WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Town Maintenance.
 - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
 - (c) Oiling town roads.
 - (d) General expense of Highway Department.
4. To raise and appropriate the sum necessary for Class V road construction.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for Public Welfare.
 - (a) Town Poor.
 - (b) Old Age Assistance.

6. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.
7. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary for Patriotic Purposes.
 - (a) Old Home Day.
 - (b) Memorial Day.
8. To raise and appropriate such sums as may be necessary to complete the construction of the Hy-Mar Fire House.
 - (a) To raise and appropriate the sum necessary to support the Hy-Mar Fire Department.
9. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issuance of notes, a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1948, said notes to be expressly payable from said taxes within one year from date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.
10. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of new snow removal equipment.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in connection with the State's program for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredths of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

As Mr. John A. Sinclair was Superintendent of Schools during the school year 1946-1947, there is very little that I can say about that period of time. My remarks will have to do with the present school year.

I have attempted to become acquainted with as many people in Webster as possible during the short period that I have been Superintendent and hope to know more people as times goes on. It is of the utmost importance that the teachers (I consider myself a special teacher) get to know the parents so that we may work together. There are three important agencies in the community which should work together in the wholesome development of young people, namely,—the school, the church and the home. It is very necessary that these three agencies should cooperate to the high-

est degree. When they do not, the ones who suffer most are the children.

The people in Webster should consider some sort of a building program, whether it be a central school for the town of Webster or participation in a co-operative school district. The Putney Hill school is quite crowded and the room is too small to allow any activity other than work at the desks. It would seem that the logical thing to do would be to build a two class room building with provision for preparation of hot lunches. If there were a movable partition between the two class rooms, they could be used as an auditorium or town meeting place.

It has been very pleasant to work with the Webster School Board, teachers and town people, and I have had a very agreeable introduction to my new work.
