted.


