THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than four o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a selectman for three years and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relative to games of Beano be adopted in this Town? (This question appears on the printed ballot.)

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$365.98 for Class 5 Highways TRA and the State will contribute \$2,439.84.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Class 5 Highways and Bridges. (Town Roads)

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for maintenance of the Town Dump without garbage disposal or the sum of \$300 with garbage disposal.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be expended on the road leading from the Whittemore Point road to the residence of Evelyn Gale.

8. To see if the Town will vote to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of the Improved Lands and Buildings in the Town of Bridgewater and make an appropriation for the same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78.00 for the Lakes Region Association.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78.00 for the Newfound Region Association.
11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for Town Poor.
13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Fire Protection.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 for Old Age Assistance.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Libraries.
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for Memorial Day.
17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Oiling the Whittemore Point Road.
18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes and deliver inventory blanks when assessing.
19. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Bridgewater for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: Dec. 31, 1949-Dec. 31, 1950:
(Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As shown therein, the Surplus increased by \$564.61 during 1950.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$714.55, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$158.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$556.52.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E) . .

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of December 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit E-1.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Tax Collector's Accounts:

In previous years' audit reports we have commented upon the inadequate records and accounting procedure of the Tax Collector. We have also made certain specific recommendations for improving the Collector's records and procedure. However, it must be stated that the Auditors again this year found the Collector's records

in the same condition as heretofore. The use of the cash book has not been adopted by the Collector and consequently remittances to the Treasurer are made in lump sum amounts, with no breakdown as the year of levy, etc.

It was also noted that remittances had not been made on a monthly basis as required by law. Reference to Exhibit F-2, shows that no remittances were made by the Collector to the Treasurer between January 26, 1950 and September 29, 1950. It was furthermore noted that the last two checks which the Collector remitted to the Treasurer, which were dated December 30, 1950, were not received by the Treasurer until the latter part of January 1951 and not until the Treasurer's accounts for the 1950 fiscal year had been closed. Consequently the amount of these two checks, \$953.52, had to be reported as Collector's Cash on Hand as of December 31, 1950, and will appear as a receipt in the Treasurer's accounts for the year 1951.

It is again recommended that the Tax Collector adopt the following procedures and accounting practises to correct the unsatisfactory situation which exists at the present time:

- (1) Adopt the use of the standard form of Collector's loose leaf columnar cash book.
- (2) Make monthly remittances to the Treasurer for the actual amount of all collections made since the date of previous remittance.
- (3) Each remittance to the Treasurer should be accompanied by the prescribed form of report, indicating the breakdown of tax collections which are included therein,—showing separately property taxes, poll taxes and interest by year of tax levy.
- (4) All tax collections should be remitted to the Treasurer **before** the Treasurer's books are closed for the fiscal year.

The Board of Selectmen should go over these matters with the Tax Collector and see that the recommended procedure is followed at once.

Conclusion :

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Bridgewater for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The month of November marked the close of five years of working together in Supervisory Union 4 under a new superintendent and it is a source of satisfaction to look back and count the achievements which have been made possible through the cooperation of teachers, school board members, taxpayers, State Board of Education, and the pupils themselves. All rooms have been painted, many have new lights, nine buildings have been painted outside, seven roofs redone, new heating installed in several buildings, improved playground equipment in at least two instances, and last but not least are two new buildings underway. These are all material achievements. To improve much on these matters will involve very expensive spending, and with future uncertainties it is well these things have been done. Non-material accomplishments have consisted in three teacher workshops, regrading of schools, extensive summer school attendance by the teachers, and the maintenance of a very competent teaching staff in spite of differences in ages, training, experience, and the lowest salaries in the state. How much longer this can be done is pure guess-work.

Our educational offerings in most towns are very limited and kept to the bare essentials. Only two towns offer music supervision, one offers handwriting supervision, none has art supervision, remedial reading, or physical education. High school offerings are almost equally limited but Bristol's will be quite modern on completion of the new school and proper staffing of the same. Yet the lake region section of Union No. 4 is, by any objective standard, one of the richest in the state and for this basic reason will never receive much, if any, state aid as long as a formula is based solely on need.

Solutions to our educational needs are not easy, and are expensive. Present state aid formulas are totally inadequate as to amount. A million dollars this year will probably not cover the new inflationary trend. The net result of this, both as to better educational opportunities for our children and for tax relief, will be close to zero. The basic purpose of any sound state aid program is to improve educational opportunities and not absorb inflationary trends over which we have absolutely no control.

Probably the taxpayers of Bridgewater, Hebron and Groton wonder why these towns now receive no state aid for their schools. These formulas are complicated affairs but perhaps one set of figures will help clarify this situation. To qualify for aid under the proposed formula Bridgewater would have to assess itself for more than \$17,110; Hebron for more than \$12,721; Groton for more than \$8,289. There is danger in stopping here for these assessments alone would not qualify the towns for aid unless they had pupils enough figured at \$175 for each elementary pupil and \$225 for each high school pupil to warrant such expenditures. Obviously none of these towns has enough pupils and all have a relatively large tax base. Stating it another way Hebron with 13 pupils (1949-50) has an equalized evaluation of \$732,731 while Danbury with 115 pupils has an equalized evaluation of \$598,367. Such inequalities are very apparent. Only when flat grants of money per pupil become a part of state aid will these three towns receive any aid, and then not much. In other words these three towns in varying degrees have a tax base enough to do what they will for themselves.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

All children had an annual inspection and parents were notified of defects found. All cases were followed-up and most of the defects were corrected or improved. Some cases, where it seemed necessary, received financial assistance from such welfare sources as the Salvation Army, Red Cross, Sight Conservation Program of the State Public Welfare, Lindsey Fund, and the Bristol Rotary Club.

In February 1950 Miss Nellie Clough, R. N., and Miss Constance Martin, R. N., staff nurses for the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Society, assisted me in giving the tuberculosis patch test to the children in grades seven through twelve inclusive. In all of my towns 357 children had the test with 5 showing positive reactions. Twenty-one teachers had the test with seven showing positive reactions. Teachers and children having positive reactions had chest x-rays and examinations at the Chest Clinic held in Bristol by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Society. No one showed any signs or symptoms of active tuberculosis.

Dental Clinics were held in Bristol with Dr. Sargent for the towns of Bristol, Bridgewater, Canaan, Danbury, and Hebron. Due to lack of time Alexandria and Grafton did not have their clinic but are being cared for first this year and we will try to do as many of the other towns as possible. In all 85 children attended the clinics, three of these were welfare cases. There are a number of children who need dental care whom I believe should have welfare dental work but due to the lack of available funds only the most urgent cases are cared for.

Three Tuberculosis patch tests were given—no positive reactions.

A Dental Clinic was held January 18, 1950. Four children attended and received treatment.

No communicable diseases other than colds occurred during the year.
