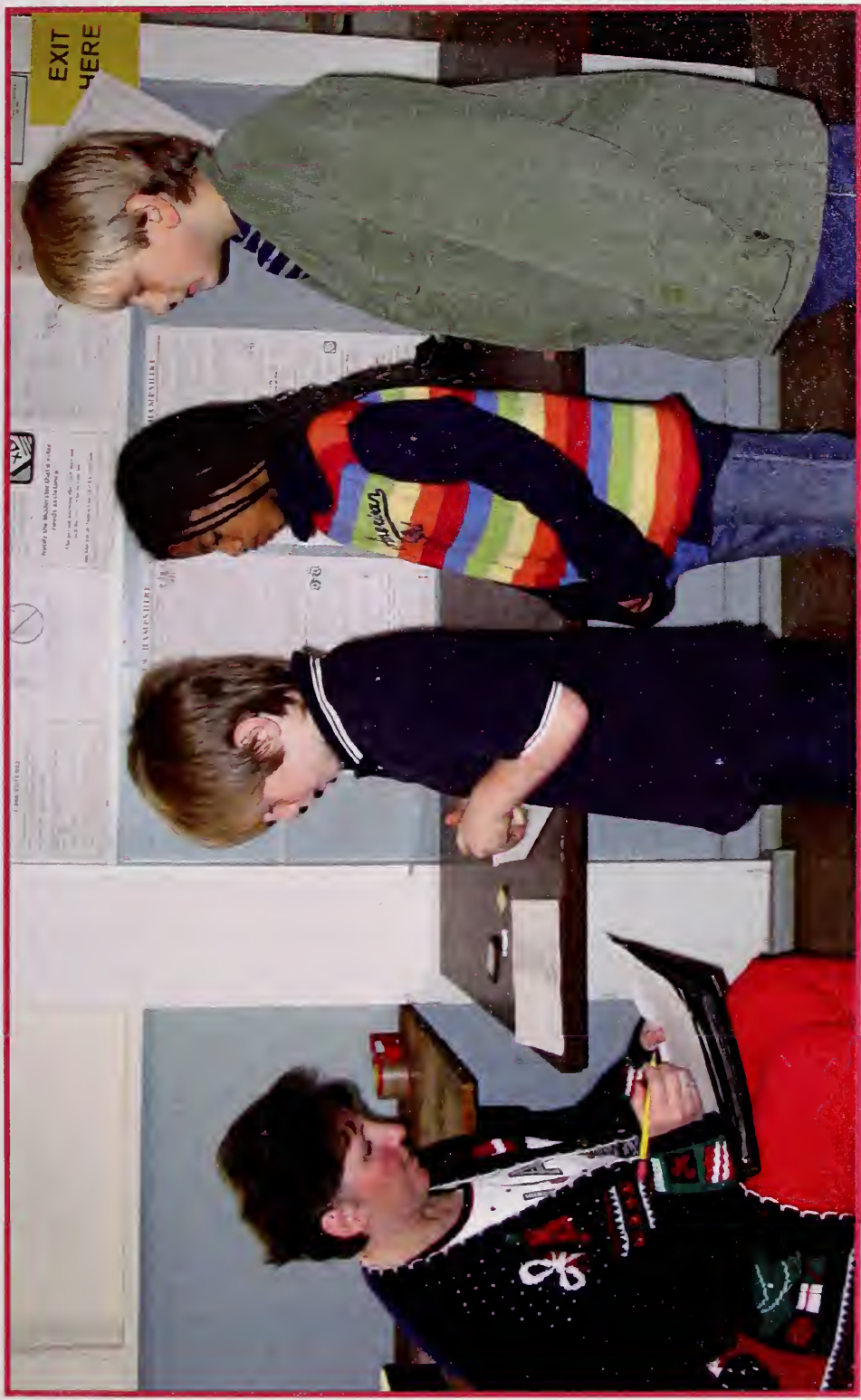

TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS of the Town of Nelson, in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs: YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED to meet in the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 2005, at 11:00 AM to act upon the following articles:

(POLLS will open at 11:00 AM and close at 7:00 PM)

(BUSINESS MEETING will start at 7:00 PM)

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 141,475.00 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing. (\$134,650 in 2004.)
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,358.75 support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: Home Health Care (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$808.75), The Keene Community Kitchen, Inc. (\$1,500) and Southwestern Community Services (\$500). (In 2004, these agencies received contributions from the Town in the amount of \$2,858.75)
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,000, to cover the cost of both a Town-wide revaluation and new assessing software to replace the current CAMA system. \$34,000 will be raised by taxes and \$20,000 will be transferred from the Revaluation 2006 Capital Reserve Fund, which had a balance of \$ 20,288.55 as of 12/31/04.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,350 for support of the Town Library. (In 2004, the appropriation was \$24,142.)

\$17,900 to be raised by taxes

\$ 7,450 income from Library memorial funds and other sources

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000, to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (2004 appropriation was \$2,000. The fund balance on 12/31/04 was \$ 8,228.63.)

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$715 for dues to belong to the Southwest Region Planning Commission. (\$712 in 2004)

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following addition to Article 14, Definitions, of the Nelson Zoning Ordinance, for clarification purposes, as recommended by the Nelson Planning Board:
"Footprint: The external dimensions of a structure, including any attached additions such as porches, decks, catwalks and stairs. Note: Unattached stone steps and patios are considered landscaping and are not included in the footprint." (By ballot)

ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,700 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that residents will still be charged for individual calls. (The appropriation for 2004 was \$2,138.96.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000, as the Town's share for the development of a Hazardous Mitigation Plan, to comply with a federal mandate . This work will be supervised by Southwest Region Planning Commission. The remaining

funds needed to accomplish this work will be provided by a grant through Southwest Region Planning Commission. This article is recommended by the Nelson Emergency Management Officer.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the proper expenses of the Fire Department and Rescue Squad. (The 2004 appropriation was \$10,000.)

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500, to cover expenses which will be reimbursed by the NH State Fire Warden, and will appear as revenue on the Budget Comparison. The Department of Revenue Administration recommends this method of accounting so as not to impact the Fire Department's operating budget.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to create a new Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. No withdrawals maybe made except by vote of the Town and upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,467 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. (\$24,500 in 2004.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to purchase a hand-held radar unit for use by the Police Department.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500 to cover the expense of patrols and details by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Office and other authorized municipal entities. The cost will be offset by grants and payments, which will appear as revenue on the Budget Comparison. The Department of Revenue Administration recommends this method of accounting, in order not to impact the operating budget of the Police Department.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Committee (which includes the Selectmen) recommends this appropriation. (The fund balance on 12/31/04 was \$19,735.94. 2004 appropriation was \$15,000.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$189,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year's budget.

\$151,090.79 TO BE RAISED BY TAXES

\$37,909.21 to be designated from the Highway Block Grant
(The 2004 appropriation was \$189,000.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000, to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the Salt Barn and Stormwater site work, at the Town Barn on Old Stoddard Road. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by the vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (2004 appropriation was \$55,000. Balance as of 12/31/04 was \$55,102.09.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 25,000 to install a well and septic system at the Town Barn on Old Stoddard Road.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 to be used by the Nelson Highway Department to install new safety signs on Nelson Roadways.

22. Shall the Town notify the Governor and the commissioner of the Department of Transportation of the State of New Hampshire that the Town has no objection to the complete discontinuance by the State of New Hampshire of that portion of Class II State Highway, being the

original Keene to Concord or Franklin Pierce Highway, lying between Mill Pond Road and Old Route 9 along land of Cucchi and the Methodist Chapel by the Lake and that if the State does discontinue said Highway, the Town of Nelson will not claim, assert or accept any right, title or interest to said highway or its right of way, and further:

Shall the Town notify the Governor and the Commissioner of the Department of Transportation of the State of New Hampshire that the Town approves the reconfiguration/realignment of the traffic pattern/flow from this discontinuance to the "T" intersection of Mill Pond Road and Granite Lake Road which includes widening the intersection of Mill Pond Road and Granite Lake Road by approximately five (5) feet along its easterly side from a point beginning at the southwestern point of the triangle of land formed by Old Route 9, and Mill Pond Road and Franklin Pierce Highway and extending northwesterly to a point of the intersection of Mill Pond Road and West Shore Road.

The Town of Nelson will not incur any costs associated to the reconstruction. The State of New Hampshire Department of Transportation will either perform the work or approve engineering plans and construction bids/contract.

Inserted by petition.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5500 to address silt erosion from Tolman Hill into Tolman Pond. The work is recommended by the Department of Environmental Services (DES). Inserted by petition.

OTHER ARTICLES

24. To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

Report from the Nelson Fire Chief

This has been another busy year for the Fire Department. The call level continues to be higher than in previous years, especially with regard to rescue calls. We have covered everything from a major structure fire down to the false alarm.

The approved articles this past year have allowed us to upgrade hoses and nozzles on one pumper, complete the EMT training and allow us to update some of our pagers. The pagers are a vital link in supporting each fire call. We plan on continuing to update them over the next few years.

We were awarded a grant from the NH Dept. of Safety, Division of Fire Safety and Emergency Management for the installation of a generator at the Nelson Center station. This unit has been installed and provides backup electricity for the complete building, supporting both the Fire Department and the Highway Department. This is a tremendous asset for the Town. Now, we just need to add usable water and restroom facilities to the building, to complete the work. As mentioned in last years report about the Homeland

Security Assessment & Strategy Program (NH Interoperability Fire/EMS Grant), we have had all of our mobile radios in our trucks replaced with these grant monies. The radios have multiple frequencies with multiple channels to support their operation. We now have the ability to go anywhere in the State and interact with different dispatch centers and fire units. They, in turn, have the same ability, if needed, in the Nelson area. The cost for these radios was in the vicinity of \$16,000, which in turn is your federal tax dollar at work, locally. We are now waiting for the second phase of this grant to provide us with new portable radios.

With the completion of our 911 project, we now have 911 maps of the Town, showing the number of the first and the last address of the houses for each street in Nelson. This is a great asset that allows us to reduce our response times to emergencies in Town. Each truck is equipped with these maps. We are in the process of providing surrounding towns and the Keene Fire Department with these maps in support of mutual aid calls.

We presently have one more individual from Nelson who is studying to be a Basic EMT. This continues a good trend that was started a few years back. EMT's continue to be a vital asset to both the Department and the Town. This category continues to have increasing activity. We presently have four (4) EMT's and, once trained, we will have a fifth (5th). As I've continued to mention in years past, we are always on the lookout for individuals who are interested in joining the Fire Department, especially those who are or want to become an EMT (Emergency Medical Technician). The Department will support the training activity for becoming certified. Anyone interested should contact me through the Fire Department.

Our number of calls this year totaled 41, which is comparable to the number of calls that we have seen in the past few years. Again this year, the Fire Log continues to show that rescue calls play a major roll in our activities. Also, we continue to support the mutual aid system that is very beneficial to all the towns involved. This system is very vital in providing resources and manpower for emergencies.

Remember, check your smoke detectors and replace the batteries on a regular basis. If you don't have smoke detectors, then it's highly recommended that you purchase and install them. They may save your life someday.

I would like to again thank all the active members for their continued effort and support. Remember, to report a fire or other emergency, DIAL 911 or 352-1100.

FIRE PERMITS

As stated in New Hampshire State law (RSA 224:2713), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, *without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.*

Burning may be done before 9 am or after 5 pm. If it is necessary to burn during the day for commercial purposes, a special permit is required from the State Forest Ranger. It is also possible to burn on a rainy day, but a written permit is still required. Written permission is required if an individual wishes to burn on land belonging to someone else, as well. If individuals wish to burn in an incinerator, a seasonal permit may be issued, but the burning must still be done before 9 am or after 5 pm. Currently, there is no charge for these permits.

My presence in Town seems to be positive. On that note, I am committed to maintaining a relationship that will allow proactive communication , in order to reach our goals/objectives.

Response to your concerns and managing a budget, as you know, are ongoing processes. I believe, as your Police Chief, I have been able to identify and set attainable goals, allowing me to better protect and serve the residents of Nelson. I know that with your continued support, 2005 will be a successful year.

As you can see from the above statistics, call activity has increased. In 2004, I spent a good deal of time performing traffic details for the State Police and Cheshire County. Last year, in the State of New Hampshire, the number of traffic fatalities on our highways and residential roads increased, due to speeding and DWI's. Two bits of information I'd like to pass on to you are the following:

- i. Speeding and DWI offenders have witnessed a steadier police presence on our main roads and all of the roads in Nelson.
- ii. The Town received an increase in revenue and compensation for the time involved, which reduced the strain on the Police Department's operating budget.

Granite Lake Road, Route 9 and Tolman Pond Road continue to be areas where I will increase the Police Department's presence in 2005.

I don't know how many of you are aware that we do not have a secure office/building site for our Police Department. I sincerely hope that in 2005, all Nelson residents will support our efforts to fulfill the goal of obtaining space for the Police Department. In keeping with the highest standards of the Town of Nelson, I plan to develop a program to actively involve the Town's youth. The younger generation will interact with Town Officials and parents, resulting in a productive solution to the needs of the community.

I want to wholeheartedly thank the residents of Nelson for their continued support, and the Town Officials who have remained supportive of my efforts. I will continue to work with and for the Town of Nelson, to maintain the highest quality of life.

In the year 2004, Nelson did not see much of a snow accumulation. The Spring proved to be an easy one as well, with mud being minimal.

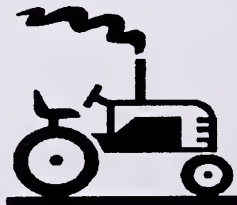

Nelson Conservation Commission Report - 2004

After a successful fund raising effort, the Nelson Conservation Commission, joined by the Harris Center, placed a conservation easement on 165 acres of the Hammond Property on Apple Hill Road in January. This has permanently protected the Black Brook wetland with its surrounding undisturbed natural environment. Building on the remaining 60 acres will be restricted to the construction of four single-family homes.

The Commission is grateful to the many residents and friends of Nelson who generously contributed to the fund to purchase the conservation easement. The goal was \$100,000 and it was met in the very short time imposed on us by the developer.

In addition, the Selectmen of the Town of Nelson agreed to support the project by placing ten additional acres of Town land adjoining the wetland under easement. Other landowners, including the Apple Hill Music Center, have pledged to place conservation easements on their land as well. In February, the public was invited to a walk led by Jeff Littleton to view the protected property.

Susan Weaver, NCC member, organized the annual spring roadway cleanup, which was held on two weekends in April with good participation from local residents. The Town was rewarded in the fall with 800 more daffodil bulbs which were planted in public areas. To date, 2400 daffodil bulbs have been planted along the roadsides in Nelson. Spring should look brighter each year ahead.

A more detailed natural resource inventory of the Great Meadow is underway to establish where natural plant communities are located as well as wildlife habitats. A meeting of landowners, who abut the wetland, was held in November. to inform them of the planned inventory and enlist their participation. The meeting was well attended and most of the owners of the larger parcels have signed on to the project. Since the wetlands lies in both Nelson and Harrisville, the NCC has been working with the Harrisville Conservation Commission, Historic Harrisville and the Harris Center to protect this important natural area.

As part of a plan to protect the sense of place of the mid-1800's village of Nelson from modern intrusion, the Peter Parker property on the north side of the village on Log Cabin Road was purchased by the NCC for the Town of Nelson and will be placed under easement. This nearly completes the protection around the Town begun by Henry Fuller when he generously placed easements on the south, west and east sides of the village almost ten years ago.

The Commission encourages any residents who may be considering a sale of their land to inform any of our members, to discuss possible options that may be available that will both protect the land and benefit the landowner.

2004 Olivia Rodham Memorial Library Report

Our library is known in the State as a very fine small town library. We are an active member of the library community, both borrowing and lending books through Interlibrary Loan. Other libraries call us for ideas and send their trustees to see our facility and our practices. We have a varied and changing collection. Our patrons are generous – of all the new books we get each year, almost one-half are donated by you!

Our Interlibrary Loan (ILL) activity is very high for a library of our size. We take pride in being able to get almost any book or video a patron requests. Due to our high volume of interlibrary loan requests, we now qualify for weekly deliveries to our doorstep. Previously, we had to pick up and drop off books in Keene. Interlibrary Loan increased 42% to 736 items lent or borrowed.

We offered two new summer programs for children. Tim Stillman volunteered his time and expertise in puppet making for a six-week program meeting on Tuesdays. He facilitated the making of a giant puppet of Johnny Appleseed. The children contributed ideas and their skills to

create this 15-foot giant. Sage Feldman, an art major, assisted Mr. Stillman in the technical processes. The program culminated on Old Home Day with the entrance of the Johnny Appleseed puppet onto the lawn in front of the library. During Old Home Week, Mr. Phil and Co. came to perform magic in "From Hams to Heroes". Seventy-five children and adults attended the program. This program was supported by a grant of the NH Council on the Arts and the NH State Library, donations from the Bryne Foundation, the Cogswell Benevolent Trust and the Madeline G. Weber Trust. During the six week summer reading program, 26 children read 302 books. The Friends of the Library hosted the parties and gave Toadstool gift certificates to children in the program.

In a new venture, the Trustees and Friends of the Library teamed up to offer a Summer Forum of five lectures on different aspects of Nelson history. Our speakers were: Marshall Davenson, Ethan Tolman, Barney Quigley, Alan Rumrill, and Rick Church. The lectures were very well attended and people enjoyed refreshments and browsing in the library after each talk. There are CDs (produced by John Cucchi) and transcripts of these programs available for library patrons to borrow.

Two ongoing programs remain popular with the Nelson community. The adult book group meets once a month on Tuesday mornings. The after-school program meets on Thursdays. Sandy Ferguson reads to the children and then leads a related activity. Twelve children attend each week.

This year, we again focused on making the library more visible and enticing to the public. Working on library aesthetics, we added two bulletin boards that now display reviews and colorful advertising of new books in the library. Patrons may refer to these as a quick reference to get or reserve a book. We also used donations to buy a comfortable couch for cozy reading in the children's section.

The library collection is constantly changing and being updated. Old, tattered, and unused books are weeded out as we make room for new books. We purchased a series of books on individual countries geared toward school-age patrons. We added several audio books on CD. Identifying spine labels were added to several collections for easier identification and to ensure that the books are returned to their proper places in the library. The labels are "History" on the fictional juvenile books, colored spine labels on the comic book collection, "Local Author"

spine labels on the May Sarton collection and "Local History" labels on the Nelson Book Collection. Also, we added more labels to identify adult videos, including "Humor", "Classic", "Fantasy", "Science Fiction", "Young Adult", "Mystery", and "Historical Fiction".

Another summer tradition is the Book Sale on Old Home Day, hosted by the Friends of the Library. This year was a success, with a total income of \$1370. Thank you to everyone who donated books, tapes, CDs, and videos; bought book bags; or became a member of the Friends of the Library. You made it possible to buy \$1,000 worth of books for the general library collection, to be purchased in the year 2005. Donations of books can be dropped off at the library throughout the year. Especially needed is the donation of time before, during and after Old Home Day to organize the sale. The Friends of the Library also hosted the Annual Friends meeting held in July and co-sponsored the Summer Forum.

The Nelson Library receives monetary donations throughout the year. Monies from Memorial Funds supplement Town appropriations and gifts to the library. Other donations we appreciate are the current (only the present month please) periodicals that are dropped in our box. The periodical reading corner has two comfortable reading chairs in which to peruse our selection of 25 monthly magazines.

Bruce McSheehy is our regular library substitute, with Sienna Giffin and Lumina Greenway filling in. Bruce is well versed in library filing systems and accomplishes many tasks when he is in the library.

Patrons with overdues are called twice a month by a volunteer, resulting in a reasonable return rate for library materials.

The Trustees during 2004 were Sandy Mackenzie, Betsy Street, Gordon Peery, Ethan Tolman and Donna Kidd. There were 11 meetings of the Library Trustees this year.

This year, the volunteers totaled 280 hours. The following list includes most of the volunteers. If I have forgotten anyone, my apologies!

Notes on 2004 Treasurer's Reports and 2005 Budget

2004 Bottom Line: Expenses exceeded income by \$284.16.

Income: The Library received \$954 more than budgeted from the Melville Fund (managed by the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation). We also received a \$200 grant to help pay for a summer children's performance.

Expenses: Overage in Children's Programs is offset by \$200 grant funding. The Telecommunications line item covers a voice phone line, an Internet phone line and an Internet service provider. The Celia Wiechart Memorial Fund funded the couch purchase. We drew down our cash balance by \$1018 to help pay for the Basement project.

Memorial Funds: Some funds are restricted to certain areas (like children's books); others are unrestricted. We transferred money from the Henry Fuller and Henry Melville Funds into the Building Fund to help pay for the Basement project.

Basement Building Project: We fully expended what remained in the Building Fund to upgrade the current basement exit and add a second basement exit. This was Phase 1 of a longer-term project to make the basement space safe, useable and available. The 2005 Proposed Budget includes \$500 (from the \$2000 we did not spend last year) to pay for contracted finish-up work by our contractor in the spring.

2005 Proposed Budget Notes: We are decreasing the Book budget because of the continuing generosity of book donors in town - almost half our books come to us via donations. The increase in Children's Programs pays for a summer performance in case we do not get a grant this year. We do not intend to spend \$2000 in Repairs and Maintenance. However, your vote authorizes the expense if things come up during the year. We would use money from memorial funds to cover any expenses here.

We are requesting a tax appropriation of \$25,350, of which \$17,900 will come from property taxes and \$7,450 from endowment, gifts and other funds.

2004 Report from the Planning Board

The Nelson Planning Board has been working on an update of the Nelson Master Plan. The current (and first) version was adopted in 1984. While many of the concepts of that original plan (such as valuing the rural character of the town) are still relevant, there is a need to update the statistical information, as well as other information, such as noting the addition to the school, and the building of the new Olivia Rodham Memorial Library building. There are also numerous conservation and other land-use components that need to be included. Once completed, this document will provide the basis for both anticipation and management of future growth of the town.

The Planning Board has been fortunate to have many residents of the Town who volunteered their time to help on this project; this group is called the RE:Visions Committee. The work has involved researching how other towns have done their Master Plans, receiving guidance from various State resources on the subject, and gathering information from other resources in the Town. The topics addressed in a Master Plan include schools, roads, and determining areas of Town that are either appropriate or inappropriate for development. Of course, the term “development” in Nelson has different connotations than it does for other towns, so information needs to be adopted accordingly.

A very important part of the Master Plan preparation is getting information from Townspeople as to how they envision (and desire) the future of the Town. An initial hearing was held several months ago. Shortly, a survey will be sent out to everyone in Town that will provide further direction on this topic. At least one more hearing will be held prior to

for the 2006 Nelson Town Meeting.

Once the new Master Plan is in place, it is the intention of the Planning Board to update it regularly, so that it reflects current information, and ensures that the future process of updating it is not such a huge endeavor. If you have questions or input concerning the Master Plan, please feel free to contact me.

In other Planning Board news, the board reviewed 6 requests for subdivisions. Each subdivision application we considered was approved, resulting in the creation of seven new lots. In one case, the creation of a new lot was to allow that land to be part of a conservation easement. Four of those new lots have been recorded. The remaining three are pending further action on the part of the applicants before the official Mylar is signed and filed with the Registry of Deeds.

The Planning Board usually meets on the second Thursday of every month, and meetings are open to the public. If you have business that you would like to bring before the Board, please contact Vangie McCormick at the Town Office to confirm a meeting date, and to reserve an appointment on the agenda.

It has been an interesting and instructive year for the Planning Board. I would like to express my appreciation to my fellow Board Members, members of the RE:Visions Committee, and especially, to our clerk, Vangie McCormick, who really keeps us on our toes.

REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR FOR 2004

Special memories linger from 2004. Writing my annual report to you is a wonderful time for reflection.

The year was very busy with a total of four elections, ending with the General Election in November. The turnout in Nelson for the General Election reflected the turnout state-wide, with over 80% of our voters casting ballots! It is always a joy to be with our townspeople who work at the polls. The high volume of ballots cast required three teams of vote counters. With many requirements to provide a safe voting environment, everyone stayed "on their toes". What might have been a very cumbersome process went very smoothly. Thank you to everyone who participated in the process.

The teachers at the Nelson School did an excellent job bringing their students to the Town Hall to register their presidential preference. It was wonderful to see our children learn the process and the importance of voting.

In response to HAVA, the Help America Vote Act, signed into law by President Bush in 2002, we made some minor improvements in our polling place to ensure voter accessibility and to comply with the law. As well, the State of New Hampshire is developing a state-wide voter registration list. This will be helpful in maintaining the purity of votes cast and make it possible in the future for New Hampshire to work with other states to ensure a legitimate voting system. This should be accomplished for New Hampshire in 2005.

The State of New Hampshire has been testing their computer software upgrade for the Motor Vehicle registration process. We are looking forward to the upgrade. The system promises to be more user friendly and will enable us to do more directly on-line.

I extend my sincere thanks to Edith Notman, Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector. It is wonderful having Edith in our office. Her competence and wit are a joy. Thank you, Edith.

Please stop by to say hello and view the current archival exhibit. Bert Wingerson assembles bits and pieces from our past to create delightful exhibits which keep our Nelson history alive. We are very fortunate to have Bert's expertise and creativity.

As well, thank you for giving me the opportunity to work for you. With

each New Year, there are new challenges and rewards. I continue to look forward to what is yet to come.

Nominated for Commissioner: Kevin Robbins; Sally Ripley, Clerk; John Halter, Moderator; and Tom Yocono, Treasurer. The article was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*
2. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Commissioners to borrow in anticipation of taxes. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*
3. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$350 to defray the expenses for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*
4. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to purchase liability insurance to cover the District. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*
5. To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to add to the Capital Reserve Fund for dam maintenance, repair and/or replacement. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*
6. To see whether the District will accept funds from the Granite Lake Association or from any other source for the purpose of maintaining, repairing and/or replacing the dam. The motion was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*

8. To see if the District will schedule its' annual meeting to follow the Granite Lake Association meeting in 2005. The article was appropriately moved and seconded. A short discussion followed concerning the date on which the water would be drawn down approximately two feet for the winter. It was agreed that it would begin on Columbus Day, 2004. Then the article was appropriately moved and seconded. *The vote was affirmative.*

A motion to adjourn was made and seconded. The vote was affirmative. The meeting adjourned at about 12:55 PM.

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 9, 2004

The hustle and bustle of readying the polls to open is always accomplished with expectation and usually just in the "nick of time". Participation in the democratic process does matter. It being the hour of noon, Moderator Ethan Tolman called for order and opened the meeting. It was moved and seconded to waive the reading of the entire warrant until the business portion of the meeting. After reading articles #1 and #10, Mr. Tolman declared the polls open. The weather outside was overcast and brisk, and the activity inside was upbeat and brisk, with a total of 212 out of 502 voters casting ballots.

ARTICLES OF A GENERAL NATURE

1. To choose necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Ethan Tolman, Moderator, called the business portion of the meeting to order promptly at 7PM. At this point in our meeting, the polls are still open for the election of officers, and this year for action on the zoning amendments as well. Ethan pointed out the disruption that this situation causes, and requested a sense of the meeting toward asking the Selectmen to change the time of the voting at future Town Meetings to 11am to 7pm. It was the sense of the meeting to request that the Selectmen consider a change in voting hours for next year.

Representative Jack Pratt was introduced. Jack said a quick hello but declined to address the meeting. Mr. Tolman then indicated that Brad Miller, our Police Chief, and Sharon Johnson, Administrative Assistant to the Selectmen, are not Town residents. Mr. Tolman stated that unless he heard indications to the contrary, he would allow them to speak to the meeting when needed. There was no objection.

Again this year, as in past years, the Boy and Girl Scouts formed a procession with their flags and led the meeting in the Pledge of Allegiance. We are fortunate to have such nice young people to provide the leadership in this activity. At this point, the business portion of the Town Meeting began.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$134,650 to defray Town charges for the year ensuing. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$136,930.) The article was accepted as read. There was little discussion and the article passed by voice vote.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,858.75 support of social service agencies which provide assistance to Nelson residents. The agencies chosen to receive funds are: Home Health Care (\$550), Monadnock Family Services (\$808.75), The Keene Community Kitchen, Inc.

(\$1000) and Southwestern Community Services (\$500). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (In 2003, these agencies received contributions from the Town in the same amount.) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article passed by voice vote.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,000 to begin work on a second egress and handicapped accessibility to and from the lower level of the Olivia Rodham Memorial Library. The funds will come from the Library Building Fund and memorial funds. Balance as of 12/31/03 in the Building Fund was \$ (29,879.87) The article was accepted as read. Gordon Peery, Chair of the Library Trustees, addressed questions concerning the funding for this project and the long range plans for the area. The article was passed by voice vote.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,142 for support of the Town Library. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$20,318.)

\$17,210 to be raised by taxes

\$ 6,932 income from Library memorial funds and other sources. The article was accepted and seconded as read. Betsy Street, Library Trustee, addressed the budget

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to be added to the Town Buildings Capital Reserve Fund. No withdrawals may be made from the fund except by vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$2,000. The fund balance on 12/31/03 was \$6,164.06.) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion, and the article passed by voice vote.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$1,000, to complete work on the Revolutionary War Monument. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. Susan Peery indicated what remains to be done to complete work in the monument area, including a bench and a marker indicating the gift of the monument itself made by John and Bess Bradshaw. Susan invited everyone to the rededication ceremony scheduled for this Memorial Day. The article was passed by voice vote.

8. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an Exemption for the Disabled, under the provisions of RSA 72:37-b as follows: the exemption from assessed value for qualified taxpayers shall be \$25,000. To qualify, the person must be eligible under Title II or Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act, must occupy the property as his principle place of abode, must own the property individually or jointly, or if owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years, had in the calendar year preceding April 1 a net income from all sources, of not more than \$13,400 for a single person and \$20,400 for a married person, and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000, excluding the value of the actual residence and up to 2 acres or the minimum single family residential lot specified in the local zoning ordinance. The Selectmen recommend adoption of this article. (By ballot.) The article was accepted as read. Jane Kirk, Selectwoman, explained the different exemptions now offered through the Town, and observed that this exemption "rounds out" our ability to help those who qualify. The article carried by written ballot. Voting results: YES - 97, NO - 4.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH PLANNING & ZONING

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$712 for dues to belong to the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$712) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article was passed by voice vote.

10. Are you in favor of the repeal of the existing Nelson Zoning Ordinance, dated March, 1986 and any subsequent amendments, and the adoption of the revision (as posted in the Town Hall on 3/9/04) proposed by the Nelson Planning Board? The Selectmen recommend this article. (By ballot) This article was presented for vote on the Official Town Ballot. Vote results are YES - 148. NO - 36.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH SERVICE AND PROTECTION

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,138.96 as a subsidy for ambulance service for the ensuing year, it being understood that residents will still be charged for individual calls. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The appropriation for 2003 was \$2,611.75 for 5 quarters. 2004 appropriation covers 4 quarters. The City of Keene caught up!) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article passed by voice vote.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500 to update the electrical wiring at the Munsonville Fire Station and replace the remaining original garage door. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article was passed by voice vote.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the proper expenses of the

Fire Department and Rescue Squad. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$9000.) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article was passed by voice vote.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to purchase 500 feet of 2.5" hose and nozzles for the 3M1 fire truck. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. Rick Lothrop, Fire Chief, explained what this expenditure is for, and the article was passed by voice vote.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500, to cover the cost of EMT training and pagers for members of the Department. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. Rick Lothrop, Fire Chief, explained what this expenditure is for, and the article was passed by voice vote.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500, to cover expenses which will be reimbursed by the NH State Fire Warden, and will appear as revenue on the Budget Comparison. The Department of Revenue Administration recommends this method of accounting so as not to impact the Fire Department's operating budget. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article passed by voice vote.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,500 for the proper expenses of the Police Department. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$24,500.) The article was accepted as read. Charlie Lang, Selectman, presented the

issues at hand and the article was passed by voice vote.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$915 to purchase a digital camera (equipped for nighttime exposures) for use by the Police Department. The State of New Hampshire has mandated that photos be taken in juvenile cases. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. Brad Miller, Police Chief explained what kind of camera is required to provide the pictures which will support investigations. The article was passed by voice vote.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a purchase agreement on a vehicle equipped to the specifications of the Nelson Police Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,816.04 for the first of three equal years' payments. Total of payments over 3 years will be \$26,448.12. Upon delivery of the new vehicle, the former cruiser will be sold; the funds received will be shown in the "Sale of Town Property" category of the Budget Comparison. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. 2/3 majority vote required, by ballot. The article was accepted as read. Charlie Lang, Selectman and Brad Miller, Police Chief, explained what kind of vehicle the Selectmen and Police Chief are looking at and what its features and benefits are. The ballot vote results are: YES - 92, NO - 8.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 6,800 to cover the expense of patrols by the Nelson Police Department for the State of New Hampshire, Cheshire County Sheriff's Office and other authorized municipal entities. The cost will be offset by grants, which will appear as revenue on the Budget Comparison. The Department of Revenue Administration recommends this

method of accounting, in order not to impact the operating budget of the Police Department. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. Charlie Lang, Selectman explained the accounting aspects of this article & Brad Miller, Police Chief, indicated what his process is to obtain grants. The article was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLES DEALING WITH ROADS

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 to be added to the Road Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund for the purchase of road equipment except by vote of the Town and upon recommendation of the Road Equipment Committee. The Road Equipment Committee (which includes the Selectmen) recommends this appropriation. (No appropriation was made in 2003. The Fund balance on 12/31/03 was \$4,662.10.) The article was accepted as read. There was no discussion and the article passed by voice vote.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$189,000 for the maintenance of highways and bridges for the ensuing year budget. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (The 2003 appropriation was \$171,000.)

\$153,572.73 TO BE RAISED BY TAXES

\$35,427.27 to be designated from the Highway Block Grant

The article was accepted as read. Sam Bouchie, Selectman, addressed this article and explained the increase is due primarily to purchase and transportation of sand and gravel. The article passed by voice vote.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55,000, which will be used to establish a new Capital Reserve Fund, the proceeds of which will be used to construct a new Salt Barn and complete the Stormwater site work at the Town Barn on Old Stoddard Road. Total cost is estimated to be \$160,000. This project is recommended by the US Environmental Protection Agency and the NH Department of Environmental Services, and must be completed within 5 years. \$25,000 of this appropriation shall be raised from taxes and \$30,000 will be re-paid from the year-end undesignated fund balance. It is understood that no withdrawals may be made from this Fund except by the vote of the Town. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The article was accepted as read. There was much discussion centering not only on the necessity of this construction, but also on the building construction itself. Charlie Lang, Selectman, explained that the State is mandating the control storm water run-off. In our case, this means constructing a barn to house our salt and sand. The article passed by voice vote.

At this time Ethan Tolman, Moderator, stepped down as Moderator so he might address Article #24. Richard Church, Assistant Moderator, assumed the Moderator's position.

24. To see if the Town will vote to designate Nubanusit Road and Brickyard Road as scenic roads, per RSA 231:157. By petition, with the signatures of 10 registered voters of Nelson, NH, as required by RSA's 231:157-158. Richard Church, Assistant Moderator, read the article and it was accepted as read. Several townspeople addressed the pros & cons of scenic roads. The discussion was extensive, and a motion to end debate passed by voice

vote. There was a call for a written vote on the article as presented. The article was defeated by written ballot: YES - 49, NO - 52.

25. To see if the Town will vote to deposit 100% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (Land Use Change Tax) into a Conservation Fund, in accordance with RSA 36-A:5,III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25,II. The article was accepted as read. Kathy Schillemat offered an amendment as follows: "I move that Article #25 be amended as follows: To see if the Town will vote to deposit up to \$5,000 of the revenue collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (Land Use Change Tax) into a Conservation Fund, in accordance with RSA 36-A:5,III as authorized by RSA 79-A:25,II". This motion to amend the article was defeated by voice vote. Jeff Littleton of the Conservation Commission addressed the article, explaining what the money will be used for, and the Town went on to accept the article as presented by voice vote.

OTHER ARTICLES

26. To transact any other business or discuss other warrant proposals as may legally be brought before the meeting.

At this time, John Bunce stood and asked that the meeting recognize the sincere dedication and hard work contributed to the Town by Jane S. Kirk during her time as Selectman. Jane is seeking another three-year term on that board, and is being challenged by John Cucchi for her seat. John Bunce noted that if Jane were to lose, her many contributions would go without recognition. John read from a letter to the editor which Vangie McCormick sent to the Keene Sentinel. Vangie's letter noted the qualities necessary for good public service and expressed strong support of Jane in her bid for another term. The meeting

gave Jane a standing ovation with an extended round of applause.

Jane Kirk, Chair of the Board of Selectmen, then made presentations to three individuals in Town for their outstanding contributions to the Town:

David Birchenough for seeing the adoption of 911 street numbering from beginning to completion.

Michael Blaudschun for 24 years on the Board of Adjustment

John Newcombe for 15 years on the Planning Board

Each was given a signed, framed picture of the 2003 Town Report cover and a signed copy of Ralph Page's book "Night of Horror", a book about the hurricane of 1938.

The Town Meeting gave each of these individuals a resounding round of applause.

Once the meeting had quieted, Ethan Tolman, Moderator, asked for a motion to adjourn. The motion was so moved and the meeting came to a close at 10:35PM.

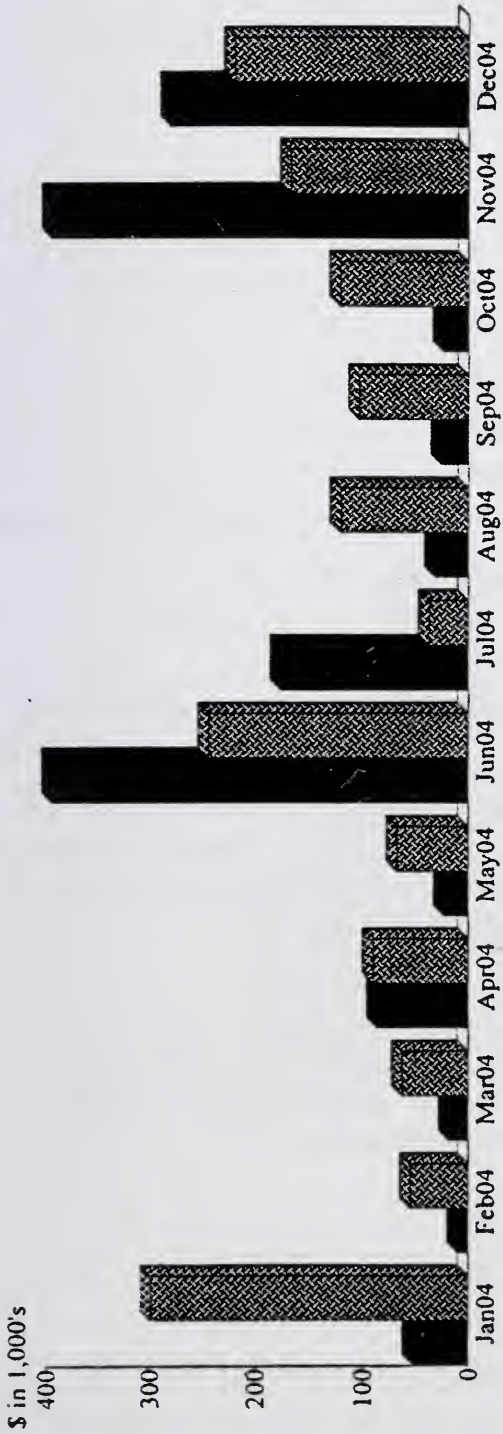

Income and Expense Chart

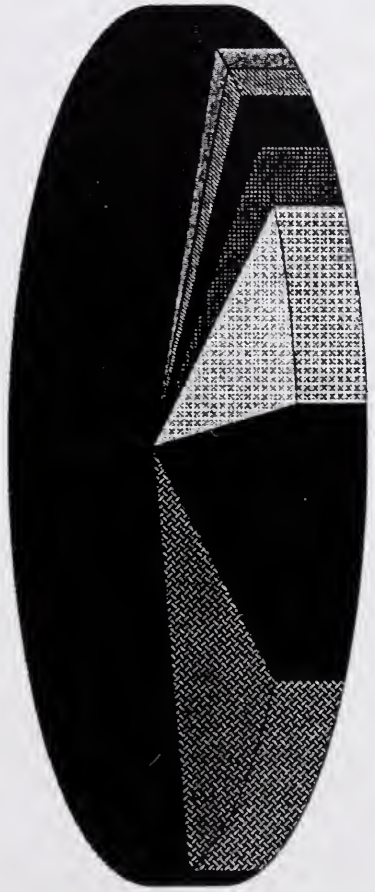

You are hereby notified to meet at the Nelson Town Hall in said District on the 4th day of March, 2005, at 7:00 p.m. to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will appropriate and authorize the School Board to transfer up to \$10,000 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2005, to the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or to take any other action in relation thereto. *(The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)*

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will appropriate and authorize the School Board to transfer up to \$10,000 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2005, to the High School/Middle School Tuition Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999, for the purpose of

paying future year unanticipated special education and/or middle and high school tuitions, or to take any other action in relation thereto. If there is an insufficient, undesignated fund balance as of June 30, 2005 to fund this appropriation and the appropriation in Article 4 (expendable tuition trust transfer), Article 3 will be funded first, with any additional surplus to be applied to this warrant article. *(The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)*

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,200 for the purchase of a theater residency program, or to take any action in relation thereto. *(The Nelson School Board recommends favorable action on this warrant article.)*

ARTICLE 7: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board
Nelson School District
Nelson, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Nelson School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2004 as shown on pages 2 through 4. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Nelson School District's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Management has chosen not to implement Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments*. Therefore, these financial statements are presented following the principles that were in effect prior to GASB Statement No. 34. Management has not presented government-wide financial statements to display the financial position and changes in financial position of its governmental activities and business-type activities. The financial statements presented do not contain separate statements for governmental, proprietary, if applicable, and fiduciary fund types, nor are major and non-major funds, separately identified and classified. The financial statements presented report expendable trust funds which should be reported as special revenue funds under the new reporting model. The financial statements also present a general long-term debt account group which should not be reported as such, but the information contained therein should be included in the government-wide financial statements were they presented. Also, the financial statements do not contain any information on capital assets because the government has not maintained historical cost records of such assets. Management has not presented a management's discussion and analysis as required. The amounts that would be reported in the missing statements and required supplementary information, and the effects of reclassifying and properly reporting the information presented are not reasonably determined.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the Nelson School District as of June 30, 2004, or the changes in its financial position or its cash flows, where applicable, for the year then ended.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Nelson School District basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund statements and schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. For reasons stated in the third paragraph of this report, we expressed an opinion that the financial statements of the Nelson School District do not fairly present financial position, results of operations, and cash flows, if applicable, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Therefore, we do not express an opinion on the accompanying combining and individual fund statements and schedules.

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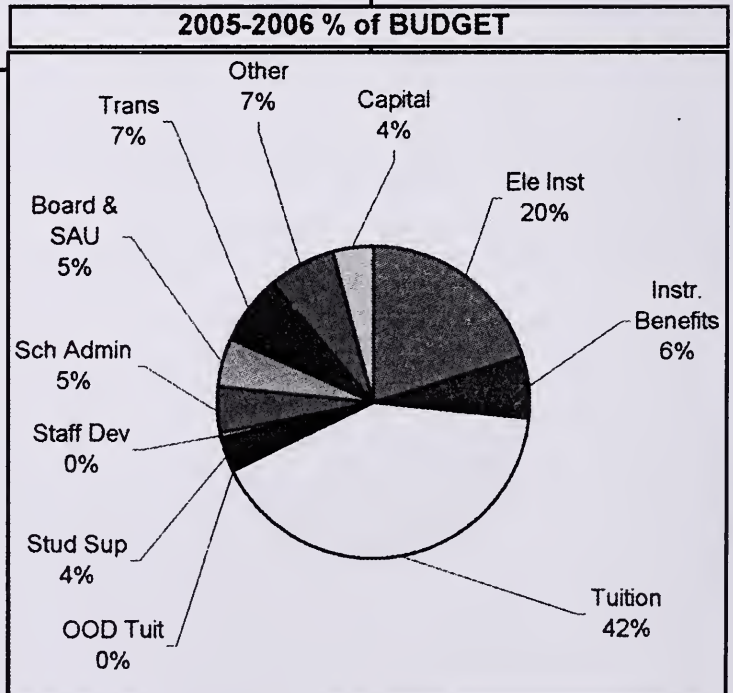
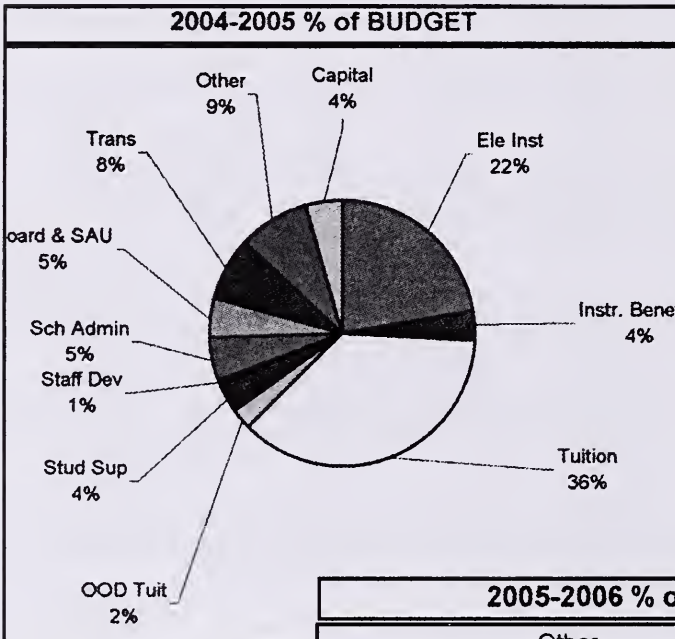

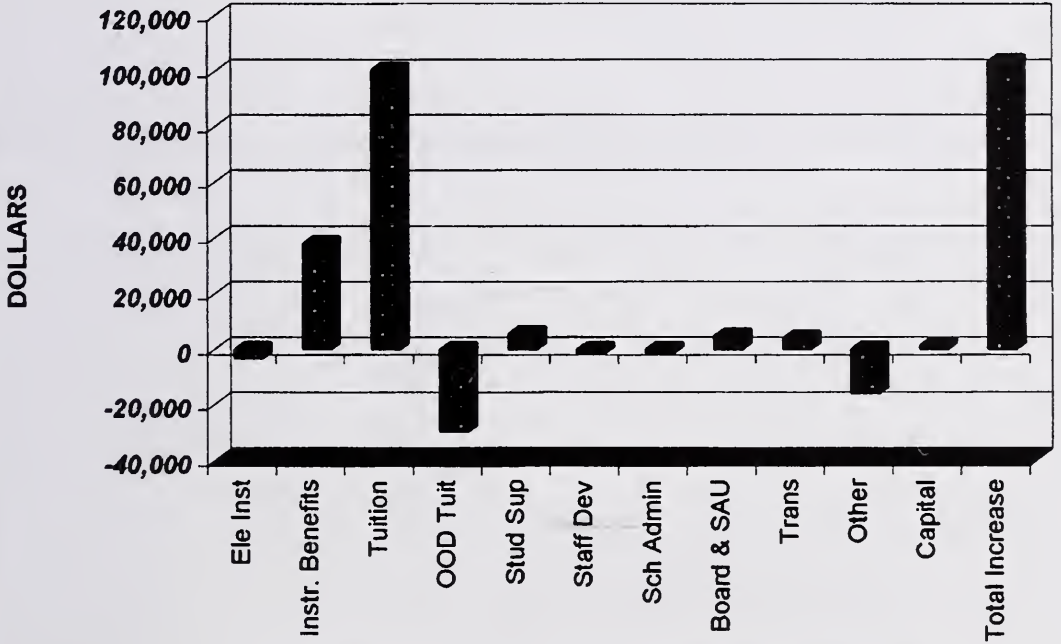

NELSON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 5, 2004

Ethan Tolman, Moderator, declared the polls open at 3:00 p.m. He announced that the business meeting will start at 7:00 p.m. and that the polls will remain open until 8:00 p.m.

At 7:00 p.m., Moderator Ethan Tolman called the meeting to order. A motion was made and seconded to waive the reading of the warrant. In attendance from School Administrative Unit #29 were: Dr. Phillip G. McCormack, Superintendent of Schools, Wayne Woolridge, Assistant Superintendent, and Tim Ruehr, Business Manager for Towns. Also in attendance were 34 residents of the Town of Nelson.

Article 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District receive the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen as printed in the annual report. Article 1 was passed as presented.

Article 2: To see the District will vote to authorize the withdrawal of up to \$21,000 to be used for renovations and/or replacement of the Nelson School's playground and related costs from the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District authorize the withdrawal of up to \$2 1,000 to be used for renovations and/or replacement of the Nelson School's playground and

related costs from the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/ reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes. Kelly French, School Board Chairman, began a presentation on the history of the Nelson School Playground. Anne Cucchi, School Board Member, as a member of the playground committee, concluded the presentation with a discussion of the proposed changes, including safety issue changes, an increase in size to the climbing structure, an outdoor learning center, a full basketball court, an awning over the sandbox, and ground cover. After some discussion, the article was passed as presented.

Article 3: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,261,391 for the support of schools, for the salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District. Kelly French explained the 2004-2005 proposed budget. After some discussion, an amendment to the Article was proposed to change the amount to be raised to \$1,246,391. It was moved and seconded to accept the amendment. After some discussion, the amendment was defeated. Article 3 was passed as presented.

Article 4: To see if the District will appropriate and authorize the school board to transfer up to \$1 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2004, to the High School/Middle School Tuition Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999, for the purpose of paying future year unanticipated special education and/or middle and high school tuitions, or to take any action in relation thereto.

It was moved and seconded that the District pass over Article 4. The article was passed over.

Article 5: To see if the District will appropriate and authorize the school board to transfer up to \$1 of its unencumbered funds, if any, remaining on hand at the end of fiscal year, June 30, 2004, to the Capital Reserve Fund established by the voters of the District at the March, 1972, District Meeting for the purpose of construction/reconstruction of buildings and/or purchase of equipment, and/or the acquisition of land for school purposes, or to take any action in relation thereto. If there is an insufficient, undesignated fund balance as of June 30, 2004, to fund this appropriation and the appropriation in Article 4 (expendable tuition trust transfer), Article 4 will be funded first, with any additional surplus to be applied to this warrant article.

It was moved and seconded that the District pass over Article 5. The article was passed over.

Article 6: To see if the District will vote to designate the Nelson School Board as agents to expend from the Special Education/High School/Middle School Tuition Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999.

It was moved and seconded that the District designate the Nelson School Board as agents to expend from the Special Education/High School/Middle School Tuition Fund established by the voters on March 5, 1999. Article 6 was passed as presented.

Article 7: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

After a thank you to the members of the Playground Committee, it was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 p.m.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

This year marks the third anniversary of the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) legislation, a significant piece of federal legislation that has and will continue to have a tremendous impact on Nelson School and how we will be held accountable for student performance.

Student performance is the focus of NCLB. Although there are many ways in which this can be measured, NCLB relied on the statewide testing program (NHEIAP) in 2004 to provide the data by which schools are measured. This year, as in recent years, Nelson's students have performed very well on these tests. At the third grade level, 67 percent of the students scored at the "basic or better" level in English language arts. (Basic is the equivalent to "at grade level.") These students did similarly well in mathematics with 89 percent of the students scoring at the basic or better level. Sixth grade students performed exceptionally well with 100 percent of the students scoring at the basic or better level in English and 93 percent scoring at the basic or better level in mathematics. Nelson's sixth graders' mean-scaled scores were well above those for the state. In addition to scoring well according to state standards, scores earned by both the third and sixth graders place them well above federal expectations related to No Child Left Behind.

The assessments required by Federal No Child Left Behind legislation determine whether or not schools meet standards established by the state and federal governments, also known as Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). This past year, the Nelson staff has focused tremendous effort on interpreting the results of the assessments and identifying areas in the curriculum in need of strengthening.

A curriculum conference area was established on SAU 29's e-mail system in order to provide a centralized location for Nelson staff to access state and SAU 29 curriculum information. All Nelson curriculum committee work, state curriculum frameworks, curriculum guides, and information related to No Child Left Behind are now posted and accessible to all Nelson staff members. Information is reviewed and edited on a regular basis.

In 2004, the New Hampshire Department of Education joined with its counterparts in Vermont and Rhode Island to

create the New England Comprehensive Assessment program (NECAP). NECAP establishes criteria for the assessment of all Nelson students in grades three through six in mathematics, reading, and writing as required by the federal government through No Child Left Behind legislation. During the summer of 2004, special curriculum committees composed of classroom teachers reviewed these new standards for assessment and school progress and rewrote curriculum documents so as to address these new Grade Level Expectations. The results of that committee's work have been posted on the Curriculum Conference of the SAU 29 e-mail system. All Nelson students in grades three through six will be annually tested on the Grade Level Expectations beginning in October of 2005.

Although not recognized as a standard measure as determined by NCLB, the performance of students in the classroom is also a valid indicator of performance. Nelson students continue to do well at Keene Middle School and Keene High School. For example, Nelson has 42 students at Keene High School this year. The overall grade point average (GPA) was 3.02 as compared to 2.73 for the total Keene High student body. Nelson students' attendance rate (96.4%) was also above the high school rate (94.4%). Seventy-two percent of the students taking an English class earned a grade of "B" or better. Seventy-four percent of those taking a math class, 73 percent taking a science class, 78 percent a social studies class, and 61 percent taking a world language earned a grade of "B" or better. Many of the students were enrolled in honors or Advanced Placement classes in the core subject areas (English, science, mathematics, history, and world language) and performed very well. One hundred percent of those enrolled in one or more of these classes earned a grade of "B" or better.

Nelson has a tremendous level of parental involvement and support, which research shows is critical to student success and overall school quality. The new Nelson School playground is a direct result of a strong PTA presence and high volunteerism, which are characteristics of Nelson School. These factors contribute to a positive school environment and strong community ownership in, and support for, the school. Nelson teachers have continued their efforts to ensure that the children are offered a well-coordinated and challenging curriculum. Many have worked hard to broaden their subject area background and/or their skills to meet the needs of each child

and to enhance their effectiveness as a teacher. This has come as a result of their involvement in quality professional development training in areas such as skillful teaching techniques, curriculum mapping, technology integration, teaching in the content area (reading, social studies), and the needs of disabled students.

The constructive working relationship between the school board and staff continues to promote continuous school improvement. This is facilitated by good communication between the staff and board and by board members' recognition of, and interaction with, the staff. One example of this is the annual school board/staff goal-setting retreat. This activity not only produces a focus around which planning and allocation of resources occurs, but also a dynamic of cooperation and trust.

The Nelson School community should be very proud of its school. The improvement that has occurred should not be taken for granted, nor should the strong support given to the school by the community. Continuation of this improvement is highly contingent upon open lines of communication between the home and school and a good understanding of what goes on in the schools. Please make the time to visit the school, to attend a school-related activity, or attend a school board meeting. Please be sure to attend the annual district meeting on Friday, March 4, at 7:00 p.m.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Nelson School opened its doors for the 2004-2005 academic school year with 54 students. This year the school welcomed the following kindergarten children and their parents to Nelson School and the community: Bradley Auclair and his mother, Renee; Ben Bigaj and his parents, Steve and Jessica; Tori Daigle and her parents, Megan and Jason; Jena Caron and her mother, Angela. In addition to the new kindergartners, Nelson also welcomed Adam Egan and his parents, Tammy and Mike; Matthew Fraser and his parents, Jennifer and Greg; and Griffin Peacock and his mother, Lindsay.

The 2004-2005 school year brought many changes to the teaching and support staff. This year two new classroom teachers joined the staff. We welcomed Kristin Mullins to the 3/4 position and Tina Denis to the 5/6 position. Kristin came to us with teaching experience from Franklin School in Keene, and Tina came to us with teaching experience from Chesterfield School. Both are wonderful additions to our school and we are quite lucky to have them with us!

In addition to changes amongst teaching staff, there have also been many changes in our support staff. Vicki Dowley, Kim Keating, and Ryann Thompson joined the Nelson team as tutors. Vicki is our inclusion tutor this year and brings years of expertise to us and the children with whom she works. Kim is an experienced preschool teacher, and Ryann is new to the field of education.

It has been many years since Nelson School has been able to offer a Title I program. This year we were extremely fortunate to have received Title I money and to, once again, be able to offer this wonderful program that provides assistance to students in the areas of reading and math. Molly Bentley, an experienced teacher from Massachusetts, now holds this position and provides supplemental reading and math instruction in this half-time program.

Jill Wdowiak rounds out the Nelson team. Jill is our new secretary, who keeps us laughing on a daily basis, and is the glue that holds us all together.

Although the staff has changed, our commitment to you and your children has not. In fact, our commitment to provide the most comprehensive, quality program for you and your children has become energized, stronger, and more progressive. As a staff, we continue to recognize and embrace the importance of an inclusive community for your children; and we continually seek to identify ways to assure that we meet the ever changing needs of our students in an inclusive setting. In addition to providing support and assistance in the classroom environment, we also believe in providing inclusive, multi-age activities that promote children of all ages to work together collaboratively.

Children of various ages can be found learning together during morning meetings, holiday craft stations, community service projects, all-school sing, and cross grade activities. As the students work collaboratively in these groupings, they learn to respect and honor one another's differences and similarities.

The majority of staff have been trained in the Responsive Classroom philosophy which advocates the importance of establishing an accepting, tolerant, respectful classroom and school environment. When new educators become part of our school, it is an expectation that they will attend a Responsive Classroom workshop so that we can continue to ensure that, as a community, we are consistent in our expectations of student interactions and behavior.

One of Nelson's most endearing programs is the annual spring festival held on the village common. This year we have chosen "Place" as our theme and the possibilities are endless. Kim Wallach, our music teacher, embraced this theme in all-school sing and her music classes during the fall for your enjoyment at our annual Winter Holiday Program. "Picnic of the World," an upbeat, catchy song of places in the world, was one of the students' favorite songs!

At last year's public meeting, a warrant article was passed for monies to improve the playground by bringing it up to safety codes and upgrading the existing structures. Thanks to the leadership of Anne Cucchi and her incredible volunteer crew, the major work has been completed and our playground now proudly displays two new structures--the

Muscleman Climber and the Stargazer--that are enjoyed on a daily basis by Nelson students. When spring returns, the smaller projects will be finished and the playground will be complete.

Over the summer and throughout the fall, a variety of projects have been completed to keep the school in the fine shape that it is. The school's entryway ceiling, the hallway, the small room across from the office, the kitchen, and the multi-purpose room walls and ceilings have all been repainted, as well as the trim in various sections of the building. The 3/4 classroom sports a new rug that brightens the rooms considerably.

The building underwent a face-lift and is now sporting new shingles on the rounded section of the building outside the multi-purpose room door. One of the major outside improvements was the hard-packing of the driveway. Even though we appreciate it now, we will appreciate it even more when mud season arrives in the spring! Amer Electric installed the necessary hardware for the outside lights to turn on and off automatically in the parking lot.

After last year's phenomenal artist-in-residence program with Children's Stage Adventures, the staff carefully chose a different venue to enrich the lives of Nelson students this year. Rocki Lehr, a textile artist with an interest in felt making, was chosen to work with Nelson students during the month of March. Her works in felt range from wearable art to large community projects. She has worked as an artist-in-residence throughout the country creating everything from finger puppets to murals to yurts. The two wall murals that the students made are hanging proudly near the entrance to the school on each side of the water bubbler.

Once again, Polly Patterson from the Harris Center, graced us with her expertise and vast knowledge. The Harris Center programs are wonderful as they utilize the area around us and provide our students with excellent hands on experiences. This year, the kindergarten students learned about salamanders; the students in R/1/2 learned about geology and rocks; the students in 3/4 learned about beavers; and the students in 5/6 learned about rocks, minerals, and glaciers.

Due to the generosity of Packersfield, students began monthly library classes at Nelson Public Library one

Monday morning each month from January to March, and Laidlaw provided the transportation (at no cost this year). Kris Finnegan led each class with input, assistance, and support from each classroom teacher.

Nelson School is a special place for students, their parents, and the staff. Although we are small, we continually strive to offer quality programs that meet the needs of our students and the community. We are thankful for the community's support and input and enjoy working together collaboratively to make Nelson the special place that it is.

Unfortunately, the number of volunteers was less than we had hoped for, so we had to hire a contractor to perform part of the work. We will erect the remaining structures in the spring, finish the basketball court and finish the landscaping, so there will still

be additional opportunities to help!

The improvement project that we are considering next is improving our kitchen facility to a commercial style kitchen, to enhance our lunch program. Cold lunches have been transported from Keene for as many years as anyone can remember, but the participation is low and the plate waste is high. Serving a healthy midday meal that children will eat insures they have the energy and the brainpower to thrive academically in the afternoon. This year, our new secretary has adopted the additional role of lunch lady. She has been experimenting on a limited basis with heat-able entree selections. The students' participation has been great! Unfortunately, the kitchen does not lend itself to heating and serving high quantities of food. We are proposing to form a committee to study options for improving/replacing the kitchen.

The Nelson School Board meets on the second Wednesday of each month, except for July and August, at 4:30 pm at the Nelson School. Public is always welcome to observe, to ask questions or to air concerns.

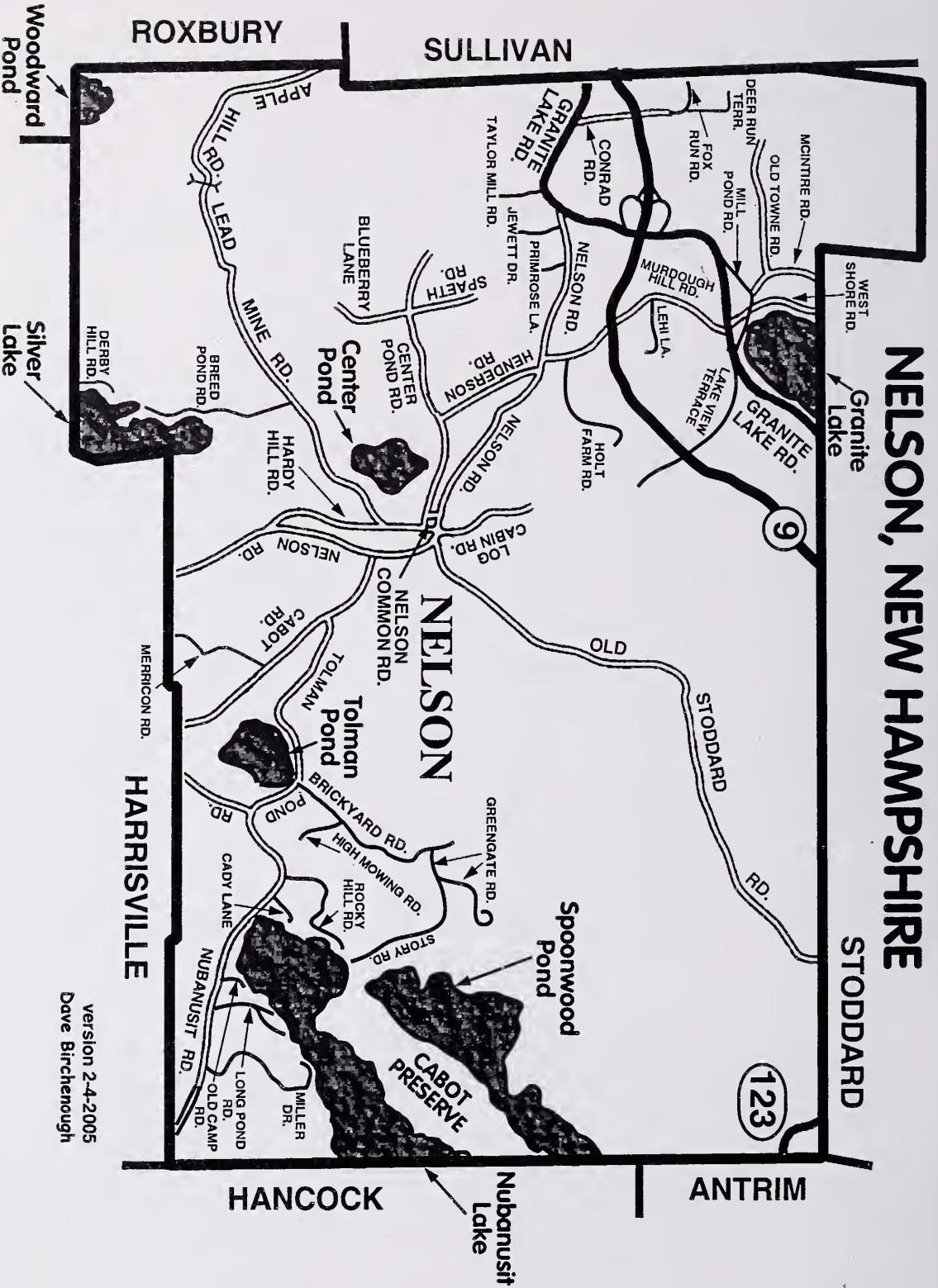
