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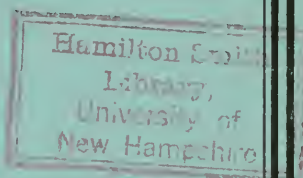

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, one trustee of trust funds for three years, one library trustee for three years, a town treasurer, auditor, one or more highway agents and all the other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2 To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries and expenses, for the repair, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the town library; for the support of the town poor; for the observance of Memorial and Old Home Day, and for all other necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4 To see what action the town will take in regard to securing state aid for its highways and to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for that purpose.

Article 5 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 6 To see if the town will vote to maintain two hydrants in the Woodsville School district in town, at an expense of forty dollars each annually.

Article 7 To see if the town will vote to discon-

tinue, subject to gates and bars, the road toward South Landaff from the turn to Harry D. Whitcomb farm to Landaff line.

Article 8 To see if the town will vote to dispense with the delivery of the inventory blanks until April 1st.

Article 9 To see what action the town will take to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Bath Town
Town School District:

I herewith present my second annual report as
superintendent of schools.

During the year 1930-1931 the total enrollment
was 77; the per cent of attendance, 95.5; pupils neither
absent nor tardy, 10; number of cases of tardiness, 156;
school visits by board members, 9; by superintendent,
92; by citizens, 257. In addition to those in the town
school the district paid tuition for 16 elementary and
28 high school pupils who attended schools outside.

Those on the roll of honor for perfect attendance
were Arthur Arsenault, Elsie Young, Isabelle Young,
Christine Mitton, Ernest Poor, Alice Chamberlin, Bar-
bara Church, Dora McQuesten, Margaret Church,
Lloyd Robie.

In June 12 pupils were promoted from the eighth
grade to the high school: Arthur Arsenault, Doris
Austin, Mildred Johnson, Maurice Smith, Walter
Young, Louis Bedard, Iola Moulton, Kathlyn Whitcomb,
Margaret Rollins, Vernard Chase, Joseph Greenwood,
Archie McQuesten.

This year the enrollment so far has been 80. The
following list shows the names of the schools, the
teachers, and the number of pupils: Swiftwater, Mrs.
Elizabeth Hooper, 32; Nutter, Mrs. Avis Lemieux, 14;
Pettyboro, Velma Robinson, 15; Carbee, Margaret Pow-
ers, 19. There are also 10 elementary and 26 high
school pupils enrolled in schools of other districts.

I feel that we are particularly fortunate in having
a group of earnest, capable, experienced teachers. The
schools show the benefit by the quality of the work be-
ing done. Miss Underhill is again serving as school
nurse. In view of the excellent attendance this year
it would seem that her supervision, together with the
work of the teachers in the cultivation of good health

habits on the part of the children, and the cooperation of the parents are bringing gratifying results.

For the most part the buildings are in good condition. The one piece of repairing most needed is at the Nutter school. A new sill will make possible a straightening up of the building and a closing up of certain cracks which let in the wind. The grading of the driveway at the Nutter School, made last spring, has proved a great convenience. I wish to take this opportunity to express the thanks of the district to the Grange of Swiftwater for the lights which they had installed in the Swiftwater and Nutter schools.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Bath Union School District:

I herewith present my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

During the year 1930-1931 the enrollment was 96; per cent of attendance, 93.3; number of cases of tardiness, 99; number of tuition pupils, 26; school visits by board members, 7; by superintendent, 115; by citizens, 70.

The following pupils were on the roll of honor for perfect attendance: Zellene Young, Helen Chase, Roger Estes, Patricia Wilson.

Five pupils were promoted in June from the eighth grade to the high school: Harry Woods, Erwin Corey, Robert Aldrich, Velma Tewksbury, Walter Woods.

This year there have been enrolled 37 pupils in the high school, 31 in the grammar room, and 29 in the primary room, making a total of 97. The teachers are for the high school—Headmaster Ernest O. Pederson of Berlin, economics, mathematics, science; Ellen S. Chase, English, foreign languages, history; for grades

1-4, Dorothy Boland of Haverhill; for grades 5-8, Elaine E. Griggs of West Lebanon.

Since the publication of last year's report there have been two changes in the teaching staff. Miss Darling resigned to accept a position in the school at Newport, New Hampshire, and Mr. Black resigned to join the staff of the New Hampshire State Board of Education. His new work has to do with the rehabilitation and training of the physically handicapped.

I wish to call attention to the changes in the curricula of the high school. By alternating a number of courses year by year we have been able to offer more subjects and allow a wider choice than was possible before. In accord with the trend of the times we are providing more for individual differences in needs and abilities.

At this writing there seems to be no urgent need of any extensive repairs on the building. It would be a great improvement if some gravel could be put on the driveway. Perhaps some public spirited volunteers from the older citizens and boys of the high school could do this work with but little expenditure of tax money.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Sir:

I hereby present my first report as Headmaster of the Bath Union High School.

Bath Union High School opened for the current year September 8, 1931 with an enrollment of 36 students. The present enrollment is 33. Of these 18 are tuition students.

The general upkeep of the building is good. I earnestly recommend a drinking fountain in the corridor

and an enlarged and more modern lavatory in the boys' basement.

To my mind, one of the wing ends of the attic could be turned into a reading room. This could be done at a very low cost and would be of great educational value to the students.

The school's major sports are basketball and baseball. I am interested in the promotion of Winter Sports among the school girls and boys. Participation, at present, in an ambitious town carnival is at its height.

The Athletic Association is partially supported by social functions through Mrs. Chase, head of the English Department. The plays that Mrs. Chase has coached have all been financially successful. The school is much indebted to her efficient and cooperative achievements.

I would urge a closer relationship between the parents and the teachers. This can easily be done by more frequent visiting on the part of the parents.

Teachers' meetings are held at regular intervals.

"The Bath Union Spirit", a school year book will come out in the Spring. The school, with editors and helpers will plan the book.

The progress of the student body is praiseworthy. The common ideals and standards of politeness and cooperation exercised among the students is commendable. As we all know, authorities agree that character more so than knowledge is the ultimate aim of education. Like many of you I believe that the aim for better discipline is not merely the suppression of noise and disorder, but self control, poise and proper standards of social propriety.

The superintendent and the school board have given their most hearty cooperation in keeping the general administration of school affairs harmonious at all times.
