

HERBERT EUGENE SARGENT

1876 - 1947

On October 27, 1947, the town of Wolfeboro lost one of its most respected and best-loved citizens, Herbert Eugene Sargent, Senior Master at Brewster Academy, who had nearly completed his fifty-fourth year of teach-

ing at that institution.

Mr. Sargent was born in Plymouth, N. H., January 2, 1867, the son of Herman Logan and Myra (Randall) Sargent. He was graduated from Plymouth High and Normal schools and from Dartmouth College with the degree of Bachelor of Science. He had studied under Professor Fernald at Harvard Summer School, doing special work in Botany, including field work on the Cape.

During Mr. Sargent's service in the school, he has taught members of many families, including parents, children and grandchildren. Marion Ricker of Acton, Maine, who was graduated in 1897, became his wife in 1898. Their

five living children are all academy graduates.

Mr. Sargent had so thoroughly explored the woods and fields of this area that he had found many botanical specimens never before found hereabouts and he prepared most of the specimens on exhibition at Libby Museum. He was a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the New Hampshire Academy of Science and the Vermont Botanical and Bird Clubs. He had been a deacon of the First Congregational Church for thirty-five years.

Mr. Sargent possessed qualities which made him an exceptional teacher, a good citizen and a devoted friend. His presence will always be felt and his influence will always be a motivating factor in the future course of Brewster Academy. He leaves to posterity a monument of innumerable good deeds, kind words and a lifetime of unselfish service.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1947

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, from twelve noon until eight P. M. for the casting of ballots, and at seven P. M. to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Water and Sewer Commissioner for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, three members of the Budget Committee for three years, and one Town Constable for one year.

ARTICLE 2. To select one or more Highway Agents, or to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget, which included the following special appropriations:

No. 1. For Moth Extermination, Blister Rust and Tree Care \$1,200 00

No. 2. To the Lakes Region Association for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region	360 00

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow by Serial Notes a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 for the completion of Forrest Road.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow by Serial Notes a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 for the Harriman-Hale Post No. 18 of the American Legion as per Chapter 51, Sec. 4, Subdivision 10 of the revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire as amended in 1945.

ARTICLE 8. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Clark property in the rear of the Bathing Beach, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the Town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the Town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate an amount of \$800.00 as estimated by the Tax Commission, to pay for same.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation of \$200.00 as estimated by the Municipal Accounting Division to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 12. To see what action the Town will take regarding the bequest of the late Josephine M. Rust of the Avery field for a Park at South Wolfeboro.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken under Article 18 of the Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting held the second Tuesday of March, 1935, and that the Selectmen shall serve as the Budget Committee of the Town.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to extend the Residential District Zone 2 of the present Zoning Ordinance to the Precinct limits.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.








Black Areas Show Additional Precinct Rate. Shaded Areas Show Town Tax Rate.


TOWN COSTS FOR SCHOOLS




WHERE THE 1946 DOLLAR CAME FROM




WHERE THE 1947 DOLLAR WILL COME FROM



We recommend that serial notes not to exceed \$4,000.00 be issued to complete the construction of Forrest Road.

We recommend, if not in conflict with the recommendations of the Soldiers' Memorial Committee, that serial notes not to exceed \$5,000.00 be issued and the proceeds contributed to the Harriman-Hale Post of the American Legion. This money is to be applied toward the reconstruction of the Legion Hall and is to represent the town's memorial to the World War Veterans.

Highways

In addition to the completion of Forrest Road, we recommend the following expenditures for road construction, funds for which are included in the budget:

The Budget Committee determined that the School Budget for 1946-1947 will be \$60,172.00. This represents about \$17,000.00 above the budget voted for the previous year. The increase is due to four main factors, namely:

- 1. The necessity of granting a substantial increase in the salaries of teachers. This is a very necessary expense and is being done on a nation-wide scale at present. It is the opinion of the Budget Committee that teachers should be adequately paid, and only by so doing can we attract the well-trained type of teacher so necessary for the training of our young people.
- 2. The increased cost of materials such as paper, textbooks, supplies, etc., will necessitate a greater expenditure in the next year and necessitated going over the estimated budget for the past year in these items.
- 3. The need for more repairs on the school building which were not possible during the war years.
- 4. The approximate deficit of \$3,600.00 from the past year made by the increase of ten per cent in teachers' salaries to cover the higher cost of living during the remaining school year, and by not having as yet received any amount from the Brewster Estate for equipment not usually included in the budget appropriation.

Garbage Collection and Disposal

Inasmuch as the amount of garbage being collected during the winter months does not justify the

expense involved, we recommend that this service be restricted to the summer season for this year.

The problem of garbage and rubbish disposal needs further study and consideration to safeguard the health of our citizens and to improve the appearance of our community. We recommend that a committee of three citizens be appointed by the Moderator to make a study and present a report at the next town meeting.

Police Department

After a year's experience with two full time policemen it is the opinion of the Committee that the town can be adequately policed by one full time officer for the full year, and a second full time officer for the summer season. Funds to meet this recommendation are included in the budget.

The Committee recommends the purchase of the remainder of the Clark Estate which lies between the bathing beach and Clark Road, for a sum not to exceed \$500.00.

\$1,000.00 has been included to cover the cost of reassessment and audit if the town votes for these articles.

The Budget Committee extends thanks to the town, school, and precinct officials whose cooperation has made the preparation of this Budget possible.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending January 1, 1947, is herewith presented.

Gradually conditions have returned to normal as far as the library work is concerned. The circulation of books has been on the increase as a result of a busy summer with many visitors in town and the increase in the enrollment in the schools, together with an increase in the number of people in town, many of whom visit the library. This year as in the past many are doing very serious reading. Veterans have been asking for information in regard to colleges which they are interested in attending. These requests have been met by adding to the number of catalogues which were available at the library.

The State Library is continuing to be of very valuable service to our library in the lending of books to meet the demands which come from time to time. This past year these requests have increased noticeably.

During the year the library received two bequests: one from the estate of Miss E. May Hanson, whose bequest was in the form of a fund in memory of her mother, Mrs. Eliza W. Hanson. The interest from this fund is to be used for the purchase of books. The second was from Miss Marion Wood. who bequeathed her library, which contained many valuable books. The Garden Club also presented to the library a number of books helpful to gardeners. In addition to the gifts already mentioned there were many other generous gifts of books.

The circulation for the year has been 22,401 books and magazines of these classes: fiction, 13,368; non-fiction, 4,189; children's books, 4,844. Three hundred and fifty-six new cards were issued. The largest day's circulation was 219 books and the smallest eighteen.

This year 485 books have been added to the combined libraries. To the reference department was added the new Americana Encyclopedia.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT WATER DEPARTMENT

During the last year we were able to do considerable more work in the Water Department, due to Government restrictions being lifted.

On Clark Road we extended our two-inch main pipe 200 feet to the new house owned by Ransom Goodrich.

At Goose Corner we extended our summer line 300 feet to the camps owned by Mr. John Bickford.

At Lake Wentworth our summer lines were extended 1,800 feet to the camps owned by Mrs. Osborne Abbott, Joseph Neirney and Leon Marden.

We have 1,500 feet of six-inch cast iron pipe ready to be laid as far as the "Allen A" property at Wolfeboro Falls and 1,000 feet to replace the old two-inch pipe beyond Mrs. Maurice Shea's at South Wolfeboro.

Due to the trouble that we have had with the old pressure regulating valve at Pine Hill we have a new 12-inch valve which will be installed this spring. We feel sure that this valve will give more water to North Main Street and Brewster Hill.

The Water Department added on 22 new customers during the last year and have replaced 28 old service pipes with copper tubing.

We have had a few bad leaks in our water mains which were repaired as promptly as possible.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT SEWER DEPARTMENT

In the Sewer Department there has been very little new construction work done during the last year.

Only three new customers were added on during 1946, making a total of 229. Several of the old sewer lines were replaced with the new Orangeburg Pipe, which is highly recommended by the State Board of Health.

At the Factory Street Pumping Station a new lawn and fence was built which we hope will add to the appearance of the buildings.

The Trickling Filter Beds were given one treatment of caustic, not only for sanitary reasons but to prolong the life of the beds.

The entire sewer system is thoroughly flushed at least once each year.

By constant treatment of the Imhoff Tank, we have reduced the amount of lime used from over two tons in 1940 to 180 pounds in 1946.

Visitors are always welcome to inspect our pumping stations and treatment plant.

I wish at this time to thank all members of the Water and Sewer Department for their splendid cooperation during the past year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE RED CROSS FOR THE YEAR 1946

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1946

Many months ago the American Red Cross made known its wish to relinquish its local responsibility in the field of public health nursing. It took the stand that, after some twenty years of pioneering in this sphere, the service had reached a mature stage of growth and should be the responsibility of a local community group. The Public Health Nursing Committee of the Wolfeboro Red Cross Chapter therefore was given the assignment of setting up such a community organization, and worked for two or three years toward such a goal before the time was ripe for separation from the local Red Cross Chapter.

On January 16, 1946, the Public Health Nursing Association of Wolfeboro and vicinity was incorporated, in order to be ready to receive and disburse funds as soon as they were available for the new organization. The first annual meeting of the association was held on January 30, 1946, and the following officers were duly elected: president, Mrs. J. H. Gould; vice-president, Mrs. Harold H. Hart; secretary, Mrs. Herbert Thibodeau; treasurer, Mrs. F. E. Meader.

The constitution of the association calls for fifteen to twenty-five directors to formulate and carry out the policies and program of the service, and the following directors were elected at this meeting: Mr. James Carr, Mrs. Thelma Colby, Mrs. Roy Foster, Mrs. Bernard Landman, Mr. Merrill C. Petty, Mr. A. C. Ballentine, Mr. Edwin Edgerly, Mrs. J. H. Gould, Mr. Harold Hart, Mrs. Herbert Thibodeau, Mrs. Howard Avery, Dr. W. J. P. Dye, Mrs. Harold Hart, Mr. John Hoppin, and Mrs. F. E. Meader.

Committee assignments were distributed as follows: Nursing—Dorothy Gould, Alta Meader, May Hart, Rena Landman, Elvira Avery; Finance—Harold Hart, Edwin Edgerly, Alta Meader; Public Relations—A. C. Ballentine, Elvira Avery, James Carr; Medical Adviser, Dr. Paul Dye; Business Adviser, John Hoppin.

During the year five meetings of the Board of Directors have been held, always with a quorum present. At the fall meeting, invited guests included the members of the school boards of Wolfeboro and Tuftonboro and also the school superintendent, and Miss Elizabeth Murphy of the State Department of Education, who supervises activities of school nurses. A general discussion of the school nursing program was held.

The association has had two outside speakers during the year: Dr. John S. Wheeler, Health Officer of New Hampshire, formerly a physician in Wolfeboro, spoke at the public meeting in connection with the annual meeting on January 30. At the fall board meeting Dr. H. Shirley Dwyer spoke in regard to a well-organized dental program, with particular emphasis on preventive dental care for children.

During the summer a membership campaign was held by mail. This campaign was held not only to realize funds to enlarge the work of the nursing service, but also to educate people in the community as to the existence, aims and objects of this newly-founded organization. The response was gratifying, and the membership at the end of the first year stands at 209.

For the first year of operation the association has had a staff of one full-time nurse and one part-time physiotherapist. Fortunately Miss Dencie Ward carried over as the nurse from the Red Cross organization to the new association. Her interest in the needs of the community and in the problems of the associa-

tion has made her work outstanding. The board of directors has thought it expedient to give her two raises in pay in the past year in order to keep in line with the rising cost of living and the level of pay in the field of public health nursing. Mrs. Earl Crosby during the year has taken on increased work in the field of physiotherapy, and has done work of which the community may well be proud. An arrangement has been made whereby the New Hampshire Society for Crippled Children and Handicapped Persons since June 1, 1946, has paid Mrs. Crosby for the treatments which she gives to children, and the Public Health Nursing Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity has taken care of the necessary transportation.

On recommendation of the North Atlantic Area office of the Red Cross, the nursing car was deeded to the Nursing Association on separation from the Red Cross. This was a much-appreciated financial boost to the new organization.

In going over these reports, it should be borne in mind that the service covers a combination of district and school nursing. Dr. Harold Gregory has helped in both fields, and his willingness to cooperate has been much appreciated. The complete report of school nursing will be found in the school report.

During the year emphasis has been laid on a preventive program in all phases of the health service.

The State made a general appeal to hold diphtheria clinics as soon as possible to aid in the control of what might have been an epidemic. Local response resulted in the large number of children contacted and immunized at the spring clinics. Many of the preschool children were given two shots as they had not previously been immunized.

Every organization in town responded generously with funds for children needing the healthful and educational advantages of a few weeks at a summer camp. Four children attended and benefitted from this phase of the preventive program.

A start has been made this year on a more complete dental program. The program of physical ex-

aminations for all grade school children by the school doctor, which was carried through in the fall brought to light the need for further examination by an orthopedic specialist. Plans are under way to accomplish this by means of a clinic in Wolfeboro.

PHYSIOTHERAPIST'S REPORT

1946

Under the orthopedic branch of the nursing service, eighteen patients have received care and treatment. A total of 37 patient visits were made at the twelve Orthopedic Clinics in Manchester and Laconia. Four patients have been corrected and discharged from the clinic and the service. The program is still on a part-time basis, with over four hundred hours spent on the work this year.

Physical examinations in the grade schools this fall revealed a high percentage of the children as having postural difficulties. The majority of these posture problems could be improved and corrected with supervised exercises and posture training. This indicates the need of a physical education program in the grade schools under the leadership of a trained physical education instructor.

The camp fund which was raised by generous donations from individuals and local organizations enabled four children on the Cripled Children's Service to benefit by and enjoy a few weeks at camp this past summer. It is hoped that this worthwhile project can be carried on from year to year.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

There have been no real epidemics of communicable diseases during the past year. The incidence of anterior poliomyelitis, commonly known as infantile paralysis, throughout the State of New Hampshire was higher and with more fatalities than in recent, previous years: but there were only two cases in Wolfeboro, both of whom recovered. The fact that there were more cases of this dread disease actually reported than previously may be more apparent than real inasmuch as the disease is now diagnosed in earlier and milder cases without paralysis because of newer knowledge and tests. The National Infantile Paralysis Foundation and the Crippled Children's Society of New Hampshire fully cooperate and have adequate funds for the treatment of these cases and their rehabilitation if any paralyses develop, so that no cases need go without adequate care regardless of individual. financial circumstances.

All of the children of the Wolfeboro Public Schools, from the first through the eighth grades, received a careful, general physical examination by Dr. Harold E. Gregory, assisted by Miss Dencie Ward, R. N., school nurse. On the whole, but few major physical defects were found, leading to the gratifying report of the good health of our children. There were, however about thirty cases of minor orthopedic defects ascertained which were in the nature of poor posture and varying degrees of flat feet. A clinic to examine, classify, and institute treatment for these defects will be held from time to time at Huggins Hospital under the direction of Dr. Albert Phillip La-France, orthopedic surgeon, from Laconia, New Hampshire, under the auspices of the Crippled Children's Services of the New Hampshire State Board of Health. Dr. LaFrance will be assisted at these clinics by Miss Dencie Ward, R. N., Mrs. Dorothy Crosby, and physicians of the community. Wolfeboro is fortunate in having the expert services of Mrs. Dorothy Crosby as physiotherapist who supervises corrective exercises for these orthopedic defects as prescribed by the examining physician. There are very few qualified physiotherapists in the State of New Hampshire and we thank Mrs. Crosby for making it possible for Wolfeboro to have one.

The Public Health Nursing Association of Wolfeboro and Vicinity, Incorporated, was established during the year. The American Red Cross felt that Wolfeboro had become of age with regards to public health nursing procedures and programs and that the community itself should sponsor and supervise such programs. Public health service to our people has in no way been changed by this innovation. Miss Dencie Ward, R. N., has continued to serve in her cheerful, efficient manner, both as Public Health and School Nurse, and the program for visits to the sick and needy, immunization and general clinics, have continued with full force and effectiveness.

Milk and water samples have been periodically examined by the State Laboratories and the reports of such were always more than satisfactory. It should be a constant source of satisfaction and comfort to our people to realize that no disease has been traced to our food, water, or milk supplies and the individuals concerned in these fields should be commended for maintaining the high standards in the production and handling of such basic materials.

There is still a definite shortage of nursing personnel throughout the whole country. However, the nurses of Wolfeboro and vicinity have cheerfully and whole-heartedly responded to the call to serve at Huggins Hospital until this situation corrects itself. Many

of our nurses are married and it means a real sacrifice for them to work at the hospital.

The community and Huggins Hospital welcomes Miss Frances B. Puffer, R. N., back as Superintendent. Miss Puffer was not only an able administrator but also generally well liked by everyone prior to her entering the U. S. Army Nursing Corps during the war. Everyone is delighted that she is now able to return in her former capacity to the hospital and wishes her every success, and cooperation is pledged from her many well wishers.

Bathing Beach

The Bathing Beach as usual was very popular this year, and was used by many of our citizens and children. A life guard was on duty from 9:00 A. M. until 5:00 P. M. daily from July 1st until Labor Day. Not only did he teach swimming to several children but also he kept the beach exceptionally clean.

Last summer the attendance was 5,235. Classes were conducted in swimming and life saving. Nineteen children were taught to swim. Red Cross Life Savings Certificates were awarded three children. And three children also received Diving Certificates.

Skating Rink

Both skating rinks were open this year for the use of adults and children. In order to accommodate all who wished to skate, it became necessary for the Commission to designate certain time for general skating, and for hockey practice and games. This makes a very satisfactory arrangement.

It appears that the rink has been kept in better shape this year than ever before, as it was quickly cleared of snow after each storm.

Parks

The Lake Front Park has been kept neat and tidy for the comfort and enjoyment of both our local citizens and our summer guests, who enjoy a quiet view of the lake.

Suggestions for the beautification of the town will be gratefully received by the Commission.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES-IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
- 5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!
