Proceedings of the County Convention.

CONCORD, N. H., June 12th, 1889.

The Representatives of the several towns in Belknap County met in convention, according to the requirements of the General Laws of the State, in the judiciary room of the State House, on the above date, and organized as follows :

Amos L. Rollins, of Alton, was chosen chairman; Willaim F. Knight, of Laconia, was chosen clerk, and the said Wm. F. Knight in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

On motion of Geo. A. Sanders, of Laconia, it was voted that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to nominate candidates for county auditors.

The chair appointed Geo. A. Sanders, of Laconia, Joseph F. Smith, of Meredith, and Pike Davis, of Belmont.

The report of the committee recommending Henry B. Quinby, of Gilford, and Samuel B. Smith, of Laconia, was received, and on motion, these gentlemen were elected as county auditors for the term of two years.

The report of the Commissioners of Belknap County was presented and read, as follows ;

TO THE REPRESENTATIVES OF BELKNAP COUNTY :

Gentlemen — We recommend that the sum of \$25,000 be raised by taxation in Belknap County for county expenses for the year 1890, and the same amount for the year 1891, divided as follows :

On motion of Geo. A. Sanders, of Laconia, a committee of three, consisting of Edwin Cox, of Meredith, Wm. H. Weeks, of Gilford, and Francis A. Emerson, of New Hampton, were appointed to fix a date and to make suitable arrangements for said visit.

On motion of Geo. A. Sanders, it was voted to adjourn.

At a meeting of the Representatives of the several towns in Belknap County, held at the County Farm, in Laconia, on Friday, June 21st, 1889, at 1 o'clock p. m., the meeting was called to order by Amos L. Rollins, chairman.

The resignation of Henry B. Quinby as one of the county auditors elected June 12th, was received and accepted.

On motion, proceeded to fill the vacancy. Moses H. Mellow was declared elected, but declined to serve.

Edwin Cox, of Meredith, was nominated on motion of Geo. A. Sanders, and the said Edwin Cox having received all the votes of the said convention, was declared elected.

On motion it was voted to adjourn, subject to the call of the chairman.

At a meeting of the Representatives of the several towns in Belknap County, held in Representatives' Hall at the State House, in Concord, on July 10th, 1889, at 2 o'clock p. m., the meeting was called to order by the chairman, Amos L. Rollins.

Geo. A. Sanders was elected clerk *pro tem*.

On motion of Samuel B. Smith, of Laconia, it was voted to authorize the County Commissioners of Belknap County, to purchase a new boiler, and at the same time to reset the old one at the County Farm building, in said county, and that the sum of one thousand dollars be appropriated for that purpose.

On motion of Francis A. Emerson, of New Hampton, it was voted to adjourn.

To the Citizens of Belknap County.

In compliance with the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Belknap County herewith present to the citizens and tax-payers of the County, their annual report, with the reports of the other officers of the county; also the proceedings of the County Convention.

We have, according to the best of our ability, attended the duties assigned to us. That we have well performed those duties remains for you to judge, in so far as you may know the facts regarding the various matters that have come before us. We have endeavored to act understandingly in all matters and wisely to conduct the business of the County.

The County farm, during the past year, has been under the efficient management of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Gale, and the year has been one of unusual prosperity, both as regards the health of the inmates and management of the institution. Much to the regret of the board of Commissioners, Mr. and Mrs. Gale voluntarily retire from the position they have so well filled for the past two years. Certainly they have the best wishes of all those who have been under their care, as well as those who have otherwise been connected with them. We have secured for the coming year the services of Mr. Thomas L. Smith and wife, of Meredith, who, from long experience in caring for the unfortunate, give promise of well performing the new duties that they now assume.

The Commissioners take this opportunity to thank the members of the Young Men's Christian Association, of Laconia, for the interest they have taken in the spiritual welfare of the unfortunate poor at the farm. Religious services have been held once in two weeks, on Sabbath afternoon, and have been of interest and we trust much profit to those attending.

At the commencement of our term of service, there was an imperative need of increased facilities for heating the buildings at the farm, and by instructions from the County Convention we have placed a new steam boiler of much larger capacity by the side of the one already

there. The old boiler was repaired and reset, much new piping done, and other additional repairs made, making the cost somewhat more than the appropriation; but we have no doubt that good work will prove to be cheapest in the end.

That the number of inmates at the farm remain about the same. While the cost of supporting those outside constantly increases, we feel it to be beyond our power to remedy. By the laws of the State a large and constantly increasing class of those we are obliged to help cannot be compelled to go to the farm. Another class, consisting of transient and foreign population, who require help only to tide over sickness or other unforeseen difficulties, while others require but a little help each week from the county, yet in the aggregate it amounts to a large sum. Again, the bills of the county have been largely increased this year by the change in the time of settlement, made by the last Legislature, whereby many formerly supported by the various towns, have become county charges.

To those who so kindly remembered the inmates at the farm at Christmas time, and by their presence on that occasion making it a day of pleasure to the unfortunate, we return sincere thanks.

Solicitor's Report.

TO THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS:

There were 16 cases on the continued State docket at the Sept. term, 1889, 8 for breaking and entering, 1 for manslaughter, 1 for adultery, 3 for violations of the liquor law, 1 for larceny and 1 for assault

One of the parties indicted for breaking and entering is in prison in Massachusetts for a long term, so the case has gone off the docket for the present under the marking, "not to be brought forward *nisi*," which means that the indictment stands and can at any time be put on the docket for trial upon motion of State's counsel. The other cases for breaking and entering have been disposed of in the same way, the respondents being boys who are under their parents care during good behavior.

The adultery and nuisance cases have been marked the same way, as well as the cases for manslaughter, the latter on the motion of the Attorney-General, it having been tried twice and the jury disagreeing both times.

One liquor case has been *nol prossed*, one marked not to be brought forward, and a fine and costs paid in one.

At that term 22 indictments were found: 15 for violations of the liquor laws, 1 for rape, 1 for arson, 1 for assault and 3 for assaults on an officer. Two appeals were entered, one for assault and one for drunkenness: the first was dismissed on payment of costs, in the second the plea of not guilty was withdrawn, a plea of *nolo* entered, and a fine and costs paid.

The indictment for bigamy was marked not to be brought forward on payment of costs; the rape and arson cases continued, the respondents being out of the State; a plea of guilty was entered in the assault case and a fine and costs paid; pleas of *nolo* were entered in 11 of the liquor cases, costs paid, and fines paid in 3, and the marking not to be brought forward made in 8; 4 were continued, two of the respondents being out of the State, and the respondent in the other two being sick. The indictments in the 3 cases for assaults on an officer were

quashed on informalities, but informations were filed for the same offenses. One of the cases was tried, the respondent convicted and sentenced to jail; the respondents in the two other cases entered a plea of *nolo* and were sentenced to jail.

At the March term, 1890, one indictment for larceny was found, the respondent pleaded guilty and was sentenced to jail; 1 indictment for cruelty to animals, which was continued because of proceedings in the probate court as to the sanity of the respondent; 2 indictments for adultery, which were continued; 1 indictment for violation of the fish laws, to which the respondent pleaded *nolo* and paid a fine and costs; 20 indictments for common seller of spirituous liquor, 20 for keeping spirituous liquor for sale, 60 for specific sales, 3 for selling and keeping beer for sale, and 2 for selling and keeping cider for sale. A trial was had on the indictment for keeping cider for sale and the respondent convicted. He was tried for the specific sale and acquitted. In the 103 liquor and beer cases pleas of *nolo* were entered, all the costs were paid, 3 fines of \$10 each paid in the beer cases, 16 fines of \$100 each, and 4 of \$50, each paid in the liquor cases, 20 sentences of three months in jail imposed on the common seller indictments, but the mittimus for the jail sentences, and the fines in 80 cases not to issue till called for by the Attorney-General and County Solicitor.

Five indictments were found against each of the twenty respondents.

The sixteen who paid \$100 fines have still over them a sentence of \$200 each and three months in jail, and the four who paid \$50 fines have a sentence of \$250 each and three months in jail.

There have been in the last two terms three jury trials, two convictions and one acquittal.

Twelve cases now remain on the continued docket.

The County has had no case on the civil docket.
