WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the
County of Hillsborough in said State qual-
ified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in
said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of
March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act
upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the
year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget
to raise as estimated therein the necessary funds to
transact the town's business for the ensuing year.

3. To raise such sums as may be necessary to de-
fray town charges for the ensuing year, and make ap-
propriations for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-
propriate \$1,200 for a resident physician.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-
priate \$150 for Memorial Day.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the
selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

7. To choose one member of the Electric Light
Commission for three years.

8. To choose one member of the Trust Funds Com-
mittee for three years.

9. To choose a committee of three for Memorial
Day.

10. To choose a committee of three for the Baseball
Field Committee.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$102 (1-100th of 1 percent of the valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in co-operation with the other thirty seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

13. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

14. To see if the town will raise \$302.18 for T.R.A. roads; by doing so the State will contribute \$1,209.70. If legislature releases present restrictions the town may raise \$604.35 and the State will contribute \$2,417.39.

15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for prosecuting the control of the White Pine Blister Rust disease or take any action thereon.

16. To see what action the town will take in regards to establishing a public town dump, appropriate money for the same or take any action thereon.

17. To see if the town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international co-operation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$350 to widen the road from Oscar Lehtala's

residence to end of road leading to Nicholas Kivela's or take sufficient funds from T.R.A. for this purpose or take any action thereon.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to purchase a tractor and snowplow, and authorize the selectmen to trade in the old Clectrac or sell same, or take any action thereon.

20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to cap and oil the road from Davis Village to Somero's Four Corners so called or take any action thereon.

21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 to cap and oil the back road to Greenville from Fennia Market corner as far as the money will allow, or take any action thereon.

22. To see if the town will vote to extend the time limit on disposal of Old Corner Store to July 11, 1946.

23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to purchase snow fence, when available or take any action thereon.

24. To see what steps the town will take in electing one road agent for the town instead of three as at present time.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of New Ipswich:

I respectfully submit my twenty-second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The Schools and the War Effort

Schools are participating in the war effort, as are all loyal citizens. Most high schools offer some form of preinduction training, such as a course in Aeronautics, and high school students are giving substantial aid in harvesting perishable crops as well as taking employment in essential industries during vacation periods. Schools of all grades are taking part in drives to collect waste paper, other scrap, and milkweed floss, and in buying war stamps and bonds. Many older boys and girls have left school with the mistaken idea that they should enter industry to make their contribution to the war effort—and some are merely attracted by the opportunity to make good wages. School attendance until graduation is the best contribution school age youth can make to the war effort; society in general, as well as the individual pupil, will profit most by his continuance in the pursuit of an adequate education.

Post War Schools

Universal free public education has been the ideal of America from its beginning; establishing schools was one of the first concerns of the earliest colonial leaders, and with ups and downs, but always moving toward greater opportunity for all, the American school system has developed. That it is short of the ideal is freely acknowledged; the 1940 census revealed that 13½% of adults had only fourth grade education or less, and Selective Service has found several millions physically unfit.

After every crisis in the life of a nation, revealing

weaknesses or new opportunities, educational procedures have been revised and upgraded. Nation after nation has proven the power of education when applied to a specific purpose. Germany used a totalitarian education to develop in its people a blind urge to conquest. Russia has made tremendous progress, both culturally and technically, by educating its people of all ages. Britain is now developing a bold program, doubling its expenditures for schools, realizing that every human talent is necessary for holding her place in the world. If this nation values its own future, it must awaken to the power of education and direct it toward desirable ends.

There are three kinds of would-be planners of post-war education—those who would completely destroy or radically revise what we have; those who hold tenaciously to the policies and practices that have been; and those who see need for certain changes but insist that they can and should be made without the loss of the best of what has been. Doubtless the first or second group will prevail here and there, but by and large the third group will succeed in making wise changes in one or more of the following (and other) ways:

Improvement in programs furthering the growth of a strong and healthy body.

Strengthening the foundations of emotional health and of moral and ethical behavior, in closer coordination with home and community efforts.

Provision for practicable means of learning through work experience, coordinating vocational training with part-time work in various occupations.

Better adaptation of teaching methods and content to individual and social needs. (The Army and Navy training programs have provided the greatest laboratory ever offered for experiment and research in edu-

cation and we should see that the best possible use of it is made in the civilian education of the future.)

Broader cultural background and greater technical knowledge and skill on the part of teachers and supervisory officers.

Reorganization of local school district units in the interest of more economical and at the same time broader and more effective school programs.

Possibly the extension of compulsory school attendance to include ages sixteen and seventeen with adequate provision for a worthwhile program for all, including the fields of cultural and technical or vocational education; human relationships, civic responsibilities, economic efficiency, increasing emphasis on physical strength and endurance, including military training.

Increasing Costs

The White House Conference on Rural Education in October, 1944, brought together and emphasized many interesting and pertinent facts, such as:

48% of all public school pupils are in rural schools (that is, schools in towns under 2500 population).

52% of all public school teachers are in rural schools.

BUT—

Only 38% of all school funds are spent on rural schools.

Average salary of rural teachers is \$959.00, while that of urban teachers is \$1995.00.

Average annual expenditure per rural pupil is \$86.00, and per urban pupil is \$124.00.

60% of rural elementary teachers have less than two years of education beyond high school as compared with 10% of urban elementary teachers.

A significant paragraph in the Report of the White House Conference reads:

“The cost of living during the war has increased 25 per cent in cities and 47 per cent in rural areas. Teachers’ salaries have increased an average of 8* per cent. Teachers by the tens of thousands have left teaching for better paying positions in industry and government. Other thousands have entered the armed forces. Of the nation’s 900,000 teachers, 360,000 are new to their jobs. Fifty thousand are teaching on emergency certificates. City school systems have maintained staffs because their salaries, nearly double those of rural schools, have enabled them to recruit many of the best rural teachers. Country schools are therefore bearing the brunt of the current crisis.”

Money expended for sound education is not to be regarded as a burdensome cost, but as a productive investment. The greatest waste we can make is to spend too little on education. Every community needs to study its School Budget, not with a view to reducing it, but with a view to making its schools as effective as possible.

In order to attract and hold good teachers, the people of rural areas need to consider three factors:

1. The salaries of rural teachers must compare favorably with the incomes of other persons of the cultural and social status that teachers are expected to maintain.

2. Teachers have an obligation to contribute to community life, and the people of the community have an equal obligation to encourage teachers to participate in community life and to protect them in the exercise of the privilege.

3. The community has an obligation to provide satisfactory living conditions for the teachers, even to the extent of providing a furnished house for a teachers’ home, either as school district property or leased by the district.

* More recent reports give this figure as 15%.

Shortage of Teachers

Last year I reported in some detail regarding the shortage of trained teachers. The difficulties of this situation have increased within the year and indications are that it will grow more and more serious until some time after the end of the war. The enrollment at teacher training institutions is still falling off, and we have nearly exhausted the list of available former teachers willing to return to teaching during the emergency. It is plain that salaries will be still further increased in the country areas, to meet the competition of larger towns and cities.

In New Hampshire the average salary of high school men teachers in 1942-43 was \$2,035 and last year it was \$2,208; that of women high school teachers in 1942-43 was \$1,462, and last year \$1,586; that of elementary women teachers in 1942-43 was \$1,204, and last year \$1,244.

Medical Inspection

The school nurse, Mrs. Edna J. Gilbert, reports for the period January 30, 1944 to January 30, 1945 as follows: The routine physical examination was made by Dr. Cayward and the nurse in November 1944 with the following results:

At the Dental Clinic in May 1944, nineteen children received treatment. Other corrections made include two for tonsils and five fitted with glasses. The audiometer test for hearing in the spring of 1944 revealed no defects.

Budget

The assessment required to meet the School Board's estimate for 1945-46 is \$15,500, an increase of \$500 over the preceding year due to the \$415 required to pay insurance premiums, an item which did not appear in last year's budget. There are minor changes in other items in the budget in which some increases are offset by a decrease in the allowance for repairs. The amount of State Aid is estimated at \$1200, but the exact amount will not be known until the Legislature has passed its appropriation bills.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.

2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.

3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.

4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.

5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
