*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Auburn, in said County,
qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the hall in the Massabesic Lake Inn in said town on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

First. To bring in your ballots for:

Town Clerk for the ensuing year,
One Selectman for three years,
Tax collector for the ensuing year,
Town treasurer for the ensuing year,
Highway agent for the ensuing year,
One library trustee for three years,
One cemetery trustee for three years,
One trust fund trustee for three years,
Three auditors for the ensuing year,
Overseer of the poor for the ensuing year.
Police chief for the ensuing year.

At 12:30 o'clock P. M., the meeting will be open for the following articles:

Second. To see if the town will vote to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

Third. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate long term notes or bonds, in the amount of ten thousand dollars, (\$10,000.00), to be retired annually at the rate of \$1,000.00, plus interest; Said notes or bonds to be for the purpose of financing permanent improvements to highways and bridges and for the purchase

of highway equipment; and to authorize the Selectmen to administer said fund in a manner they deem conducive to the best interests, economy and general welfare of the Town.

Adoption of this program to automatically include, and eliminate from the proposed budget, all items for permanent improvements in the amount of \$3,600.00; consisting of \$1,000.00 for Wilson Crossing Road, \$1,700.00 for Overhead Bridge, and \$900.00 for Snow Plow.

Fourth. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for town officers' expenses.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for election and registration.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for expense of municipal court.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for expense of town hall and other town buildings.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Police department expense.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Forest Fire Department.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Volunteer Fire Department.

Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for the Health department, including Vital Statistics.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for maintenance of summer roads, \$3,000.00 for winter roads, \$200.00 for bridges and culverts, and \$500.00 for general expenses of highway department.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for street lights.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$569.85 for Class V roads, (TRA—town's share.)

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the library.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for town poor.

Nineteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for old age assistance.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day and Veteran's Associations.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$210.00 for rent of hydrants.

Twenty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for the Village Cemetery.

Twenty-third. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for town dump maintenance and rental.

Twenty-fourth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for interest on temporary loans.

Twenty-fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for surface treating the bus terminal.

Twenty-sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for tarring and improving the road leading from the Congregational Church to Pingree Hill.

Twenty-seventh. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for purchase of V-type snowplow.

Twenty-eighth. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for town's share of replacing the overpass bridge on the Auburn-Hooksett road. (Railroad to pay one-half, State and Town to pay one-fourth each.)

Twenty-ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,319.37 for the 1947 County tax.

Thirtieth. To see if the town will vote to use the income of the H. B. Burnham fund for schools or library.

Thirty-first. To see if the town will vote to accept such trust funds as have come in during the past year.

Thirty-second. To see if the town will vote to accept the former Methodist Church building and land offered as a gift to the town of Auburn by the First Congregational Church of Auburn, under the terms of said offer, namely: that said building be dedicated as a memorial to service men and women of all wars, and be used as a Town Hall and recreational center and for town activities, and not for religious services except upon patriotic occasions, and if not so accepted and used within two years the property shall revert to the First Congregational Church of Auburn.

Thirty-third. To see if the town will vote to rescind the vote whereby the town of Auburn operates under the Municipal Budget Law, and in consequence to abolish the Budget Committee. By petition of—Paul S. Wood, Malcolm A. Wood, John Conway, Edward T. Sargent, Andrew Guinnesso, John R. Ryans, Joseph F. Callahan, John T. McKinley, Carl L. Emery, Jr., William H. Towne, Esther Emery, Edward W. Smith, H. Emery.

Thirty-fourth. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls will open at 10 o'clock A. M. and close at 6 o'clock P. M.

NOTICE

We wish to take this opportunity to clarify any misunderstanding relative to the increase in property valuations as assessed in 1946.

By order of the State Tax Commission, all towns were required to show an overall increase in the total real estate valuation where such valuation was deemed by the Commission to be insufficient for the purpose of equalizing County Taxes and State Aid allotments. This increase to be in the amount which the Commission could add, by law, for such equalization purpose in any town failing to meet its requirements.

In view of the fact that we considered previous valuations relative, one to another, it was our feeling that the fair and equitable procedure to provide the required increase was to increase all valuations in the amount of ten per cent. By so doing, all assessments remain on the same relative basis and, since any increase in the overall valuation is reflected by a proportionate decrease in the tax rate, the total tax paid by any one individual remains the same.

We would also like to call attention to article No. 3 in the Warrant, relative to long term notes or bonds. By authorizing the Selectmen to negotiate such notes or bonds, a progressive program of construction may be instituted. By having funds available, the Selectmen will be in a position to affect considerable savings in construction costs by virtue of being able to complete a definite program without incurring the expense which arises from doing a job piecemeal. Also of benefit will be the attendant equalization of the tax rate by pro-rating these construction costs over a long period, at the same time deriving immediate benefit from the results.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Teacher turnover has been relatively small in Auburn. Unfortunately the necessity for the vacancy in Auburn Village came late in the year. Replacement under existing conditions of teacher supply was practically an impossibility. Another factor that contributed to the difficulty of obtaining a teacher was the matter of salary. The situation was taken care of by the use of substitutes. The return of Misses Jamrog and Pinas provided for two of our teaching positions. Miss Charlotte O'Leary was secured as primary teacher for Severance. The need for additional funds for teachers' salaries was demonstrated in the present year and the need will be greater in the ensuing year. In the face of existing conditions the district was fortunate to be able to retain the services of trained personnel.

The educational program was carried on as usual despite critical conditions in the supply field. Publishers are severely handicapped in obtaining adequate supplies of quality paper to furnish text and workbook material. This necessitated placing orders far in advance of anticipated use. It may and does in some cases work hardships for increased enrollments in excess of anticipated increases leaves some pupils without necessary supplies. Fortunately with few exceptions this situation has not developed.

The supply field is in much the same condition. Paper supply is still and will continue to be short. Quality is down and prices are up. The same condition exists here. Orders are placed far in advance based on estimated demands. This has worked out to advantage for deliveries are accepted at prevailing price levels and considerable saving has been affected, in this way. Close scrutiny of conditions will govern future purchases to avoid a declining market.

The pupils have been making satisfactory progress. Test results over a period of years has indicated that the pupils are at or above national norms in most instances. This is naturally subject to some variation for pupils and grades will vary in aptitudes and interests.

The need for a program of major repairs is evident at Severance. The installation of the central heating system is the first step in this direction. There are two and possibly three more major problems to be met. The first to be solved is that of modern sanitation. The present toilet facilities are in need of replacement. With central heating in the building modern equipment can be installed. This is the first problem to solve. The second is to improve the interior of the building. This would involve installation of modern lighting facilities. It would involve ceiling alterations for lighting fixtures and also to provide for insulation. The latter portion of the program would ultimately be a saving for the heating costs should be cut considerably. The next step would be the erection of a chain link fence along the highway. The district has been fortunate that no accident involving a pupil has taken place. These improvements may be consummated through use of state aid funds if the proposed legislation meets the approval of the legislature.

The proposed budget shows an overall increase of \$3,951.77. Three items, teachers' salaries, transportation and tuition are responsible for \$3,142.05. Eleven other items, of which two accounting for \$229.00, are statutory, add \$809.72 to the budget. These items are all increased because of increased costs and are held at a minimum. To provide educational service to the pupils of Auburn they are necessary. The tax levy increases \$1,000.00 in addition for the cash available on July 1, 1946 was utilized to reduce the levy of 1946 and thus is no longer available.

The educational service rendered to the pupils of the Auburn schools has been maintained at a comparatively high level. That this has been so is due to the united efforts of many. Your teachers have worked loyally and conscientiously to provide educational opportunity for each pupil at his or her own level. Pupils and parents have maintained a high level of regular attendance and have worked with teachers to adjust minor difficulties. The members of the school board have given of their time without stint and have

counselled wisely in all school situations. With the cooperation of all it has been a pleasure to work with these groups in an endeavor to provide the best educational opportunity possible.
