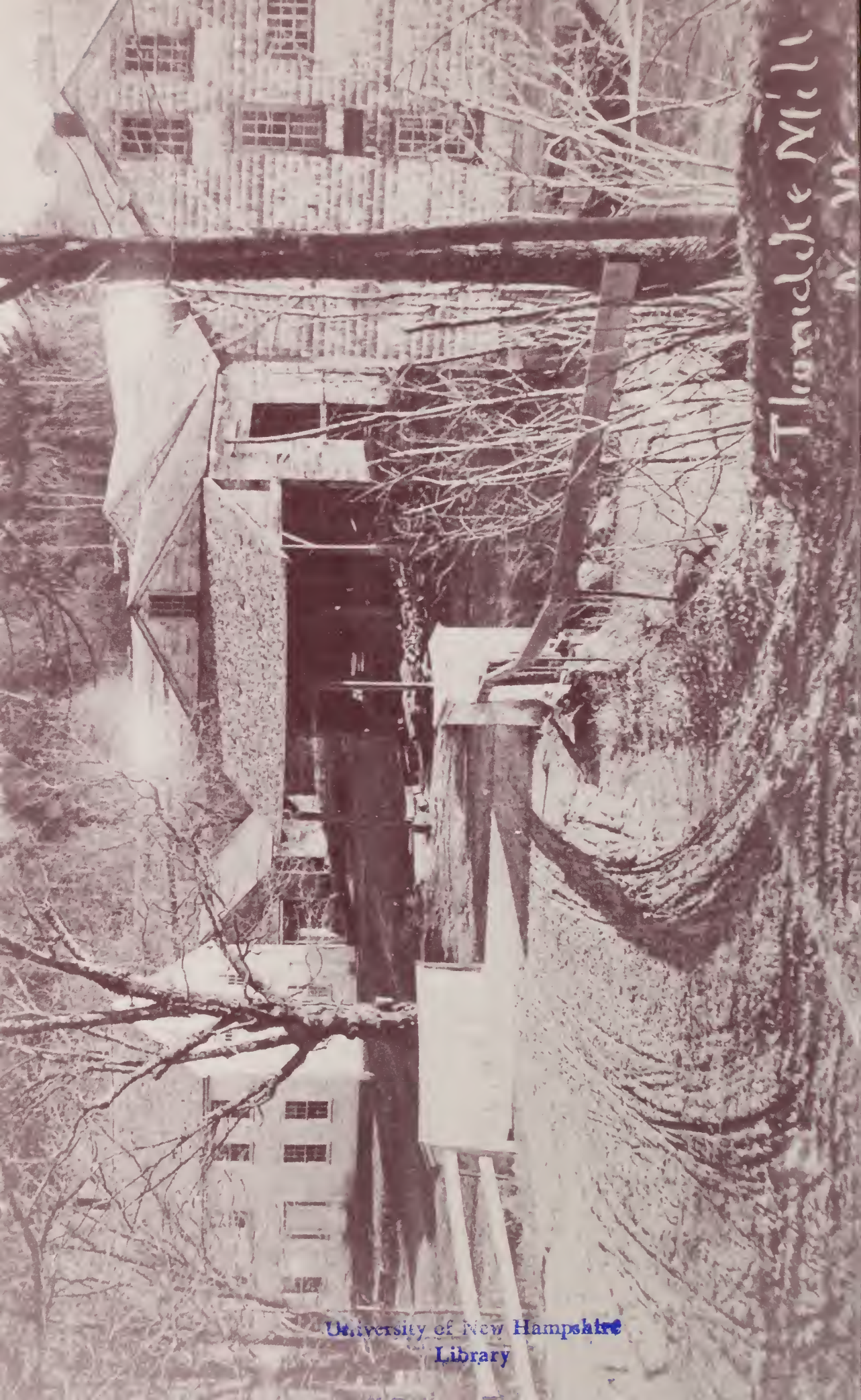

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare School Gymnasium in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

NOTE: In accordance with the vote of Town Meeting of March 6, 1973, Articles 2 through 44 will be taken up at an adjourned session of this meeting on March 12, 1981 at 7:30 P.M. in the Weare School Gymnasium.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1981 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,000.00 for summer and winter maintenance of highways or to take any other action in relation thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for repair of bridges or to take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000.00 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,123.16 to be used with the sum of \$14,154.41 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.
8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$189.93 as a set-off against that reimbursement from the State of New Hampshire known as the Duncan Fund, for use on Class V highways.
9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$19,333.12 which represents the anticipated Additional Highway Subsidy funds under RSA 241:15.
10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$25,153.34 as a set-off against the State reimbursement known as Highway Subsidy Funds.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.
12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the purchase of an additional typewriter or to take any other action in relation thereto.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,250.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,000.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,800.00 for new equipment for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,609.00 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the care of cemeteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repair of fences at the cemeteries in Center Square, so-called, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Civil Defense program or to take any other action in relation thereto.
21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for repairs to the Sawyer Estate at Tavern Village, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,850.00 to have the Community Nursing Service of Weare, New Hampshire join with the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association to provide Home Health Services for the residents of the Town of Weare, New Hampshire, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement or to take any other action in relation thereto.
24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
(By Petition).
25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000.00 for the reassessment of all the taxable real estate or taxable property of the Town by a private professional appraisal firm and that said sum is to be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen shall determine in the best interests of the Town.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at the Weare-Deering Town Line.

27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$6,000.00 for the construction of office space in the basement of the new Town Office Building for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Petition).

28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1,200.00 for the purchase of four (4) radio pagers for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Petition).

29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$1,400.00 for the purchase of a four-channel two-way radio for the Police Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (By Petition).

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to grant franchises for the installation of cable television systems within the Town pursuant to N.H.R.S.A. Chapter 53-C. (By Petition)

31. To see if the Town will vote to assign to the Weare Historical Society the Stone Memorial Building for a museum of Weare artifacts; the cost of maintenance and utilities to be assumed by the Weare Historical Society. (By Petition)

32. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in both taxes and spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent unless approved by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting of such taxing or spending authority. (By Petition).

33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a pavement spreader and roller for the Highway Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 to finish rebuilding shoulders on River Road from Robert Gordon's to Route 77, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

35. To see if the Town will vote to contribute 100% toward medical insurance coverage for town employees, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

36. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the surplus fire truck from the Fire Department to the Highway Department.

37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the vault at the Town Office Building.

38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to go with State Matching Funds, 2 to 1, if we qualify for funding only, to reconstruct sections of Center Woods Road.

39. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of dogs.

40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to the nonprofit newspaper which is presently being published at a loss by the Taxpayers Association of Weare. (By Petition).

41. To ask the Town of Weare to permit residency of retirees in travel trailers only at all Seasons Campground. We would not allow anyone to reside here if they planned to enroll their children in the Weare School System.

Resident retirees would have to be 60 years old or older. Exceptions to this would be:

1. early retirement due to failing health
2. having completed the raising of children.

We consider our campground a first class recreational resort and would not allow mobile homes. We ask, at this time, not to be classified as a mobile home park pursuant to existing tax structure and town ordinances. These travel trailers would be able to be registered and pulled within the State if the occupant so desired.

The type of trailer allowed would be no older than 5 years old and have an estimated value of seven thousand dollars as determined by Kelly's Blue Book Recreational Vehicle Directory.

Retirees residing at All Seasons Campground would benefit the town without imposing any financial burden. These people would bring in revenue for the town by paying head taxes, personal property taxes, and registration fees. They would also increase revenue for the local merchants.

This type of arrangement would greatly benefit senior citizens who find it increasingly difficult to live on fixed incomes. This article will benefit the town in the form of increased revenue, and benefit the people in the form of a good standard of living at minimal cost. (By Petition).

42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used by the Weare Recreational Advocates for the Town of Weare Annual July 4th Activities. Said sum to be returned to the Town General Fund.

43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for repair to the bandstand at Chase Recreational Park, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

44. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

March 11, 1980

At 7:10 p.m. the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William G. Herman. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by James B. Craig. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who had died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence. A special tribute was made by the Moderator to the memory of Marion Adams, Town Librarian for 17 years.

The Moderator read the results of the Town and School District elections. He noted that a Petition for Recount has been received from Lloyd E. Bailey II. The ballots for Board of Fire Wards - Member of Fire Department - will be recounted.

The following were appointed to three-year terms on the Finance Committee by the Moderator: Murray C. Wood, Robert F. Martin, Mary Jo Campana and Rodman W. Wilson.

The Moderator stated the rules of order for the conduct of the Meeting. He then recognized Malcolm C. Purington who presented an engraved plate to Henry T. Osborne in recognition and appreciation of his 34 years of service, from 1940 to 1974, as Treasurer of the Town of Weare.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred C. Foote, Sr. made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42,600. for general expenses of the Highway Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended \$42,600. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,053.41 to be used with the sum of \$13,689.38 to be furnished by the State for Class IV and Class V construction, reconstruction and Betterment Aid or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred C. Foote, Sr. moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended the motion as read. The vote was affirmative.

Harold O. Hall moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,100.00 for repairs to the old high school. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended the article be dismissed. Charles Brown, Jr. made a motion to indefinitely postpone Article 13. The motion was seconded and the vote negative.

Robert Munro made a motion to amend Mr. Hall's motion by stipulating the money be taken from the Revenue Sharing Funds. The motion was seconded and the vote negative.

The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,550.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Stetson Hunt made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,450.00 for the Weare Police Department. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$13,700. Charles Brown, Jr. made a motion to amend the amount to \$13,700. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was negative. The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,500.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$21,500. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,200. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the repaving of the South Weare Fire Station driveway or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$1,500. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,800.00 for new equipment for the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$9,800. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the salaries of two full-time fire department members, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended that no money be raised under this article. After discussion, the vote was taken. The vote was negative and the motion lost.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for operation and maintenance of the landfill area, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that Article 20 be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as a set-off against the following debt service representing a pro-rated 1980 repayment on the principal of a note to the New Hampshire Municipal Bond Bank:

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,694.00 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Camille Ahern moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,200.00. Charles Brown, Jr. moved to amend the motion to state \$10,200.00. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment (by division vote) was: Yes - 93; No - 48. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the care of cemeteries, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$5,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Civil Defense program or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Edgar Hunt moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$500.00. Charles Brown, Jr. moved to amend the motion to read \$500.00. The motion was seconded. The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of fences at the cemeteries in Center Square, so-called, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 under Article 25. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$2,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to the Sawyer Estate at Tavern Village, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 under Article 26. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$4,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00, said sum to represent a town contribution not to exceed \$10,000.00 and a matching grant from the State of New Hampshire for the construction of a combination softball/youth baseball field on the old dump site off Route 77. And, furthermore, that the Selectmen appoint a committee of three townspeople to assist in the planning of this construction, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved that the Town vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$17,000.00, said sum to represent a town contribution not to exceed \$8,500.00 and a matching grant from the State of New Hampshire for the construction of a combination softball/youth baseball field on the old dump site off Route 77. And, furthermore, that the Selectmen appoint a committee of three townspeople to assist in the planning of this construction, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$17,000.00. James B. Craig moved to amend the article by stipulating that the upkeep of this so-called ball field, after the initial field is put in, will be borne by those people who use it and not at town expense. The motion was seconded. After a short discussion, Mr. Craig withdrew his amendment. The vote on the original motion was affirmative.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Community Nursing Service or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The article was dismissed.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts, and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the adoption of this article as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 30 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended this article as read. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will reaffirm the action taken at the 1979 meeting with respect to the issuance of serial notes and/or bonds or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 31 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. A standing vote was taken which the Moderator declared to be almost unanimous -- well over the 2/3 vote required.

ARTICLE 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street signs for Weare and a corrected map of roads in Weare or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to buy as many street signs as possible for that amount of money. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended no funds be raised under this article and further recommended that the Road Committee be reactivated so that we will know where the roads are and also know how much it will cost before starting this project. The vote was negative and the motion lost.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$10,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,854.00 for a new York Rake for the Highway Department, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended this motion. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance and supplies of water holes or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$500.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Subdivision Regulations as follows:

Paragraph 2. General. B. Delete the words "natural person" and substitute the word "owner".

Murray Wigsten moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of property taxes and authorize the collector of taxes to accept such prepayment pursuant to RSA 80:52-a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 37 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the prepayment of resident taxes and authorize the collector of taxes to accept such prepayment pursuant to RSA 80:1-a or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 38 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the collector of taxes to appoint a deputy tax collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, pursuant to RSA 41:38 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 39 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action with respect thereto:

HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCE PERMIT ORDINANCE

For the protection of public health and safety, the following is hereby adopted as an ordinance in and for the Town of Weare:

1. Permit required; hearing. No person, organization, corporation or trust shall in the course of business dump, dispose of, manufacture, remanufacture or otherwise process, transport over Town-maintained roads, store or deal in or within this Town any hazardous substance unless and until a permit authorizing such activity shall have been obtained from the Board of Selectmen after a public hearing at which the views of townspeople shall be given substantial weight. Any expense incurred in connection with the hearing or the issuance of the permit shall be borne by the applicant.

2. Issuance of permit; revocation. The Board of Selectmen may issue a permit only if a) the benefits to the Town from such activity outweigh the costs and b) a bond or an insurance policy, issued by a company licensed to do such business in this state, is posted

or obtained in an amount the Board deems appropriate to save the Town and its residents and property owners harmless from any damage such activity might cause.

2.1. Conditions. A permit may contain such limitations and conditions as the Board may deem necessary to fulfill the purposes of this ordinance, including limitations and conditions on quantity, quality, time and place of operation, equipment, facilities and personnel.

2.2. Term; revocation. No permit shall be valid for longer than 365 days from the date of its issuance, and it may be revoked by the Board at any time upon a finding by the Board, after the permit holder has had an opportunity to be heard, if the situation allows, that its terms have been violated.

3. Penalty; enforcement. Any person, organization, corporation or trust which shall be found guilty of violating this ordinance shall be fined not more than \$100.00, and each day such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense. The Board of Selectmen shall expeditiously obtain an injunction and/or take other legal action to prevent the violation of, and to enforce, this ordinance.

4. Definition. A "hazardous substance" means a solid, liquid or gaseous substance, or combination of substances, which because of its quantity, concentration or physical, chemical or infectious characteristics may

- a) cause, or significantly contribute to an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible or incapacitating reversible, illness; or
- b) pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly dumped, disposed of, manufactured, remanufactured or otherwise processed, transported over Town-maintained roads, stored or dealt in or within this Town, and includes, but is not limited to, toxic, corrosive, flammable, explosive and radioactive substances.

5. Exceptions. This ordinance SHALL NOT APPLY to any person, organization, corporation or trust with respect to any hazardous substance used or sold by him or it

- a) for his or its personal purposes and not in the course of his or its business; or
- b) in connection with, but only as a minor and incidental part of, his or its business in this Town; or

c) at retail in this Town in substantially the same form as originally manufactured,

nor shall this ordinance apply to the Town of Weare as a corporate body.

The Meeting waived the reading of Article 40 in its entirety. Neal Kurk moved the adoption of Article 40 as printed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to amend its Notice of Building and Permit Ordinance so that the penalty for failure to secure a building permit shall be \$100.00, and each day on which any construction shall occur until the day on which a building permit is issued shall be deemed a separate offense, or to take any other action with respect thereto.

Neal Kurk moved the adoption of Article 41 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to install underground Fuel tanks and metered pump at the landfill area for the use of the Fire, Police and Highway Departments at a cost of \$3,500.00 completely installed.

Charles Brown, Jr. moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to install a diesel fuel tank at the town landfill area for the use of the Fire Department and the Highway Department. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money as may be necessary to have the taxable property of the Town reappraised either by the State of New Hampshire or a private professional firm, as to be decided by the Annual Town Meeting.

Arthur Brennan moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$60,000.00 to have the taxable property of the Town reappraised by the State of New Hampshire. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$60,000.00. After discussion, Arthur Brennan moved to amend his original motion by adding the words: or a private professional firm to be decided by the Selectmen. The motion to amend was seconded. After discussion, Mr. Brennan withdrew his amendment.

A motion was made and seconded to move the question. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the original motion was negative. A division vote was requested. The result of the division vote: Yes - 43; No - 65.

Robert Munro moved that the Selectmen form a committee of five residents to study the costs relative to reassessment and make a presentation to the Town at the next Town Meeting, or sooner if there should be a Special Town Meeting. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 44. To see what action the Town will take with respect to the Capital Budget Committee. This committee would be established to study, in light of current and/or future needs, and make recommendations to the Town regarding any capital expenditure to be made by the Town in excess of One Thousand Dollars. That such Capital Budget Committee be composed of six members whose membership shall initially be appointed by the Selectmen, who shall appoint two members for three years, two members for two years, and two members for one year. That thereafter, the members of the Committee be replaced by election of two members per year for a term of three years and whose names shall appear on the ballot in compliance with the laws established for other elected officials. That the Committee be authorized to require that the various department heads and Town Officials or individuals suggesting a capital expenditure submit their proposal and statement of need for each capital item, which shall include a statement of the expected longevity of the item, to the Committee prior to December 31, of any calendar year. That the Committee as a whole and/or its individual members shall make such inquiry or investigation as it deems necessary and shall have authority to require such further information from the individual department head or Town Official or individual submitting the proposal as may be necessary to make a determination with reference to the item's impact on the community. That prior to December 31st of each year, all of the various departments and offices of the Town be required to prepare an inventory, in duplicate, of all property owned or leased by the Town which is in their possession or within their control. One copy of such inventory shall be considered a matter of public record to be stored in the Town Office and open to public inspection, and the other copy will be submitted to the Capital Budget Committee prior to its taking any action on any capital expenditure proposed by a department head or Town Official.

Malcolm C. Purington moved to waive the reading of this article. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. Harold O. Hall moved the article be dismissed. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 45. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at the Weare-Deering Town line.

Chester A. Colburn moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the reconstruction of Reservoir Drive beginning at the Weare-Deering Town line. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$40,000.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to reinstate the power back to the Selectmen on Driveway Permits, and remove it from the powers of the Planning Board.

Edith Foote moved that the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Lloyd Bailey II moved to amend the article to read: To see if the Town will vote to give the power to the Highway Department on driveway permits. The motion was seconded. The

vote on the amendment was affirmative.

Douglas Hatfield, Town Counsel, stated he would give a formal opinion as to whether the Town has the authority to take this action if it is favorably passed.

A motion to move the question was made and seconded. The vote was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223 or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Malcolm C. Purington moved the adoption of Article 47 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommendation: \$100.00. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 48. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Neal Kurk moved the following resolution: Resolved: it is the sense of this meeting that, under the Town's gravel ordinance, as amended, a gravel permit is to be granted only if the applicant can show that it is in the best interests of the Town. The motion was seconded. The vote was negative.

George E. Welch moved a resolution of the sense of the meeting that he be able to hook into the Town water system at his own expense. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The Moderator thanked the Finance Committee and their Chairman, Charles Brown, Jr., for their hard work this year and requested a round of applause for the Committee.

Nancy Rheinhardt moved a resolution of the sense of the meeting that Robert Todd be made aware of the mistakes he has made in the tax maps and to please have them corrected at his own expense. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Charles Brown, Jr. stated we should give whoever is responsible for the public address system a round of applause. The Moderator stated the sound system is provided by A & H Productions of Manchester, with Mr. Tom Holt present here tonight.

James B. Craig moved the meeting be adjourned. The motion was seconded and the meeting adjourned at 12:45 a.m.

Following the meeting, the Moderator gave the oath of office to the following newly elected officers: Kenneth R. Glaude, Selectman; Wilfred C. Foote, Sr., Road Agent; William Boisvert, Board of Fire Wards (Non-member of Fire Department); Beverly M. Herman, Town Clerk. The Moderator, William G. Herman, was given the oath of office by the Town Clerk.

RECORD OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

October 2, 1980

The Special Town Meeting of the Town of Weare held in the Weare Town Hall on Thursday, October 2, 1980 was called to order by the Moderator, William G. Herman, at 7:35 p.m. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Malcolm C. Purington.

The Moderator read the Warrant and Certification of Posting of the Special Town Meeting. He then briefly stated the rules of order and announced that, in the absence of two of the duly elected Supervisors of the Check List, Craig Knowles has been appointed to serve as a Supervisor pro tempore.

ARTICLE I. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Board of Selectmen as the "regulator" as defined in RSA 155-E:1 III, for the purpose of hearing applications for and issuing permits for the excavation of sand, gravel, rocks, soil or construction material. All as provided in said RSA 155-E. Or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Donald Myhr requested further information be given the Meeting. As there was no objection, Douglas Hatfield, Town Counsel, responded to the request. He stated the situation arose by action of the Legislature in 1979 adopting a state-wide law to provide special protection for towns that did not have gravel or similar types of mining ordinances. That law conflicted with the law which the Town of Weare had already adopted which gave the Selectmen the same authority which the State law gave to Planning Boards. The State law provides that the Planning Board will administer these laws or ordinances unless the Town has made the determination that the Selectmen do it.

Mr. Hatfield stated a law suit has been brought against the Town of Weare arising out of the granting of a permit by the Selectmen. The law suit challenges that the Planning Board should have granted the permit because they claim the State law preempted the local law. This Special Meeting was recommended in hopes that it will avoid the necessity and the expense of going to court on that law suit. If this motion is adopted, the voters will have clearly spoken.

Mr. Myhr spoke in favor of the motion stating his preference of having elected officials rather than appointed officials granting the permits.

The vote on Article I was affirmative and the motion was adopted.

ARTICLE II. To transact such other business as may legally come before this meeting.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The vote was affirmative. The meeting adjourned at 7:50 p.m.

WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

Recent events indicate a need for more explanation about the basic operation of this police department. Several things appear to be either misinterpreted or misunderstood. The Weare Police Department is only a part-time department with all officers working at other jobs. At present, there are only four active regular officers and two active auxiliary officers. All of these officers, except the latest addition to the force who has been on just over seven months, have completed approximately 200 hours of police training. Sgt. Wayne Thomson recently took a week's vacation from his regular job to attend a police firearms instructor course sponsored by the State of New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. Sgt. Thomson is now certified by both the State of New Hampshire and the National Rifle Association as a police firearms instructor. All active regular and auxiliary members of the department have qualified in the use of firearms under his instruction. Also, these members have been certified by the State of New Hampshire as part-time police officers even though this is not mandatory until January 1, 1983.

The present level of four active regular and two active auxiliary officers is just not enough to give proper coverage, even on a part-time basis, especially when you consider sickness, vacation, special details, and other personal commitments. The latest figure available indicates that the national average for number of police officers is greater than 2.1 full-time officers per 1,000 residents, which translates to 6.76 full-time officers for the Town of Weare. We don't even have one full-time officer.

Due to the limited amount of manpower, an item was requested to be put in the Town Warrant this year to purchase four "pagers." These units are similar to those used so effectively by the Fire Department in alerting persons to an emergency call. The use of these pagers should help expedite answering emergency calls and will also allow the alerting of additional manpower without worrying about busy phones, etc.

The pay scale for the department is less than that of the secretarial help and the Highway Department, with all officers receiving less than \$5.00 per hour. Not much money when you consider the number of times that officers could be putting their life on the line.

An item put in this year's budget, which has never before been included, is a clothing and/or equipment allowance of \$150.00 per man. Under the present circumstances, the town does not furnish any uniforms and has available only three department-owned revolvers. A new man starting on the department would have to spend close to \$700.00 just to have the bare minimum of uniforms and equipment.

The department, until late in 1980, never had any private and secure office space to use, which meant records were kept in a private home. Subjects taken into custody for interrogation and/or placed under arrest have to be transported to the Goffstown Police Department facilities for processing. We have been very fortunate to have these facilities available, and we owe a great deal of thanks to that department. Included in the budget this year are items to cover heat and lights for the old Town Office (Stone building). Another item requested for the Town Warrant is sufficient funds for two rooms in the basement of the new Town Office. If either one is approved, the other will not be necessary.

Recently, the Board of Selectmen made a decision to have a person of their choice serve as Animal Control Officer pertaining to stray animals. This person would not function as a police officer. Other animal complaints will be handled by the department.

One other factor that has come to light is that some complaints about the department are based on rumor or hearsay and usually on one side of the story. If you are really interested, why not get both sides? Other complaints have been based on a misunderstanding or lack of knowledge of the law. Any member of the department would be glad to explain as much as they can about the law.

Finally, this year's operating budget is based on the requirements of previous years. Excluding the four new items of clothing allowance, insurance, heat, and lights, this budget represents an increase of only \$803.00 or about 4.7%. The other items including the radio and pagers, are critical to the smooth and efficient operation of the department.

Consider for a moment the status of three of our neighboring towns - Henniker, Hillsboro, and Hopkinton with populations of 3,236, 3,431 and 3,841 respectively (Weare 3,218). All three of these towns have full-time departments and have budgets ranging from \$85,900.00 to \$107,000.00. Consider, also, that Weare has a population estimated at over three times normal in the summer vacation season, taking the lakes and campgrounds into account.

You, the voter, must decide the quantity and quality of police protection you want and are willing to pay for.

WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1980, The "Red Network" received 445 calls. They are broken down into the following types: 9 house fires, 9 car fires, 26 wrong numbers, 17 police calls, 129 rescue calls, 19 brush fires, 3 grass fires, 160 aid or information calls, 22 mutual aid calls, 2 false alarms, 22 chimney fires, 1 dump fire and calls for 26 burning permits.

We would like to thank Mrs. Florence Wheldon for the good job she has done again this year and "thank you" to Brownie's Mobil Station for taking care of the "Red Phone" on Wednesdays, Mrs' Wheldon's day off.

When reporting a fire or a rescue, please call 529-2333 and make sure you let the phone ring at least three times. Calls requesting information should be directed to 529-2379 and police calls should be directed to 529-2323.

Five firemen have become State Certified Fire Fighters after completing a 108 hour course. They are: Lloyd Bailey, Newell Bailey, Paul Braley, Dave Beaulieu, and Mark Hollis. Members of the Fire Department donated over 1,000 hours of their own time this year. This time was spend in training drills, maintaining equipment, paperwork, getting trucks inspected, etc.

In January, 1981, our new truck arrived. This apparatus is a combination tanker-pumper and holds 1,000 gallons of water. The truck, purchased at Ken Carpenter Ford, is a Ford Louisville with a Cat diesel. Farrar Company of Woodsville, Massachusetts built the truck body.

We participated in several Mutual Aid Training sessions, and, as a result, we have learned the value of using and assisting other towns. We strongly feel our ability to work successfully with these other towns has enabled us to save property in the Town of Weare.

Each year residential fires claim 6,000 lives. Smoke detectors can save some of these lives by providing an early warning of fire. In fact, statistics show that if the fire strikes in your home, you are twice as likely to perish if the smoke detectors are not in use. The Weare Fire Department recommends that all homes in the town have frequently tested smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. If you sleep on the second floor, you should have a secondary escape route, such as a rope ladder.

The Community Birthday Calendar gave us a profit of about \$2,000.00 which was spent on new equipment for the department.

We would like to thank everyone who supported us at last year's Town Meeting and throughout this past year. Also, we thank all the employers who let their employees leave their jobs to respond to fire and rescue calls.

WEARE RESCUE SQUAD

In 1980, the Weare Rescue Squad trained ten (10) new members in an eighty-one hour National Registry Course at the Center Fire Station. This course was held two nights a week from March to June.

We responded to 129 medical emergencies this year with a good response for all calls.

We held three dances and sponsored a flea market. The proceeds from these functions were used to purchase new equipment and supplies for the Rescue Vehicle.

Donations of \$2,429 were received and of this money \$1,725 was used to get five radios, a Hot Stick (used to move live wires), 3 blood pressure cuffs, 2 sets of fins, masks, snorkles, a portable first aid kit, and new fire retardant blankets. These are just a few of the items purchased with the money we received from donations and various fundraising events.

During the year, we also purchased orange jackets to properly identify rescue personnel. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the townspeople for supporting our dances and other fundraising events, and also those who have been so generous with donations of Memorial funds.

We, also, wish to thank the local employers who allow their employees to respond to medical emergencies during working hours.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Last winter was a rather mild winter with mostly small snow storms. The Highway Department did lots of sanding due to the icy road conditions. During the winter months, we were able to complete the application of gravel to Colby and Worthley Roads that were excavated last November.

Since there are new residents on Cram Road, we had to clear brush and apply gravel to the entire road to make it passable. A portion of Reservoir Drive was excavated, rebuilt and tarred. Also, guard rails were put up. Chipmunk Falls and Craney Hill Roads were excavated, trees and brush removed and are now in need of gravel. This section has always been narrow and washes out.

As the frost penetrated deeply, due to the small amount of snow, we had an extensive amount of potholes to patch.

During the Spring, we had extensive flood problems. Our friend, the busy beaver, couldn't wait to plug the culverts after we got them thawed and cleaned out. We had to replace a washed out section of Mt. Dearborn Road due to flooding and the work of the beavers. Mud problems weren't too serious this year.

We completely rebuilt the bridge on Twin Bridge Road. Other bridges were painted and guard rails replaced on some of these. We plan to continue this project of bridge repair each year in order to preserve our bridges.

Throughout the year, we did our regular highway maintenance work as well as putting in culverts, cleaning ditches, brush and tree removal, grading and raking of roads. Also, we have done repairs to the equipment.

CHASE RECREATIONAL PARK

The 1980 season at Chase Recreational Park showed a large increase in all areas--attendance, income and expenses. Tighter controls were placed on the sale of Season Tickets which showed a small reduction in the number of Season Tickets sold. There were 476 sold in 1980 versus 482 in 1979 showing a 1% reduction. Boat Tickets sold in 1980 were 221 versus 175 in 1979. A 13% increase. Adult Guest Tickets sold in 1980 were 3,347 versus 2,436 in 1979, reflecting a 14% increase. Child Guest Tickets sold in 1980 were 615 versus 589 in 1979. A 10% increase.

In the area of income, 1980 showed a total income of \$8,869.04. A 15% increase over 1979's \$5,803.11.

Expenses in 1980 were \$7,764.25 versus \$6,113.28 in 1979, reflecting a 13% increase.

Many major improvements were made to the park in 1980. The Boat Ramp was repaired and a new dock was built to replace the old one. Two other boat docks were repaired and are scheduled to be replaced in 1981. All 38 picnic tables were restained and 12 new picnic tables were purchased. Necessary repairs were made to all buildings and equipment. Also, one new section of the parking area has been paved. The park also purchased a new 14' Olympic Diving Board.

Vandalism was a major problem this year. Several tables were destroyed, signs broken and burned and one side of the ladies' dressing room was ripped off and used for fire wood. Several of the individuals were identified and have, or are, making restitution to the park.

Many group outings were held again this year. There is no charge for local groups, but out-of-town groups do pay the regular admission rates. Among these groups were Rumford Press Softball Team, Electro Pak Corp., Kendall-Hadley, Sugar and Spice Pre-school Dance, Cub Scout Pack 24, and many school groups and class outings as well as other social and civic groups.

The lake water was tested and found safe for swimming and the well water was tested and found safe for drinking. Swimming lessons and band concerts were held at the park

again this year.

WEARE COMMUNITY NURSING SERVICE

The Community Nursing Service provided 196 home visits which included injections, change of dressings, baths, blood pressures, exercises, specific medications and mother and baby care. Blood pressure measurements were provided for the Senior Citizens. Transportation of persons to and from doctor and dentist offices and hospitals for examinations and treatments were also provided. Health educational films were shown for groups which included blood pressures, choking and diet. In cooperation with "Women, Infants and Children" (W.I.C.) program, sixteen (16) programs and four (4) clinics were held. This program provided for supplemental food for children under 5 years of age. Clothing donations by the people of Weare were available without cost to children and adults. Hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, crutches and health publications were available for use by the people.

The Nurse Service office in the old high school was renovated and provides facilities for clinics and group meetings on health subjects.

At meetings with officials of Medicare, it was learned that in order for the Weare Nurse Service to be certified for Medicare and Medicaid programs, it would have to provide at least two special therapy services such as physical, speech and occupational, a physician for certain clinics, maintenance of personnel and patient records and billings, office facilities and other requirements. The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association is affiliated with several towns similar to Weare wherein under contract arrangements the Association provides all services required by Medicare plus several other health services. Therefore, the Board is recommending that the Weare Nursing Service join the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association under contract arrangements. An article will be included in the Town Warrant for this purpose.

The Board of Directors are: Dr. Richard Backus, Jan Bidwell, Ann Colburn, R.N., (secretary), Harold Hall (Selectman), and Dr. Frederick Vintinner (Chairman). The Community Nurse is Evelyn Reade, R.N.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Report of Forestry Practices Accomplished during 1980

1. Town Forest:

Five acres of timber stand improvement have been completed in the area shown as stand 5 in the Town Forest Management Plan. This stand of young pine, located in the northeast portion of the Town Forest, was one of two areas listed in the Management Plan as a high priority area for thinning. The good quality pines in this stand have been released from the competition of poorer trees by girdling the poor trees with a double chainsaw cut. These high quality trees will now make full use of the available growing space and will produce a valuable timber crop. Plans for future management include pruning these trees in a few years time.

2. Poor Farm:

Five acres of land on the east side of Poor Farm Road were planted to white pine some years ago, but the stand has been neglected since. This is the second high priority area for thinning. These trees are just reaching sawlog size, so the present thinning will yield a small volume of cabin logs, pulp and sawlogs. The trees to be cut have been marked with paint and will be cut this year. Only trees with inadequate live crowns are being cut, leaving the vigorous trees to occupy the growing space and to grow at an accelerated rate.

The total cost of the above projects is \$626.00. Of this, \$300.00 has been paid by the forestry incentive program of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), leaving a net expense to the Conservation Commission of \$326.

The selective harvesting program which was postponed during 1980 due to the uncertain market conditions, will be continued in 1981. The goal of this program is to improve the Towns timber resource and to provide revenue for conservation projects by carefully harvesting mature timber. This is done in accordance with the Management Plan written for the Town Forest and Poor Farm, and is conducted under the supervision of a professional forester. Another project planned for 1981 is the construction of a badly needed access road on the Town Forest. This will aid in timber harvests and will be invaluable in the event of forest fire.

The Management Plan mentioned above was prepared by Robert B. Todd early in 1980. Based on a systematic timber cruise, it provides a comprehensive schedule for timber harvests, timber stand improvement, access road maintenance and boundary maintenance on the Town Forest and Poor Farm for the next ten years. The plan also has detailed tables of timber volumes by species, growth rates, soils information and maps showing the location of timber stands, roads and boundaries.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION (CONT'D)

The selective harvest started in 1979 was completed during 1980. There were 85,561 board feet of timber cut on the Town Forest, just south of Rte. 77. A gross revenue of \$5,262.00 was realized.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the state of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said government funds constitute full reimbursement, or take any other action in relation thereto.
4. To see if the District will vote pursuant to RSA 31:105 to provide indemnification for District employees, school administrators, school board members, district officers or agents from personal loss or expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to property providing the indemnified person was at the time of the accident within the scope of his/her employment or office.
5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Weare School Board to appoint a building committee to make a study and evaluation of alternative solutions to Weare educational space needs; and to raise and appropriate \$7,000 to assist the aforementioned building committee in preparing a plan for presentation to the citizens of Weare for their approval at the next School District meeting, or take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
7. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Weare qualified to vote in District affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE WEARE SCHOOL GYMNASIUM IN SAID DISTRICT ON WEDNESDAY, THE FIFTH DAY OF MARCH, 1980, AT SEVEN-THIRTY IN THE EVENING, TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

1. To see if the District will determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other Officers or Agents of the District.
2. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
3. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$8,105 for the purchase of cafeteria tables, student desks/chairs, teachers' desks/chairs and entrance mats.
4. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$56,000 for construction of a two classroom addition including furnishings and equipment, architectural and other fees, site development and other items incidental to and necessary for such construction, and to raise said sum by the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the School District in accordance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, the time and place of payment of interest, the rate of interest, provision for the sale of notes and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith, to be left to the discretion of the School Board.
5. To see if the District will vote to purchase two portable elementary classrooms at a cost not to exceed \$32,500 and to raise said sum by the issuance of notes or bonds upon terms and conditions as determined by the School Board or take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$12,360 for deficit spending for the 1979-80 school year.

8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the state of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said government funds constitute full reimbursement, or take any other action in relation thereto.

9. To see if the District will vote to create a cooperative school district planning committee of three (3) voters, one of which will be a board member, and two others selected by the Board to work with similar committees appointed in neighboring school district to study the feasibility of forming a cooperative school district in accordance with RSA Chapter 195 as amended bylaws of 1955, Chapter 334; and to prepare a report to be presented to the voters at either a special meeting or at the next annual school district meeting.

10. To see if the District will raise and appropriate \$6,000 for site improvement, or take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To see if the District will raise and appropriate Seven Thousand Dollars for repairs of ceiling - foyer (gym), seamless floors (elementary bathroom) and general repairs.

ANNUAL MEETING OF
THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT
March 5, 1980

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by Neal Kurk, Moderator, in the Weare School Gym.

Mr. Kurk led those present in a salute to the Flag.

Mr. Kurk then went over the rules to be followed for the evening and announced that Roberts' Rules of Order Revised would be the guiding manual for conduct of the meeting.

Mr. Kurk then recognized Mr. Frank Farmer, chairman of the School Board, who gave a brief talk about the Weare Schools and introduced the other members of the School Board.

Mr. Kurk then asked those present if there was any objection to dispensing with the reading of the warrant at this time - each article to be read individually as it was taken up. There was no objection.

Article 1. Nancy Taylor moved, Dale Conant seconded, that the salaries of the School Board and other elected officers be accepted as set forth in the Function 2300 Series of the printed budget.
MOTION CARRIED.

Article 2. Frank Farmer moved, Nancy Taylor seconded, that the District raise and appropriate \$987,851 for the support of schools, for the payment of statutory and contractual obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Members of the School Board then presented each section of the budget to those present. Much discussion was generated by certain sections of the budget, especially by the 1100 Section (Regular Education). Mr. Brown, Finance Committee Member, moved to amend Article 2 by substituting the figure of \$975, 251.00 for the \$987,851 figure. Discussion followed on this motion, with ideas generated as to where the budget could be cut. It was then moved and duly seconded that debate be stopped on this amendment. This motion was carried and a standing vote was taken on the amendment. Forty of those present voted to amend the article; 78 voted against amending the article. Mr. Thomas Clow then moved and the motion was duly seconded that debate be stopped on Article 2. The motion was carried. Those present then voted on Article 2. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 3. Frank Farmer moved, the motion duly seconded, that the School District raise and appropriate \$8,105 for the purchase of cafeteria tables, student desks/chairs, teachers' desks/chairs and entrance.

The Finance Committee recommended that this article be passed. A vote was taken. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 4. Frank Farmer moved, Mr. Arliss seconded, to see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$58,000 for construction of a two classroom addition including furnishings and equipment, architectural and other fees, site development and other items incidental to and necessary for such construction, and to raise \$56,000 by the issue and sale of bonds or notes of the School District in accordance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, the time and place of payment of interest, the rate of interest, provision for the sale of notes and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith, to be left to the discretion of the School Board, the balance of \$2,000 for interest to be raised by taxation.

Discussion followed on the merits of this Article in comparison with Article 5 which dealt with the proposed purchase of portable classrooms. The School Board favored Article 4, as did the Finance Committee. Discussion then centered on whether \$56,000 was a realistic figure (too low?) for the building of the proposed addition. Mr. Paul Delamater then moved to amend the article by changing the amount of \$56,000 in said Article to \$60,000. The motion was duly seconded and a vote was taken. The amendment was not passed. Mr. Brown then moved and the motion was duly seconded that a vote be taken on Article 4. A standing vote was then taken. Those in favor constituted a 2/3 majority of those voting. VOTE: UNANIMOUS

Article 5. Mr. Farmer moved, motion duly seconded, that Article 5 be dismissed. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 6. As there were no reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen to accept as printed in the Town Report, this Article was dismissed.

Article 7. Thomas Clow moved, Frank Farmer seconded, that the School District raise and appropriate \$12,360 for deficit spending for the 1979-80 school year. Mr. Clow then explained the Article. Mr. Brown, Finance Committee, expressed the view that money should not be appropriated for deficit spending until the fiscal year was over. Mr. Clow then explained that it is known that we have gone over the budget in certain instances at this time. Much discussion followed on this Article. Mr. William Herman then moved, motion duly seconded, that we vote on the Article. A vote was taken. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 8. Dale Conant moved and it was duly seconded to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the District any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the state of New Hampshire and/or the United States, and to appropriate any funds received to the payment of obligations of the District for which said government funds constitute full reimbursement. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 9. Nancy Taylor moved and Thomas Clow seconded the motion to see if the District will vote to create a cooperative School District Planning Committee of Three (3) voters, one of which will be a Board member, and two others selected by the Board to work with similar committees appointed in neighboring school district to study the feasibility of forming a cooperative school district in accordance with RSA Chapter 195 as amended by Laws of 1955, Chapter 334; and to prepare a report to be presented to the voters at either a special meeting or at the next annual school district meeting. Some discussion followed the presentation of this article. MOTION PASSED.

Article 10. Mr. Frank Farmer moved and Mr. Thomas Clow seconded that the School District raise and appropriate \$6,000 for site improvement, or take any other action in relation thereto. It was explained that this article was for the purpose of paving a parking area on the right hand side of the school driveway and for eliminating muddy conditions at certain times of the year in the school area and for fixing up the baseball diamond area. The Finance Committee recommended that this article be passed. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 11. Frank Farmer moved and the motion was duly seconded that the School District raise and appropriate \$6,000 for repairs of ceiling - foyer (Gym), seamless floors (elementary bathroom) and general repairs. MOTION CARRIED.

Article 12. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and it was duly seconded that the District vote to provide for the hiring of ten part-time aides, at minimum wage, to work bus duty, recess duty, lunch duty, and to assist in the libraries of the Weare Schools. There was some discussion following the presentation of this Article. The Finance Committee recommended dismissal of the Article. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 13. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and Barbara Arliss seconded that the District vote to restore the money cut from the shop budget by the School Board. Some discussion followed presentation of this Article. The Finance Committee recommended dismissal of the Article. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 14. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and it was duly seconded that the District vote to provide for Weare High School to be a "Comprehensive" High School by New Hampshire State Standards by June 1, 1981. Mr. Arliss then explained this Article and a discussion of the Article ensued. It was moved and seconded that debate be stopped on the Article. The motion passed and a vote was taken on the Article. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 15. Kathy Piccollo moved and it was duly seconded that the District vote to provide the sum of \$3,000 for the purpose of hiring a part-time grant writer who will seek alternative funding sources for the Weare Schools, or to take any other action in relation thereto. The Finance Committee recommended dismissal of this Article. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 16. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and Barbara Arliss seconded that the District vote to restore the money cut from the school budget by the School Board for academic supplies. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 17. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and it was duly seconded that the District vote to combine the Elementary and High School libraries into one comprehensive library for both schools located in the High School library. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 18. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and it was duly seconded that the District vote to provide two additional portable buildings for the art and music programs. Some discussion of the article followed. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 19. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and Barbara Arliss seconded that the District vote to set the minimum starting salary for any new teacher at \$9,000 per school year. Some discussion followed on this article. A vote was taken. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 20. Mr. Martin Arliss moved and Barbara Arliss seconded that the District vote to investigate using space in the old high school as either a temporary or permanent alternative to the overcrowding conditions at the Weare Schools or take any other action in relation thereto. Discussion followed on this article. Mr. Arthur Brennan moved and Martin Arliss seconded a motion to make amendment to this article to include the town hall as a possible source of classroom space. This amendment was dropped. A vote was taken on the original article. MOTION NOT CARRIED.

Article 21. Under Article 21, the following motion was proposed:

Mr. Frank Campana moved that we conduct a community survey to assess educational needs and develop a five year Master Plan based upon the results of this survey.

The survey is to be developed and conducted by a committee of town residents composed as follows: 2 school board members, 2 faculty members, one selectman, 2 Weare High School student council members -- chosen by their respective groups; and 2 community members, to be selected by the school district moderator.

The results of the proposed survey are to be presented to the community at a public meeting no later than September, 1980 and by at least one written report published and distributed prior to that meeting.

The master plan is to be presented to the community in a public meeting no later than November, 1980 and by at least one written report published and distributed prior to that meeting.

Progress of the master plan is to be shown to the town twice yearly; at the School District meeting in March and at a public meeting to be held no later than September each year thereafter.

The motion was duly seconded and discussion followed on this article. A motion was made by Thomas Clow and seconded by Nancy Taylor that this matter be referred to the School Board. A vote was taken. Motion was not carried. It was moved by Mr. Arliss to stop debate on the Article and this motion was duly seconded. The motion carried. A vote was taken on the article. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Arnold Rocklin-Weare moved to adjourn the meeting. The motion was duly seconded and a vote was taken. MOTION CARRIED.

The meeting adjourned at 1:45 a.m.

REPORT OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS
OF WEARE

I herewith submit my 1980 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

Having completed the first year of a new decade, those of us in education look ahead to the Eighties with a mixture of excitement and concern. A number of very important issues must be addressed jointly by educators and the members of the communities which they serve. Probably the most immediate and grave concern shared by all of us is the impact which spiralling inflation is having upon our institutions, our families, and our quality of life. The constant escalation of certain fixed budgetary costs like fuel and utilities, and the increased number of mandated special education programs and services, have forced school districts to set careful priorities in the use of discretionary monies and to streamline all programs in order to be certain that they achieve maximum cost effectiveness. The challenge to all of us is to continue to improve the quality of our educational system with diminishing available resources.

Special education costs will continue to rise as service requirements and transportation costs increase, and this fact alone will motivate school districts to provide more specialized services within the individual school and district. The key to maximizing special education services lies in collaboration among districts and in expansion of the mainstreaming idea whereby more handicapped youngsters are taught in the regular classroom setting. In order for this to be accomplished, teachers will need additional training and systematic consultant support from educational specialists.

I am certain that in the Eighties we can expect to see many more students learning about computers as well as with computers. Computers are rapidly becoming an important part of the educational environment, providing students with individualized instruction and immediate feedback, and freeing teachers to give more time to individual students. Alongside this emphasis upon technology, we may expect to see a renewed interest in the Humanities, the Fine Arts, and the Classics. While surveys indicate that most of us agree that the primary responsibility of our schools is to prepare all students in the fundamental or basic skills of reading, writing and computing, increased interest in music and the arts and greater appreciation of our cultural heritage can be expected in our schools as our leisure time increases.

School systems across the nation are presently involved in accountability programs which seek to measure pupil performance in relation to specific educational objectives developed by the school systems themselves. This approach, called criterion-referenced testing, differs from norm-referenced testing, which compares pupil performance to a national or regional norm. Each school in New Hampshire is expected to have its accountability program in operation by the end of this school year. New Hampshire school districts will use the information gained

from accountability testing to improve educational programs and services to learners. Results of the annual assessment will be made public so that the taxpayer may see the results of his/her investment in public education.

I think we will see a continued emphasis upon career education in our schools and continuing support for sophisticated vocational programs which provide adolescents with valuable job entry skills. Communities will probably emphasize adult education to a far greater degree in the Eighties, making much greater use of school libraries, laboratories, shops, gymnasiums, and classrooms. The recognition that one's education does not cease at age 18 and that learning is a life-long process will promote greater cooperation between the school and the community.

Public education in the 1980's must effectively apply existing technology in order to equip all students with the basic skills. In addition to teaching these survival skills, however, public school personnel must teach young people how to think so that they may discover and develop their own potential to a level of personal fulfillment. Schools must begin to educate youngsters for the future, preparing them to cope with and to solve complex problems not yet envisioned by us. A youngster entering first grade next fall will graduate from college in 1997, in search of a career in the 21st Century. We educators, parents and taxpayers share a great responsibility if we are to prepare young people for this challenge.

I would like to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the principals, teachers, school board members, and citizens of Weare. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued cooperation.

Routine physical examinations with required lab work were given to all school cafeteria personnel. T.B. Tine tests were once again made available to all personnel as was routine blood pressure checks.

A dental program was offered to all elementary and junior high students with a total of 154 children participating. Mrs. Joyce Prowse, our dental hygienist, was available from October to December for cleanings, dental checks, fluoride treatments, and individual instruction for each of these children.

In the health teaching area, topics on nutrition, drugs, alcohol, venereal disease, and preventive health measures were covered at respective grade levels. The fifth and sixth grades were also presented a program on adolescence. In October the Weare Fire Department presented an excellent program on fire safety in which the entire elementary school was able to participate and view demonstrations.

A vision/hearing clinic sponsored by the Sugar & Spice Kindergarten was held on May 14, 1980, at the Town Hall. A total of 62 children participated, 45 of which were registered for first grade in September.

All incoming first grade children were invited to spend a day at the school as guests of the present first grade students. Forty children participated.

School physical examinations totaled 117 during this school year and were done in August and October.

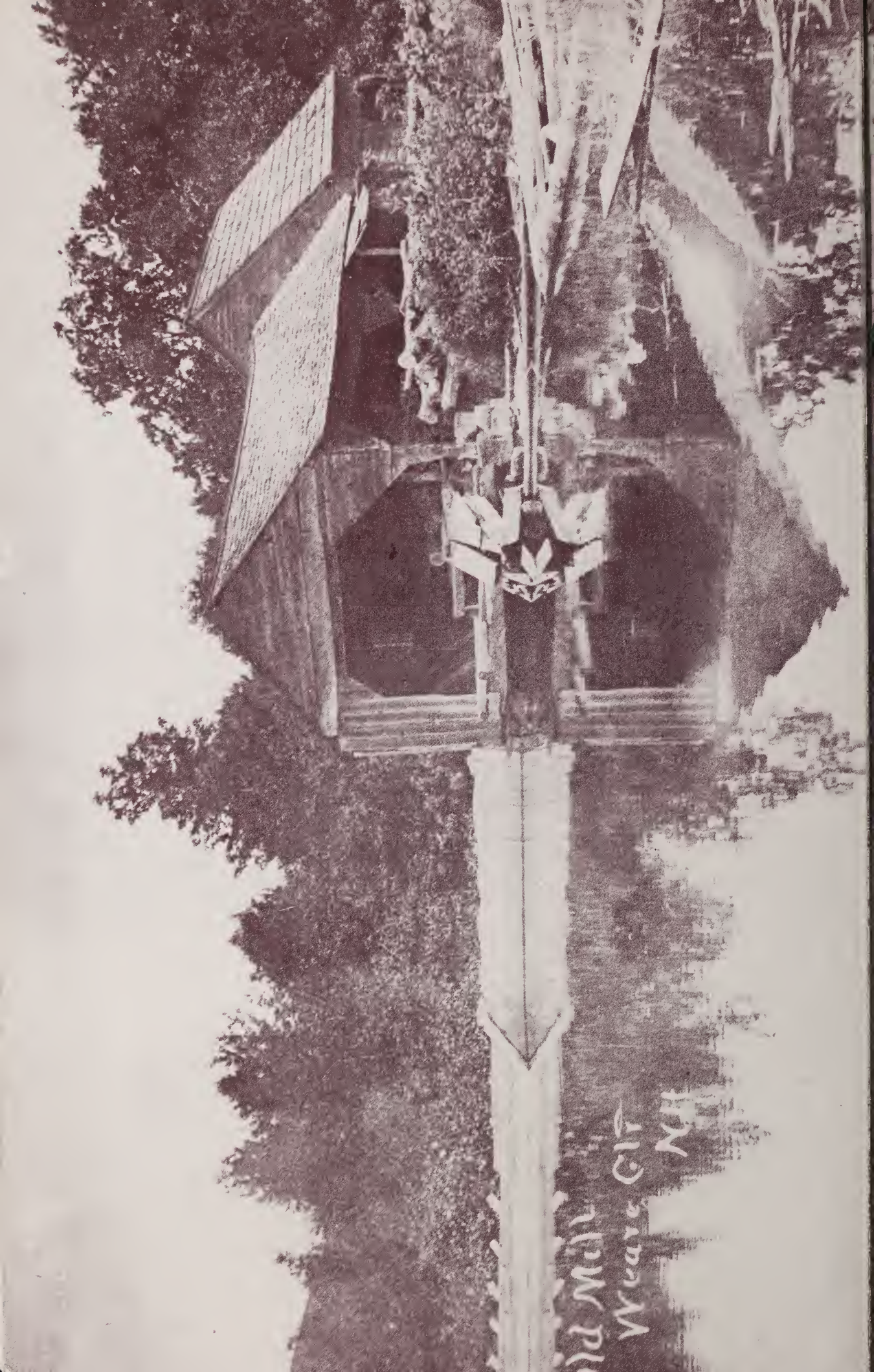
