WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Boscawen in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sewers.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Library over and above the amount required by law.

- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of Pine Blister Rust.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Firemen.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Trunk Line Maintenance.
- 11. To see what action the town will take toward completing the State Aid road on High Street to the Salisbury town line and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid construction.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid maintenance.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and construction of sidewalks.
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the tarring of roads.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and painting of bridges.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50) dollars toward the support of the Penacook-Boscawen District Nursing Association.
- 18. To hear the report of the survey for the installation of a sewer system on the "Flat" near the High School in Penacook district and see what action the town will take with reference thereto.

- 19. To see if the town will vote to establish a Town lighting system instead of the present Precinct lighting system.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LIBRARY REPORT

The date 1928 will no doubt make no particular impression on the average patron of our library but to them and all future generations it marks a distinct milestone in the library's progressive development. The fact that through the will of Miss Martha A. Knowles, a former Boscawen resident, our library received almost ten thousand dollars which assures for all times a constant supply of books. It might be well to emphasize the fact that in both the Knowles and White bequests the interest of these principals can only be used for purchase of books and not for library maintainence.

The second high-light in our year's growth is the remarkable interest displayed in the work of the Penacook Branch. Much of this interest has been by the younger people—that is right and what we want. The older people have their tastes formed and many other interests, but if we can reach and help from the literary habits of the young, we feel that the work is worthwhile.

Mrs. Emery has continued her reading clubs, we reported last year, with nineteen children at Penacook and eighteen at Boscawen completing the work and receiving certificates. At the Boscawen end a second year class received a seal and ribbon to be added to their former certificates and a third year class of three completed the work and received their certificates framed.

Besides the reading clubs Mrs. Emery held Naming contests of Native Birds, Native Flowers and Native Animals, throwing the specimens on the screen by means of a mirroscope and having short talks at the same time with the children naming as many kinds as they knew.

The annual Book Week was observed in Novmber with story telling by Mrs. Bessie Towne of Penacook, and at Boscawen by two plays given by the children as well as book reviews.

A total of 6,086 books were put out at the Penacook branch from September 1927, to September 1928. This fact alone justifies the maintenance of this branch and further verifies our oft repeated assertion that the village of Penacook needs and would support a library of its own.

We wish to acknowledge books received from Edward Elliott, Herman Ham, Alice Roby, Leo Stevens, Edith Bowers, Isabelle Fiske Conant, Mr. and Mrs. Buxton, Kenneth Raymond, Ethel Sweatt, as well as thanking all the people who have so generously and at an inconvenience to themselves maintained the used magazine files.

There has been added to the library during 1928 two hundred twenty-eight books besides having twenty-eight rebound. The total circulation of the year was 10,767, divided as follows: fiction, 6,884; non-fiction, 760; Juvenile fiction, 2,087; Juvenile non-fiction, 1,033, and a magazine circulation of 314. This gives an increase in book circulation of 4,404 for the year. In 1925 we reported 3,687 handled, with this year passing to 10,764, one cannot help but be pleased at the increased use of books with no increase in population. Most of this increase must be credited to Mrs. Emery's activity and it is to be hoped that soon she may receive a better sålary than at present.

Mrs. Emery and the trustees wish to thank Miss Flossie Duquette and Miss Bessie Winn for the assistance these young ladies have given the librarian free of charge, in her work at the libraries. Mrs. Emery states that it would have been impossible to have handled the work in the allotted time without their help.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

From last year's teaching staff only the Water Street teacher remains with us this year. Cadets from Keene Normal School are still employed at High Street. One of last year's cadets is now teaching in the primary room at the Plains. Every teacher is doing careful, conscientious work with commendable results.

The attendance table shows a high per cent of attendance at Water Street and the Plains Grammar School last year, with the lowest at High Street as during the previous year. High Street was also poorest in the tardiness record having over twelve tardinesses per pupil of average membership, a fifty per cent increase over the previous year. While none of the children live close to the schoolhouse they do not walk distances long enough to excuse such a poor record for promptness.

It seems likely that there will be fewer children at High Street next year and that the school will be closed.

The attendance at Water Street of nearly ninety-seven per cent is very good though the number of tardy marks there and at the Plains Primary is higher than it should be.

The best type of curtains obtainable were put into the Plains Grammar room this year. No further improvement can be made in the lighting except by extensive alterations. The new slate blackboards, a bequest from the estate of Miss Knowles, are a great addition to the equipment of the school.

A new set of six maps in an oak case has been recently placed in the Grammar room.

The toilet tanks at Water Street are both unfit for further use. In replacing them the newer type should be used. This new type is much better mechanically and is emptied

by draining into a dry well instead of by pumping out the contents. Tanks installed last summer in the White school-house in Loudon are entirely odorless and can be emptied in about one minute.
