To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rumney, N. H., in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rumney Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

All articles not on the Ballot will be acted upon at 7:30 P. M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its high-ways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76, American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$346.83 to secure from the State \$2,312.17 to be expended for Town Road Aid.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in co-operation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

14. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Civil Defense and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Advice.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sum of money sufficient for the security of land, construction and appurtenances of a Fire Station at West Rumney.

17. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in the amount of \$2,000.00, to be transferred from surplus funds for the purpose of purchasing Highway Equipment.

18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members with duties as set forth in Section 1-15 Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development, and to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the expenses of the Planning Board. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for control of the White Pine Blister Rust in co-operation with the State Forestry and Recreation Commission.

20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the installation of a heating system in the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate or borrow the necessary funds for the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

23. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to the playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

24. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles— use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

The following is a report of the activities conducted by the N. H. Department of Health, Bureau of Public Health Nursing for the year 1959.

Home calls have been made in the town throughout the year on mothers, babies and pre-school age children. Arrangements have been made for children to attend clinics for diagnosis and treatment. In the fall the nurse gave a talk at the Rumney School to the P.-T. A. District Meeting.

In November an immunization clinic was sponsored by the P.-T. A. for Salk Vaccine shots. The school children's clinic was held at the Russell School and the pre-school clinic was held at Rumney Grange Hall. Assistance with the clinics was given by the School Nurse, Helen Fisher, R.N., and members of Rumney P.-T. A.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to sell to the Rumney Fire Department for a consideration of one dollar (\$1.00) the burner and blower formerly used at the Village School providing it is voted at the annual Town Meeting to construct a Fire House at West Rumney.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT
TO THE RUMNEY SCHOOL BOARD

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

There have been no changes in the staff or personnel involved in running your school since my last report. I know you had desired that a man teacher be employed for this year but after a number of interviews with various individuals, no one was found who was qualified. At this writing, interviews are already being arranged with young men who may be interested in the position for next year. I am pleased that there is an arrangement now whereby an interested person from outside is able to do something with athletics but I feel sure a program of this type would work out better if it were under the guidance and jurisdiction of school personnel.

With the exception of new spelling books which I intend to purchase this year, your school is now better equipped with up-to-date series of textbooks than at any time since I have been with you. Outside of the purchase of usual expendable workbooks, etc., about all we need are some supplementary reading books and reference materials. Those of you who have not done so already should visit school and examine the small school library that has been established. With the help of the Russell sisters, the library is quite well equipped and is a valuable addition to the school.

Our testing program from last year has not been changed and I am sure it is adequate. The records we keep on each child are maintained throughout his elementary school years within the district and are passed on to the high school counsellor when they enter the 9th grade. These prove very valuable in scholas-

tic placement and sometimes their help may be the deciding factor that keeps a boy or girl in high school until graduation.

I feel I should call to your attention that the matter of educational T. V. is now a reality with regular classes being telecast from the University of New Hampshire at Durham. I have had a signal check made at your school and reception there is good. This has been reported to the school board. I think it advisable that some thought be given toward purchasing a set for another year. This might be done through some interested group or groups or on a matching basis through Title III funds of the National Defense Act.

I want to thank you for your cooperation and support of the school during the past year. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you feel I can help you with problems of an educational matter.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "REPORTS. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1958-59 received a salary of \$7,000 which was made up as follows: \$3,500 paid from the per capita tax and \$3,500 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1100 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table below shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.
