TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Community Hall in the Town House in said Greenville on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Bring in your Ballots for:

Town Clerk for one year; one Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer for one year; Tax Collector for one year; Highway Agent for one year; one Water Commissioner for three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; one Library Trustee for three years; two Auditors for one year; and three Firewards for one year.

And at eight of the clock in the afternoon of the same day, at the Town Hall Auditorium, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by the Aus-

tralian Ballot.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and raise and appropriate a sum of money to

cover the expenses of such an audit.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Fire Alarm Horn to replace the old steam whistle at the mill, and authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow the sum of \$3000, payable \$1000 per year beginning in 1963, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$320 this year, or take any other action thereon.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for a new overhead door at the Fire Station, or

take any action thereon.

Article 8. To see of the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1000 to drain the Ida F. Taft Memorial Field, this amount to be taken from the M. M. Marsh Village Improvement Fund, or take any other action thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to place railings on the steps of the Library and

Community Hall.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept a certain tract of land situated between Mill Street at No. 6 Bridge and the Mill Yard Fence, by properties of Charles Proulx and others and the East bank of the Souhegan River, as described in a certain deed from the Greenville Real Estate Inc. to the Town or take any other action thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a street light near the residence of Gilbert Deschenes, Jr. on the so-called

Rousseau Heights.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a street light at the foot of the School House Hill on Columbian Avenue.

Article 13. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 to clean the old World War Memorial site opposite the Town Hall, grade and surface the same, exclusive of the removal of the elm tree, or take any action threon.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to sell a strip of land ten feet wide between the LeClair-Caron Post No. 13 quarters and the Fire Station, to the LeClair-Caron Post, or take any other action

thereon.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for maintenance of water holes for fire protection for outlying sections of the Town, or take any other action thereon.

Article 16. To see of the Town will vote to rescind that part of Article VIII voted at the Town Meeting on March 9, 1915, regarding the management of all matters pertaining to the supplying of the citizens of the Town with water, and place the authority for setting rates of wages, meter reading, billing, out of town meetings, in the hands of the Selectmen.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to have a Town Budget Committee to be appointed from the floor, or take any other action thereon

Article 18. To see what action the Town will take on the report of the Communications Committee.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of \$1326.65 from the unexpended balance for painting bridges to the Capital Reserve Fund.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Water Commissioners to continue the investigation of a

new water system for the Town.

Synopsis of 1961 Annual Town Meeting March 14, 1961

Number of Ballots Cast - 472

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan, at 10:08 A.M. After the reading of the Warrant, the polls were opened for voting by Australian ballot. It was voted that a Deputy Moderator be appointed by the Moderator, and Russell Kimball was duly appointed. At 4:50 P. M. it was voted to close the polls at 6:15 P. M. At 8:00 P. M. the meeting was called to order by the deputy moderator for action on the articles of the Warrant, and it was voted to adjourn the meeting until Wednesday, March 15th, at 7:30 P. M.

At 7:30 P. M. on March 15th, 1961, the meeting was called to order and the articles in the Warrant were disposed of as follows:

- Article 1: For Town Officers chosen, see page 3 of this report.
- Article 2: See Selectmen's report for appropriations made.
- Article 3: Voted to accept reports as printed in the Town Report, with the following exceptions: Page 15, item 7, corrected to read "Fire Department, Operation and Maintenance, \$4,392,95;" and Page 46, signature corrected to read "J. W. Buttrick, Jr., Forest Fire Warden."

The Memorial Park Committee reported that \$2,103.50 had been spent, and it was voted to have the dedication program incorporated with the minutes of this meeting.

- Article 4: Voted to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 5: Voted not to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, State Tax Commission.
- Article 6: Voted to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of nine members to act as a Budget Committee for the ensuing year, three of the members to have served previously. The following persons were named to the Committee:

Arthur E. Pelletier, Chairman Leon Russell Priscilla Phipps Albert Bourke Omer J. Fortin J. W. Buttrick, Jr. Henry Howard Paul Tolman Alexander Taft

- Article 7: Voted to pass over the article to appropriate \$500 to paint and repair the Community Hall.
- Article 8: Voted to appoint a committee of five to investigate the three brooks in the hollow and report at the next Annual Meeting. The following persons were named to the Committee:

Joseph C. Caouette, Chairman Antonio Proulx Robert Wirtanen Bruce Grover Ronald Vaillancourt

Voted to raise and appropriate a sum of \$500.00 to widen brook between residence of George Lord and intersection of other brooks, said money to be spent under the supervision of the above committee.

- Article 9: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to finish construction of the road at Rousseau's.
- Article 10: Voted to appoint a committee of five to report on a possible signal system for fire and police departments by telephone when the dial system is installed. The following persons were named to the committee:

Robert Pelletier, Chairman George Fournier Henry Bergeron, Jr. Jean U. Vaillancourt Howard Clow

- Article 11: Voted to establish a street light near the residence of Jean B. Gamache.
- Article 12: Voted to pass over the article regarding appointment of the Chief Fire Ward by the Selectmen.
- Article 13: Voted to pass over the article to appoint a committee to look into the advisability of replacing the floor in the Town Hall Auditorium.
- Article 14: Voted to appoint a committee of five to investigate centralizing the supervision of all Town Departments, said Committee to report at the next Annual Meeting. The following persons were named to the committee:

Marcel Gauvin, Chairman Charles Sawyer Joseph C. Caouette Albert Bourke O. John Fortin

- Article 15: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to extend the fire alarm system from the last box on lower Mill Street to the residence of Harold Martin.
- Article 16: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$299.00 instead of \$250.00 to purchase an Air-Pac for the fire department.
- Article 17: Voted to pass over the article regarding purchase of a portable pump for the Fire Department.
- Article 18: Voted to pass over the article regarding painting of the Fire Station.
- Article 19: Voted to pass over the article regarding purchase of an overhead door for the Fire Station.
- Article 20: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300.00 to purchase a car for the Police Department.
- Article 21: Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$2,900.00 for an investigation of the Town Water System.
- Article 22: Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to buy athletic equipment for the Greenville Boys' Club.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee met with all of the department heads and discussed their budgets.

After a very thorough analysis of each request, certain changes were made with the approval of each department head. The budget as printed in the Town Report is approved by this Committee, unless noted below.

In the original fire department budget, the amount requested was \$3,650.00. This Committee favored the deletion of \$500.00, which will be placed in the Town Warrant in a separate article for fire holes, thus making the Town Budget \$3,150.00 as printed. The Committee also approves the special article requesting \$450.00 to be used for the purchase of a two-way remote control radio, a typewriter, a metal filing cabinet and the installation of a new over-head door.

We recommend that the election and registration expenses be reduced to \$600.00.

The special article dealing with the cleaning up of the old War Memorial site is approved by the Committee.

The article dealing with the fire alarm system is so complicated and seemingly necessary that the Committee does not feel that it has sufficient information to make a recommendation.

The article relative to the Town accepting a piece of roadway, owned presently by the Greenville Real Estate Co., is not approved by the Committee.

The article relative to drainage of a portion of the Ida F. Taft Memorial field is approved by the Committee.

The Budget Committee recommends that the Selectmen raise the rent of the Post Office to \$1,200.00 per year.

The vote of the Committee in regards to an increase in Teachers' salaries was approved by a vote of 6 to 2.

The Committee approves the article relative to making a flat-rate contract with Appleton Academy.

The article relative to signing an exclusive contract with Appleton Academy resulted in a vote of 3 in the affirmative, 4 in the negative and with one abstention.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

An Appeal from Your Forest Fire Warden

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned. Everyone will benefit by it.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE CHAMBERLIN FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR THE YEAR 1961

Once again it is time to report on the year's activities of the Library. Statistically it has been a good year. 6,006 visitors, 346 more than last year, and a total circulation of 7,827 books and magazines, a gain of 931 over the previous year.

This year the Librarian attended a course in Story Telling at the Manchester City Library. This course was given under the auspices of the N. H. State Library. It consisted of six, three hour periods, from April 6th to May 11th. Miss Siri Andrews, retired librarian of the Concord City Library, was the teacher. Mrs. Helene Greene also attended the course, and furnished transportation, thus making it possible for the Librarian to attend. The course was given without expense to the librarians, and all attending were given five books, suitable for Story Telling, for their Libraries. The course was very helpful. As a result well attended Story Hours were held, at the Library, every other Friday afternoon during June, July and August. Both the children and the Librarian derived equal benefit and enjoyment from the Story Hours and are looking forward to them again this summer.

In May, Mrs. Marian Buttrick, trustee, Mrs. Helene Greene and the Librarian attended a Neighborhood meeting in Bedford. We all enjoyed a tour of the Library and an informative discussion on adult fiction led by Mrs. Marjorie Hopkins of the State Library staff. The book "Silas Marner" was given to our Library for our attendance at this meeting.

A "Friends of the Library" group was formed in October. The officers elected were: Mrs. Dorothy Russell, chairman, and Mrs. Helene Greene, Secretary-Treasurer. We have found our new "Friends" very much interested in the Library and helpful in many ways.

New shelves have been installed in the supply closet making it possible to store our magazines in a more efficient manner. At the suggestion of the State Library, all magazines must be kept on file for at least a five year period. "Friends" have assisted in the sorting and labelling of these magazines. Thanks are due Mr. Russell Kimball who did the greater part of this work.

A beautiful new bookcase was made for the Library for the convenient shelving of the books for the small children. This bookcase was dedicated in honor of Mr. Eugene H. Coffin who has served as library trustee for thirty years. A bronze placque commemorating his service was presented to Mr. Coffin by Mr. Robert Taft at a ninety-first birthday party at the Taft home. The placque has been installed on the bookcase.

We greatly appreciate the many books given to the Library during the year by Mrs. James Hitchcock, Mrs. Eugene Roe, Mrs. Robert Taft, Mrs. Joseph Pelletier, Mrs. Camille Vaillancourt, Mrs. C. Cameron Burnap, Miss Emma Woods, Mrs. Russell Kimball, Mrs. Leon Russell, and Mr. William H. Doonan. We also wish to express our thanks to Miss Esther Kimball for the subscription to the National Georgraphic and for the renewal of the N. H. Profile; to the American Legion Post No. 13 for the donation of the American Legion Magazine. Boys' Life is given by the Boy Scout Troop each year.

Two books given in memory of Miss Doris Wheeler are, "New Horizons in Flower Arrangements", by the Greenville Woman's Club, and Tolman's "North of Monadnock" by Mrs. Rose Alma Pelletier. The family of Miss Harriet Morris have given, in her memory, the books "PT 109", the exploits of John F. Kennedy in World War 2, and Elsie Masterton's "Off My Toes". A Memorial fund has been started to purchase books in memory of Miss Morris. The "Friends of the Library" are sponsoring this memorial gift. We wish to thank all who have contributed to this project.

We also want to thank Mr. Theodore Alton for giving us a supply of bricks which "Friends of the Library" have converted into attractive and much needed book-ends.

The Library has been fortunate in having Miss Betsy Eaton give of her time as assistant to the Librarian. It is gratifying to have one of our young people interested in Library work.

This year a library schedule has been worked out with the Public School, allowing the children and their teachers to come to the Library and choose books correlated to their classroom work or for reading pleasure. It is hoped that a plan may be worked out where the Parochial School students and their teachers will come to the Library for instruction in the use of the Library and its resources. This will prove helpful to the student and to the Librarian. The first and second grades have visited the Library, with their teacher, and all classes make good use of the Library on every Friday afternoon.

With so much increased interest in our Library, we feel that the Library is taking a vital part in the Community. An informed community is an alert one. May we urge you all to "Wake Up and Read". This was the slogan for National Library Week which we celebrated this year with a successful Hobby Show and Open House.

The Bookmobile continues to serve our Library. We select an average of 185 books each time the Bookmobile arrives. The schedule has been changed so that now the Bookmobile comes once in two months instead of every third month. Most of the books are for young people, which enables us to offer them a wider choice

of reading material. Many requests for technical books are sent on to the State Library at Concord. They are always ready and willing to help us, in any way possible, to make our service to the community more efficient.

Make it a habit to visit your Library often in 1962.

REPORT OF RE-ORGANIZATION COMMITTEE

After a thorough examination of the functioning of all departments and serious discussions at our meetings of these matters, we arrived at the decision that the re-organizing of all the departments of the town is impractical at this time. We decided that the public works and the water departments deserved more consideration and seemed more open to reformation.

We found that improvements were possible in the public works department. However, these would require a major reformation of the whole department and a much more thorough and lengthy study. This is not a personal reflection on the head of this department. We think that the trouble is mainly with the present set-up.

Without casting any aspersions on the present board of Water Commissioners, we find that the authority vested in this board is much too broad. These powers, placed in the wrong hands, can lead to excessive expenditures and could lead to even more. We recommend that the setting of rates for wages, meter reading, billing, out of town meetings et al. be placed in the hands of the Selectmen. Accordingly we have asked the Selectmen to place an article in the warrant for this purpose.

The committee met many times during the year and at various times went to investigate the situation at the three brooks in question. After our investigation we find that most abutting owners are willing to live with the flow of natural water but find the problem to be the contamination of the water by sewerage. This is a recurrent problem all over town and the solution is beyond the scope of this committee.

We would like to suggest that these brooks be flushed at regular two weeks intervals during the dry season unless there is a heavy rainfall. We suggest that the \$500.00 appropriated at the last Town Meeting for widening one of these brooks and not expended for this purpose be used to defray the expense of these flushings if it is possible to release this money by a vote of this meeting.

- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$24,475 for the tuition of High School children of Greenville attending Appleton Academy in lieu of \$28,791.00 currently stated in the School Board's Budget for this purpose, or take any action relating thereto.

To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$24,475 to enter into an exclusive contract with Appleton Academy for the tuition of all High School children of Greenville in lieu of \$31,104.88 currently stated in the School Board's Budget for this purpose, or take any action relating thereto.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

During the summer the halls and toilet rooms were painted. Desks were repaired and a couch was added to the nurse's room for emergency use. Two metal window ventilators were installed in each classroom and thermometers were placed in order to control the temperature in each room.

FINANCES

The 1962-63 budget of the School Board shows an increase of \$10,174.85.

The major increases are in tuition \$7,614.88 reflecting an additional enrollment of 12 in high school in 1962-63.

Teachers' salaries were increased \$1,575.

Many of the pupil desk units in grades seven and eight are beyond repair and replacements will amount to \$450.

It will be necessary to do painting of the exterior at an estimated cost of \$265, and painting of hall and stairway ceilings. With these and other minor repairs, the Greenville Public School will be in fine condition in the ensuing school year.

CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the Greenville School Board, Greenville Public School staff, the clerical staff in the administrative office and the citizens of the town for their cooperation, patience and assistance during the transition period in the administration during the school year. Collectively we constitute a good educational team working for progress in educational offerings in order that the boys and girls of Greenville may be better prepared for their participation in today's world.
