

During the past two years, the County debt has been reduced \$6,594.53.

Report of Superintendent

Of Sullivan County Farm and House of Correction

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners of Sullivan County:

Gentlemen:—In submitting our annual report for the year ending Dec,ember 31, 1920, we desire to express our gratitude to the Honorable Board of Commissioners for their pleasant relation shown us at all times.

I refer with regret to the increased cost of board, but if the taxpayers will bear in mind that everything purchased for the farm has increased to a great per cent for the past few years, they may readily see the cause. A new milking machine has been installed, which, owing to the scarcity of inmates able to help with the chores, was very much needed. During the past year, there have been only five committed to the House of Correction, three for drunks, two for non-support and abuse.

We still maintain the practice of each day being a visiting day except holidays and Sundays.

Our thanks are extended to our physician, Dr. Emery M. Fitch, for his service always so cheerfully given, and to our pastor, Rev. H. M. Frye, who is showing so much interest in the welfare of the inmates; also to all charitable societies and individuals, who have so generously contributed reading, fruits and candies to help brighten the lives of those in our charge.

Mrs. Putnam above all wishes to extend her hearty

thanks to each and everyone that showed so much interest during the dreadful sickness of last winter.

To the officers at the farm, our thanks are tendered for

their faithfulness in their duties.

There is very little for the Solicitor to communicate in his annual report. There have been but very few instances of felonies and the usual amount of misdemeanors, most of which have been disposed of by pleas of guilty, and suspended or indeterminate sentence, or both. There was one homicide, State vs. Edwards, in which the respondent, George Edwards, alias George Silver was sentenced to the State Prison for a minimum term of eighteen years for the murder of Austin W. Russell at Georges Mills in July 1920. There is pending only one case involving a felony, namely, statutory rape, which is under consideration in the supreme court. There are no law suits in behalf of or against the county on the civil or equity dockets.
