## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rollinsford in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, One Selectman and Overseer of the Poor for a term of three years, One Road Agent, and Chief of the Fire Department.
- ART. 2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on all taxes of the 1943 levy, except poll taxes, paid on or before September 1st. next.
- ART. 5. To see if the voters of the Town of Rollinsford will authorize the Selectmen to borrow

money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

ART. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Hundred and Eleven Dollars (\$1611.00) towards the completion of the building of the Goodwin Road, provided the state contributes the sum of Thirty-Two Hundred and Twenty-Two Dollars (\$3222.00) for the same purpose, or in the ratio of two dollars for one dollar for as much as the state funds will permit if unable to contribute the Thirty-Two Hundred and Twenty-Two Dollars (\$3222.00).

ART. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purpose of Town Road Aid Construction, provided the state is prevented by statute or otherwise from providing funds for the Goodwin Road, but is able to provide funds for this purpose.

ART. 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Appropriations will begin at eleven (11:00) o'clock sharp.

Given under our hands and seal this twenty-second (22) day of February, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and forty-three.

## REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER and FOREST FIRE WARDEN

---

Fellow Citizens :

In submitting this report for the year 1942, it is my desire to paint a true picture of the facts pertaining to the past and present and perhaps offer a few helpful suggestions relative to the activities of your fire department if progress is to dominate our efficiency for the safety from fire in the trying days ahead.

First: While it is useless to linger on the fact that new apparatus is badly needed, yet, I feel it my duty to inform you that each year your trucks are getting older and less efficient. New trucks could not be had now, due to the war time priorities of the government, even if the desire and money were available to purchase them. No doubt, new apparatus is out for the duration.

Second: Man power for your fire department is at a premium. Men for fire fighting are as scarce as hen's teeth. A large majority of the regular firemen are laboring eight or more hours a day in defense industries out of town. Several of the regulars are in the armed services of your country and although we are carrying several substitutes they too are out of town defense workers. Our auxiliary firemen, what we could muster of them, are in the same class as the regulars and substitutes. If there are local men available they just will not come forward and offer their services, and try as we have we cannot locate any which all sums up to the fact that we are now carrying on as best we can with what we can find available in town at least part time

daily, and no doubt this situation will get worse instead of improving due to the future induction of men for both the military and defense industries as the war progresses. If there are any physically fit men capable of fire fighting, over 18 years of age, in the town of Rollinsford, will they please come forward and offer their services toward protection of their town from fire. They will be accepted and instructed in the Rollinsford Fire Department. It must be that there are, at least, a few patriotic men in this town capable of fighting fires when called upon. This is a real chance to demonstrate their patriotism and protect their own and other people's property from fire. This seems to be a good place to live in, why not help fight for it and protect it? Don't you want fire protection? Come forward and offer your services.

Third: Our regular fire alarm is and has been located at the plant of the Somersworth Foundry Co. It is an 8 inch chime whistle operated by steam. Since this plant went out of existence last September there has been no steam there to operate this whistle. We have, since last September, had to depend entirely on what was our substitute alarm, the siren on the town hall. While this does a good job as a substitute for the regular whistle it cannot be coded and is operated by 220 volt electricity. If the town's electricity goes off for any reason we have no fire alarm until the electricity is put on again. Not so with our Foundry whistle as that was operated by batteries and altogether independent of the town's electrical supply. Then again where we had four boxes around town from which an alarm could be turned in as the occasion demanded, with our substitute system the siren, we have only one box, located outside the fire station. In case an alarm for fire comes in by telephone to the Chief's home he, or someone else, has to run to the fire station to sound an alarm on the siren, day or night. In the night-time when abed it means get



up, dress and run to the station before an alarm can be sounded and is a delay of about ten minutes, then after the alarm is sounded it means wait until the men can arrive before the trucks get rolling. With the old system of alarm the Chief could get up and sound an alarm from the house and then when he got to the station the men were there or arriving. It means a loss of time for a night alarm of about 15 minutes or more before starting the trucks to roll to the fire. It is really something serious for the first 15 minutes at a fire can spell victory or defeat. We have made a survey of the necessary wire and fixtures needed to have an alarm box installed in the Chief's home, but due to the red tape of securing the necessary priorities, we cannot seem to get anywhere. The gravity of the situation with the required articles to make a proper installation have been related to our State Civilian Defense Fire Co-Ordinator in Concord and he, by letter, held out no immediate hope of a remedy to better the situation, although he admitted he could see the much desired need of the alarm box installation and stated that our problem had been turned over to a representative of the Board of Fire Underwriters for any possible aid they might be able to render us.

I am using this space to inform the townspeople why we have been and will be delayed in getting started, due to our incomplete alarm system. It can be easily seen that this is a very serious and detrimental handicap for a quick response to an alarm for fire by your fire department. While there does not seem to be any immediate remedy to overcome this fire alarm condition we will do the best we can under the circumstances, but you will all have to expect delayed arrival of apparatus when an alarm for fire is received. It just cannot be different under existing conditions.

The grass and brush fire season of 1942 was in keeping with the best of years in our town. Such fires were



very few and permits were issued to burn only on rainy days as requested by the State Forester.

As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, team work becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by whole hearted cooperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where cooperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention" being "worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and cooperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations become a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this

year, however, that this problem was, to a great extent solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except on rainy days. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or other of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters' Service". Its purpose is to provide fire fighters, equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war effort. The State Forester is the State Coordinator; the District Fire Chiefs are District Coordinators and the Warden is the Local Coordinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the local warden and his assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to their local forest fire warden. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.
3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.
4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.
5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be cooperative and thus help your warden prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

The 1942 fire record for our town follows:

Number of fires .....	0
Number of permits issued.....	33

Not so many fire permits were issued during 1942, and these extra precautions, both, for fires and permits for the ensuing year must and will continue in force. Also please note that there are to be no open fires anywhere, including incinerators, from one half hour before sunset to one half hour after sunrise, as per dimout rules for light glare in this area as proclaimed by the United States Army Command and the Governor of New Hampshire, as head of the state Civilian Defense. The rules and regulations pertaining to night fires, where controllable, will be strictly enforced. The people of Rollinsford have really tried to eliminate night fires this past year and I might add have also greatly curtailed on the number of open fires, usually kindled both with and without permits, as requested by State regulations of Forestry Department. Due credit is extended to the townspeople for trying to assist the Army authorities and State Civilian Defense setup pertaining to fire and light glare as requested in the past and future or for the duration. Remember that an open fire at night from any cause is an aid to the enemy and we

cannot take any chances. Fires out of control are not only a financial menace to property but could spell disaster to the lives of our people. So it is very important to control all fires at all times. The best way to do this is not to kindle them. Stop and think before you start a fire of any size or kind, and only after obtaining a permit.

In conclusion may I be pardoned if I get off the fire subject somewhat, only to remind everyone that there has been established in your town a civilian defense set-up for the protection of the lives and property of all the people of Rollinsford. Committees have been appointed for the various branches of this local defense machinery. The Chairmen, as heads of the various committees, have many times in many different ways appealed to the citizens to offer their services in any way or on any committee that appealed to them. The response to these appeals has been disheartening and the few patriotic citizens that have come forward and shown their willingness to assist are by no means sufficient to render defense as it should be in case of a bombing or other catastrophe. It is not too late to offer your services and thereby encourage the handful of men and women who are now shouldering the burden of your defense by giving their time and effort in behalf of this necessary work and the town's protection. If protection is worth anything it is worth one's effort, no matter how small. So I say to you men and women who are not now enlisted in this effort, come forward and help protect the mothers, fathers and children, of our men and women now protecting you in the many military services of your country. It is your war and requires your help to continue it to a Victorious conclusion. Your help on the home front is just as important for those on the war front as is the service they are rendering for your protection. Think this one over. Our soldiers and sailors expect to come back home as

soon as their job is done and they expect to hear each and everyone of us say we have helped to protect their homes and loved ones while they were at the front protecting us. Can you honestly tell him that? You can if and only if, you become part of your town's civilian defense protective army. Our efforts in this direction will enable those service men to finish their job quicker and return home to their loved ones sooner.

Get in line and offer your services to your town's Civilian Defense Project. Be an American and show it. It is your country so fight for it.

To those who have come forward to assist their fire department and other civilian defense efforts for the necessary protection of this town for the duration, we desire to extend our appreciation in their acknowledgment of duties assumed, as required by the responsible officials who issued appeals for assistance of all patriotic and home loving citizens, both men and women. They, at least, may feel secure in the knowledge that what they can do to protect lives and property for a quick and victorious conclusion of the war effort, is being done as American citizens with their town's welfare at heart. Good Luck to you all. Let us say Thank You to all who assisted in any way with the town's fire protection for the past year and anything that can be done to better your fire protection in the future will be appreciated and welcomed.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Rollinsford:

For the 15th time I am privileged to make a report for your schools.

As usual the statistics given are for the School Year ending June 30, 1942 although such changes as were made this year are recorded.

You will note such a large increase in the number of pupils in the lower grades that the employment of another teacher was necessary this fall. Since this increase was brought about almost entirely by war conditions, application has been made to Federal Government, under the Lanham Act, for aid to be given to the extent of \$1700. Such an application has been approved by our State authorities and the regional director and now awaits action in Washington.

Rollinsford was fortunate in having room and equipment ready for just such an emergency.

To succeed Mr. George Cross, who left us to take a more lucrative defense job, we secured Mr. Robert A. Bragg. He taught in Maine last year. When it was found necessary to secure an additional teacher Miss Rosamond Wood, also a teacher from Maine, was induced to take the position. She was affianced to Mr. Bragg, so they were married and we now have a "team working double". Mr. Bragg may be subject to call to the armed services but we hope that his Selective Service Board will regard our "second line of defense, the public schools", to be of equal importance and at least defer him for the remainder of the year.

Last school year, a hot lunch was served each day to those pupils who lived so far from the school that it was necessary for them to bring lunch. This was very successful and was continued this year, the WPA assisting us.

When the WPA ceased operation, Miss Margaret Thomas, who had been the cook, was continued in the work. The lunch is now financed in part by products, so-called "Surplus" provided by the Agricultural Marketing Administration, in part by those participating and part by the School District, since it was found to be legal to use tax money for this purpose. The price of the lunch had to be raised from three cents to five cents per day. Miss Thomas is assisted in serving by the girls from grades seven and eight and this is regarded as part of their training in Home Economics. The menus are supervised by the Home Economics teacher, who is Mrs. Beverly Howard of South Berwick. About 60 pupils participate in the lunch program.

To be served the hot lunch pupils must live so far from the school that the noon recess time would not be sufficient for them to go home or both parents may be working so that there is no one at home to get the lunch. On stormy days any pupil below the fifth grade may remain but cannot be assured of a lunch. If there is enough prepared the pupil will be served.

Miss Thomas also helps to supervise the noon recess.

It was with regret that the Adult School so well conducted by Miss Thomas had to be discontinued. This was a WPA project.

The Agricultural Marketing Administration tried to help us introduce the so-called Penny Milk program, whereby any pupil could purchase a half pint of milk for a cent. The Administration would pay the cost of production and the penny was supposed to pay the cost of processing and delivery. Owing to a milk shortage,



none of the milk dealers in this vicinity submitted bids.

At the graduation last June the William Martel Post of the American Legion, medals were awarded to Roger Van de Meulebroecke and Eleanor R. Philpott. Besides the American Legion the Parents Club and the Garden Club have continued their active interest in the schools. Their cooperation is appreciated. The schools we conduct are the public schools and all are invited to visit them. The School Board Meetings, held ordinarily on the second Tuesday evening of the month are open to all.

Your School Board has devoted time and effort for the good of the schools and supported us all in these trying times.

We are continuing our testing and checking programs but we cannot say "schools as usual" as schools as well as business are affected by the war. The pupils have entered heartily into scrap collecting and War Savings, both by stamps and bonds. Mrs. Cross is heading a Junior Red Cross movement to interest more pupils in active participation. We have not entered into the Schools at War Program in a record sense, but hope to do our part.

St. Joseph's Parochial School reported an attendance of 111 in October. This compares with 116 of the same date last year.

The high school pupils are this year distributed as follows: At Berwick Academy 1 in Grade Twelve; 2 in Grade Eleven; 1 in Grade Ten and 4 in Grade Nine. Rate of Tuition \$81.00 per year plus cost of books. At Dover High School, 13 are in Grade Twelve; 10 in Grade Eleven; 15 in Grade Ten and 16 in Grade Nine. Rate of Tuition is the State Average last year or \$89.79.

All pupils were finger printed last year and cards have already been prepared for the new pupils of this year, and are being held for coming of the State Trooper.

Pupils have been trained for air raids and can be evacuated on short notice.

During the past calendar year your teachers have assisted in the war efforts by rationings as follows: Sugar in May; Gas in May and July and Fuel Oil in October. They are anticipating further rationing without murmurs and are glad to give of their time and effort if it will aid the cause for which we are all united to win. No school time was lost by the above rationings.

We have tried to keep on hand the necessary school supplies but during the coming year we may have to do without some of those that we regard as essentials.

As I write these lines Miss Lillian A. Winkley of the Salmon Falls Bank is relinquishing her duties of keeping the financial accounts of the School Board. She has done this work so well that it received the commendation of the State Department of Education when our system of accounting was investigated. We wish Miss Winkley many years of happiness in her retirement.

Your teachers have remained "on the job" resisting the lure of higher wages in defense industries and the glamor of uniforms. They will receive no medals or decorations. They have neither Social Security nor old age pensions. However, they believe that their work is essential and that in teaching children to love our United States and our democratic way of life, they are laying the foundations for a better world when the present world conflict is ended.
