TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Grantham, in the County of Sullivan, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Grantham on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose by ballot and major vote one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Police Officer and one Overseer of the Poor for the ensuing year, one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Trustee of the Public Library for the ensuing three years.
- Art. 2. To choose one or more Highway Agents and all others necessary town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 3. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for support of the poor, and Old Age Assistance.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid for highways and raise and appropriate money for same.
- Art. 6. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary to repair highways and bridges.

- Art. 7. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for snow bill.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of one percent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1942 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources and advantages of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- Art. 9. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of the Public Library.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the care of the cemeteries.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to buy additional fire-fighting equipment.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate to apply on long term note.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the park.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will give the Selectmen the authority to buy a filing cabinet.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for control of the White Pine Blister Rust to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money if necessary.
- Art. 18. To hear the reports of the officers, agents and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- Art. 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board and Citizens of Grantham:

It is a pleasure to submit herewith comments on the Grantham schools both as to the scholastic achievements and the financial situation.

BUILDINGS

The Grantham Village building, both interior and exterior, has been repainted and greatly improved in appearance. Both of these had needed to be done for some time and we were fortunate in being able to get the work done by local help. Both of the buildings are now in reasonably good shape, but some improvement in the seating capacity in North Grantham and Grantham Village could be added with much enjoyment and physical benefit to the children. The fence at the North Grantham school yard needs to be replaced with one that is strong and safe.

TEACHERS

Two changes are noted in the teaching staff. Miss Evelyn Strand who had taught in the Village building for three years, left to take a position in Massachusetts. Her place has been filled by Ida Soboll, a graduate of Keene Teachers College. At North Grantham, Miss Dorothy Lincoln, who had completed substantially three and one-half years of her course at Keene, was appointed as teacher. Miss Lincoln expects to finish her work during the extended summer session. These two new teachers, with Miss Rule who was with us last year, have had good results in the rooms and are generally liked by the pupils. The large enrollment at North Grantham made it advisable to transport the seventh and eighth grades from that school to the

village, thereby allowing more opportunity for individual work with the children at North Grantham.

BUDGET

The budget for next year will not vary a great deal from that of last year, but we need to watch out that we have sufficient funds to retain the teachers we have and to meet the wage scale that similar communities are offering.

HEALTH WORK

The large number of districts which were combined together under Mrs. Robert Hasham, as school nurse, has made it necessary for her to relinquish some of the work. Grantham, therefore, is now under the supervision of the school nurse from Lebanon, Miss Elizabeth Donovan. A few cases of measles have crept into the schools but there has been no serious epidemic. The Agricultural Marketing Association has supplied us with fruits and other materials to supplement the noon luncheons. It has been necessary this year to pay the freight on the supplies that have come from Manchester and Concord.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment is fairly stable, except that there was an increase at North Grantham as mentioned above. A table of the children by grades for the different schools is set down with the list of graduates from the eighth grade on another page. The names of those children who have attended high school any time during the year is also listed.

I am glad to take this opportunity to express to the teachers who were here last year and who are here this year and to Mrs. Walker and other members of the school board and citizens who assisted in the rationing programs for sugar and gasoline. The fuel proved to be more of a disappointment and hardship on the teachers than some of the other programs because of the lack of supplies and materials with which to do the work. I am, however, pleased to express my appreciation for all that has been done, both by the teachers and helpful citizens in the matter of making the schools more worthwhile to the pupils and the community.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Chapter 150, Laws of New Hampshire

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name, and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provision of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners or keepers—thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs, whenever and wherever found.
